Recreation Ground Refurbishment

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone who attended the reopening of the play area on a rather chilly, yet

sunny Wednesday just before Christmas. There are plans being made for a grand opening once the weather warms up.

The Recreation Ground, which is owned by the Parish Council, previously had a rather small and tired play area, plus a multi-use games area (MUGA) and a skate park. Following a £315,000 refurbishment the northern side of the site now has a large fenced play area with over 15 pieces of equipment designed for children aged 2-14 years; a new MUGA; a new BMX pump track; a 4 person carousel; new shelters, benches and improved access from the car park with a footpath linking the areas.

The project has been financed with a £100,000 grant from FCC Communities Foundation; a £10,000 grant from National Lottery Awards for All England; £97,000 from developers' contributions (60% of which had been tied to providing recreational facilities) and £78,000 of public funds held by the Parish Council, the majority of which had been saved up over recent years.

At the south west corner of the Recreation Ground, thanks to a grant of £30,000 from the Sutton Courtenay National Power Trust, an outdoor fitness area has been installed with 6 activity stations. Visitors can download an app from Kompan Ltd which enables them to download videos and tips on how to use the equipment.

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council Budget

The Parish Council has agreed the budget for the forthcoming financial year -2023-24. Parish Councillors decided to keep the contribution from Council Tax payers the same as 2022-23. As there has been a slight increase in the number of properties in the parish this is resulted in an increase of £238 in the overall precept.



Happy New Year!

Although the spring term starts in January, which feels like a dark month, time very quickly gathers momentum and we start to see signs of spring. The evenings will get lighter, and we will see the first flowers soon. In school, it is a favourite term of many teachers as they really start to see the children come on with their learning. They have fully settled with their teachers and progress accelerates across the curriculum.

All the children have made a great start to the new year, with the atmosphere around school calm and purposeful. As always, as a staff, we are constantly looking at what is going well and what we can do even better. On our Inset day we were looking at how we can model learning for the children more effectively through our clear explanations, as this will help them pick up on challenging concepts more easily. As a team of teachers and teaching assistants we work to share ideas.

SIAMS inspection

On Friday 18th November we had a visit from the SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) inspectors. This is the inspection which Church schools undergo every five years. I am delighted to share the final version of our report, which is now published on the website. The report reflects the best of our school, and we can rightly feel very proud. In gathering evidence for the report, inspectors spoke with parents, governors, trustees, teachers, and most importantly, children. I am also proud of the way the whole school community conducted themselves through the inspection process -everyone was calm, articulate and quietly confident. The report captures many of the lovely things that make our school special, but in particular our strong vision and the curriculum which enables children to grow in this.

How we support attendance

This term, attendance can really suffer as there are so many illnesses around which spread rapidly through school. We work hard to achieve good attendance in school, because this is the best way for children to reach their potential. When

children have low attendance, it not only has negative impact on their academic work, but it can also make it difficult for them to maintain friendships and learn social rules. However, we aim to manage this in a supportive way. Sometimes families can find children are reluctant to come to school, and there is a lot we can do to support them, working together to look at the barriers that may be creating anxiety. We track attendance carefully, looking at patterns we see emerging, and we aim to support early if things are going off track.

Welcome back, Mrs Kapswarah

Mrs Kapswarah has returned to our school this term after leaving in 2019 —she is delighted to be back and has settled into Robins class very quickly this week. The children have made the transition to a new teacher extremely well. Having a teacher join us who has experience in a range of other settings is a wonderful opportunity for us as a school, as they see ways of working with fresh eyes and can help us to develop what we do. For the first few days, Mrs Kapswarah's focus has been on hearing every child read, making sure she really knows what their next steps are. She has also suggested some new books we have been able to order to complement our existing reading scheme.

Happy New Year!

A new year seems an opportune time to invite you to take a moment and think about what "youth work" means to you. We would love to hear from you (contact details below).

For us, at its core, "youth work" is about understanding and validating the experiences of young people, but equally about challenging and educating, albeit informally, to deepen their experiences.

Youth work did not develop to "keep kids off the streets" or to keep them entertained with "something to do". We do not see ourselves as the 'providers', but the 'enablers' of communities and their young people; and we challenge the notion that youth work is only about providing tangible youth activities in isolation from the rest of the community. It is said that "there is no one way of doing youth work". However, it is accepted by all practitioners, that whatever the approach, we work towards the same values and principles of positive youth development – the six Cs:

- Character
- Compassion
- Competency
- Confidence
- Connection
- Contribution

For us, a lot of the work in addressing the six Cs happens in encounters at bus stops, shops, parks, street corners where we engage with young people and find they are eager to be heard. We engage with young people to help them to feel valued and motivate them to become active members of their community through social action. And this is where the wider community has to play its part – "*it takes a village to raise a child*".

Going forward, our work will focus much more on making those community connections, with youth advocacy & leadership in the community at its heart. A sustainable win-win for everyone in our growing community.

In addition to the one-to-one bespoke support we give to young people and our detached work meeting young people wherever they are out in the community, we also run weekly in-building sessions. Our plan is to theme these sessions on a monthly rotating basis as follows:

- Week 1. Drop in A safe & welcoming space for all young people to feel ownership and responsibility towards that space. Games, music, chat & chill.
- Week 2. Mind and Body Gym Keeping active through sport & brain games, empowering

young people to make informed decisions and widen horizons.

- Week 3. Dare2Be –A space for young people to express themselves by experimenting with different modes of creativity (e.g. art, music, storytelling).
- Week 4. Village Youth Voice and Community Action – Youth-led conversations on the burning questions of the day. A space for young people to be heard & seen and to develop leadership skills in order to become contributing members of their communities and plan social action.

We believe young people are fully capable and able to solve their own issues with appropriate support, and we are excited to re-claim the roots of meaningful youth work & to support young people to be the change makers in the communities in which they live!

Reservoir - your chance to respond...

Traffic

It cannot be denied that our roads are becoming more and more congested. Even the rat runs are choked with rats. Whilst the pressure for more and more housing remains, and with it the pressure on County Highways to pass new developments, is it inevitable that things are going to get worse? The photographs attached show rush hour queues at Culham Bridge, Drayton Rd, and the A415 at Marcham. It would be only too easy to find many more. Have we already reached saturation point? The latest major housing development to be considered in our area is the Lioncourt development at Fyfield with 600+houses potentially spilling yet more cars on to the Frilford crossroads. Marcham. OCC Highways judge that the effect on Marcham will be marginal, but there are concerns that this argument must soon run out and the cumulative impact of several developments on the immediate and wider area must carry more weight. But spare a thought for OCC Highways and the District Councils. Under our current planning system, Districts have to offer up areas for thousands more houses in their Local Plans. OCC is then charged with trying to make our Highway network function properly and take all the resultant flak. Having just arrived back home from a photography session, having spent the best part of two hours driving a very few miles, I am struck by the irony of the damage we are causing to the environment, to our own physical and mental health and to the impact on local commerce. Are our only solutions growth at all costs and ever more roads?

A lighter note - New Year Resolution

Determined as I am to get out of my car and on to my bicycle whenever possible, I decided a few days ago that the weather was warm enough for a shopping visit to Tesco by bicycle. Yes, it had been raining, but the forecast looked promising. As we approached via the Ock Valley cycle path, we passed a pedestrian coming the other way who kindly warned us that the path ahead was flooded but just about passable. My wife went first through what looked like six inches of muddy water steering her way through an 's' bend in the path. She managed to get through safely so I followed. I could see that there was a short cut avoiding the 's' bend if I made straight for the dry path the other side. Older readers will know exactly what I mean when I say that my direct route went straight over a Dibley-scale pothole invisible under the mud. The bike suddenly disappeared underneath me and I fell in up to my waist. Unhurt but sodden, I picked myself up and squelched the last yards to Tesco to purchase new dry trousers and underwear. Having found great value replacements, I made my way to the checkout while my wife did the shopping.

However, I had forgotten the issue of the security tag firmly attached to my new trousers. It seemed that the machines that remove security tags are firmly mounted on top of the checkout conveyor belts. It took a Tesco manager and two members of staff to manoeuvre me into the correct angle to allow the tag to be removed – much to the amusement of the checkout queue.

DAVID JOHNSTON MP



If you haven't heard from me since last year, then Happy New Year!

Just before Christmas we had the sad news that a key community figure in Didcot, Hasnath Miah, died at the age of just 49 after a stroke. Hasnath had been homeless for part of his life and had been helped by local people, including through free meals, to get back on his feet. He swore if he was ever in a position to help others, he would do so. He developed a successful restaurant called Indian Dream, and in the pandemic began giving free meals to key workers, the homeless and young carers, just in the way he had been given food. In total he gave away more than 10,000 free meals.

I paid tribute to Hasnath in the House of Commons the following week in a speech including a number of local matters. I included my campaigns to see more GP surgeries here and to reopen Grove Station. I updated people on the Local Electricity Bill that I am the lead sponsor of, which aims to remove the barriers to community energy being created by local communities and sold to it.

And I talked about a couple of the things that have come out of activities I ran for the first time last year: firstly the crime summit, where antisocial behaviour was a recurring theme – something my boss in the Department for Levelling Up, Michael Gove, is now tasked with working up a strategy on – and my work experience campaign for local young people. Many employers have got out of the habit of providing work experience with so many staff now working from home, yet it's a vital way for young people without connections to learn about the workplace.

Work experience is of course a familiar theme from my prepolitics career working on social mobility, a topic I used for a PMQ I was drawn for in the first week back of the new year. You're 24 times more likely to become a doctor if a parent is one – only 6% of doctors come from a working class background – and 17 times more likely to become a lawyer. And as I wrote in a recent article, it's not just the responsibility of the Government or schools.

In brief: the Thames Water Resources Management Plan is currently open to consultation. Make sure you take part on their website at thames-wrmp.co.uk as it includes the reservoir proposal. You can respond to the Draft Regional Plan for the WRSE's South East the website on at wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/our-consultation. I know there have been Royal Mail problems again, so I've been highlighting these once more in parliament and with the company. And congratulations to both Grove and Southmoor Kebab Vans on being nominated for the Kebab Van of the Year Award.

The good news is that The Abbey is not up for sale. New life is being breathed into our beautiful Abbey which is now being prepared for re-opening as a spiritual retreat centre in line with the objectives of the charity that owns and manages The Abbey.

A lot has happened since we last reported progress in the Sutton Courtenay News. A new body of trustees has been appointed and is now directing the plan for re-opening this Spring. A 'Regeneration Working Party' comprising local people who want to see The Abbey up and running, has been established. The Working Party has developed a stabilization plan to secure the financial health of the charity as we prepare to restart our work here. From 1st April the Abbey facilities will again be available for hire. Preference will be given to use it as retreat and for workshop events with a spiritual focus, but we

also encourage commercial use until our finances are again on a stable footing.

Arrangements are being put in place to undertake the essential maintenance work on the buildings and grounds and to prepare a longer-term plan for the restoration of the buildings.

Some exciting new partnerships with other charitable bodies are emerging which promise to bring new life and important business to The Abbey. As soon as these are firmed up, we will share this with you through the Sutton Courtenay News.

We are aware that there are many people in the village who support The Abbey and want to see it come back to life. We welcome this support and if anyone would like to volunteer their help in any particular way, please do email. Also, please be in contact if you want to make use of the facilities. Have a look on the website: The Abbey is there to be used!

We are developing a new staffing structure for The Abbey, and we will advertise any positions (for instance in housekeeping or management) in the Sutton Courtenay News as soon as we are able.

Valentine's Day reminds us of the importance of expressing our love to those close to us. But how can

we go beyond simply offering flowers and a card? Jesus says: 'A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another' (John 13:34). How can we express love like Jesus in our everyday relationships to our partner, children, neighbours or work colleagues?

Listening

We need to listen to others, just as Jesus did. He asked questions of people and waited for them to process their answer. According to James, 'everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry' (James 1:19). How well do we listen to others? How often do we find ourselves already thinking of what we want to say before somebody's finished speaking? Listening takes time; don't rush it!

Touching

Jesus reached out to touch the untouchables in His world, including lepers, the sick and children. This was completely out of character for rabbis of His day. For us today, a warm handshake may be of value. Of course, it should always be an appropriate touch – helpful for the other person, not just for ourselves.

Jesus' conversation was always full of grace and truth (John 1:14). Do we speak words of grace, by offering comfort, giving encouragement or expressing care and concern? However, we should also be ready to speak words of truth, in asking for forgiveness, seeking reconciliation or addressing conflict. As Paul urges us, don't avoid: 'speaking the truth in love'.

Where is the challenge for us in expressing love this Valentine's Day?



Sign up for Low-cost Broadband Citizens Advice Tip

Citizens Advice Henley has expressed concern that people in need are not taking advantage of cheap broadband and mobile phone schemes set up specially to help them. Loosely termed "social tariffs" or "essential broadband", these schemes are discounted deals intended for those on Universal Credit, Pension Credit, Employment and Support Allowance, and some other benefits.

Statistics show that only 1.2% of those eligible to register for these low tariffs have done so, although they could save over $\pounds 100$ a year.

Social tariffs are provided in the same way as normal phone and Internet packages, but at a lower price. Network providers liaise with the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) to ascertain customers' eligibility, and the DWP is required to provide only the necessary information, so that personal information remains safe.

At the time of writing, not all telecom companies offer social tariffs but it is possible for those who qualify to switch to a supplier that does provide them. The usual fees for switching contracts, leaving a contract early or terminating them have in many cases been scrapped for those on benefits who qualify for these tariffs – but check with your supplier to make sure.

Help is at hand for people finding it hard to pay for food and energy bills

The Household Support Fund scheme has opened again for people finding it hard to cope with the rising cost of food and energy bills.

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils have reopened the scheme to help households meet the costs of life's essentials.

The fund is initially open for applications to help eligible households that have not received any support from the fund previously. However, from 13 February, if funds remain, it will be opened up wider to households that have received some funding in the past but not since May last year.

Residents can apply for support by filling in an online form on the councils' websites or by calling their Community Hub team during office hours on 01235 422600. The fund closes on 31 March, or sooner if it is fully allocated.

Cllr. Maggie Filipova-Rivers, Cabinet Member for Community Wellbeing at South Oxfordshire District Council said: "We're delighted that we're able to offer this important scheme again because we know that some households are finding it hard to make ends meet. If someone hasn't received this kind of support before and think they may be eligible, please visit our website to find out more."

Cllr. Helen Pighills, Cabinet Member for Healthy Communities at Vale of White Horse District Council said: "We want to help support as many residents as we can, particularly after Christmas and during the cold winter months. If anyone needs help with completing the application form, please contact our friendly Community Hub team for assistance."

The councils recognise that many residents are struggling in these difficult economic times and are offering a wide range of advice, including information on free or affordable food banks and council tax support. They can also help to signpost people for debt advice and other cost of living support, and provide information on housing support as well as guidance on how people can look after their mental health and wellbeing.

The Abbey

We would like to thank all that attended our (admittedly last minute) meeting held at Matrix Arts Centre on Thursday 5th January. There was a good turn out and apologies from those who could not attend.

One of the purposes of that meeting was to gather the necessary evidence to nominate The Abbey as an Asset of Community Value (ACV: which is now submitted pending approval). This should help to ensure the future of The Abbey if it were to be put up for sale, as it gives the community a period of six months to pool funding to buy it. We are happy to be able to have this security blanket if needed.

We are delighted to hear that the Abbey is opening again as a spiritual retreat centre with some community members forming a working group to help facilitate this, and local individuals taking governance as the new trustees.

The formation of our Supporting The Abbey, Sutton Courtenay Group was to help broaden the scope of potential future activities held in the grounds for the wellbeing and development of the community, as well as enabling the Charity to continue its work. While it seems the Charity now has a roadmap for financial stability for use as a spiritual centre, we would like to see The Abbey fulfil its full potential, as to prevent a financial situation where the sale is again considered.

We would reiterate that our best intentions are with the Charity that owns The Abbey. We wish to work together to ensure its prosperity for future users and to protect the memories that many of us hold deeply rooted there.

In many ways, we believe that the threat of its closure being made public has been beneficial in that it has initiated a community spirit in the village that would like to see positive sustainable development, and to many, The Abbey could provide this.

We would like to hold another meeting, ideally in The Abbey itself. If you are interested, our contact details and mailing list is at the bottom of this article.

RECREATION GROUND REOPENING

On 21 December 2022 the long-awaited reopening of the Sutton Courtenay Recreation Ground took place. The organisers were fortunate that the day was sunny and there was a substantial turnout of residents of all ages.

Installation of the new play area was by Ashford Contract Services Ltd. who were subcontracted by Kompan to do the construction. Anthony Stiff and Maria Lara Mijancos of ASA Landscape Architects designed and managed the upgrade to the recreation ground. The parish council was successful in obtaining grants from FCC Communities Foundation and Awards for All. It was also able to access relevant s106







contributions from the VWHDC and allocate some of its awarded CIL funds. Over the past ten years, the parish council had been also building up a reserve to ensure sufficient funds for the upgrade. This phase of the upgrade also includes installation of combination rugby/football posts with nets and it is hoped they will be installed in the field by March.

The design was informed by feedback from village residents to a bespoke survey included in the village news in 2020, consultations with children in the village school, clubs, and young people from the Abingdon DAMASCUS Youth Project who conducted an online survey of their peers, and appraised neighbouring play parks to inform their feedback to the parish council.

Environmental considerations were high on the list of design requirements. This is one of the first play areas in the county to install equipment made from recycled plastic marine waste using Kompan's Greenline range, alongside other equipment made from Robinia which is regarded as an extremely sustainable source of wood. Excavated soil in the installation phase of the play area was used to build up the BMX track near the skate park, thus reducing the need for several trips to dispose the soil elsewhere.



REST IN PEACE

Joshua James WILLIAMS, who died in tragic circumstances, aged 19, on 20th November 2022, was born on 28th August 2003. Joshua (or Josh or Wish as he was sometimes known) was born in Macclesfield, after a 24-hour labour, to his parents, Simon and Alie. He was someone who was always busy, who wanted to be the best he could be at whatever new interest he took up. He was ferociously competitive - particularly with his brother Thomas - but he was also supportive and motivational. He had a surfeit of self-confidence with a natural charisma and a warm smile. He was a good listener and a friend to many as witnessed by the number of people who attended his funeral on 14th December 2022 in All Saints' Church. Personal tributes were given by his Dad, Simon; his brother, Thomas; with a reading from his Mum, Alie. The address was given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick, from which this is an edited extract.

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
