PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Council budget 2017/18

The Parish Council held its budget meeting prior to Christmas to discuss its financial requirements for next year. It carefully considered income and expenditure, and has set a precept of £51146. This is the amount that is charged via the council tax to the residents in the parish, and represents a slight increase on the amount of the precept last year. However the number of houses in the parish has increased too, so there should not be a significant difference in the amount payable for the parish element. The Council when deciding on its spending, included a sum of £10925 to award to local organisations by way of grant where residents benefit.

Warehouse - Sutton Courtenay Lane - Update

Residents have been asking questions about what is happening to the warehouse site at the southern end of the village. The situation is that all the planning conditions in regards to the warehouse application have now been discharged. There is therefore an unfettered consent. The roads agreement with the County Council too is complete. S shed has been demolished and the site is being cleared. This will take a few weeks. There is no planned date for starting construction. Some people have been asking too about an idea a while ago to put 3 smaller units on the site. This was not progressed and a planning application was not lodged.

Letters to the Council or Councillors

Sometimes letters are sent to the Council or to Parish Councillors without the author's name, address or contact details. Anonymous letters are not helpful. It may mean that the Council cannot consider them. It also means that there is no way of replying to the person who wrote it, so they will remain unaware if the Council or Councillor has managed to deal with the query. If anyone wishes to contact the Council or their local parish councillor, please provide your name, and contact details.

Foul language in recreation ground

As reported last month the Council received comments regarding the foul language which can be heard during sports matches on the pitches in the recreation ground. If anyone hearing inappropriate language from players, brings the matter to the attention of the linesman, then the referee can speak to team captains, and if necessary matches stopped.

Oxfordshire County Council – Unitary Authority bid

The County Council is proposing to abolish all six councils (county and district) and to replace them with a single new unitary council for the whole of Oxfordshire. "A Fresh Start for Oxfordshire" has just been published, and the County Council would like to hear views on what is proposed, so that it can consider points made before submitting a final bid to central government for a decision. Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered:

P16/V2472/HH Double storey side extension, new roof dormers and internal alterations at 7 Ginge brook. The Council restated its comments that no access should be from Ginge Brook

P16/V2010/FUL Erection of 2 bed dwelling at Peewit Farm, 95 Drayton Road. The Council stated that the height should be no more than originally consented and windows not to overlook neighbouring property.

16/V2216/FUL Demolish garage of no. 90 and erect 4 detached dwellings on land rear of 90A Milton Road. The Council stated that this was overdevelopment of the land.

P16/V2777 Variation of condition 3 in consent P13/V0858/HH at Cedar Croft, High Street to allow new first floor windows to comply with building regulations. Council objected to the application owing to the resulting overlooking of neighbouring gardens. Other means of fire escape could be provided

P15/V2353/O Erection of 200 dwellings (additional information- gas migration and drainage reports) at Hobbyhorse Lane. Council agreed that there was nothing in the additional reports which made any material difference to the concerns raised previously.

MW.0129/16 Retention of existing site office building and compound in association with monitoring of the former Sutton Wick landfill. Council had no objections

MW/.0130/16 Pumped underground drain to take leachate from FCC site. Council enquired where the leachate was being treated before discharge into the public sewer system.

P16/V2693/FUL Erection of 83 houses and associated works on Land south of Appleford Road. Council objected owing to the impact on traffic and sewer system

P16/V3115/FUL Proposed extension on the North side of the Church to provide meeting room, kitchen and WCs at All Saints Church. The Council raised objections on grounds of inadequate parking.

P16/V3232/LB and P16/V3231/FUL Redesign of new house, adjacent to the Manor House, Church Street. Council had concerns regarding the impact on the views from the river, and asked for a tree survey.

MW.0137/16 Erection and operation of mobile asphalt plant for a temporary period of 12 months during demolition and reconstruction of existing plant at Appleford sidings.

The Council had no objection provided the hours of operation were controlled and there were no vehicles through the village.

MW.0139/16 s. 73 application to change quarry operating details by varying conditions of a previous consent at Sutton Wick Quarry. Council had no objections

P16/V3098/HH Conversion of garage to granny annex at 41 Milton Road. Council requested conditions as to occupancy and non severance.

P16/V3179/FUL Replacement windows at 3A Tyrrells Way. Council had no objections

P16/V3121/HH Erection of conservatory at 42 Lady Place. Council had no objections

New Beginnings

As the New Year starts, the staff and children have all come back full of enthusiasm for the term ahead. In Key Stage 2, their learning is centered around the theme of 'Bright Lights, Big City', whilst in Key Stage 1 the children are looking in detail at the changing seasons, taking their inspiration from the natural world outside the classroom. Themed planning of learning, where we link areas of the curriculum together to make sure we cover what we need to, are very much central to the way we work in the school. We encourage children to make connections in their world, and use the skills they are learning in different contexts.

Watching the natural world around us reminds us of how essential change is in the cycle of life. Children understand this and experience the wonder of it — after all, for them, growing up every day, change is what they do! I take my inspiration from the way they learn as I steer the school through the period of change approaching, beginning with the building of our new classrooms. Of course, the main excitement for the children will be the arrival of diggers on site, but for the adults involved there are more far reaching considerations.

The school exists to serve the whole village, and we are expanding at such a fast rate because the village is growing and changing so fast. We now have to look closely at what our community needs from our school, and how we can best provide that. We will be developing our before and after school care soon - we already offer a breakfast club, and are working on setting up after school facilities. This is an important part of how we can support family life, and we all know children learn better when they are happy and settled.

Our library is also currently being re-designed, with a generous contribution from the Friends of Sutton Courtenay School who work so hard raising money to enhance different aspects of school life. The children are enjoying watching Mr Greenough constructing the shelving. We are very lucky to have a talented workman as part of our team!


Touching

REST IN PEACE

HELEN TYLER who died aged 70 on 25th November 2016 was born on 11th July 1946 in Paisley to her parents Helen and Peter and she was big sister to two brothers – Peter and John. Her parents sent her to Sunday School, which she attended regularly and she enjoyed it so much she ended up as the Sunday School Teacher. On leaving school Helen went to work as a Junior Accountant but due to ill-health in the family she had to change jobs and eventually worked for Pressed Steel. It was at work that she met her future husband Frank. It was love at first sight for him as he thought, "that's a cracker, I'm going to marry her!" It took six weeks of persuasion but he kept on asking her out until she said yes. They went on their first date in February 1966 to La Scala Cinema to see John Wayne in Stagecoach. Frank enjoyed the film tremendously but Helen fell asleep! Despite this inauspicious start they became engaged on Christmas Eve of that year and married in March 1968 in the South Church - the parish church of Charlston. There was rain, snow and fog on their wedding day and driving to Edinburgh for their honeymoon, the lights on the car packed up and Helen had to shine her torch out of the window so they could see where they were going. They went onto celebrate 48 years of married life. Work brought them south when they moved, initially to Drayton and then to their home in Sutton Courtenay on Bradstocks Way, where they brought up their boys - Malcolm, Andrew, Steven and Robert.

Helen worked in the Lemonade department at Morlands Brewery and also worked at the Manor House in Sutton Courtenay and as a cleaner and barmaid at the Swan. She decided to go into catering and got a job at the Head of the River having put herself through Abingdon College to get her City and Guilds Catering and Management qualification. One of her last jobs was working for Gateway & Summerfields in Didcot until it closed. As the years went by problems developed with her legs and the surgery she was offered did not help. She was diagnosed with Rheumatoid Arthritis and from then on she always hated going to the doctors. In 1984 she thought she was suffering from indigestion until she discovered she was pregnant with Robert. She was a very caring and protective Mum and also strict but fair. She never lost her Scottish accent and a joke in the family was that Steve told his teacher he couldn't learn his spellings, despite the hours Helen spent helping him, because he had a 'foreign' Mummy! Over the years she was involved with the village playgroup; the PTA at the school, and the Cubs and Scouts - she helped with many fundraising activities. She also became involved with the Evergreens and would help Mary Maddox organise trips to Blackpool and other places. She was always a good cook and liked to knit - making many jumpers for her four boys. She was a very proud and doting grandmother to her grandchildren.

Helen was a stoical, straight-talking, strong-willed and forceful individual but gradually her increasing ill-health reduced her mobility and she died at home. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

This is an edited extract of the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the funeral which was held in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay on 10th January 2017

VIOLET BOWERS (SIS) who died, aged 83, on 5th December 2016 was born on 29th June 1933 in Iver, Buckinghamshire – the 4th child in the family and the first girl. Her three older brothers called her 'Sis' from the moment she was born and the nickname stayed with her for life. She attended school in Clifton Hampden and Milton – although she didn't like school much and left as soon as she could. She was always a very jolly girl and, although she tried to be the older bossy sister to her younger sister Liz, she failed, as laughter was never far away. She liked to enjoy herself and took a great delight in life and all the fun it had to offer. As a young woman she worked for a Market Gardener at Kingston Bagpuize and for the local farmers helping with the potato picking and other harvest work. A hardworking woman she must also have cleaned all the local pubs at some point over the years. She met her husband, Jim Bowers in the early 50s and they set up their first home together in a caravan in Westbrook - going onto have their first four children there - before moving to a house in Barratts Way where Sis lived for over 50 years. They went onto have six children in total - Jack, Tink, Carol, Pauline, Marty and the baby who sadly died very young. Sadly the marriage came to an end after twenty years and Sis became a Single Mum, continuing to bring up her family and working hard to provide for them. She loved all her children equally and did her best to ensure that they never went without. She was a strong character who set boundaries for her children and she wouldn't tolerate any backchat. She was very much a force to be reckoned with and was defensive and protective of her whole family. From an early age she loved to sing - and once won a singing competition as she had such a good quality voice. She also loved to dance. In later years she continued to enjoy a singsong at social gatherings and playing bingo. She was also a keen darts player - playing on a team for the Red Lion at Drayton. She always maintained a wide circle of friends and was well known as the life and soul of parties. Known as 'Little Nanny' she was very proud of her 11 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren whom she loved and spoilt whenever she could. Her main focus throughout her life was her family and she always liked to know what was going on and to keep in touch with everyone. During the last five years of her life Sis grew progressively frailer as she suffered from diabetes and its side-effects. She was cared for by her family until her death.

This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral on Tuesday 20th December 2016 in All Saints' Church by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

GLADYS MABEL WINCHESTER who died aged 97 on 8th December 2016 was born on 8th July 1919 in Loughborough to her parents Albert and Hettie and she was soon joined by Jack, her younger brother. Gladys had a challenging childhood. Her father had lost a leg in the First World War and her Mother died of septicaemia when Gladys was only 12 years old. She met her husband Elrick during the Second World War and they went onto have a long and happy marriage. They were both musicians – Elrick sang and Gladys played the accordion – and would perform at the many dances held throughout the war. Gladys had some vivid memories from this time of her life – from saving up her clothing coupons for her wedding and having to spend hours queuing for food to feed the three men in her household. She could also recall the night that Coventry was bombed when the sky was lit up for miles around. She and Elrick went onto have one child - Anne - who remembers Gladys as a very caring and loving Mum. Gladys always loved gardening and she and Elrick worked in partnership - she would look after the flowers, whereas he was only interested in growing things he could eat. Pets always featured in her life – initially dogs but then her two cats - Roly and Dusty - in later years. Although her main focus was always her family and caring for friends and neighbours she spent time working outside the home in a factory making hosiery for M&S where she worked her way up to become a supervisor. In retirement she and Elrick discovered the joy of travelling. Gladys also went on a 'continental catering course' to learn how to cook other cuisines – but Elrick always preferred to eat English food! Gladys and Elrick moved to Sutton Courtenay in 1985. She was a fantastic grandmother to Sam and Sarah and was always making cakes; willing to play games and was a keen babysitter. She was immensely proud of them and their achievements and would have been really proud of her great-grandson Marlowe who entered this world as Gladys left it. Unfortunately Elrick died not long after moving to Sutton Courtenay but Gladys showing the same determination of her early years - rebuilt her life and made many new friends. Having been an active member of the Young Wives during her years in Loughborough she loved belonging to Evergreens in her later years. She enjoyed the weekly socialising and games of bingo and would take every opportunity to go on their outings and holidays. There are not many people who can say that they celebrated their 80th birthday in Paris and their 90th in Jersey and on her 92nd birthday she went to an Abba Tribute Concert - where her name was read out as the oldest Abba Fan in attendance! Sadly Gladys became bedbound five years ago and the time since has been a long goodbye for Gladys and for Anne and for all those who cared for her. The whole family are immensely grateful for the care Gladys received in her final years - from the carers but also from supportive friends and neighbours in Katchside. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

FRANCES JEAN WOODWARD who died aged 95 on 21st December 2016 was born in Berkhamsted on 25th May 1921. She was the second eldest in a family of five. As a young girl she moved, with her family, to a farm in Steventon and then later to a bungalow in Sutton Courtenay. She would often tell stories about the dances she went to at the old village hall in Old Wallingford Way and about dancing the 'Paddy Kline' although her daughters are not sure what that was. They have tried 'googling' it but to no avail - it must have been a Sutton Courtenay speciality! She met her husband to be, George, at one of those dances. He had a bet with Mervyn Hyatt about who should ask her to dance and George won - or, as he often used to joke about it later - 'I got lumbered with her!' They corresponded with each other whilst George continued serving in the Navy and they were eventually married in this church on 1st March 1947. The majority of their married life was spent in Frilsham Street, where they brought up their three girls – Jane, Sarah and Georgia - before retiring to live in Katchside. She became the backbone of her family. Kind and caring, understanding and compassionate she was always there when her children needed her. She was generous and hardworking a good neighbour to many and always with a sense of fun and mischief and love of life. In her spare time she found painting immensely rewarding and produced some lovely pictures which had pride of place in her home. She was also talented at sewing, knitting and smocking and made clothes for her daughters. She volunteered for the St John's Ambulance Service, which she loved so much that she went onto work as an auxiliary nurse at the Radcliffe Infirmary and later on at the Marcham Road Hospital. She was quietly proud of her career and was always compassionate and caring to her patients. However, she always focused her life and energy on bringing up her family and was very proud to be 'Nanny' to Wayne, Laura, Daniel, Emma and Zara and, in due course, a great-Nanny. In later years George and Frances enjoyed leisure time on their boat on the Thames until they became unable to jump on and off! Sadly, George - who had been such a dedicated and devoted carer for Frances as she grew frailer - died in 2011 and the last three years of her life were spent at Leafield Care Home in Abingdon where she received exceptional care, delivered with dignity and compassion. Her memory continued to fade but on good days her amazing sense of humour was still as good as ever. She had a lifelong love of music and she loved to sing and dance. In Leafield she would sing along to music whenever she could and, when much else was forgotten, she could still recall lyrics from long ago and, even when bedbound she would still manage to dance with her arms in time with the music. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

FREDA KATE FANNY JONES who died, aged 92, on 2nd January 2017 was born on 23rd April 1925 in Appleton on 23

April 1925 to Frank and Maud Woodward. Along with her siblings, Marjorie, Nancy, George and Frank, who have all sadly predeceased her, they moved to 31 Harwell Road, Sutton Courtenay as children and with the exception of Nancy, they spent the majority of their life in Sutton Courtenay. During the Second World War Freda joined the Red Cross as a nursing auxiliary and was working at a convalescent home in Burcot when she met Ron, who was a patient. When he had sufficiently recovered from his injuries, Ron returned home to Teignmouth, Devon and Freda followed. They married on 20 May 1947, and returned to Sutton Courtenay to live at The Sheiling, a wooden bungalow along Ginge Brook. As the family grew they moved briefly to Dry Sandford before moving back to a new house in Barrett's Way in 1958 where they remained until moving into a bungalow in Milton in 2004. Both Freda and Ron were active members of the Sutton Courtenay community. Freda helped Ron with the Football Club (as tea lady), Friday night bingo, Christmas draw and weekly lottery raising funds for the Football Club. She was a member of the WI, the Evergreens, the Women's Christian Fellowship and on the Village Hall Committee. She loved going on the organised outings and holidays with her friends. Freda worked as a home help for many years and then as an escort on the transport taking children to Kingfisher and Teasdale schools in Abingdon, as well as caring for her mother and then her husband Ron during his ill health. She also worked for a while at the egg-packing station in Sutton Courtenay and she was also a volunteer at the League of Friends coffee shop at Abingdon Hospital. Besides being a loving Mum to Peter and Helen, she was affectionately known as 'the outlaw' by Simon; Grandma Freda to Sam and Kelly, Amy and Martin, Chloe and Scott; Great Grandma to Beth, Jessica, James, Aiden, Chase and Zara and a good friend to many. She was so proud of her grandchildren and great grandchildren; always keen to have new photos of them. They remember her as the maker of the best ever Roast Potatoes and Yorkshire Puddings. Freda suffered for many years with arthritis and increasing heart problems and after a fall at the end of August breaking her hip, she spent 12 weeks in hospital. She then moved to Winterbrook Nursing Home but her health deteriorated rapidly. The care and compassion she received there was excellent. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Unitary Government – time for Oxfordshire residents to decide.

It was confirmed by both sets of the expensively-commissioned experts that Oxfordshire's Local Government is badly in need of improvement and that Unitary Government in some form is the obvious way forward. The estimated savings from forming a single Unitary Council (replacing the present County and 5 District Councils) amount to more than £20m every year.

When the issue is explained to residents, almost all I have spoken to respond "Surely. It's a no-brainer. So why are we not getting on with it?"

There seem to me to be two types of argument that are raised against a single Oxfordshire Unitary solution. The first type all boil down to Councils and councillors desperately arguing for self preservation. The second group of objections is more worthy of an answer.

With large councils comes a reduction in democratic accountability. But how many of us know our District or County Councillor? How many of us even know what the different councils do? I certainly didn't before I got directly involved. At present there are 63 County Councillors. The experts reckon there would be 120 Unitary Councils in a one Oxfordshire Unitary Council. In other words, each councillor

would be responsible for half the number of people. Councils would no longer be able to pass the buck between each other. There would be *one council* responsible for all local services, *one council* to make the big necessary decisions and *one council* to blame if things go wrong. In my view, that would give local government *more* not less democratic accountability.

Every day we delay in going Unitary wastes public money — that is the money that you and I pay in our Council Tax. £20 million of savings every year is the equivalent 0f £60,000 every day — the equivalent of what it takes to fill many potholes and to support a Children's Centre or two of the bus services we are about to lose. Can we really afford to delay further? As someone who has spent the past four years facing the dreadful choices that austerity has offered, I have to ask - is the prevarication any longer morally justifiable?

However you feel on this issue, I very much hope that all residents of Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay, Drayton, Marcham and Shippon will join me on entering their views on the OCC website where a consultation is about to begin. It is about time that ratepayers rather than councils or councillors should be allowed their say.

OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

ONE new council for the whole of Oxfordshire?

Have your say.

Oxfordshire county council wants to know what you think about its draft proposal to abolish all six councils in Oxfordshire and replace them with a one new council for the whole county, called a 'unitary' council.

Why change?

Central government is changing the way councils are funded, and councils will soon have to pay for services mainly from council tax and business rates. Unless local government is reorganised, Oxfordshire councils will not be able to pay for vital public services for local communities and vulnerable people as the population increases and gets older.

The proposal

Oxfordshire currently has a two-tier local government — a county council plus five district and city councils. Oxfordshire County Council thinks that all of Oxfordshire's six councils should be abolished and replaced with one new unitary council which would save £20m each year — money that would pay for better services and keep council tax low. That money would be enough to fill over 300,000 potholes or provide 1 million hours of home care.

The new council would be simpler for residents and business, with one website and one point of contact.

One councillor would represent your community and be

accountable for all services. As members of an 'area board' serving the existing district or city areas, each councillor would take decisions affecting their community and also the county as a whole.

Environmental services such as street cleaning, countryside services and grounds maintenance would be properly joined up and managed locally to respond to community needs.

Bringing together social services, housing, leisure and welfare benefits would mean joined up support for people who need extra help, improving health and wellbeing. And joining up planning, housing, jobs and transport would mean Oxfordshire's housing shortage can be addressed, along with investment in vital infrastructure such as roads.

Without changing local government in Oxfordshire, further service cuts may be needed. The government is reducing funding and a unitary council is more financially sustainable in the long term.

Oxfordshire County Council believes a new council for the whole county makes most sense. Simpler. Better services. Lower cost. That's what 'One Oxfordshire' means.

ED VAIZEY MP

Welcome to 2017! As this is my first Parish News of the New Year, may I wish you Happy new Year and hope that you had a wonderful Christmas and got to spend time with your families and loved ones.

2017 has arrived with quite a full in-tray for me as your local MP. Issues such as the congestion on the A34, the continued campaign to re-open Grove station, my campaign to secure better fertility treatment for people in Oxfordshire, and the need to secure continued investment in science and technology post-Brexit will take centre stage. The early months of this year will see us take the formal step to begin leaving the European Union, an issue that will dominate the agenda in the House of Commons.

One of the issues I am most contacted about is local health services, and I share many of the concerns my constituents have raised about the ongoing review, known as the Sustainability and Transformation Plan. I am very unhappy with how the process is being undertaken, and the constant delays to publishing anything meaningful is having a severe impact on local services. Prior to Christmas two GP practices failed in a bid to secure funding to expand their premises to cater from growing populations.

This situation is becoming very urgent, and I will be meeting local NHS chiefs early in the New Year to try and get from them a clear timeline for the STP, so that we can all have a say in how our health services are developed. I am also seeking meetings with health ministers to discuss the failed capital bids for GP surgeries so I can understand why they were turned down so we can have greater success in the future.

In January I will be also co-hosting a debate in Parliament on the provision of IVF treatment. This is an area that I have campaigned on for some time, and I am frequently contacted by constituents who are having difficulty funding fertility treatment. I fear that this area is seen as a treatment that local health services can easily cut and reduce. I will be making Ministers aware of my concerns, and hope they take some action to further protect this important service.

January also saw my first public meeting on Brexit, held at the Beacon in Wantage at 18:30 on Friday 20th January. I will be holding a second meeting from 19:00 on Friday 3rd February at Didcot Civic Hall. I am looking forward to meeting many of you at these events and hearing your views on Brexit.

Progress/update on major planning applications

Just before Christmas, a small group of villagers met with the Leader of the Vale, Matthew Barber and Emily Hamerton, Development Manager. This meeting arose from the village march. We had a frank and open discussion and, as a result, a "Sutton Courtenay Forum" was established. On 20th January, we held the first meeting of the Forum with the Vale.

The impact of the Local Plan, Didcot Garden Town, Purpose and Objectives of the Forum and an update on the major planning applications affecting the village, were discussed at length. Sutton Courtenay is the only village in the Vale to have established such an original initiative. It is encouraging that we have progressed this far and we hope that through the Forum we can begin to address some of the development challenges affecting the village.

After the meeting, Cllr Matthew Barber commented on the Forum: "I recognise the genuine concerns within Sutton Courtenay of the cumulative impact of development over a long period of time and from today's meeting it is already clear that we can work closely to resolve many of them. I would never suggest we can find a solution for every issue but I have no doubt that the transparent and open dialogue we have now established will be a great benefit to the local community."

He also commented on the Local Plan: "The adoption of the Vale of White Horse Local Plan provides greater certainty for villages such as Sutton Courtenay over future development by giving the Council more powers to refuse planning applications outside of the local plan."

The next meeting will be attended by a senior officer from the County Highways team. At the meeting we will plan actions. A one-to-one meeting between the Forum and Didcot Garden Town will also be scheduled.

Major Planning Applications East Sutton Courtenay P15/V2352/O

There is a holding objection on drainage and the developer has been asked to provide more information. The village has hired an independent expert who has been directly involved in discussions with the Vale. When the developer responds the additional information will go through a further consultation period. This site is included as a Strategic site in the Local Plan.

East of Harwell Road P16/V0646/O

This development is outside of the Local Plan and so has the potential to be refused by the Vale. The Vale has already refused the application for 15 houses on the old Catholic Church site which overlaps with this application P16/V2306/O. Unfortunately, the village is well aware that refused applications can be won on appeal.

South Appleford Road P16/V2693/FUL

An application for an additional 28 houses has been lodged. OCC have objected subject to further transport assessment. There are also ongoing discussions about the condition to add traffic lights on the bridge junction.

Sutton Courtenay is unique in facing the cumulative impact of a wide range of industrial and housing developments on a woefully inadequate sewerage and highways infrastructure and traffic gridlocked by the narrow bridge over the River Thames. To its east are gravel pits and aggregate plants, an extensive landfill site with a large Material Recovery Facility and a composting site which regularly emits noxious odours. To its south there is to be a giant warehouse, which with the considerable extension of Milton Park, albeit under the welcome Science Vale initiative, will put even greater pressure on the inadequate infrastructure.

In addition, at the last count there is - approved or in the pipeline - a grand total of 1168 new dwellings, doubling the size of the village despite the above pressures. Moreover, one of the proposed development is adjacent to uncapped and unlined landfill cells, with potentially toxic contents, methane gas in evidence, with high ground water levels in an area which floods regularly, severe odour problems and with dangerously inadequate access.

Faced with these cumulative impacts Sutton Courtenay requests that it is considered as special case in planning decisions, and that:

ENVIRONMENTAL AND CUMULATIVE IMPACT ASSESSMENTS ARE CARRIED OUT ON ALL CURRENT AND FUTURE SC APPLICATIONS, to ensure cumulative impact considerations are fully addressed by officers and the planning committee.

THE VALE FULLY ADDRESSES INDEPENDENT EXPERT ADVICE AND RECOMMENDATIONS, especially where such advice conflicts with that of statutory consultees and/or the advice given by developer appointed experts.

THE REDROW/HOBBYHORSE LANE APPLICATION IS DEFERRED, until all issues raised by residents and their independent experts have been satisfactorily resolved, the EA and OCC have responded in full and that a review is completed of the risk assessment undertaken in deciding that this was to be a Strategic Site, despite the above risks.

PRIORITY IS GIVEN TO SCIENCE VALE UK APPLICATIONS, over warehousing and applications involving large numbers of low wage jobs.

MORE NEW HOMES BONUS IS DIRECTED TO SUTTON COURTENAY AND ITS INFRASTRUCTURE, to compensate for all that has been and will be earned by VWHDC from SC applications

CIRCLE DANCING AT THE ABBEY

Join us at the Abbey for Circle Dancing to beautiful music from around the world. We dance in the Great Hall of the Abbey, a unique Grade 1 listed medieval building, set in four acres of beautiful grounds in the heart of Sutton Courtenay.

We'd like to extend a warm welcome to newcomers, and so are offering a FREE taster session on Monday, 27th February from 7.30 - 9.00 pm. All we would ask is for a small donation to contribute towards the cost of heating.

What is Circle Dancing?

The circle is an ancient, universal symbol of wholeness and unity, and Circle Dancing has its roots in the community dance of many cultures. Each person joins the circle as an individual but, through the dance, becomes connected with other participants and the still centre around which the circle moves. The important thing is participation.

As well as traditional dances, whose origins are lost in the mists of time, new dances are being created and new music written for them. The repertoire is constantly increasing, so a typical circle dance session might include dances from Greece, Israel, Russia, France, as well as recently choreographed ones. Their varied origins deepen an awareness of our shared world, and some people refer to this type of dance as 'World Dance'.

The patterns of the dances reflect the cycles and rhythms we all experience in life. Some are solemn, some exciting, some lighthearted; some are very lively, some complex and some simple; some can lead us into stillness and reflection.

The modern circle dance movement arose out of the work of Bernard Wosein, a German ballet master and choreographer, who was also drawn to Slavonic culture and folk dance. He travelled widely in the Balkan region, where the old 'round dances' were still kept alive. He was struck by the sacred quality and symbolism that their ancient steps and rhythms expressed. Learning them and sharing them with others also inspired him to develop his own choroeographies in the spirit of the traditional dances. Bernard Wosein then introduced Circle Dance to the UK at Findhorn in 1976. Since then many groups with regular meetings have developed here and around the world.

The aim of circle dancing is to create a sense of well-being, wholeness and community. Indeed, recent research from Oxford University has shown that such dancing benefits health, boosts the body's 'feel good' endorphins, and increases feelings of social connectedness. So it's official: dancing together is good for you!

No partner is needed - just bring yourself and a comfortable pair of shoes. Absolute beginners are welcome too, because the dances are simple, and are taught and walked through first.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP—NAG5

With shorter days and colder weather it's a good time for a few safety and security reminders.

Pedestrians

- Use pavements, or paths, whenever possible.
- If there is no pavement keep to the right-hand side of the road so that you can see oncoming traffic, keep close to the side of the road and walk in single file
- In poor daylight conditions help road users to see you by wearing or carrying something light-coloured, bright or fluorescent.
- When it's dark use reflective materials (armbands, jackets, waistcoats, sashes, footwear). Drivers using headlights can see reflective materials three times further away than those that are non-reflective.
- Never try to cross the road in front or behind of a vehicle with its engine running.

Cyclists

- At night white front and red rear lights must be lit.
 Flashing lights are permitted but it is recommended that cyclists who are riding in areas without street lighting use a steady front lamp. Bicycles must be fitted with a red rear reflector. Lights and reflectors should be kept clean and in good working order.
- Brakes must work efficiently, gears should be working correctly and the chain properly adjusted and oiled.
- Tyres should be in good condition and inflated to the pressure indicated on the tyre.
- All traffic signs and traffic light signals must be obeyed.
 You must not cross the stop line when the traffic lights
 are red. Some junctions have an advanced stop line to
 enable you to wait and position yourself ahead of the
 traffic.
- You must not cycle on a pavement (if you are concerned for your safety, or that of young children, you can dismount and push your bicycle on the pavement until you feel it is safe to re-join the road).
- For your own safety please wear a helmet and light coloured or fluorescent clothing in daylight and reflective clothing at night to help to ensure that other

road users see you.

Vehicle drivers

- Keep your windscreen and other windows clear of dirt and remove any snow from front and rear lights, windscreen, windows and roof using de-icer and a scraper as necessary.
- Ensure the windscreen wipers are in working order and keep the screen wash reservoir topped up.
- Ensure front and rear lights are in full working order and free from dirt. Use headlights in seriously reduced visibility.
- Keep number plates clean and visible.
- Tyres should have a minimum 2mm of tread and preferably 3mm or above.
- Avoid the water pump freezing by using antifreeze.
- Car batteries rarely last longer than five years. Consider replacement if it's nearing the end of its life - lights, heating and wipers place a high demand on batteries during winter months.
- Remember that stopping distances are **10 times longer** in ice and snow.
- Carry an emergency kit in the car: tow rope, shovel, hazard-warning triangle, a fully charged mobile phone, de-icing equipment, a working torch, warm clothing, wellington boots, blanket and emergency rations including a hot drink in a flask.
