PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Council budget 2018/19

The Parish Council held its budget meeting on 12th December to look at its expenditure for the next financial year. The precept request has been lodged with the Vale of White Horse District Council for £58,786. This is the amount charged via the council tax to the residents of the parish. This is an increase of £7,130 over what was given by the District Council last year, but the costs will be shared between a larger number of houses, as many of the latest houses on the new developments in the village have become occupied. The Parish Council will have significant expenditure this next year, particularly in regards to the planning appeals, and the employment of consultants to represent the Parish Council at the Public Inquiry. The Council believes that Sutton Courtenay has had more than its share of development and is supporting the Vale of White Horse District Council in its opposition to the proposed 554 new houses and other buildings, off Hobbyhorse Lane and Harwell Road. The Parish Council will also be giving grants to deserving local organisations for the benefit of the local residents. These include Sutton Courtenay news, the Scout Group, Damascus, the Primary School, the costs of providing the Community First Responder for Sutton Courtenay and the Citizens Advice Bureau, as well as other small grants.

Appleford Road – pothole repairs

The Parish Council, as well as residents, have frequently contacted the County Council regarding the poor state of Appleford Road and parts of Church Street, particularly since the trenching works undertaken on behalf of Thames Water. There were numerous deep holes, and the Parish Council was very much aware of the problems they caused. Rather than repair several small areas, the County Council decided to arrange for resurfacing, particularly in the vicinity of The Fish public house. The Parish Council will continue to refer on, areas which are not completed to its satisfaction.

Cyclists on pavements

The Council has had reports of cyclists that ride on the footways particularly in the High Street.

This is dangerous for the pedestrians who use the path, and also for the cyclists themselves as vehicles emerge from driveways and side roads such as Courtenay Close where visibility is limited. Cyclists could get hit by a car. The Sustrans cycle route from Abingdon to Didcot is along the High Street, but cyclists should use the road and not the pavement. The matter has been brought to the attention of the Police, who will be patrolling the area, so for your own safety and that of others, please ensure you do not cycle on the pavements.

Recycling

Your chance to talk rubbish with the Councils in Oxfordshire. Consultation is being undertaken by Oxfordshire County Council regarding how it can help reduce the quantity of waste thrown away and increase recycling. The results will inform the review of the joint countywide waste strategy. This sets out priorities across Oxfordshire for waste and recycling until 2030. The agreed priorities will be approved by the

Oxfordshire Environment Partnership and will be adopted by the relevant District Council later in the year.

Stop Press and Latest Information

The Parish Council holds its meetings monthly on the first Tuesday of the month, and the agenda for those meetings is finalised one week beforehand. The copy deadline for Sutton Courtenay news is about one week after the Parish Council meeting. It is therefore not always possible to have up to the minute public information available at Council meetings, or in its articles in the News. The Council's website too is not done in house, so that cannot be immediately updated. To get over the problem, the Parish Council will be providing any stop press and urgent items to the Sutton Courtenay News team, with a request that information goes on its website. December Parish Council meeting

At the December meeting, there were 2 presentations, one on the independent studies on the Oxford Flood Relief Scheme. These concluded that there would no additional effect downstream should the Oxford Flood Relief Scheme go ahead. A business case for the Abingdon scheme should be available in the first quarter of 2018, and then more information would be available.

Also agents acting for Diageo Pension Trust gave a brief presentation about the plans for the warehouse site in Sutton Courtenay Lane. Residents should have received a leaflet through their doors about this. The large warehouse proposals have been shelved, and currently the plan is for a data centre to the rear of the site, and 2 smaller warehouses closer to Sutton Courtenay Lane. It is understood that the planning application for the 2 smaller units will be lodged in the early part of 2018.

The following planning applications have been considered :

P17/V2965/FUL construction of 6 bed detached dwelling following demolition of existing dwelling at 1 Appleford Road. The Council wished the height of the dwelling to be reduced in line with the adjacent dwellings.

P17/V1963/O Additional highway information for Sutton

Courtenay East site, Hobbyhorse Lane. The Council objected to the highway report as it compared Sutton Courtenay to large towns and cities and did not take into account limited rural bus services, the requirement for people to use their cars.

P17/V3131/FUL Retrospective application for the laying of a hardstanding. Material change of use of land from agriculture to domestic car parking on land south of 6 Abingdon Road. The Council commented that there was no tracking shown on the drawing and the vehicle would have to reverse into the road too close to traffic lights. No drainage was included in the hardstanding.

P17/S4416/FUL Change of use of land from agricultural land to farm park, wildlife and outdoor activity centre at Culham Hill off the A415. The Council had concerns regarding the traffic impact on Sutton Courtenay, and coalescence with Abingdon.

P17V/3273/HH Erection of two storey front extension at 14 The Green. The Council had no objection.

One planning decision that the Parish Council is pleased to report is the refusal by Oxfordshire County Council for mineral workings near Clifton Hampden. The main reasons being the impact of additional vehicle movements, the new link road and river crossing which would be prejudiced, and development was to take place in the green belt.

Public Inquiry / Planning Appeals

The dates of the public inquiry are 23rd January to 2nd February, and it will be held at the Steventon House Hotel. In addition to all the written submissions at the time of the planning applications, the Inspector will hear evidence submitted as part of the appeal process, and will listen to the opposing views. His report and decisions will be available some weeks after the hearing.

An Exciting Year Ahead!

2018 promises to be a very exciting year at Sutton Courtenay School. The building work has been stalled by the collapse of Carillion, and as I write no work is happening on site. We very much hope this situation will be resolved quickly, as our grounds are in desperate need of reconstruction! Mr Greenough our caretaker has already done a lot in the new garden area, with the shed already erected and the raised beds coming on well. The new garden is bigger than the previous one. We will soon be collecting 2 litre plastic bottles to build our new bottle greenhouse! This was one of our favourite features of our old garden area, and always attracted a lot of attention. Our project is called 'Growing Our School, Growing Their Future.' In addition, we are planning an application to the Aviva Community Fund. We are now working hard on new topics as we get back into our learning after the Christmas break. The children and staff have returned full of enthusiasm, and the topics planned are sure to give the children many memorable experiences. In the Nursery, a winter wonderland has been created with a huge amount of paper recycled from our shredder – it is constantly

'snowing' in there, and the hoover needs emptying more than usual! Reception are learning about 'People Who Help Us' and have lots of visitors planned. Year 1 and 2 also have a wintery theme, with their learning centred around the theme of 'Polar Explorers'. They are learning about different climates and animals around the world. Year 3 and 4 have an exciting topic called 'The Blue Abyss' which focuses around the ocean. There will be lots of science, but also lots of stories told and written based on the theme of '20,000 Leagues Under The Sea' by Jules Verne. In Year 5 and 6, the topic is 'Rebels'. 

During this month Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day, share the same date. It seems an odd mix, yet there is an obvious link: *love!*

Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is about learning how to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. It's also an opportunity to reflect on Jesus' experience in the wilderness (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit, where He was tempted by Satan, but demonstrated the path of real love.

Jesus is tempted to turn stones into bread. Love gets to the heart of human need, not just satisfying physical desires.

Satan tempts Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is the beginning of love and results in sacrificial service to meet the needs of others.

Finally, He is tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Only real love can change hearts by practical love and care.

Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.

Valentine was Christ's follower, committed to sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and was martyred on February 14th.

Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret. He also helped Christians in Rome during times of persecution. He demonstrated the importance of showing real love in action.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

*'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing?
Know it well, love was his meaning.'*

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of **Eric Leslie FIDLER** who died on 9th December 2017 was born in Swindon on 2nd May 1932 to his parents Phyllis and Harold Fidler and he grew up with younger brother Brian, attending the Council School in Conduit Road in Abingdon. He first met Margaret when she was 15 and he was 19 and they were both working at T&G Woodware in Abingdon. They became childhood sweethearts but it wasn't quite love at first sight - Eric was very shy and it took two weeks for Margaret to ask Eric out to the cinema on 13th January whilst they were standing outside Woolworths! They became engaged just a couple of years later on Eric's 21st birthday and they were married two years later in St Michael's Church in Abingdon. Before they were married Margaret always said she wanted four children and she got her wish with the birth of Lesley, Linda, Andrew and Diane. The family initially lived in Saxton Road in Abingdon before moving in 1958 to Sutton Courtenay. This is where they made their home, brought up their family and established long lasting friendships. Eric's working life was spent in a variety of places but mainly at Harwell. After he retired from Harwell he became a cleaner at Esso – Margaret was delighted that he took up this job as she was not looking forward to him being at home all the time! In his spare time he enjoyed playing golf at Haddon Hill – until arthritis in his hands stopped him. He enjoyed listening to music – particularly The Shadows and Enya. Both he and Margaret enjoyed going to the Football Club three times a week to have a drink and meet up with friends.

He loved company and could tell some good stories. Holidays were always a highlight of Eric's life. From family holidays in Hayling Island and Dorset – usually camping in pouring rain as we have heard – to coach trips with Margaret to Italy where they met some great people and made good friends. Eric had an immense love of animals – particularly dogs – but he also cared for all creatures great and small over the years – including a variety of birds – bantams, quails, chickens and a parrot and hamsters, gerbils, guinea pigs and a tortoise. He would carefully hand rear injured birds that the family brought home – including a dove that Margaret found and even Eric brought home a lost kitten which he called Tuppence. Eric was very practical and could turn his hands to most jobs. A good electrician he would potter around the house doing DIY. Eric also enjoyed coming to this church and for several years he and Margaret were regular worshippers at our Family Services. Such was Eric's kind and helpful nature that he volunteered to go on the church cleaning rota – in fact for several years I think he was the only man who volunteered to help clean and dust! Sadly Eric developed Alzheimer's Disease and his condition deteriorated quickly. He received excellent care in the Wantage Community Care Home and Margaret and all the family visited him regularly and did whatever they could to support him. Margaret has truly fulfilled her wedding vows in caring for him so lovingly, devotedly and unconditionally. He will be remembered as a loving and caring husband, generous and kind, a devoted father and a hard worker who never wanted his family to go without. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends who attended his funeral in All Saints' Church on Wednesday 27th December. *This is an edited extract of the address given at his funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.*

THE CHURCH BUILDING PROJECT

Help is needed.

We take things for granted - clean tap water, political high jinks, the postman, our NHS, our interesting weather chat. One of these is All Saints', our village church. We expect the wonderful Grade 1 listed building to be there for us, to visit, to give comfort (in times of trouble), for Christmas and Easter, to provide services for rites of passage - baptisms, weddings and funerals - whether we regularly worship or not. Would we care if our church was closed and deconsecrated? This has happened to almost 1,500 churches over the last 5 years, in Britain.

It seems that the way forward is to reopen our churches, for different activities, as things used to be pre-Victorian times, and to rediscover their original purpose. The Church should welcome everyone, and be at the heart of a community. We are working to secure our church, for you and future generations.

The Church Building Project is designed to do just that. It will provide support for all events in the church. The River Room will also stand alone, available for use, by interest groups, for hobbies, meetings, parties, lectures, complementing the role of the Village hall. It will store and display local historical material, for family historians, tourists and students. This will be a much needed additional space, as Sutton Courtenay continues to grow apace. The room will seat 60 in rows, or 40 around tables. The kitchen will be fit for the 21st century, and

be able to cater for large numbers. There will be three toilets, one of which will be fully accessible.

This project will help to ensure the survival of our church, well into the future. It has been taxing the working party for more than three years! With your support, our aim is to complete the job by the end of 2019. We appeal to every household, to consider contributing. The total cost estimate is £500,000, half of which will pay for the toilets and kitchen. The rest is for the Room. £258,000 is still needed to reach the grand total. The grant application process continues, as do the fundraising events, but we very much need your contributions and help, as individuals.

Donations and pledges of any size, will be very welcome. **NOW is the time to do this**, if you have been thinking about donating or pledging. It will help greatly with the grant Application process, and of course to reach the final target. **This is a once in a life-time opportunity to make a lasting gift to your village.**

The youth project works with young people to change lives, and hearts and minds in the community. It is the day to day running costs of doing

In November, the Chancellor delivered his Budget. No one can pretend it was radical or revolutionary. But most will think that's a good thing. There's quite enough turmoil at the moment.

The main focus of the budget was housing - a deeply controversial issue in our part of the world. Nevertheless, people do know that we need to build more houses, as property ownership has fallen dramatically and houses have become unaffordable for many people. I am therefore encouraged that the Chancellor has outlined the Government's ambition to increase housing supply to its highest level since 1970 by the end of this Parliament. This will put us on track to deliver 300,000 homes a year by the mid-2020s with £15.3 billion new financial support for house building over the next five years – taking the total to at least £44 billion.

On a local level, it was promising to see an additional £215 million set aside for Oxfordshire to build infrastructure, deliver new homes and increase economic productivity across the county. This is a welcome step in ensuring our local area is fit for the future.

I welcome the announcement from Chris Grayling of the £47.9bn overhaul of the rail network in England and Wales, including restoring the Oxford to Cambridge rail link. This is part of the overall strategy suggested by the National Infrastructure Commission's report earlier this month on infrastructure growth across the Cambridge-Milton Keynes-Oxford Arc, which Wantage & Grove Station is part of. I will be continuing to campaign in Parliament for a new station at Wantage & Grove whilst there is so much interest in rail infrastructure.

The Department of Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) has recently compiled a handy list of funding sources available for arts, heritage and cultural projects which may be useful for local organisations. There are many different avenues that organisations seeking support can pursue and I would recommend that anybody wishing to make an application first

contacts the relevant local office. Their staff will then be able to provide advice and support regarding the application process. Full list can be found at: goo.gl/QihSKD

On a similar note it is fantastic to see that over the past three months the Big Lottery Fund has provided nearly £55,000 of funding to 6 projects in the constituency. Every week over £13 million is awarded across the UK to support community activity with the money raised from National Lottery players. The organisation works hard to ensure the money reaches the people and organisations who make a real difference and it's great that the benefits are being felt in our area.

The brand new Didcot Concert Orchestra gives its inaugural concert at Cornerstone arts centre, Didcot at 4pm on Sunday 11 February 2018 playing music from the late Romantic era. More info can be found at: <http://www.didcotconcertorchestra.org.uk/>

I am delighted that this Orchestra has been established. Didcot is a vibrant and growing town, and the arts have always been a central part of its life. The concert orchestra fills a gap, and it is very much needed. Music brings great joy to people, and it also plays an important role in our schools and our communities. I wish the Didcot Concert Orchestra every success and I look forward to seeing them perform soon in Didcot – if not at the Proms!

Please forgive yet another article on planning and development; I will try to find something else to write about in future. It may not be easy.

The impact of Development on Drayton Road and its Neighbourhood Plan, the impact of development on the A415 through Marcham, Barrow Rd and the Marcham AQMA, the impact of development in Sutton Courtenay on Culham Bridge and an A34, itself already under extreme stress running through the middle of it all - it sometimes seems as if this County Division, of which we are all part, is being singled out for very special treatment. The truth is, of course, that many parts of the South of England are under similar stress.

However, with our very low unemployment and our local economy thriving, Government is wanting, expecting and depending on us to grow. For almost the first time, the stresses – particularly on our road system - are now so obvious and so acute that Government is realizing that without more

infrastructure, there are fewer and fewer sensible places to put the nation's much needed extra housing. Money has to be found and the calls for infrastructure before housing are becoming ever louder and more persuasive.

Hence, the "Growth Deal" - an initial "down payment" (Government term, not mine) of £215m over 5 years, to help us cope with all the housing our Councils are already committed to - may not be enough, but it's a start. Given that our housing is due to be delivered over the next 13 years, it appears that, if the deal is signed, there is the prospect of some infrastructure *before* houses. This is something we have been requesting for many years now.

On January 23rd, a planning appeal hearing will begin over 2 potential major developments in Sutton Courtenay. The OCC Highway officer's view is that the road network will not cope,

at least not until a new bridge over the Thames has been built. This might happen in five years at the earliest. The planning appeal is due to last at least 8 days, we are told. We will know if the Growth deal is to be signed on February 1st. The timing of all this and the planning decision is going to be highly significant. The result, however it goes, will impact not just on Sutton Courtenay and the immediate villages around, but on the whole of Oxfordshire and almost certainly on planning in

the whole of the South of England. I would urge all those with an interest in planning and housing to join me in watching the progress of that appeal very closely.

Thames Valley Police advice about reporting suspicious behaviour

If you see anyone acting suspiciously please report it to the police by calling 101 or by e-mailing the Neighbourhood Policing Team at

AbingdonOuterNHPT@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk, which will ensure that the information is picked up and actioned as necessary. The police request that contact is made by the person directly concerned, rather than a friend or neighbour. You should call 999 in the case of an emergency.

Modern slavery

We all think it wouldn't happen in our town or village but, shockingly, three modern slavery crimes are recorded every week in Thames Valley and many more go unreported. Victims of modern slavery can be any age, gender, nationality or ethnicity. They are tricked or threatened into work, and may feel unable to leave due to fear of intimidation. If you suspect it, report it. The police rely on information from members of the public. Protection and support is available at www.thamesvalley.police.uk/hiddenharm.

Would you recognise the signs? How do they look? Scruffy, dirty, malnourished, injured? How are they acting? Anxious, afraid, reluctant to talk? What's their work situation like? Long hours, unsuitable clothing, wrong equipment? How's their accommodation? Overcrowded, poorly maintained, curtains always closed?

What are their movements like? Never leave the house alone, limited contact with friends and family, no access to money or identification?

Two simple ideas which could save a life...your life!

Message in a Bottle: When the Emergency Services are called to the home of someone who has collapsed or been involved in an incident, they are faced with many questions. Who is this person? What medication are they taking? Are they allergic to anything? Who are their next of kin (or carers) to contact? Are there any pets in the house who will need care if this patient has to be taken into hospital? The small plastic 'bottle' container contains a yellow form on which the owner has provided vital information - medical conditions, regular medications, allergies, doctor's details etc. This

information could obviously prove critical in deciding any appropriate treatment or other necessary action. The bottle is placed inside the fridge on the door shelf just above where the milk is kept and a green sticker is placed on the outside door of the fridge. A second sticker is placed on the inside of the main entrance door.

The Message in a Bottle scheme is very strongly supported by our local Emergency Services who are impressed by the simplicity of the system. It is also now a national scheme – run throughout the country by Lions and some other organisations all with the same aim – ensuring that their community is being helped to the maximum. There are now over 100,000 of these little bottles in the fridges of Oxfordshire alone.

Message in a Wallet: This was introduced in 2017 and folds, concertina style, to the size of a credit card and should be kept in a wallet or purse. Ideally you need a bottle and a wallet so that the information's available if you have either an incident or accident at home or while you're away from home.
