We are all thankful that the power cuts are over, and older people are particularly grateful to the many who did what could be done to alleviate the discomforts and dangers attendant on the coal strike. We were particularly glad to learn that our local coal merchant was able to see that old people, including some normally served by another merchant, had a continuing supply of solid fuel, even if it was not their usual sort.

We were also appreciative of the service provided by the local S. E. B. Showroom, who provided a clear indication of where and when cuts could be expected. It was not so in some other towns.

Motorists also appreciated the service of local garage men, who served petrol by "muscle power". The Vicarage also dit its bit, by giving hospitality to Brownies, Wives, and the W.I.

There were anomalies. A part of Appleford Road, including a favourite hairdresser, had a different time-table for cuts. The Vicar went to see how old Mrs Woodham was getting on without electric heat, and found her warm and watching television: a customer, on another day, went for a hairdo at what should have been a safe time, and went home disappointed. And Rationalists may well have wondered why the Church end of Sutton Courtenay missed the last lot of cuts!

WELL DONE, OUR P.T.A. We congratulate the P.T.A. who put 48 hours into organising the Parent's Interviews described on Page 5, and thank Mr Curd and all his Staff for the two exhausting evenings so fruitfully spent on this project. WHO MAKES IT? For three months we have been waiting to find room for fitting in sketches of the "News" Editors and Officers. Now we have lost the paper - and still have no room. It is sufficient now to say that our Editor, George Jager, first edited a duplicated Magazine - the Toc H "Salford Pilgrim" - in 1934 when he was an engineering apprentice; that Margaret McKenzie, his Assistant, who gets the pictures, is also Secretary of the P.T.A. and guards the door at the Youth Club; and that Reg Davies, the Postmaster, completes the Editorial Board. ANNUAL PARISH MEETING - MARCH 7th 1972

At the Meeting eleven members of the public were present and they raised the following matters.

Street Lighting - A plea was put forward for an improvement in street lighting, preferably a re-siting of some poles to overcome "blind dark spots" in some parts of the village. When the street lighting is restored, it is hoped that members of the public will write to the Chairman, 32 Harwell Road, suggesting which poles should be re-sited.

In this context complaint was also made of manhole covers that protrude above the level of the pavement and are a danger to pedestrians in the dark.

Pavements and footpaths - Complaints were again raised bout the state of the footpaths, notably the crumbling curbs on the New Estate and the roots of trees in Frilsham Street that have broken the surface of the pavement. The Parish Council will again press for action on these points, and members of the public are asked to notify the Council of places that seem to be dangerous.

At the end of the Annual Parish Meeting the Parish Council proceeded to hold its meeting. The following matters were discussed.

Southfield Drive - The responsibility for putting this in order lies with the developer, before action would be taken by the Council.

Sutton Entrance to Power Station - The barrier against heavy lorries has been put in place, but is not yet in working order.

Complaints against Pop Group noise - Letters were received from Mr Porter, Dr. Fletcher and the landlord of the Swan Inn complaining of the noise made at week-ends. Several Councillors hoped that the Group might be allowed to continue their practising in the Manor Barn (their only available place of practice) if they would contrive some means of adequately muffling the noise.

Children's Playground (new Estate) - Courcillor Mrs Moss raised the question of the state of the children's sand-pit. It was agreed that the pit should be cleaned out and the sand renewed. Councillor Fidler has offered to cut the grass. It was felt that it would be a great advantage if some parishioner would be willing to undertake periodic inspection and tidying up of the play-ground, as a previous Warden of the flats used to do. Anyone who might be willing to undertake this could contact any of the Parish Councillors.

It was with the deepest regret that Councillors heard from the Chairman that Mr Tame, who has been Clerk of the Council for so many years, feels obliged to resign from this office, owing to ill-health. No Council could ever have had a more patient or sympathetic Clerk. The vacant position will be advertised, and the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and Councillor Malein will form a Sub-Committee to deal with this. Next Parish Council Meeting will be held on April 4th, 7.30 p.m.

The following matters were discussed at the Meeting on Feb 8th. Southfield Drive

Street Lighting. The Parish has to pay for wanton damage.

Car Park. The Police would be asked to investigate derelict cars.

Planning permission. The Council agreed that the plan submitted for a new house and annexe at 15 The Green, was not suitable.

OUR FRIENDLY NEIGHBOURHOOD GIANT

Didcot Power Station authorities tried to warn us about new series of noises due to begin on March 13th and finish by the 25th. They are caused by the cleaning of No. 3 Boiler and associated pipework.

In answer to a letter from the Vicar asking for an explanation for the new signs erected on the private road through Didcot Power Station, the Site Manager wrote:-

"..... We are now erecting official notices advising that this road is a private road and that there is no through route.

We do not intend to police the road or control the traffic on it; but in order to maintain our rights that it is a private road, we will be closing it from time to time to the general public.

In the meantime the general public will not be stopped from using the road; but the Generating Board will not be responsible for any accidents or damage to private vehicles that may use that route. This is a matter for each car owner to clear with his own insurers."

In the power crisis we were glad to see, from the vapour from the cooling towers, that the Station is now in partial commission.
