#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**



Odours from the landfill - Odours from the landfill can be reported to the Environment Agency on 0800 80 70 60. It is important that all cases of odours are reported as they can only investigate on issues that

they are aware of. If reporting, it would be useful if you could also keep a note of the dates that reports are made.

**Drayton Road Buildout** — This matter is now being progressed by Oxfordshire County Council. A separate longer report on a recent meeting which took place between the County Council and Parish Council can be found later in the magazine *on page 4*.

Casual Vacancy — A further casual vacancy has arisen on the Parish Council due to the resignation of Cllr Jennifer Corrigan. We are, at the time of writing, awaiting confirmation as to whether an election will be called or whether the vacancy can be filled by cooption. If by co-option, we would be looking to do this at the October Council meeting. Please contact the clerk if you are interested in the position.

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank Cllr Corrigan for her hard work during her time on the council.

Recreation Ground redevelopment — The Parish Council have employed the services of a local landscape architect who will be preparing designs based on the results of the questionnaire responses received to both the questionnaire in the Sutton Courtenay News and the questionnaire prepared by members of the DAMASCUS youth project. Primary School pupils also provided details of what they would like to see (with some lovely pictures) and a group of young people took a tour of local play areas and provided a report on what they particularly liked and disliked. Thank you to all who have provided their feedback. Once the plans are prepared, we will be consulting with the public again so please keep an eye out over the next few months for further information on this.

**Footpaths** - Following a request to the OCC Countryside Access Officer, a voluntary group from the Ramblers VOWH have cleared an area of the footpath between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford. They cut down nettles and other plants growing on the surface of the path, including small saplings, and trimmed back the blackthorn etc. that was growing over the path. *See below*. They wish residents an enjoyable walk along it now that it is cleared.

As the Rights of Way portal can be difficult to navigate to report problems, the Parish Council have set up a specific email address where issues with footpaths can be reported. The email address is footpaths@suttoncourtenay-pc.gov.uk.

**Cemetery** - The Parish Council are in the process of arranging for preparation of the next stage of the cemetery, which should provide burial space within the village for many years to come. Further details will be provided in due course once plans have been prepared. A survey of the land will, by the time of publication, have been carried out to allow a detailed plan of the cemetery to be prepared.

New bench on the Village Green - You may have noted the new bench on the Village Green. This bench was purchased by the Sutton Courtenay Women's Institute to celebrate its centenary. Thank you to the WI for their donation to the village.

Neighbourhood Plan — a draft of the plan has now been produced. Once this has been checked and any amendments made, it will be passed to the Vale of the White Horse District Council who arrange for the consultation to take place with residents. Please keep an eye out for further updates in the near future.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> September 2021 at 7.15pm in the Village Hall. Please check the noticeboard outside Hari and Esha stores or the parish council website for further details on the meeting.

#### DRAYTON RD. CHICANE OR BUILDOUT

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council and County Councillor Richard Webber met with Oxfordshire County Council Highways Department in August to agree the location and details for a chicane to be built on Drayton Road, B4016, to slow traffic approaching the village from Drayton. The chicane's exact location is yet to be finalised but is likely to start circa 50m west of number 9 Drayton Road. The start of the 30 mph speed limit and the signs will be moved to circa 50m west of the chicane. It is hoped a temporary chicane will be built by November and subject to the results of this trial a permanent chicane will replace it by the summer of 2022. Highways pointed out that, for safety, the chicane would normally be illuminated and will look into the lighting being solar powered.

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council will be consulted on the details of the chicane before any final decision is made. Comments on this long-awaited scheme are welcome, please email the Parish Council Clerk, Helen, at info@suttoncourtenay-pc.gov.uk.

#### Making Ourselves heard

The big news of the summer is that after two years of campaigning we have been awarded a substantial grant to completely refurbish the entire perimeter fence around the **site.** You may be aware that this has been an area of concern for some time. The existing wire mesh fence is so easy to climb and totally unsuitable for keeping the children and the site safe. The new plans are for a high quality, but attractively designed, metal security fence which will make the site much safer for the children. We also included new gates in the design. This has been achieved due to a huge amount of work by a lot of people — the Trust board at Ridgeway Education Trust, the central admin team, the governors, and most importantly, the children. They made their voices heard by writing letters, making a video, and speaking to the local councillor Richard Webber.

This is an important lesson for them — that they do not have to accept second best and that collectively we can work together to ask, firmly and politely, for what we need. It has attractive wooden ramps and steps up to the door, and skirting around the bottom. Inside, the building is



bright and surprisingly spacious.

We are aiming to furnish it in a style to make it look more like a home than a classroom, with carefully chosen



pieces of real preloved furniture. We have already had some donations of curtains to replace the office blinds it came with! We hope to paint it cream to match the render of

the new building, which will help it to blend in with the whole site. Its official name is now 'The Beehive!'

#### Endings and beginnings

Due to the COVID restrictions, the end of term was adapted for the second year running. However, all the major milestones were passed with creative flair. The whole of Key Stage 2 worked together on a production of The Greatest Show, which we recorded scene by scene before it was edited together into a full-length film. Because we were not constrained by the layout of the hall or audience, we were able to be much more creative with settings and scenery. Mr Greenough constructed a huge Big Top backing using the PE parachute, and the bars came in handy to swing a trapeze!

As term drew to a close, the children were able to visit their new teachers for a transition day, and the Year 6 leavers enjoyed a very moving service outdoors with Reverend Helen leading the prayers.

#### Test and Trace scam

Action Fraud has issued a warning to anyone returning from international travel, who may need to quarantine for ten days. During this time, you might receive a visit from someone working for NHS Test and Trace, to check that you're complying with the rules.

- Staff employed on behalf of the NHS Test and Trace service will visit the address listed on the passenger locator form.
- They will be wearing NHS Test and Trace branded clothing.
- They will identify themselves verbally, and present an ID card with information which includes their name, role and employer.
- They will follow social distancing guidelines where possible.
- They will state your name, and ask you to confirm it. They
  will also ask to see your driving licence or passport to confirm
  your identity.
- They will then ask you a few questions to help establish whether you're following your duty to quarantine and to enable them to provide additional information, support or guidance where necessary.
- You may receive follow-up visits within the 10-day quarantine period.

Genuine NHS Test and Trace staff will not:

- Enter your home; ask you to provide your name; ask for your National Insurance number, telephone number or any other identification other than your passport or driving licence; photograph your identification documents; ask you for financial details (such as bank or credit card information) ask you for money or issue a fine.
- NHS Test and Trace staff have no legal power to issue a fixed penalty notice or a fine. Only the police can issue fixed penalty notices for breaching quarantine rules.
- If someone visits you claiming to be from NHS Test and Trace, and you do not believe they are genuine, call 999 and ask for the police.

#### Fraudulent links texted to mobile phones

If you often miss calls on your mobile be careful not to be caught off guard by texts like these. Criminals hope to trick you into clicking on dangerous links in order to obtain your financial details and your money.

#### From the Ministry Team.....



#### <u>Just a minute ...</u>

I wonder how your soul is. We've been through a period of unusual stress and strain over the last 18 months or so. Life slowing down, speeding up, closing down, opening up. It has all taken its toll on

many of us as we've tried to cope with different scenarios time after time. We may be aware that we've become less loving, our internal fuse is shorter with people and situations, tension and anxiety levels are higher. There just doesn't seem to be the emotional energy available any more to respond well in relationships. Many of us may be able to identify with Bilbo Baggins in *Lord of the Rings*, 'I feel all thin, sort of stretched, like butter that has been scraped over too much bread.' Maybe there is a sense of wanting to stop and get our lives back again, to refresh our souls again.

But it's often difficult to find the energy to do what we know is good for us—and hope that a quick fix will do it instead—a raid on the fridge, switch on the TV, browse the internet, go shopping, do the next job ... whatever gives us comfort quickly. Yet our souls could be looking for something more than a quick fix. They could be thirsting for something deeper, for a Someone that allows them to rest and just be, to catch up with themselves in a world that is demanding so much of them. This is where 'Just a minute' may be helpful.

*Just a minute* in those transition times of the day: dropping the

children off from school, just before starting a new piece of work, or after a phone call, before getting out of the car, making a cup of tea ... pause, stop for just a minute.



Just a minute to stop, to take time to breathe deeply, to slow our minds down, to pause and be, to savour the beauty of the world around us, to recall the kindness of others, to hear the gentle whispers of that Someone - God, loving us, wanting to be with us, wanting to tend to our souls, like a good shepherd with His sheep. As King David in the Bible found ...

The Lord is my best friend and my shepherd.

I always have more than enough.

He offers a resting place for me in his luxurious love.

His tracks take me to an oasis of peace near the quiet brook of bliss. That's where he restores and revives my life.

He opens before me the right path

and leads me along in his footsteps of righteousness so that I can bring honour to his name.

May we all find our souls being restored in the precious hands of God so that we can regain our lives again.



#### Some reflections on watching villages grow

One of the major concerns of those who sat down to begin the Drayton Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) nearly 10 years ago now, was the need for the village to be more interconnected as this would generate a better sense of community. For decades village planning had been obsessed with all homes being immediately connected to the main highways. This led to endless ribbon developments with people living far apart from one another. The villages of Drayton, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford have all suffered. The Drayton NDP has ensured that each of the three main new developments is well connected within the village and also to the main highways. There are now a range of interesting circular walks all round the village.

The new developments in Sutton Courtenay are less well connected to each other and the distances some have to walk to get to village services are a challenge, particularly to the elderly. The concerns of residents at one end of the village are often very different from those at the other end. Appleford has the same issues but, being a much smaller village, generating a feeling of community is less of a challenge.

Marcham is rather different and, in planning terms is far more compact. Whilst, as in all families, Marcham is not above disagreeing with itself, it is not surprising that the village generally has a strong community feeling. However, even here there have been issues within some of the new developments over some residents resisting planned connecting roads and paths.

The Drayton experience is that connecting roads and paths is the secret to generating functioning communities.

Covid has made it easier for all of us to hide from each other and to stop meeting and talking to one another. However, our village communities and their Covid Groups have done a magnificent job in minimising this damage. Indeed, our communities are probably better at caring for each other than ever before. As we come out of the pandemic, it would be tragic to slip back behind our front doors. There are very powerful economic reasons for encouraging working from home but not at the expense of community life.

#### Holiday news

- The long awaited "build out" on Drayton Rd, Sutton Courtenay has now been agreed and is funded. Various legalities have to be gone through, but the project should be fully operational by spring next year.
- The application for Mill Rd Bridge has been passed and work should begin shortly. This will restore the pedestrian path between Drayton and Marcham.
- The repainting of all the white lines on the Milton interchange roundabout will be done in September.
- 4. Appleford continues to fight for an adjustment to the new HIF Road. We expect to see the formal application very soon.
- 5. In common with many councils across the country, the national shortage of HGV drivers, together with the "pingdemic", has led to the temporary suspension of the Brown Bin service for the month of August in order to ensure there is no threat to other waste services. It is hoped that the garden waste collection will be reinstated in early September. In the meantime, residents are asked to be patient and take their garden waste to the Drayton recycling depot where possible.

#### **DAVID JOHNSTON MP**



I held a very productive pre-COP26 summit for Wantage and Didcot constituents this month. We had a great range of speakers, including the CEO of the independent Climate Change Committee.

Interesting fact: the UK is currently 20 years ahead of the global average for cutting emissions, as well as cutting them faster than the other G20 countries. It won't surprise you that the way we build houses featured regularly.

I put the event on because tackling climate change is very important to me, very important to a significant number of constituents and we have a big opportunity to demonstrate leadership when the world's leaders come to Glasgow for the actual UN summit in November. It was also a great chance to showcase good local organisations like Greencore Construction, Westmill Wind and Solar and the Earth Trust. I am sending a summary of the concerns and ideas raised at the event to Alok Sharma, President of COP26, and will let everyone know how he responds.

As you might have seen, I held my debate in parliament on Royal Mail's performance recently, making clear again that I don't blame their workers for the problems. The following day I visited the Didcot Delivery Office. It's clear that Royal Mail HQ have taken the criticisms seriously and have worked to try and improve the service—many people have told me it has. But you should let me know if you continue to encounter problems.

My first '10 minute rule bill' will be on behalf of the AEAT Pension Campaign. This constituency has more of the AEAT Pensioners than any other constituency and they were all encouraged — via assurances that turned out to be false — to transfer to a pension scheme that has meant their pensions are now worth considerably less than they should be. It is a tale that sounds familiar, but a unique case in that it was advice from the Government's Actuary Department in the 1990s that was strengthened to encourage the transfer and, at the moment, the advice can't be investigated as the Ombudsman in question doesn't have the powers to. The Bill would enable the Ombudsman to investigate the advice given and was first introduced by Ed Vaizey not long before he stood down. It is a long and difficult route to pass a law this way, but I am full of admiration for the campaigners who have been dogged in seeking to right the wrong.

Recess is fast approaching. I will be back home in Didcot for most of it, albeit working, contrary to the suggestion MPs are on holiday! In addition to regular meetings, surgery appointments and visits, I'll be holding some roundtables on issues constituents have raised repeatedly with me (including on GP appointments) and trying to attend as many of the events that couldn't take place last year as I can — let me know if you think there is a good one for me to attend near you.

#### THE PATH LESS TRAVELLED BY SIMON LAZARE

This month's walk is a circa 13km, 8-mile walk starting from the Village Hall along some Permissive Paths and Public Rights of Way (PROW) to the south and west of the village to Steventon. There are shortcuts if you don't want to do the whole walk. Note some paths on this walk are prone to flooding and can be muddy.

From the Village Hall turn right and take the first turning on the left, south, on to Christchurch Way. This is Bridleway (BR) 25. Follow the BR south, east, then south again until you get to the fence belonging to the old power station site, now a data centre. Turn right, west, on BR 24 and walk 260m to Harwell Road.

Cross Harwell Road and turn left, south, to the gate into the field on your right, Kelaart's Field. In Kelaart's Field take one of the paths, heading diagonally, south west, to the bridge over Moor Ditch, on the far side of Kelaart's Field, toward Milton Park. The mapped route follows the permissive path keeping to the left, south, and then following Moor Ditch, west, to the foot/cycle bridge (continuing straight over the north side of the dead-end road which also bridges Moor Ditch on the way).

Take the foot/cycle bridge into Milton Park and follow the shared use cycle pedestrian path west then south, across Park Drive at the crossing, continue south and then west parallel with the railway to Backhill tunnel, on the left (south). The building on the right, before you get to the tunnel, is 99 Park Drive, there is a new café, Pierrepont Café, managed by Julia, which is open to the public. Continue across the face of the tunnel on to the bark-covered path running between the duck pond and the railway, until it goes right and links back up with Park Drive.

Follow Park Drive west to the junction with High St Milton, on the right (north). Cross Park Drive North. Then cross Milton High St, west, where you will find Milton's FP 14. Follow FP 14 south-west under the A34. After the underpass, turn right, north west, and continue on Milton's FP 18. After 350m you will reach the boundary with Steventon Parish, where Milton's FP 7 joins from the right. Continue west on Steventon's FP 15. After 220m you will see the entrance to Steventon's FP 13 on your right, north. Take FP 13 north, across the wooden bridge over the Ginge Brook, north to the stile and on to Kennel Lane. Follow Kennel Lane north west, for 350m, noting the Tudor houses, until you reach The Green, Steventon. Cross The Green, north west to the north corner of The Green on Abingdon Road, B4017.

Follow the B4017, north, using the pavement on the west side for about 300m until you see Farmhouse Bakery on your right. Here you can take a break and enjoy a nice coffee and bacon bap, if your partner will let you!

When suitably revitalised, leave the bakery turning left back along the B4017 to the Green. This time walk back across The Green, south east, keeping to the left on Steventon's FP 19, with the ditch on your left. The path turns right, south west, where it is paved (crazy paving), this is FP 3. After about 50m there is a small concrete bridge over the ditch on your left. Cross the ditch, south, passing the Thames Water pumping station and cross the second small concrete bridge over the second ditch, turn immediately left, east, on Steventon's BR 12 part of the Vale Way. As you follow the cobbled path for about 400m to the parish boundary with Milton, look out for the deer in 'By The Meadow Farm' to the north. The path continues as Milton's BR 5, an unmade path below the level

of the ditch on your right. The water in this ditch is usually higher than the path and surrounding fields, which often flood.

Milton's BR 5 continues over the footbridge, across the A34. On the far side, at the bottom of the steps, turn left and continue on BR 5, north east, still part of the Vale Way, north then east around the back of Milton Manor. After walking 450m east on BR 5, now a metalled track, on your right, south, you will see a narrow path between the high walls of the Manor with offset barriers, Milton FP 8. Take FP 8, south, past Saint Blaise's Church then turn left, east, through the church yard or along the road past the Plum Pudding Public House to High St, Milton.

Cross the High St, turning right and then left, east, on School Lane. Follow the lane south east, back to Milton FP 4, Finger Post on the left, east. This is the continuation of the Vale Way. Follow the path east for 650m passed the houses and across the field to the cycle track on Kelaart's Field. Turn left, north, on the cycle track (shared cycle and footpath — Milton FP 1 and Vale Way) for 400m to Sutton Road/Milton Road.


Take care and cross Milton Road to Frog Hole, the narrowunmade path going north along the side of the houses, Sutton Courtenay FP 21. This is still the Vale Way and we will follow it until we reach Drayton East Way. This often-muddy path goes north along the edge of the houses and on along the hedgerow and ditch. The PROW is on the other side (east) of the ditch but an unmade but maintained path runs along the west side before crossing over further north where you will see a narrow wooden bridge over a ditch. After crossing the bridge, into Drayton FP 10, turn right, east, for about 50m before turning back north and continuing along the ditch until you reach the Ginge Brook again.

Turn left and follow the Ginge Brook upstream until you reach another narrow wooden bridge on the right, north, over the Ginge Brook. After the bridge turn right then left, the path crosses the middle of the field but is a maintained gravel path. Continue north until you reach a track going east/west. This is Drayton East Way. The Vale Way continues north across the middle of the next field before continuing north along Peep-O-Day Lane to Abingdon. However, we will turn right, east along Drayton East Way, Drayton's path No. 1, back to Sutton Courtenay, back across the Ginge Brook, for the last time, on to Mill Lane, Sutton Courtenay BR 26, then on to the High Street.

Turn right, south, on the High St, find Doctors Lane Path, FP 8, on the left, east, between 53 and 55 High St. The path is a narrow gravel path between houses for 170m then turn right, south, at the end of the houses, on to FP 27 for 280m. About half way along it becomes Frilsham St. At the south corner, junction with Hobbyhorse Lane and Christchurch Way, turn left on byway 9 west for 100m, along Hobbyhorse Lane, back to the Village Hall.

#### **REST IN PEACE**

Jacqueline Mathews (known as Jacqui) who died on 18<sup>th</sup> June 2021 was born in Faringdon on 28<sup>th</sup> April 1920. She did not have an easy childhood and moved to Milton to live with her Gran and was brought up by her until her Gran died. She had two half sisters, Barbara and Christine. She attended school locally and then went to the Council School in Abingdon before leaving to go into service – working first for a family in Rowstock – who were very kind to her and treated her well – and then at a College in Oxford. The family are not sure how she met her future husband, Lawrence Mathews, but their courtship involved a lot of cycling between Sutton Courtenay and Oxford for both of them! They were married in Milton Church and set up home together at 2 Harwell Road before moving to number 19. They went on to have six children – Jim, Richard, Susan, David, Pauline and Rose. She was a good Mum – firm but fair.

Jacqui was a lovely cook — not just making delicious homemade meals to feed the family but also making cakes for a variety of people and occasions — from birthdays to weddings. She was a great knitter — making jumpers and tank tops for all the family and was also good at smocking — making dresses for the girls when they were in fashion. Bringing up a large family was always a challenge and Jim and Richard, in particular, always seemed to be up to some sort of mischief and, even well into adulthood, were always playing tricks and teasing her.

Jacqui always remembered the time during the war when some soldiers marched down the cinder track past their house and Jimmy followed on behind without anyone realizing — he was eventually found at Culham swimming with the soldiers in the river! She also had vivid memories of the practice parachute drop when hundreds of soldiers descended from the sky but not all their parachutes made it back to their base as they were highly prized as a precious dress material.

As well as caring for her family she was always busy helping run the family business in partnership with Lawrence. Once she had passed her driving test — which she took many times before she succeeded — she would often help out in the shop or drive deliveries around the local area.

In the wider community she was a founder member of the Camera Club in Sutton Courtenay and enjoyed their regular meetings. She loved bingo in the Village Hall and was a member of the WI. She used to bring Rose to choir practice in the church and was always a helpful and friendly neighbour who became known as 'Gran' to many young people as they were growing up in the village. Sadly, she was widowed at a relatively young age when Lawrence died after a long illness throughout which Jacqui nursed and cared for him.

After Lawrence died, she did make a once in a lifetime trip to Australia and she always enjoyed holidays in Cornwall. And when she was 75 years old, she made the move to Penryn, near Falmouth, where she soon made friends with her supportive neighbours. But home was always Sutton Courtenay and she remained interested in the village and the lives of all those she knew here. She spent the last two years of her life in the Godolphin House Care Home in Helston where she was well looked after.

Jacqui was a kind woman, a supportive wife, a good mother and a friend and a Gran to many. She had a good sense of humour but could, on occasion, be sarcastic. She was always a straight talker - you knew where you were with her. And she was never afraid to speak her mind. But she was also a good listener. She always tried to help if she could. She was strong-willed and proud of her independence well into later life. She was a bit of a perfectionist and liked things to be done right and in the proper way. But, above all, Jacqui was a person whose entire life was focused on her family and who put loving and caring for them before anything else. She was very proud of her children and the subsequent generations of the expanding family.

Her funeral took place in All Saints' Church on Thursday, 8<sup>th</sup> July 2021 and this is an edited extract of the address given at her funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

Our route took us through Burford and into the Cotswolds. Some of the hills were a challenge for the donkeys but when we came to steep hills everyone except the driver got off the carriage and walked. On country lanes Nelson ran alongside the carriage. Of course, hills go down as well as up and the old adage is true 'Going uphill the donkeys sweat – going downhill the driver sweats'!

Travelling through the network of country lanes at 2 mph was a special privilege. You see and hear so much that is just not possible to hear or see from a car. At Notgrove we had a warm welcome from Notgrove Holidays, one of our sponsors and in the next village of Kineton we had a ford to cross. This is very near the Cotswold Farm Park and Adam Henson (from Countryfile) came out to help us across the ford.

Excitement mounted as we entered Wales but frustration as well. The border is not a straight line and we found ourselves weaving in and out of Wales. We have several different photos of 'Welcome to Wales' signs! The weather was warmer, but the donkeys thrived on the warmth even if the humans found it more stifling.

On the last day nostalgia set in — we had had such an amazing experience we didn't want it to end. At St Melangell we had the warmest of welcomes and the donkeys held their heads high as a clapping crowd awaited our arrival. As soon as the donkeys were settled in their field shelter Christine Browne (Vicar of St Melangell) held a moving service outside in the donkey field. She had worked hard at researching references to donkeys in the bible and wove the service cleverly around that. It was an emotional time as John Hughes — the singing farmer accompanied himself on his guitar for another rendering of 'the Donkathon song' (see www.donkathon.org).




