Recreation Ground Upgrade

The final equipment choices for Phase 1 of the upgrade are just being finalised along with the final aspects of funding. Once these are agreed, we will be able to formalize the

contract and get dates for the installation. Please keep an eye on the website over the summer for updates and further details.

Planning

We understand that the Hobbyhorse Lane application is due to be heard by the planning committee at Vale of the White Horse District Council in August. The Parish Council is approaching the District Council to request that this is delayed as many people may not be able to attend as they may be on holiday.

In relation to other planning matters, the HIF application relating to the new bridge crossing appears to have been halted for the present. However, the 5 Parish Joint Committee continue to work to commission reports into matters which will affect the parishes with the instigation of the project when the time comes.

Council has recently objected to a planning application made by Hansen to extend the movement times at the workings on the basis of the proposed hours being too long and having an effect on the villagers' enjoyment of their private residences due to excess noise.

New Chairman

At the June meeting of the Parish Council, Councillor Rita Atkinson was elected as Chairman for the remainder of the civic year.

Scams - Beware

Scamming has become increasingly common in recent years. COVID has given Scammers many new opportunities and it seems that our ability to tackle the problem is permanently lagging behind the ingenuity/criminality of the scammers. Most financial institutions have improved their security, often at the expense of the customer's convenience and ease of use. Security phone calls and messages add an extra layer of complication to even the simplest of financial transactions. Until our systems have worked out how to trace Scammers, we are stuck with the system as it is. It is now more important than ever that we protect the vulnerable and our family and friends from Scamming and other types of sharp practice.

My recent experience has taught me that it is not only the elderly and vulnerable who can be very easily scammed. I have discovered the hard way that obtaining an "ESTA" form for foreign travel is open to such sharp practice.

The first contact details that appear on a Google search for ESTAs all appear to be bona fide government websites with all the official logos. When contacted, the applicant is invited to fill in a form (name, DOB, passport number etc.) for an official ESTA to be returned in a couple of days - all for a charge of somewhere between £120-150 per ESTA. What you are not told is that they are transferring the information to an official government ESTA service form — a form that is no more complex than the one you have just completed — which they then send to the official government ESTA-issuing authority. It costs them (in my case) \$14 for this non-service. In other words, they have pocketed well over £100 for doing something you can do for yourself.

I am still trying to explain to my wife why our visit to the US to greet our new grandchild has cost £280 more than intended.

20mph Initiative

There has never been an Oxfordshire County Council initiative more popular than the installation of 20mph zones in any village or town that wants it. True, there some hoops that have to be gone through to qualify, but the process is straightforward. I am not aware of anyone who has failed. It would be a brave politician who tried to unravel or challenge the initiative now.

I have received a couple of enquiries asking exactly what is the justification for this initiative. It's a fair question, so here is my attempt to answer it. Obviously, safety is the overriding justification. All Councils are trying to get people out of cars and make walking and cycling a more attractive and less risky option. The chances of death or serious injury are drastically reduced as speeds reduce from 30-20mph. With increasing numbers of electric cars, any concerns that 20mph produces more pollution are becoming less persuasive. Enforcement is an issue, but the safety benefits increase every 1mph reduction in traffic speeds. If some drivers are determined to drive at 30mph in a 20mph zone, other people are safer than if the same driver drives at 35mph in a 30mph zone. In other words, enforcement, in my view, should never stop us introducing speed limits. Every life saved, every injury less severe, is progress.

Much will be happening in the autumn with decisions on the Reservoir and major local road building. So, here's wishing everyone a good holiday, free of Covid and, if possible, free of travel disruption.

SUTTON COURTENAY AND ROYALTY

The recent Platinum Jubilee celebrations are a reminder of the village's links with royalty in the past.

Archaeological investigations have revealed an Anglo-Saxon settlement of significance, including several halls which may have been a royal centre. In AD 801 Sutton (or Sudtone) became a royal vill which would be visited by the king and his entourage as they travelled round the kingdom. The royal vill was an administrative centre with extensive lands and provided provisions for visits of the king.

The Domesday Book of 1086 shows that the manor of Sutton was held by the king, William the Conqueror, and farmed by tenants. As well as the cultivated land it included several mills and areas of woodland.

The royal connection continued when Henry I sent his wife, Queen Matilda, to Sutton for her confinement because of the medical skills of the monks of Abingdon Abbey, including Faritius, the Abbot. A daughter, also called Matilda, was born about February, 1102. As a child she was betrothed to the Holy Roman Emperor, went to live in France and became the Empress Matilda on her marriage.

When the Emperor died in 1125 Matilda married Geoffrey, Count of Anjou and they had three sons.

Henry I had named Matilda as his successor but when he died in 1135 her cousin Stephen claimed the throne. Matilda returned to England in 1139 to pursue her claim and that of her son Henry and years of civil war ensued. With the support of his companion and fellow Crusader, Reginald de Courtenay, Henry II succeeded to the throne in 1154. In recognition of his loyalty, he gave custody of the manor of Sutton to Reginald de Courtenay and the village soon became known as Sutton Courtenay – but that's another story!

From the Ministry Team

A few weeks ago, my daughter was teaching a group of students map reading skills as part of their Duke of Edinburgh award. Much to her

surprise, one of the students suggested taking a short cut across some private land, saying it would be alright as long as they didn't get caught. It was the first time she had encountered this attitude and wondered if the young people were unconsciously picking up the current confusion in our political leadership.

Why does it matter that people in power tell the truth and keep the rules they've made for everyone else? Why do some of us find it difficult to forget the scandals and move on? Is it because we recognise that something much deeper is being questioned? As a country, we have taken for granted many values that hold our society together: truth, integrity, fair play, justice, and compassion towards those in need. Could we find ourselves unable to move on because alarm bells are going off? If the people in power exempt themselves from the values that hold together the common good, they are eroding the bonds of trust placed in them and their office.

In his sermon at the Service of Thanksgiving for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, Archbishop Stephen Cottrell said, 'The best leaders ... are those ... who lead for others not themselves. People whose heart's desire is to serve the common good.' He was, of course, praising the Queen for her dedication in serving the country and commonwealth. She has often told us that she is sustained by her Christian faith and has said, 'For me, the life of Jesus Christ ... is an inspiration and an anchor in my life.' Jesus had some challenging words about leadership for his disciples: Whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be the servant of all (Mark 10:43-44).

Let's pray for those in leadership, whether in our workplace, in different levels of government and businesses, as well as in our recreational activities, so that we all may live quiet and peaceful lives.

DAVID JOHNSTON MP



I have just launched a campaign to help young people at local state schools get work experience with the great employers we have in the constituency. This was part of

what I used to do when I ran charities, because most work experience goes to the relatives of existing employees or clients, meaning young people without connections struggle to get it. It's essential to get work experience, because it gives you an understanding of the world of work, teaching you what to wear, how to interact with people, how an organisation fits together. And it gives you something you can put on your CV — as well as your first connections. It has almost disappeared as a result of the pandemic, so I'm leaning on the employers at Harwell and Milton Park, in particular. If your organisation can help, wherever it is, do please get in touch.

On 2 consecutive days recently, we had debates that allowed me to raise some of the constituent issues I am most often contacted about:

First, we had the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which contains the Government's planning reforms. I am very pleased the Government has listened to those of you who raised objections to the zonal system that was being suggested. It is also going to put more weight on local plans and not require a 5-year land supply if your local plan is up to date – welcome news for us. The planning process will be fully digitalised; but I asked again for hybrid meetings to be permitted (as well as measures to ensure the digitally excluded can still participate). I banged the drum again for my campaign for new houses to be built to the latest environmental standard, not the one when they got planning permission, which is often several years earlier. I also stressed that there is still an issue with housing targets. South and Vale have typically exceeded their targets, but we continue to have an issue with the city of Oxford demanding the highest number of houses then hardly building any of them, meaning the burden falls on the rest of the county.

And, of course, I raised lack of infrastructure.



• The following day was a debate about Ofwat and I again brought up the issue of lack of infrastructure. The Government has just set new priorities for Ofwat, and I used a debate on these to talk about the sewage releases in Oxfordshire waters, the poor water infrastructure that often accompanies new homes and the objections to the reservoir proposal. You can find both speeches on my website/Facebook pages.

I had a great 4 days of Platinum Jubilee celebrations including in Didcot, Faringdon, Wantage, Grove, West Hanney, Harwell and Wallingford. Along the way there was lots of food, plenty of games, Vikings, Morris dancers, animals and an impressive array of classic cars — well done to everyone involved. God save our wonderful Queen.

CONCERT 22ND MAY - REVIEW

Live choral music returned to All Saints' church with a wonderful programme of music performed by the All Saints' Singers - their first concert since the Covid lockdown. The choir's Music Director Sebastian Thomson gave the choir clear direction throughout and had clearly prepared his singers with thorough and effective rehearsals; and the concert was ably accompanied by organist Ben Giddens.

The choir gave a spirited and committed performance of sacred music by Mozart, Haydn and Vivaldi. The opening piece was the Missa Brevis in C by Mozart (K220) — nicknamed the Sparrow Mass because some of the accompaniment has been likened to the chirping of these birds - with contribution from the evening's soloists: Hannah Fraser-Mackenzie (soprano), Clemmie Franks (alto), Dominic Bevan (tenor), and Michael Hickman (bass). There were a couple of late entries in the opening movement - any choir could be forgiven for a little rustiness in performance after such a long layoff - but these were soon forgotten during the emotionally charged later movements where soloists and choir interacted well.

Next, we had the ever-popular Ave Verum Corpus by Mozart (K618) which was beautifully delivered to a spell-bound audience. The Te Deum in C major by Haydn completed the first half of the concert, a piece taken in a single continuous movement and requiring some vocal stamina, especially the final section Non Confundar in Aeternum. Often this work can seem rushed owing to overfast tempi, but this performance was taken steadily and benefitted from the singers' clear annunciation of the Latin text.

After an interval for drinks, the second half of the concert was devoted to Vivaldi. First Hannah Fraser-Mackenzie gave a beautiful rendition of the sublime motet Nulla in Mundo Pax Sincera (RV630). The evening finished with the wonderful Gloria in D (RV630) – one of Vivaldi's best-loved works. Some of the movements were taken at a rather pedestrian pace but overall, it was an effective performance.

It was clear from the smiles of the audience, choir, and soloists that this was a very enjoyable and well-received concert.

Our 118 volunteers and our 23 (mainly part-time) staff, advise over 9,000 people each year from four main advice centres. At present our advice centres are partially open and many of our staff and volunteers operate our Adviceline service from home.

We are members of National Citizens Advice, which means we have access to its services, resources and support and it sets and audits our advice standards. However, as an independent charity, we are responsible for running our own affairs and much of our funding comes from District, Town and Parish Councils and local charities.

Trustees are asked to attend six Board meetings a year, held in the evening at various locations. Each Trustee is encouraged to take an interest in a particular aspect of the charity's work.

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following person who died recently:

Diana Marion HASTING, who died on 17th April 2022 was born on 7th August 1936 and her funeral was held in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay on 20th May 2022 followed by burial in Milton Cemetery. Tributes were given at her funeral by her grandchildren and by her cousin, Edmund Sixsmith, of which this is an edited extract:

As a child Diana attended Abbots Bromley school where she was clever enough and bossy enough to be head girl but too mischievous to get the job. She got several effortless Alevels and could have gone to Oxford or Cambridge but she told her father it would be a waste of his money and her time and she would go to secretarial college because within a few years she would be married and have several children. She came top at her secretarial college and was recruited by 10 Downing St. to be one of the 'garden room girls' working for the Prime Minister, Sir Anthony Eden and then Harold McMillan. She did indeed marry young and rapidly produced four delightful children.

Diana's life was marked with two tragedies. The death of her younger brother Philip in the canoeing accident in Austria in 1965 age 28; and the death of her son Toby in 2008. Diana bore these tragedies and other difficulties with fortitude and faith.

Diana was a pillar of the church and certainly considered becoming ordained. She gained a degree in theology at a mature age. She would, one suspects, have made an excellent vicar. She would almost certainly have been rapidly promoted to Abbot. She was active in the Mothers' Union and the Women's Institute, both at a national level and presided over a Jamboree in Westminster in 1985 attended by a thousand members. She was also the backbone of the Abbots Bromley Old Girls' network. The charity Parents and Children Together benefited from many years of Diana's tireless efforts and she was awarded MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours in 2016 - richly deserved! Diana was head of the Sixsmith family for the last 30 years and as all members of the family know, kept everyone well informed and well under control. She will be greatly missed by us all. Her radiant smile, often infectious, will never be forgotten.

And an edited extract from the address given by The Reverend Helen Kendrick:

Most of us knew Diana through her involvement in church life; her work with the Conservative Party; or through her many charitable endeavours. Throughout all of this she was a perfectionist who worked to extremely high standards and expected others to do the same. Straight talking and honest - she demanded a lot of herself, and she demanded a lot of those around her. She was passionate about those things in which she believed -and she held strong opinions on numerous topics, which she was never afraid to voice. Intelligent and deep thinking, she enjoyed discussing everything from theology to world affairs. Diana would always have an opinion to express - whether in a Parochial Church Council or Deanery or Diocesan Synod meeting; a bible study group or on the numerous committees across the church and the charities she supported and with which she was involved. She liked nothing better than a lively discussion on some thorny theological issue and she always had something of value to contribute. However, her manner of delivery could be intimidating to some, and this did not always make life easy for those around her. She was never afraid of disagreeing with someone else - often seeming to relish a good confrontation! She certainly knew her own mind, but I think age did mellow her and she appeared more willing to consider the views of others in recent years. Nevertheless, Diana was a woman who got things done. Her heart was always in the right place, and she was often the first to offer to take up a job - even those that no one else was prepared to do. If you did ask Diana to do something you could always guarantee that it would be done – and probably twice as quick as you had anticipated. She was a gifted proofreader and would not hold back from pointing out mistakes made - particularly if it involved an inadvertent addition of an 's' to her surname! Diana loved good food, good wine and good company. She was generous with her hospitality and enjoyed joining in with all the social occasions she could. She and Peter had a wide and varied circle of friends – in the church community and further afield through naval connections and charitable work. She was also very caring, kind-hearted and supportive – often in unseen ways. Her faith gave meaning to her life and underpinned all that she And I know that she drew great strength from worshipping over the years - at St Peter's in Drayton and at All Saints', and indeed across the DAMASCUS Parish - and she has been an important part of our parish community for many, many years. She witnessed several vicars come and go and found wry amusement in the slow progress of change in the church and the repetitive nature of much of the church decision making process. But whatever the vagaries of church life, Diana's faith was pivotal to how she lived. She believed firmly in the virtues of duty, of service to the community and generous giving - of her time, her talents, her energy and her money. She will be greatly missed by her many friends and her family who gathered for her funeral on 20th May.
