

Council Vacancies

Following Merouan Hemamda's resignation, there is another vacancy on the Council making three in total. Two of these vacancies have been advertised and no election called and

can therefore be filled by co-option when candidates come forward. Should the electorate wish to call an election for the vacancy left by Merouan's resignation then they should confirm this to the Vale of the White Horse District Council's Returning Officer - should they receive 10 requests for an election then one will be called rather than filling the position by co-option.

Following comments made at the consultation, the works have now been put out for tender. Further updates will be forthcoming over the next couple of months in relation to this.

Their enjoyment and ownership of the whole process was an absolute joy to see, and it felt wonderful to have parents and friends back in school to share their excitement.



A Journey Through History...

The following week, it was the turn of Year 3 and 4. They have been learning about pre-historic times and the Vikings in their planned curriculum. So, it seemed to make sense to present their learning in music, drama and song for their Spring production. The script was rich in historical knowledge, and the children had memorised complex speeches explaining the details of the periods. There were also drama sketches interleaved which brought the content to life, two sections of performance poetry and six lively songs with challenging pace and lyrics. The standard of performance was extremely high, and everyone involved can feel very proud! It was an awesome display of learning!



Developing musical knowledge...

We are lucky to be part of a Trust that values music highly. This year, all children in Key Stage 2 have been taught weekly by a specialist music teacher, Miss Melidis. They have learned correct musical notation and experienced reading music with tuned instruments and percussion. Children in Year 3 have been learning the recorder, and those in Year 4 have experienced keyboards and drums this year. These instruments were incorporated into the show to

give children the chance to perform live, which is, of course, an important part of music.

There was another sign that things are returning to normal this week; we held one of our end of term musical assemblies for our musicians in order to showcase their learning. This term we heard, and saw, our pianists play, along with the various bands in the iRock groups. It was lovely to be able to welcome parents to this assembly too. We were also really pleased to see how those children who were not performing listened politely, and to see how they clearly enjoyed watching their peers perform. Being an appreciative audience is also a skill!



Cars

As a member of two Councils, each with a top priority of doing what they can to address climate change, I am amazed at how much of my casework revolves around the problems of cars; parking, neighbourhood disputes, potholes, traffic speeds and congestion — at the heart of all these issues is the motor car.

Now I am as guilty as anyone. I own two cars. One is a much-loved old Citroen Saxo – high mileage in its early years – reliable and cheap to run in spite of high road tax due to its relatively high emissions. I know it is coming to the end of its days, but it will be sad to say goodbye after 20 years of reliable service. The other one is a 9-year-old Seat – with, at one stage, what seemed like low emissions, low road tax and more mpg than the Saxo. However, like so many of us, I am wrestling with the guilt that in the interests of a healthier world, I should be reducing to one electric car and finding a way of financing it.

My generation has never known a world without cars. The US grid layout of cities is down to the motor car. Our own cities and towns were built for the horse and cart. Adapting them for the motor car has been a problem for more than a century. I was recently shown two photographs of New York streets — the first in 1908 (only horses and carts in sight) — the second in 1913 (nothing but cars). The change was both dramatic and complete within 5 years. Major changes in transport can happen in a very short time. Are we now on the verge of such a dramatic change?

We all expect to own at least one car and to drive between 5000 and 15000 miles a year. Cars require roads and there is a common acceptance that as more and more cars appear, we need more and more roads to accommodate them.

Induced Demand.

Since 1913, the evidence has been growing that building more roads itself generates more traffic. In our congested little island, this has now become a problem we ignore at our peril. More roads – more cars – more roads - in a neverending cycle. There is also mounting evidence that, if a new road is built, the temptation to use our cars (rather than walking or cycling or using public transport) increases with induced demand. As all our roads become ever more congested, many are now arguing that we need to break this cycle and that road building is not the solution. Our resources might be better spent on maintaining our present system and repurposing our roads to positively encourage alternatives to car transport whilst actively discouraging the use of the car. I am always being charged with being anticar. Guilty as charged.

If I am sitting in a traffic queue whilst regular buses in a dedicated bus lane are overtaking me, am I more likely to choose bus travel? If there is a safe, dedicated footpath and cycle way, will I choose to walk or cycle? At present, too many bus timetables are disrupted by car traffic. If my bus is held up in car and other traffic, I am much more likely to travel by car. Many young people in London choose not to own a car because public transport is quicker, easier and journey times more reliable. Discouraging single occupancy; congestion charging; toll roads - these will all have to be considered alongside measures to make public transport and active travel more attractive for everyone.

Local issues and possible solutions

The proposed new HIF Rd designed to alleviate traffic congestion, reduce environmental damage, and provide for further growth in our area, is being argued over as I write. It may be that we have to have this road to address immediate and past problems, however, conversations and studies over longer-term planning are likely to move us all away from new road building as a solution. Our money would be better spent on bus and rail, cycle and pedestrian lanes and so on. Is it just possible that this road might be the last built in Oxfordshire? Because if we want our children to enjoy a healthier, happier world, my generation may well have to accept that car ownership was a privilege we once had, but it can no longer be treated as a right.

DAVID JOHNSTON MP



Since I last wrote, I have given two speeches on two very different topics, but they have one thing in common. The first was about rape conviction rates in this country. I talked about

the fact they're too low and shared cases from constituents anonymously to highlight how the system doesn't work well enough for the victims. I shared stats I'd been given about public attitudes to rape that a constituent had given me and I stressed the need to educate boys about the right way to treat girls so they grow up to be men who behave in the right way towards women.

The second speech was about the lack of GP practices for the number of houses we've had built. Yes, I know, a regular topic that I talk about, but I've joined forces with colleagues who have similar issues in their constituencies to maximise our campaigning efforts. I set out in detail the level of housebuilding we've had, the fact that years and years have passed without additional, promised GP practices being built and I talked about what I thought should happen, including infrastructure going in first and setting a maximum number of patients per GP or practice (surprisingly, there isn't one at present).

What the two very different topics have in common — apart from being longstanding issues — is that no one organisation is responsible for solving the problem. Both are of course significantly affected by what Governments do (or don't do). But the failure to see enough rape prosecutions is also partly about what the police, the CPS and judges do, as well as about societal attitudes, which affect jury decisions. And on GP practices, it's partly to do with the actions of housebuilders and developers, councils, the Clinical Commissioning Group and national NHS bodies. People understandably look to Government to solve problems, but authority in this country tends to be well dispersed — and for good reasons — so, unfortunately, no one lever being pulled in Westminster will quickly solve them.

In amongst all the despair of the national and international news it has been heartening to see the response to the refugee crisis across the world; in this country and,

more locally, in the villages of the DAMASCUS Parish, in many and varied ways. Every single act of kindness; every gift of money; every prayer said, all offer a sign of Easter hope in a Good Friday world.

John Rutter, the composer, has written a new choral work in response to the invasion of Ukraine. Funds raised from 'A Prayer for Ukraine', are going to the Disasters Emergency Committee's Ukraine appeal. explained: "How can a composer respond to a global tragedy? I suppose by writing music: like everybody I have been shocked and dismayed by the events of recent days. The first thing I wanted to do was write music that would respond in my own way. I went to a late-night service in my old college chapel where they sang a setting of a lovely Ukrainian prayer, so having encountered the Ukrainian text...I wrote my own music. I hope the meaning of the text will resonate in people's hearts." The words of the piece, which are originally in Ukrainian, translate into English as: "Good Lord protect the Ukraine. Give her strength, courage, faith, and hope. Amen." He added: "I hope it speaks in terms which reach out to the Ukrainian people in their hour of need." We might not have the ability to compose a special piece of music but we can all look to using our gifts, our talents and our resources to serve and help others in whatever way we can. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell, have said in the light of the war that "all people of goodwill [are called upon] to join in prayer for the people of Ukraine and to work practically to support them in their hour of need...In these days of uncertainty and fear, we pray that each of us might again turn to the Lord and receive God's gift of peace, work for God's justice, and know God's reconciliation and love."

It has been humbling to witness the outpouring of love and care for the Ukrainian refugees. An open meeting was held in the River Room in early April to bring together people who were wanting to help. This has created a network of individuals and families, some of whom are already welcoming refugees into their homes; some of whom are in the process of registering; some who want to offer community support to refugees and to host families, and others who are willing to donate money or fundraise*. And in Sutton Courtenay we have the amazing example of Alan Calver who is planning a tandem parachute jump on 19th June

to raise money for the DEC Ukraine Humanitarian fund (see advert for details of how you can sponsor him). And as we look at how we can help, in our own way, let's not forget refugees from other countries and situations. We still have Afghan refugee families living in hotels in Milton and our village school has done an amazing job in welcoming some of the children into their midst and offering a place of safety where they can learn and flourish. The school is still looking for volunteers to come and read with the children – if you would like to help, please contact the school directly. Over 20K People Fell Victim To Remote Access Scams

More than £50 million was lost last year to scams where victims are tricked into handing over control of their computer or smartphone to criminals.

New data from Action Fraud, the national reporting centre for fraud and cybercrime, reveals that 20,144 people fell victim to scams where they were persuaded to grant criminals remote access to their device. Victims reported losing a total of £57,790,384 – an average loss of £2,868 per victim.

What are remote access scams

Remote Access scams will often begin with a browser pop-up saying that your computer is infected with a virus, or maybe a call from someone claiming to be from your bank saying that they need to connect to your computer in order to cancel a fraudulent transaction on your account. Regardless of the narrative the fraudster's use, their goal is to steal your money or access your financial information by tricking you into allowing them to remotely connect to your computer.

Detective Chief Inspector Craig Mullish, from the City of London Police, said:

"While remote access tools are safe when used legitimately, we want the public to be aware that they can be misused by criminals to perpetrate fraud. We often see criminals posing as legitimate businesses in order to trick people into handing over control of their computer or smartphone. "You should only install software or grant remote access to your computer if you're asked by someone you know and trust, such as a friend or family member, and never as a result of an unsolicited call, browser pop-up or text message."

How to protect yourself

- Only install software or grant remote access to your computer if you're asked by someone you know and trust, such as a friend or family member, and never as a result of an unsolicited call, browser pop up, or text message.
- Remember, a bank or service provider will never contact you out of the blue requesting remote access to your device.
- If you believe your laptop, PC, tablet or phone has been infected with a virus or some other type of malware, follow the NCSC's guidance on recovering an infected device.
- Protect your money by contacting your bank immediately on a different device from the one the scammer contacted you on.
- Report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or via actionfraud.police.uk. If you are in Scotland, please report to Police Scotland directly by calling 101.

Cold Callers

Residents are being warned to be cautious of cold callers offering to do driveway, landscaping or roofing work. They also often target consumers by leaflet dropping and creating fake profiles online.

Many traders will be booked up, so the advice is to be wary of traders who can arrive to start the work the following day and push for a quick agreement to use them. Always make sure you receive a final total cost in writing before agreeing to any work starting.

Oxfordshire residents can check the Local Authority's Buy with Confidence scheme for local traders who have been vetted and approved by Trading Standards.

If anyone believes that they have been the victim of such a rogue trader and wants advice, you can contact the Citizens Advice National Consumer Service on 0800 144 8848 or via its website at Citizens Advice.

Basic Guidelines for Hosting Ukrainian Refugees

If you are one of those who have generously offered to host Ukrainian refugees, you need to know what is involved.

The government hasn't yet released complete details of how the "Homes for Ukraine" scheme will work, but as of the time of writing (mid-April 2022) the following guidelines apply:

First, you can volunteer for someone from the Ukraine to come to the UK and live with you. If you know of specific Ukrainians whom you wish to host, those people can apply to come to the UK. If you don't know of any particular people you want to host, you can sign up to be matched with one or more people. In either case, your local council will pay £350 per month per sponsor or property.

You must be able to provide the right kind of accommodation: it can be a spare room or an empty property, but it must be safe, suitable and large enough. The local council will visit you to make sure that the living space is appropriate. In addition, safety checks will be carried out on both hosts and guests, including police and criminal records checks.

Before you apply for the scheme, do check with your mortgage provider and/or your home insurance company, if applicable, to ensure that they have no objections.

You must be willing to let the refugee(s) stay with you, or in your separate accommodation, for at least six months - the longer the better. You may not charge them rent. Your guests will have the right to work and study, claim benefits, use the NHS, go to school and attend free English classes.

Citizens Advice can help with claims for benefits and other necessities. Our website at www.citizensadvice.org.uk has relevant information which is constantly updated as new rules are publicised.

Rest in Peace

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following person who died recently:

Nancy Jane Lyford (Jane) who died on 18th March 2022 was born into the Tomkins family on 13th June 1932, the youngest of eight children. Sadly, both her parents died whilst she was young and she was subsequently adopted by the Perkins family. She had a happy childhood, attending school in Banbury and then going to boarding school before getting a clerical job at Horton General Hospital and then becoming a student nurse at the Radcliffe Infirmary. Whilst training she met George, who was a patient on her ward. Jane gave up nursing to get a job with more money at the MG Car Factory, where George worked.

Jane boarded at the "George and Dragon" and often went to Abingdon shopping. One day, as she came out of "Masons" wool shop a girl stopped her and asked if she was Jane. It was Audrey — one of her long-lost sisters, who then lived at Marcham. After that meeting, they kept in touch and in time Jane was reunited with her other brothers and sisters. After saving up £500 Jane and George got married in January 1957 in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay. They initially lived in a flat in Tyrrells Way before moving to a house in Bradstocks Way which became the family home. Shirley was born in July 1958 and Judith in September 1961. Jane stayed at home until Judith was 12 when they both went to Secondary school, and then took a job at DOE, Milton, where she stayed for 20 years.

Jane enjoyed living in the village, amongst friends and neighbours who all supported one another as a real They would often work together potato picking for the Cauldwells or turkey plucking at Christmas. She was devastated by George's premature death from lung cancer but with sheer determination she rebuilt her life and focused her time on helping to bring up her grandchildren. Jane was always immensely proud of her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren and loved every moment spent with them. Sadly, she was diagnosed with dementia seven years ago and moved to Abingdon to live with Ju where she was cared for by the family with help from a wonderful team of carers. Her funeral was held in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay on 12th April where tributes were given by various family members. This is an edited extract from the tributes and the address given at the funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.


