The Great British Spring Clean 2023

Please join Parish Councillors on Saturday 25th March at 2pm for a Community Litter Pick. With the support of the Waste and Recycling Team at the Vale of White Horse District Council equipment will be provided and the waste will be collected by them after the event. Meet at the Village Hall to collect litter picks, rubbish bags and route maps. Refreshments will be provided at the end of the event.

Dog waste and litter bins

Both the District and Parish Council provides litter and dog waste bins in the village. The Parish Council is aware of some areas which would benefit from the provision of a bin or additional bins. If you have a location in mind please send details to the Parish Clerk, ideally with the What3Words* location.

Thames Water Sewage Treatment Works discharge map Thames Water has released an online map to show when the treatment works, including one at Drayton, are discharging into local watercourses. You can view the map at www.thameswater.co.uk/edm-map The Drayton sewage treatment works discharges into Ginge Brook which flows into the Thames.

Thames Water advises that our sewers carry foul water from our properties to sewage treatment works, where it is treated and returned to watercourses. When it rains, some of the rainwater gets mixed in with the foul water. At times of heavy or continued rainfall, the sewer system cannot always cope with the extra volume.

Storm overflows are used to prevent sewers flooding homes, gardens and streets. They act as a safety valve, diverting some of the rainwater and foul water into watercourses. This is called 'storm discharge' and contains some untreated sewage.

Storm overflows are regulated by the Environment Agency. Storm discharges are legally allowed, under the conditions of the Environment Agency permit. Storm overflows should only be used when necessary. Thames Water do not actively switch them on, they operate automatically when the flow levels increase. In 2017, the Environment Agency asked all water companies to start monitoring storm overflow activity. Knowing how frequently they discharge gives an insight into the performance of the network and sewage treatment works. Thames Water has made this information publicly available with almost real time updates.

Potholes and Oxfordshire County Council's FixMyStreet app and website

Residents are encouraged to use the FixMyStreet app or fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk to report any road, cycleway, and pavement defects in the village, e.g., potholes, broken curbs, blocked drains, non-functioning street lights, obscured road signs. Reports on this app are fed back to the local Oxfordshire County Council Highways Officer, who will initiate action where needed. Please be aware of traffic when making reports of defects on the road carriageway and stay safe.

There are two FixMyStreet "super-users" in the village who will also see the reports. For large potholes (greater than 15x15 cm and at least 4cm deep on the road, or 2cm deep on a cycleway or footpath), the super-users can order a repair directly with the contractors, bypassing Oxfordshire County Council which will speed-up resolution: repair is then normally achieved within 28 days. However, superusers can only take action on unclassified (non-A and non-B) roads with a speed limit of 30mph or less. Repairs on A and B roads have to be handled by the Highways Officer.

The 2022 repair of the potholes on the High Street outside Hari & Esha News and the entrance to Lady Place were ordered by super-users and repairs were made well within the specified time-limit.

Supporting our wellbeing through art

There is no doubt that increasing numbers of children nationally are struggling to manage anxiety and heightened emotions. A day does not seem to go by without there being a story in the news about the crisis in children's mental health. As educators, we cannot claim to be experts in this field. But what we can try to do is to create an environment where children's wellbeing has the best chance. We believe that our art curriculum has a vital part to play in this. Watching a child lose themselves in creating something, we can see their sense of flow and the break from everyday worries. Through art, we can also value each child's unique and original work and celebrate them for who they are!

Curriculum design

We use a programme called Access Art – you can find out more at www.accessart.org.uk. There are lots of inspirational activities anyone can enjoy from aged 1-101! The school's programme helps us to plan our curriculum based on the study of working artists. Children see what has inspired them and then move on to investigate themes based on this as a starting point. There is always a lot of observational drawing in every unit, encouraging responses from what children see. They are taught to develop their ideas gradually in their sketch books so that they can experiment and practise.

Playing and experimenting



A central theme in all units is playing and exploring in many different media, in both 2 and 3D. Children learn that things rarely work out the first time you try them – in fact, we may not even know how we want things to turn out when we start exploring an idea. As children become comfortable with this uncertainty, it can impact

positively on their mental wellbeing in all sorts of ways, not just in art.



Hearing children's voices



Progress in Art doesn't look quite the same as progress in other subjects, because we aren't looking for children to get 'better' at something in the same way – there is no right or

wrong in art. What we do see is children becoming more able to talk in depth about what they have chosen to include in their work, and importantly, why. This gives them a voice and a way of responding to the world around them.

For some children, who need a little more support, we are able to offer Drawing and Talking. This is a twelve session programme led by a fully trained mentor who works with children to use drawing to explore their feelings about things that are troubling them.

Dorian shows our school values!

Dorian showed our school values in spades this month. On the way to school, for the whole journey he collected litter.

Look at how much he found! He then did the same on the way home. Well done Dorian for taking responsibility for the environment and helping to make our village a lovely place for all of us.

Opinion Polls

It is all too easy to become excited/depressed/anxious (take your pick) over the state of the nation's local and national politics. It almost seems that there is a competition going on between polling organisations to grab the headlines over who can be most dramatic. But is this the best way to test public opinion? And more importantly, how far do these polls actually influence public opinion? There are many examples of the polls turning out to be very wrong. Do they merely solidify passing trends or do they stimulate resentment in an electorate that does not like being told how it is going to behave?

I am not clear what purpose they serve except to give the chattering political classes something to chew on. At best, polls are a vague guide as to how public opinion might be shifting and at worst, a hindrance to independent thinking.

With some important local elections in May, many media outlets are beginning to obsess about what national polls are saying. I very much hope that people will make up their own minds and, as far as possible, ignore the polls.

Budgets

After many weeks of discussion and consultation, the process of forming a Council's budget culminates in a formal Councillor Budget debate. Yesterday's near 6 hour meeting at which an alternative budget produced by the opposition had to be considered first, culminated, as expected in a comfortable majority passing the ruling administration's budget. The whole exercise is called "a debate" but the outcome is almost always predetermined. It can be very frustrating for Opposition councillors as it is far too late for any of their ideas to be built into what will be passed on budget day. But having served as an opposition councillor for many years, I have some sympathy for them.

That said, I am very pleased with the outcome this year. OCC's finances are looking remarkably secure given the amount of financial uncertainty around. In summary, more money is going into adult and child social care, highway maintenance, tackling climate change and protecting the most vulnerable from the worst of the cost of living crisis. As a package it seems to offer something for almost everyone with one proviso: that the increase in council tax of 4.99% (although in line with more than 70% of all other councils) is a tough ask of those in the next most vulnerable category. It was a choice between the pain of a Council Tax increase over the pain that would result from cutting frontline services. Politics is about making choices - often difficult ones.

There are plenty of other risks around the corner however. Not least the impact of inflation on all areas of the budget together with the announcement from government that we need to prepare for further cuts in central government finance in 2025-6.

Other challenges

In the next financial year, a number of issues affecting us all will have been resolved or irrevocably decided.

- o The Thames Water Reservoir.
- o The HIF 1 Road
- The development of thousands more houses at Culham, Didcot and Kingston Bagpuize.
- More clarity on the number of houses we need to build elsewhere.
- 0 The potential development of Abingdon airfield.

And those are just the major issues. At the same time there are a number of other highway and traffic issues that have been outstanding for far too long.

Here's hoping the next financial year will be a little less pressured.


Village Youth Voice and Community Action

DAVID JOHNSTON MP

I'm delighted to have secured a breakthrough for the local AEAT Pensioners after 10 years of dogged campaigning by them. The National Audit Office – which has investigated high-profile cases such as Equitable Life and British Steel – has agreed to my request to look at the AEAT case and will produce a report setting out their views in the coming weeks. Parliament's powerful Public Accounts Committee will also hold an inquiry and are calling for evidence for this until 5th March:

A highlight in the last month was, of course, President Zelensky addressing Parliament. He gave a very powerful speech, conveying the bravery of the Ukrainian people and his thanks to the UK for our support during the past year.

For anyone born in the UK after World War II, as I was, it is impossible to truly understand what the Ukrainian countrymen and women are going through at this time, subjected to a relentless bombardment by Russian tanks and planes every day that takes the lives of their family members and causes untold destruction. The President's speech made us all feel proud of the UK's support. We were the first European country to start sending lethal aid to Ukraine and are the second largest donor of military aid in the world after the USA – a total of £2.3 billion since the outbreak of war.

In addition to all the military equipment supplied to Ukraine – and a major new package of air defence to help protect Ukrainian civilians and critical national infrastructure from

THAMES VALLEY ALERT

Scam Reports Didcot & Wallingford

We would like to make you aware of some recent reports of a scam that we have received from local residents in Wallingford and Didcot.

It involves the victim receiving a phone call from someone saying they are a Police Officer, and they have their credit card. This is not genuine and the victims have not even lost their credit/debit cards. The intention of this scam is to get your pin number and other personal information from you. They will even sometimes offer to send a driver to collect your existing card or ask you to get large sums of money from the bank as they are investigating the bank for distributing fraudulent bank notes. If you get any similar calls please be advised that this is NOT a Police officer phoning you and it is a SCAM!

A genuine Police Officer would not ask you any personal questions about pin numbers etc. If you are in any doubt ask for the name, station and shoulder number of the officer and put the phone down. Once you have ensured the telephone line is clear and the scammer is not on the other end, you can phone the police on 101 and they will check whether it is indeed a Police Officer. If a genuine officer is calling they will be more than happy to let you do this. These scammers can sound very plausible so please be on your guard. Russian strikes – we've provided a £220 million humanitarian assistance package and issued some 218,000 visas to Ukrainians. Oxfordshire has of course been at the forefront of hosting Ukrainian refugees, many of whom I have had the privilege to meet. Our support is very important – and must continue.

I was very pleased this constituency was the one Michelle Donelan, the new Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology, chose to pay her first visit – to the Rosalind Franklin Institute at Harwell, to which the Government has just committed a further £40 million. The Department for Science, Innovation and Technology will be key for this constituency, and its creation has happened just before I hold the first meeting of my Science and Technology forum for businesses at Harwell, Milton Park and elsewhere. This forum will welcome George Freeman, Minister for Science, Research, and Innovation, as the guest speaker.

The other event coming up in the near future from me will be an Apprenticeships Fair for local young people and employers. While there has been a welcome growth in apprenticeships with the Government's Apprenticeship Levy, many employers struggle to fill their apprenticeships while, nationally, the highest-level ones disproportionately go to young people from higher income families. If you work for a company that wants to take part, then do get in touch.

How to Protect Yourself Against Scams

- 1. **Research companies and websites before buying.** No matter how urgent the offer may seem, or how badly you want the item or service, do your research first.
- 2. Pay with a credit card or trusted payment processor. Compared to debit cards and bank transfers, credit cards are far more secure.
- 3. Avoid unknown links and downloads. Scammers can use attachments and websites to infect your computer with malware.
- 4. **Keep personal information to yourself.** Many websites ask you to answer a series of security questions in case you need to recover your password. Remember which information you've set as security measures, and don't share it.
- 5. **Secure yourself online.** If a website offers twofactor authentication, use it. It's not bulletproof, but it's better than nothing. Use strong, unique passwords on the websites you frequent, and store them more securely with a dependable password manager.

CORONATION BIG LUNCH & BIG HELP OUT



How do you celebrate an event that Britain hasn't seen since 1953? Connecting with your neighbours is a great start!

As part of a weekend of celebrations between Saturday 6th and Monday 8th May, His Majesty the King has invited communities to come together for a Coronation Big Lunch. This can range from a small gathering to a full-on street party. It is the perfect way to bring you and your neighbours together.

Whilst we recommend starting your planning three months in advance, organising a Big Lunch can be more straightforward than you think.

Getting started

• Order a Coronation Big Lunch pack: Free resources will be made available online by the Eden Project's Big Lunch team at CoronationBigLunch.com. There you can sign up for your free pack, which will be released in mid-February. It will include editable invitations, posters, recipes, and activity ideas.

• **Pick a date:** Sunday 7th May will be the most popular date, but you could consider Neighbourhood Watch Week which is 3rd - 9th June, during the Month of Community.

• Talk to your neighbours: Try to speak to all the households on your street – that way nobody feels left out!

• **Invites:** It is always a good idea to pop an invite or 'Save the Date' through each letterbox.

• **Apply for a road closure:** If you plan on closing the road, you will have to apply early – see your council's website for more information.

Planning

• Share the work: One or, preferably, two months before your event, ask your neighbours for help sourcing tables, chairs, and decorations.

• Food: You could ask those with odd house numbers to bring something savoury and those with even numbers could bring something sweet!

• **Games:** Plan activities for all ages – these could involve a street quiz for grown-ups or a treasure hunt for children.

• **Signage:** If you plan on closing the road for your celebration, you will need to source road signage. Some councils may lend signs to you and some will tell you where you can hire them.

• **Decorations:** Plan how your street will be decorated. The Eden Project has some great ideas! Visit: edenprojectcommunities.com/make-it-happen/decorations



From the Ministry Team

Dear Friends

'The world, the country is in a mess due to the failure of.....'

Failure! We all experience it in some way or another; every day each one of us will fail in a myriad of small and large ways. Closely associated with failure comes blame; failure is hard to confront whilst blame is so easy to embrace. Failure is an intricate part of being human, therefore the question facing us is not, 'Will there be failure?' but, 'When there is failure, what will we do about it?' Failure can occasionally be devasting in its consequence whilst often the effect is small. The challenge for humanity therefore is, 'How do we make the kinds of mistakes that are safe and contained?' We must learn about what went wrong in order to avoid making the same mistakes again.

Traditionally the Church uses the season of Lent for serious and sober thinking - this year the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book is entitled 'Failure' and written by Bishop Emma Ineson; and this will be the theme for our parish services and study groups. The bible is full of accounts of serious leadership failure including Joseph, Moses, David, Jonah. Was Jesus successful in leading His team of 12? Immediately after the resurrection the disciples were confused, scared and ineffective. We learn from biblical historical narratives that the most spectacular disappointments and failures, public or private, are not the end of the story. The end of the story is written by God who knows what failure is and is not, and whose gracious love overwhelms our greatest failures. God sets a different scale for measuring success and failure, and the bible records many stories of failure redeemed, forgiven, restored.

The temptation is to use our many failures and disappointments to convince ourselves that we are not worth being loved. The bible narrative on failure says that the opposite is true. Many failures mean we have nothing to brag about but everything to be loved for. As we study some of the biblical narratives of failure, we pray that we will be disturbed when we are too comfortable, and comforted when we are too disturbed, and in praying take comfort in God's merciful and hope-filled judgement of each and everyone. OBITUARIES - REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who died recently:

Glenys Diana May STUBBINGS, who died on 19th December 2022, was born, according to her on 23rd January, but according to her birth certificate on 24th January 1941! Her funeral was held on 19th January 2023 at South Oxfordshire Crematorium and conducted by the Reverend Helen Kendrick. Her son, Tim, gave the family tribute from which this is an edited extract.

Glenys was born at home in 6 Thame Road, Great Milton, where she grew up, the fourth of five children. She always said she had a happy childhood. Glenys' first job was at Pressed Steel as a secretary. It was here that she met her future husband, Dennis. Apparently, he would drive past her window regularly on a forklift truck and would smile at her as he did so. From this, romance blossomed and in 1962 their son, Tim, was born and then their daughter Stephanie was born a year later in 1963. With two older girls from Dennis' first marriage, Lesley and Pauline, there were 4 children.

Glenys spent the next few years being involved in some aspects of village life in Sutton Courtenay, such as working in the playgroup and what was then young wives. Once Tim started secondary school, Glenys went to work for Bass Charrington the brewery, initially on Milton Park and then Abingdon. Eventually she was made redundant and worked in the security building at Milton Park. However, this was also around the time that she, Dennis and their daughter Stephanie, bought the village shop and Post Office in Bradstocks Way. Glenys worked there whenever she was not working anywhere else. The shop was eventually sold, and they bought their home in Harwell Road with the proceeds. Sadly, Stephanie died from Leukaemia which, of course, left Glenys heartbroken.

Glenys, continued working and found her next career move very much to her liking; she went to Tesco to work as a checkout operative. This combined her two greatest passions, talking and shopping. She loved to chat about anything and almost everything. She was also a grandmother to 10 and a great grandmother as well. She loved her garden and her gardening. She also loved her Yorkshire terriers, and to go shopping and spend money. She loved her family and was very grateful to them for all they had done for her and for the love they gave her. **Agnes (Dolly) EDWARDS** who died on 29th December 2022 was born on 4th May 1950 in Sutton Courtenay. She grew up on the Harwell Road with her parents, Joseph and Emily Loveridge and her three sisters. The family connection to Sutton Courtenay remained important to Dolly all her life. As a young child Dolly, with her family, would spend up to six months of every year travelling, often to Evesham for the fruit picking, but always returning to her grandparents' bungalow in Sutton Courtenay. She enjoyed trips to Weymouth on holiday with all the family trailers and to Pontins at Weston Super mare. She never lost her love of travelling and would love going for long walks or being taken for car rides all over the countryside.

From an early age Dolly loved to sing and this was something she carried with her all through life. As children she and her sisters would often sing and dance and pretend to be 'The Shadows', and in her older years she liked nothing better than a sing-song, when she would make up songs spontaneously! Even though Dolly did not have an easy life, because of her struggles with ill-health, she loved her family - all of her sisters and their children; her son and daughter Joe and Emily and her grandchildren - Christiana, Lily-May and Dolly-Rose. They used to make her laugh when they got up to mischief but she loved them very much indeed. Even when she moved to Thame in later years she would often get a taxi back to Berinsfield so she could spend time with her sister Sally and the family and she loved sitting and eating a packet of Walkers' Crisps and a Pork Pie! Sadly, she spent the last year or so of her life in a Care Home in Burford under the restrictions of the Covid-19 lockdown.

Her funeral took place in All Saints' Church on 30th January 2023 followed by burial in the churchyard with her parents and near to her daughter, Emma, and amongst many members of previous generations of her family. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

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
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
