HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

There can be few Horticultural Shows fortunate enough to be staged in a more attractive setting than the Manor Barn, generously lent every year by the Hon, David Astor, This year, the 23rd Summer Show held on 12th August, because of the difficult season entries in the flower, vegetable and fruit classes were lower than usual. On the other hand it was encouraging to have attracted in the Domestic Section 50% more entries than last year, Unfortunately the support from children, without the usual large primary school entry, remained disappointingly low.

It is pleasing to know, however, that the judges enthused over the high standard achieved in all sections, quite up to that expected of Sutton Courtenay.

Mr. M.J. Hutt of Sutton Wick with 15 firsts and 5 seconds won the Banksian medal, the Open Cup and the Francis Cup, while Mrs. G. Ling's 1 first, 5 seconds and 7 thirds gained her the Ladies Cup. Mrs. M. Davies won the Royal National Rose Society's medal. Winners of the Society's Awards of Merit were Mr. M.J. Hutt, Runner Beans and Collection of Vegetables, Mr. E.K. Jarman, potatoes; Mrs. I.A. Jarman mixed garden flowers, Mrs. R.D. Gough dahlias; Mrs. A. Lacey, patchwork quilt; Mrs. F.E. Downs, embroidery; Mr. F. Curd, home-made wine; Donna Woodward, miniature garden; Sandra Newton, crochet; Debra Mullins, collage "Flowers".

The Society's thanks are due to the small depleted committee and all the other people who contributed to the success of the Show, particularly the competitors, the donors of gifts for raffles and the stall and Mrs. Doreen Bradshaw, late of Norman Hall, who came from Abingdon to present the prizes.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

The following matters were discussed at the Parish Council Meeting held on July 11th.

BULK LITTER CONTAINER, FRILSHAM STREET, In reply to requests that this hight be emptied more frequently, the Public Health Inspector said that it was emptied twice a week, but that the overflow complained of was chiefly caused by children dragging mattresses, etc., from the container into the ditches. He would, however, endeavour to comply with complaints from parishioners, if they informed him.

FUMILE FOLIDAYS ACTIVITIES. The Parish Council agreed to donate £20, from the Free Fifth, towards this event.

HODGS AT 14 HARWELL ROAD The District Surveyor states that this is now a County responsibility and will be cut back. Eventually it will be removed altogether.

SIREM LIGHTING. The Council proposes to enquire about the possibility of insurance against damage to lamp standards caused by high vehicles, which has resulted in a bill for £21 from the bern Electricity Board for repairs to two lamp standards damaged lis way.

Our first impression was of the prgress that has been made since our first glimse seven years ago. New cars, mainly of East European make are quite plentiful; but, unless you win one in a lottery, you will have to wait six years for your 600 cc Trabant,

The new shopping centre in Dresden is like that in Coventry; but has splendid fountains and more space, and longer queses for Ice Cream. The famous Zwinger Art Gallery is fully restored and full of treasures. I have never seen so many young people crowding to see Old Masters. The general impression however is that of England in the drab 50's, with a great need of new paint.

We spent most of our time visiting Deaconesses, Protestant Sisters, who gaily combine the office of District Nurse and Parish Worker. They spoiled us with whipped cream and lavish meals, and, when we attempted to say that they were too kind, they insisted that as they were not allowed to travel (even to comfort your mother after your father's funeral in the West) they were so grateful to meet visitors from the West. MRS, SKINNER'S PRESUNTATION. (Extracted from Abingdon Deanery News)

On July 14th Mrs. Dorothy Skinner finished 18 years of very much appreciated service at Infant Teacher at Sutton Courtenay School and 42 years of teaching in Berkshire Schools, included our now defunct School at Appleford for which she was transferred in 1954. It was agreed beforehand that this was to be a very special occasion, and Mr. Curd, our Head Teacher organised it so that everything (including a letter that appeared in everyones Sutton Courtenay News except the Skinners') was kept secret until the last moment,

The Managers had already made their gift at a party given in Mrs. Skinner's honour at the Vicarage, and then, on the day before the end of term, the main presentations were made. The Director of Education was there, and so was our own Alderman Jack Francis, and a representative gathering of parents, managers and friends; and the sun had come out too.

The children sang a song, to the familiar tune of "Thank you", that had been specially written by Mr. Curd. The children's gift was presented by Sarah Caudle, whose grandfather had been a pupil under Mrs. Skinner, when she was a pupil-teacher. The teachers' gift was a V. H. F. radio set (a choice inspired by Cyril Skinners remark that Derothy would like to be able to hear Radio Oxford) Mr. Syd Vale, Deputy Head, presented it with an excellent speech, recalling that the total staff had been four, when they began together at the Old School.
