Planning and Licensing

The Parish Council is a statutory consultee on planning and licensing applications in the parish and adjacent areas. The Parish Council does not make the final decision on an

application but can make comments in support or to object to an application.

In recent weeks the Parish Council has been part of the appeal process for the Hobbyhorse Lane North development, the Parish Council objects to the development and has funded a planning consultant to assist in building the Parish Council's case against the appeal and to represent the Parish Council at the inquiry. SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL



Welcome back!

It has been a lovely start to the new school year at school. The children have been amazing despite the heat. This year, we welcomed our new Trust Director of Primary Education, Mr Paul Shaughnessy. Now that more primary schools are joining us in Ridgeway Education Trust, we are able to have this new level of support and challenge from a primary expert. Mr Shaughnessy was the headteacher at Northbourne Primary School before this role, and he has also worked for the Diocese Schools Trust to support many different schools. Teachers learning...

The first days of the term are very important for teachers too. Although they have been busy in the summer setting up their classrooms and planning together, it is important for us to train together as a staff team on key areas. One vitally important one is our safeguarding protocols, which we must keep refreshed regularly to make sure our school is a safe place for all our children. We were lucky to have training from our school Educational Psychologist. He not only works with individual children, but also supports staff to grow in their professional expertise so they are able to support all learners. There are also curriculum initiatives that we work together to launch. For example, this year we are moving to new maths teaching resources from White Rose, and we are also working on an initiative to bring more poetry into our teaching.



Off to a great start in the kitchen

This year we have new catering arrangements, as we have brought the provision 'in house' to the Trust catering. Mr Gills, the catering manager, has been on site working with Mrs Greenough and Mrs Pointer. This change gives us much more freedom to design the menu and be creative, and of course enables us to have better quality control. This term we have had more children than ever eating school meals, which, of course, is excellent news as this is a well-balanced, nutritional meal. We are also working hard to reduce the amount of ultra-processed foods the children consume.







Mr Stoodley's half marathon is coming up!

Mr. Stoodley, our Year 4 teacher, is raising money for the school to get more sports equipment and kit for the children to use. The big day is **Sunday 15**th **October.**

COUNTY & DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

A Multitude of Issues All Across the **Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Division**

OCC Children's Services

As you may have read in the Press, a recent Ofsted report listed Oxfordshire's Children's Services (along with others) as requiring improvement. There is particular criticism of the lack of support given to children with special educational needs and their parents. We have a number of families who have been affected by this. The Council has accepted the findings of the report in full and has already begun to take actions to rectify the problems including increased funding (with consequent pressure on the budget). I will give further details on the actions to be taken in my next report.

20mph zones

I am disappointed that this issue is becoming a political football for a minority of residents. Just to make it clear, I was elected to take decisions, some of which might be contentious. I repeat that the overwhelming number of people who have contacted me support the proposals. Rather than write separate emails to the 7 people who have contacted me opposing the initiative, I am restating my position here. 20mph zones are Parish Council proposals but I fully support them. There is mounting evidence that lives are saved and that the quality of life in our towns and villages is improved by 20mph zones — with or without enforcement.

Hobbyhorse Lane Appeal

The third attempt to get this application (turned down by planning committee several times) approved is currently being heard by a planning inspector. As such, it would be improper for me to express an opinion here. There will be time for that later. However, I wanted to commend on behalf of all Sutton Courtenay residents, the enormous amount of effort over many months put in by the Parish Council, their advisors and many well known residents with particular knowledge and experience. Whatever the outcome, it has been a pleasure to work with them.

VILLAGE HALL AGM

GigaClear Box at Parkside, Marcham

Walking down New Rd in warm weather, it is impossible to ignore the noise of the cooling fans and the disturbance caused to residents of Parkside. A number of public spirited residents have helped monitor the situation and, together with officers from VWHDC, OCC, and District and County Councillors, pressure is being exerted on the installers to address the problem. With District responsible for noise measurement and County responsible for internet provision, there has been a need for a coordinated effort.

Accidents and the Young

With the recent tragic accident in Marcham involving young people in mind, I have signed up to a task and finish group of the Police and Crime Commissioner Scrutiny Committee. This will allow me to raise the issue of education of future young drivers in schools and colleges. Education in schools has made a considerable difference in the approach of young people to drugs, smoking and alcohol. As a self confessed attendee of a speed awareness course, I am convinced that education is the most effective way of changing behaviour.

HIF1

Leaving aside the fact that the country is divided on whether or not road building is a solution to congestion, a decision on the future of this project is now in the hands of the Secretary of State. He has "called in" the decision of the Planning Committee to refuse the application. We should hear the result in the early new year.

MEPC

One of my roles as an elected councillor, is to Chair regular meetings of the. MEPC Liaison committee involving local parish councils and MEPC reps. Of all the meetings I have to attend, these are the most informative and constructive.

We are fortunate in this area to have such a successful and environmentally aware commercial operation in our midst. It is clearly a great place to work. I can recommend the bus services and the coffee. And, in case you are wondering, I do not have shares in the operation.

DAVID JOHNSTON MP



I was honoured last month to be appointed the Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing.

It's particularly special for me to be placed in the Department for Education given that

my pre-politics career was spent running organisations for children and young people. It often surprises people when I tell them that, before I became an MP, I had never been in politics before, whether as a councillor, advisor, or candidate.

In my new role I have responsibility for a wide range of areas such as early years and childcare — including the delivery of the Government's new commitment to provide 30 hours a week free childcare from when a child is 9 months old until they start school - as well as Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), children in care, adoption and kinship care — vital areas that help support some of our most vulnerable young people - not to mention mental health.

I am delighted to have the opportunity to work on giving children across the country the best start in life.

It was also a delight to attend the unveiling of the new Agatha Christie statue in Wallingford, a place she lived for 42 years. The sculptor, Ben Twiston-Davies, has done a really great job and it was a pleasure to meet her grandson, Mathew Prichard, who did the actual unveiling. I recommend a visit to see it when you have time!

Some other recent visits made by me included meeting with a group of unpaid carers in Wallingford, facilitated by Val

Wolsey and Carers Oxfordshire, to talk about their experiences and listen to their concerns; attending an Innovator Day at Harwell Campus where I gave a speech and talked to staff and investors about the world-leading work that Harwell is doing; and visiting SeeAbility in East Hagbourne which provides support services for people with learning disabilities, many of whom have sight loss.

I have been campaigning to see Grove Station re-opened since I was elected nearly 4 years ago and have now launched a petition of Parliament. This is something MPs can do on matters that are important to their constituents and I've done so to keep the pressure up. I am delighted that 1,750+people have signed so far and the more signatures we collect, the stronger the message we send to the Department for Transport – so please do sign if you are able to and encourage your friends and family that live in the constituency to do so too. If you read this in time, do attend or spread the word about my Pensioners' Fair at the Beacon in Wantage on Wednesday 27th September from 12:30pm to 4:30pm. 
as being creative in how I challenge the young people's thoughts and attitudes.'



To mark the turn of the Millennium, a prayer was written by Revd. Peter Trow as a Millennium Resolution which could be used by all faiths and those with none. Like many prayers, it is an earnest wish or hope. It begins with an environmental hope and ends with a resolution wish. It is simple and short with five gentle reminders to us of how the future could be.







MedicAlert and Thames Valley Police: Introducing Safe and Found

There are currently 944,000 people living with dementia in the UK. On average, around 40,000 are reported missing every year.

The MedicAlert Foundation, in partnership with Thames Valley Police, have launched a dementia safeguarding programme, Safe and Found. This new initiative supports those living with dementia and other memory or cognitive conditions.

Safe and Found is available nationally and enables people living with dementia to securely store their Herbert Protocol form digitally. This document contains information that aids a missing person search, giving the police a better understanding of who they are looking for, what they have done previously and what they may be likely to do in the future. It includes places of importance, routines and habits, their connections, medical details and more.

The Herbert Protocol is a proven strategy in reducing search time and increasing the chance of the individual being found safe and well. MedicAlert is helping to speed up the process by providing quick access to this critical information in an emergency.

Chief Superintendent Mike Loebenberg from Thames Valley Police said: "When a family member or friend goes missing, it is an incredibly distressing time for those desperate to know where they are. This fear and distress are exacerbated when that individual is living with dementia.

"Completing and keeping an up to date Herbert Protocol form printed or saved and easily accessible is really important, but we know this can be challenging. MedicAlert is a service that can help, by storing information and working to keep it up to date and accessible for officers if it is needed.

"As a MedicAlert member myself, I know this partnership will provide loved ones with peace of mind that Thames Valley Police can access important information quickly and save time in the search for those missing. I hope this offers reassurance to those living with dementia and their families."

The support of The McLay Dementia Trust makes the Safe and Found programme even more accessible.

MedicAlert and The McLay Dementia Trust will be providing the first year of MedicAlert membership free to anyone living with dementia in the UK.

"The MedicAlert charity is making dementia a priority. We are very proud to work with Thames Valley Police and The McLay Dementia Trust. These partnerships ensure you can feel safer and more comfortable to continue being active, socialising, and living well with dementia. Wherever you go, we will be with you." says Mark Hacker, MedicAlert CEO.

"MedicAlert has also launched the Carer ID and storage of Emergency Care Plans to support carers. This ensures that, should a carer have an accident, their loved one receives appropriate and continuous care."

Kicking Up a Stink!

September kicked off with warm weather and such an awful smell that many residents in the village couldn't sit outside or open their windows. The Sutton Courtenay Action Public Facebook group was full of residents kicking up a stink! After many calls to the Environmental Agency (EA), one resident emailed the FCC, the EA, David Johnston MP, Adrian Duffield, Head of Planning (re the proposed development next to the site) and the Parish Council.

These are the extracts from the reply from the Environmental Agency (as it's too long to publish in full):

- We are very conscious of the level of frustration in the local community regarding noxious odours. We received over
 90 reports of odour to our pollution hotline in the first week of September.
- Thank you for providing links to the Sutton Courtenay Action Public Facebook group. We do need to improve our communication with residents to keep them updated on what we are doing so they don't feel like their reports are simply going into a black hole. Unfortunately, we don't have the resources to call back complainants or visit them.
- We attend the Appleford and Sutton Courtenay Local Liaison Committee where parish and county councillors meet with the operators and all the regulators to discuss issues such as this. The last meeting was held on 11 September 2023.
- Our investigation into this matter is continuing. We are due to meet with FCC later this month to review their own investigation into these odours and compliance with their environmental permit.
- We have informed the planning authority about concerns on the proposed housing development in Hobbyhorse Lane.
 Our concern relates to the potential impact odours could have on a development situated so close to a large composting facility.
- We encourage residents who perceive a sustained malodour in the area to continue to report it via our pollution hotline number 0800 807060

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH & SCAM INFORMATION



Pa\$\$W0rD Protection

We know there is a sea of information out there around how to best protect yourself online. We also know the horror stories of hacking, online scams and identity theft.

But what are the quickest, most important things for you to do today to ensure it doesn't happen to you?

There are 3 quick and easy steps you can take today to secure your accounts.

1. Create a separate password for your email account(s) Your personal email account contains lots of important information about you and is the gateway to all your other online accounts, including banking, social media and online shopping.

If your email account is hacked all your other passwords can be reset, so use a strong password that is **different** to all your others.

2. Use 3 random words

Weak passwords can be hacked in seconds. Three random words is the recommended way of generating passwords, as it is easier to remember and takes trillions of years for a computer algorithm to crack.

Start with your most important accounts (such as **email**, then **banking** and **social media**) and replace your old passwords with new ones.

The <u>Cyber Resilience Centre</u> recommend looking around the room and picking three things your see, for example table, computer, map would become tablecomputermap — DO NOT use words that are associated with you for example animal names or surnames, as these are easy to identify if you are someone who uses social media.

3. Turn on two-factor authentication (2FA)

Two-factor authentication (2FA) is a free security feature that gives you an **extra layer of protection** online and stops cyber criminals getting into your accounts - even if they have your password.

2FA reduces the risk of being hacked by asking you to provide a second factor of information, such as getting a text or code when you log in, to check you are who you say you are.

Check if the online services and apps you use offer 2FA — it's also called two-step verification or multi-factor authentication. If they do, turn it on. Start with the accounts you care most about, such as your email and social media.

POSTAL SCAMS

Postal scams are sent in the mail. They can be addressed to you directly, and even use your name. They contain fake claims or offers that are designed to con you out of your money.

Here are common types of postal scams to be aware of:

Lotteries and prize draws
Bills from companies you don't use
Psychics and clairvoyants
Pyramid schemes
Strangers who need help
Unclaimed inheritance
Advance fee fraud
Fake job offers

How can I protect myself from postal scams?

- **Reject:** If you receive a letter that you think is a scam, ignore it and throw it away. Never reply.
- **Report:** Join the Scam Marshal scheme (www.friendsagainstscams.org.uk). You send them your scam mail so they can catch the scammers.
- **Ignore:** Don't call any premium-rate phone lines. These numbers start with **09** and can cost up to £4 per minute.
- Verify: If you're unsure, check the details of the organisation. Find the organisation's details using the phone book or via their official website. Never use the contact details listed on the scam letter, as it's likely they'll be set up by the scammer.
- Opt out: Try to avoid being added to mailing lists. For example, when you register to vote, tick the box to opt out of the 'edited register' (also known as the 'open register'), as this can be used to send unsolicited marketing mail.
- **Reduce:** Register with the Mailing Preference Service (www.mpsonline.org.uk). This will stop many of the direct-mailing companies from contacting you.

Sue took to the instrument so well and with such ease, that she was enrolled in The Yehudi Menuhin school in Stoke D'Abernon. The teaching and guidance she received from Menuhin was a great influence on her style of playing and she quickly became, with dedication and hard work, a favourite of her teacher. One of her contemporaries, Nigel Kennedy, she often beat in school playing competitions and she was fond of pointing out that he used to be such a nice boy and so well spoken! Towards the end of her time at the school she was chosen to accompany Menuhin on a tour of American cities playing the Bach double and Sibelius concerto to great acclaim. Sue remained on good terms with the Menuhin family for many years afterwards.

Sue won an ABRSM scholarship to The Royal Academy and began a new independent life studying under Sir Frederick Grinke for 3 years. During this time, she won many prizes; GLAA young musician of the year in 1976 and again in 1979; The Countess of Munster trust award and The Park Lane award for contemporary music. Sue formed a piano trio group of fellow scholars called Trio Zingara and together they won The Overseas League award. It was around this time that Sue started to develop a number of different illnesses that eventually plagued her life and sadly prevented her from developing her career as a soloist. She did however play with many orchestras becoming a great friend of Nigel Marriner of The Academy of St Martin in the Fields and was described by Iona Brown as the best leader the orchestra never had! Sue has guest led a number of orchestras, The English Chamber orchestra, the LSO and Philharmonic, and for many years she was the much-acclaimed leader of The City of Oxford orchestra. She worked with a number of bands in an unusual departure from classical - from "Take That" to Madonna on tour but also spoke with great pride about being the only woman ever to appear with The Bonzo Dog Doo Dah Band.

I hope that Sue will forgive me for saying that the pinnacle of her career was as leader to the All Saints' Singers orchestra! Many local residents will remember her playing The Lark Ascending with Patrick Salisbury conducting. Illness finally prevented her from performing and Sue specialised in teaching young people from 5 years to post graduate level. She will be remembered fondly by so many young people whose career she was so influential in starting. Sue was a woman who loved fun, wine and pizzas, Rock music, and with effortless ease played the violin like an angel." -Eulogy given by Tony Furze

Doreen Sparrowhawk who died on 12th July 2023 was born on 27th December 1939 at 30 Frilsham Street in Sutton Courtenay to her parents Les and Mary Austin. She was the third child in a family of six and she grew up in the village with her brother and sisters; attending the old village school and then going onto Box Hill in Abingdon. On leaving school she had a variety of jobs – working for Dr Sinclair at Lady Place; at the Didcot Depot as a packer in S Shed and for T&G Woodware and later on as a cleaner for Ameys. She also did seasonal work as a potato picker on the local farms. Doreen had first encountered Dick when she helped her Mum and Dad with the Cricket Teas at Appleford and Dick was playing for Marcham Cricket Club. But they met properly when they were both working for T&G Woodware. Dick was just 16 and Doreen was 15 when Dick plucked up the courage to ask Doreen to go to the pictures with him. They courted for five years and finally got married on 25th June 1960 - after Dick had asked her Dad for his permission for them to get engaged and then to marry. Their honeymoon was spent in a caravan in Weymouth and it was only on waking the next morning (having arrived in the dark the night before) to hear all the laughter from the other holiday makers on the campsite that they realized the outside of their caravan had been decorated with a large, 'Just Married' sign.

According to both of them they were friends from the moment they met and were happy ever after. After a few years living in a works' flat and then Palmer Place in Abingdon they moved, in 1970, to Tyrrells Way which became their family home. As a wife, Dick tells me, he couldn't fault her. They never had any secrets from one another and although they might have had differences of opinion over the decades, they never had arguments. Theirs was a real partnership of love and mutual support as they worked together to bring up their three children – Lesley, Paul and Terry. Doreen was a good cook, a knitter and dressmaker and homemaker - she kept the discipline in the home and was always firm but fair. Over the years they enjoyed family days out - travelling all over the country whilst Dick was an Archery Coach - and holidays by the sea which gave them many happy memories. Doreen was someone who loved all her family and who always put them first. The last few years of her life were not easy – either for Doreen, or for Dick and the family, as she developed dementia. But Dick lived out his wedding vows and cared for her at home with devotion and kindness, supported by Lesley and Paula. She and Dick also found great support and comfort through joining the WeCare2 group in the River Room – I know that Doreen particularly loved to sing and it was the gift of music which really animated her and gave her and Dick so much joy in recent times. The last few hours of her life were particularly traumatic for the family when Doreen went missing from home, but I know they are extremely grateful for the love and support shown to them all by the community of Sutton Courtenay who turned out to help look for her. She will be greatly missed by all those who knew her. This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral on 18th August at South Oxfordshire Crematorium, by the Reverend Helen Kendrick. Personal tributes were also given by members of the family.

Sheree Gair Hynd who died on 18th July 2023 was born on 25th August 1964 at The Marcham Road Hospital to Jim & Doris into a large family consisting of Kim, Teresa, Paul, Selena and later Matthew and Phillipa. A happy and joyful child who was cheeky and was nicknamed Flit by her Father because she never sat still. At 11 she attended Larkmead School. Sadly, Jim and Doris separated and when Sheree was 13 she moved with her mother and sister, Selena, to Grangemouth in Scotland where she stayed until she was 17, then returned to Marcham with her Dad. However, she never lost her love of Scotland and visited regularly over the years to see her mother, stepfather, Jim, and many friends.

Sheree started her career as a lab technician working on the lithium battery. After this she worked as a nanny in Wimbledon and then for her friends' children. During this time she met Paul at a party and they remained together for the next 38 years, settling in Sutton Courtenay. They both liked to socialise and enjoyed dinner parties, where Sheree would fuss over everyone. If you could say one thing about Sheree is that she always put others first. Paul and Sheree enjoyed many holidays over the years together and went on to have two children, Lauren and George. Sheree embraced the challenges of parenthood with unwavering dedication, ensuring they had a stable and loving home. She was a devoted mother who spoiled her children so much. Later, her path led her to Milton Hill, where she excelled; her ability to organise, her dedication and humour led her to create lifelong friendships which enriched her life. As if Sheree didn't have enough to do, she also lent a helping hand in the community, whether it was helping at the Village Hall or the Vicar's Fun Days or with Sutton Courtenay Cricket Club where she was the Welfare Officer. She would also help out with the legendary cricket teas. There was a groundless rumour that Paul only got onto the team because of Sheree's teas!

In Sheree's later years, her mental health deteriorated. It became extremely difficult for everyone to see somebody who was so special, so caring and with a real zeal for life, lose the fight. Until the end she was still concerned with others' needs above her own. She will be greatly missed by partner Paul, children Lauren and George and all her family and many friends who remember her infectious laughter, her indomitable spirit, her fierce love and the joy she brought into their lives. Her friends and family filled All Saints' Church for her funeral on 22nd August 2023, which was conducted by the Reverend Helen Kendrick. This is an edited extract of the family tributes and address given at the service.

Clive Neville Grundy (Harry) who died on 30th July 2023 was born on 26th July 1958 in the JR to his parents, Shirley and Neville Grundy. He grew up in Bradstocks Way, with his brother, Terry, and his two sisters, Yvonne (his twin) and Carol. He attended the village school before going onto

secondary school in Abingdon. When he left school he went to work at the MG factory and he was there until it closed. He then went to the Culham Labs where he worked as an electrician's mate. He transferred to the Patrol Service where he trained as a Fireman and for many years he would travel down to Reigate in Surrey for regular training. In 2004 he became the Incident Response Officer at JET and it was here that Tom, his son, followed in his father's footsteps. Harry also worked as a pallbearer for Michael Didcock.

Harry met Amelia whilst working at Culham and it was love at first sight. They were married in 1986 here, in this church, and became partners for life. They started their married life together in Catmore Close in Grove before moving to Brunel Crescent which became the family home with the arrival of Tom and then Robyn. As a husband, Amelia described him as one in a million – funny, sensitive, open, honest and her one true, irreplaceable soul mate. Tom and Robyn described him as a fantastic Dad with a great sense of humour, and someone who would always stick up for them and protect them, someone who was strong, caring and funny. He was someone who brought joy into every room.

Harry always kept himself physically fit and the list of his achievements at endurance events is quite incredible. He ran four London Marathons; he cycled from London to Edinburgh; he was passionate about deep sea diving and was an active member of Wantage Dive Club. He loved paddle boarding and doing anything adventurous. He was always a great lover of the outdoors—something he encouraged both Tom and Amelia to be too. Family holidays often involved camping in the New Forest or in Cornwall but also further afield to Ireland, Malta, Goza, Egypt, Maderia and Budapest. There was a part of him that would have loved to have lived near to the sea.

Harry was a lifelong football fan. He supported both Manchester United and Oxford United from the age of five, and played football himself as he grew up. He enjoyed gardening and DIY. He was very practical and could never sit still for long. He became an accomplished cook – always willing to experiment and would try new recipes after he had seen them on TV saying, 'I can do that!' Although, as Amelia pointed out to me he then went and used every saucepan in the kitchen and she had to clear up after him, so it was very much a team effort. Above all he was devoted to his family – being always there for them, caring, providing and protecting - and he took immense pride and delight in Tom and Amelia and was besotted by his granddaughter Elsie. Sadly, he became ill in November 2017 and since then had surgery every year. But throughout his treatment he continued working because he was dedicated to his job and didn't want to sit at home doing nothing, but always wanted to be useful. He was loved and cared for by Amelia and the family until his death. He will be greatly missed. His funeral took place at All Saints' Church on 23rd August 2023 and this is an edited extract of the address given at the funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.
