# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### All Saints Church – River Room

At the last Parish Council meeting, the church gave a presentation about declining churches and how the creation of new facilities at the church in Sutton Courtenay would enable it to be equipped for a variety of community uses thereby ensuring future survival of the church as a building. It was very interesting to hear a different aspect. The Council understands that there is a shortfall still to be raised to enable the project to go ahead. The Council has supported the project in a small way, bearing in mind that its resources are small and that there is the village hall which needs maintenance.

#### <u>Footpath 27 Closed Frilsham Street to Old Wallingford</u> <u>Way</u>

A temporary closure of the footpath, which runs from Old Wallingford Way next to the Cemetery along the rear of Lady Place houses, to Frilsham Street will take effect between 10<sup>th</sup> December, 2018 to 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2019. This is to allow the removal of the pipe by Magnox, which was referred to in last month's issue of The News.

#### Bradstocks Way – Gas works

Direct Mole, on behalf of SGN are carrying out gas pipe replacement works in Bradstocks Way. This is relining existing pipes, so there will be holes dug at intervals in order to push through a new pipe within existing pipes. There will be the need for traffic lights when they are working in the vicinity of the junction with Harwell Road, but mostly, the works are in the verges or gardens of properties. SGN is talking to those affected by their works, such as the primary school. The works are likely to take several weeks and will be ongoing into the new year.

#### <u>Village Green – Poppy Display</u>

The Council's thanks go to Georgia Broome, Poppy Appeal organiser for the Royal British Legion who organised the poppy event on the village green leading up to the Anniversary of the Armistice of WWI. A big thank you too to the many village organisations who made the poppies from mosaics, recycled plastic, ceramic, acrylic wool, felt etc. It was a magnificent representation of the different local skills, bringing all sections of the community together at a time when we joined with the Royal British Legion who led the nation in saying Thank you the First World War generation who serviced, sacrificed and changed our world.

#### <u> Thames Water – Water Resources Management Plan</u>

Thames Water, in the latest consultation document has brought forward the date of needing a reservoir on land west of Steventon and Drayton. This they say is partly on the basis of overwhelming support for the scheme. The Parish Council has objected as the water stored would be sold on to other companies and not used for local need. They have not given sufficient economic, or environmental justification for the reservoir, and the overall case for the reservoir has not been made.



#### Appeal for village photographs

<u>The following planning applications have been</u> <u>considered :</u>

**P18/V2474/D** Proposed demolition of existing discharge pipeline on land between Frilsham Street and Old Wallingford Way for: Magnox Ltd. Council wished to see an arboricultural report and restoration plan.

**P18/V2531/LDP** Creation of outbuilding for uses incidental to the enjoyment of the dwellinghouse and single storey rear extension at East Wilden, Brook Street. The Council had no comment to make.

**P18/S3067/FUL** Redevelopment of Waggon and Horses public house at Culham, with extension to dining room, erection of 12 bedroom motel and 8 dwelling houses. The Council objected owing to additional road traffic in an area already deemed by the County Council as being at peak capacity.

**P18/V2539/FUL** Demolish 2 semi-detached cottages, garages and outbuildings and construct  $2 \times 4$  bed dwellings and garages at 3 and 4 Mill Lane. The Council had no objection in

principle, but had concerns regarding the possible impact of flooding.

**P18/V2617 FUL** Variation of Planning Applications P16/ V1257/FUL and P17/V0371/FUL to rectify garage design and position on site due to conflicting application details. The Plough, 51 High Street. Council had no objections.

#### Academy Conversion News

We have had some good news regarding our academy conversion. Our application has been accepted and we have a conversion date for 1<sup>st</sup> April 2019, after which we will become part of

Ridgeway Education Trust rather than being accountable to Oxfordshire County Council.

Some of you may have seen in the media that there have been quite a few negative stories recently about academy chains. These usually concern larger trusts which often have had commercial interests. Ridgeway is a small, local trust with only three schools (Didcot Girls' School, St Birinus School, and the Didcot 6<sup>th</sup> Form) and we are in the exciting position of being their first primary. They have a very strong record of school improvement and have already had a big impact through the support they have given us prior to our official joining date. They are able to offer us a much better support package to improve the education we can offer than the local authority is able to do at this time. So we are all very pleased that the move seems to be proceeding smoothly!

#### **Choose Respect!**

Last week was Anti-Bullying Week. Every year, we hold a week to focus special assemblies and PSHCE lessons around this very important topic. We need all children to understand exactly what bullying is and how they can all work together to prevent it.

This year, the theme was respect, which fits very well with our focus on our three core values: *readiness, respect and responsibility.* 

We encouraged the children to see that *everyone* deserves respect, and that our differences make us interesting. We started the week on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> November by joining schools up and down the country in an **'Odd Socks Day'**, where children wore their craziest socks to school to show their understanding of how being 'odd' is nothing to be afraid of!

Our three new, fully trained Anti-Bulling Ambassador presented an assembly on Tuesday to explain their role and how they will help children report any worries.

Perhaps you've heard the story about a family who have a tradition on Christmas Eve where the Mum and children go to church, and Dad stays home to read the paper? Then, when the family return home from church, they gather to open their presents. Dad doesn't go with them as he no longer believes in the childhood stories of God coming as a baby in a manger. So as the family leave for church, he opens up the evening paper and begins to read by the fireplace.

Suddenly, he hears tapping on the window. It's a robin flying against the glass trying to get inside to the warmth. Dad has compassion for the robin and goes outside to try and bring her in. But as he approaches, she flies even harder against the window and then drops into the thorn bushes below, exhausted yet too afraid to be caught. Dave was an Uncle to an extended network of nephews and nieces plus their children and grandchildren. Most people knew him as Dave, but his family called him David or "Boy" and to others he was also known as Veno, Hagar or Uncle Buck and on one occasion called Earthquake by a small boy in Abingdon who thought he was a wrestler on TV and asked for his autograph, Dave duly obliged! Dave's family was one of the first to move onto the estate in Sutton Courtenay in 1957. This was just a few months after he was born, so essentially, he has spent his whole life living in Tyrrells Way, making him the longest living resident on the estate. He attended Sutton Courtenay Primary School before going to Fitzharry's Secondary School in Abingdon. A clay "figure" he made during Art lessons has held pride of place in his home ever since! Dave worked for six companies from the age of sixteen, starting out at Dorchester Refrigeration in Milton; and including Federal Express and Abingdon Carpets and more recently at Bookpoint where he worked from 1994 to 2011. He only changed jobs as a result of companies closing, moving from the area or "reorganising", until he became self-employed at the start of 2012, working as a warehouse transport training instructor. Apparently Dave held 10 driving licences for fork lift trucks and other vehicles used in distribution warehouses and light engineering works. But he never had any interest in getting a car driving licence, instead preferring to ride around on his distinctive push bikes. Despite the enforced change of jobs Dave was an upbeat person, with a slightly warped sense of humour who always made the most of each career opportunity and found something to laugh about most days of his life: even during his hospital visits to deal with various health problems that cropped up over the years. He was a friendly and approachable person who always seemed to be smiling and who loved to stop for a chat. He loved this village and this community and would never fail to help his neighbours if he could. Sadly he died in the JR on 28th September 2018 after a very short illness with cancer. He will be greatly missed by his family and wide circle of friends from the village and beyond.

This is an edited extract from the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the service of thanksgiving for Dave's life which was held in All Saints' Church on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> October 2018.

Allen Edward Bennett who died on 29<sup>th</sup> September 2018, was born on 30<sup>th</sup> October 1938 within earshot of Bow bells in London. His father was called up in 1939, and, despite the ever present danger in wartime London, his memories of early childhood were happy ones in the company of his Mother Iris, his Grandmother, sister Doreen, Aunt Edie and cousins - although conceding, as the only male child, he was rather

spoilt. His family had a lucky escape in January 1945 when a V2 rocket fell in an adjacent road killing and injuring 223 people, mostly children, and which also badly damaged their home. At the time, Allen and Doreen had been evacuated to Leicestershire. Returning to London he started school and a lifelong friendship with Alby Lethbridge. Allen and Alby progressed to Tottenham Grammar School, but he left aged 15 when his family moved across London. He got a job as a shipping clerk in the City, in Pudding Lane. He loved the job because there were "lots of girls in the office" and he got to ride around the city delivering documents and wages! Aged 17 he enlisted as a regular in the Army and trained in the Royal Army Ordnance Corps as an Ammunition Examiner (a bomb disposal expert). This however was not his first experience with explosives - aged 11 he and Alby were given the job of digging over the back garden. A hard day's labour in prospect the mischievous pair devised a more exciting plan. They rigged the garden with homemade explosives. The ensuing blast deposited all the top soil in next door's garden. They were deaf for days and Alby needed hospital attention but in no way did it dull their enthusiasm! Allen spent 27 years in the Army, serving in Malaya, Singapore, Germany, Cyprus and Northern Ireland; attaining the rank of Warrant Officer Class 1 aged only 33, and later awarded the honoured title 'Conductor'. His many stories from those years are worthy of a novel, ranging from high adventure - being lowered into a snake infested ammunition dump in Singapore Harbour, to the comical - defusing a bomb in a Norfolk ditch in his underpants.... and looking up to find a class of schoolgirls peering at him over a wall! In Allen's last year in the Army he was stationed at Didcot. It was 1977, and as the senior Warrant Officer he was asked to select a worthy recipient of the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal, he chose the longest serving Warrant Officer. Presentation day duly arrived, all the men turned out, filling the entrance hall and staircase...Allen positioned himself out of the way at the top of the stairs. The commanding officer read out the name of the recipient of The Queens Silver Jubilee Medal, WARRANT OFFICER 1 ALLEN BENNETT! Allen was stunned at this subterfuge! He walked down the stairs to tumultuous applause and much laughter at his complete astonishment! His forthright character, strongly held views and unfailing integrity had not always endeared him to army superiors, but his courage, his extraordinary positivity and sense of humour was appreciated by all who knew him, then, and throughout his nearly 80 years of life. Retiring from the army in 1978 aged 40, there was a brief spell working as a Planning Inspector at The Vale of the White Horse, before embarking on a new career in financial services - first at 'Save & Prosper', then joining Malcolm Sydenham at County Insurance Services in Kidlington - eventually retiring again in 2004! Alongside work, during the 1980's and 90's, Allen trained and practiced as a counsellor for The Samaritans and Marriage Guidance-Relate. Allen would say that the most important event in his life was meeting Barbara, at her cousin Beryl's birthday party in 1960. Having just returned from Singapore and about to leave for Germany, they managed just ..... Continued one date

'Fings Ain't What They Used To Be' at The Garrick Theatre, when he asked her to be his 'pen-pal'! They exchanged hundreds of letters but met only 24 times before becoming engaged in 1962. They married in February 1963 and celebrated their 55<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary this year. In 1964 and 1966 Allen and Barbara were joined by daughter Lisa and son Robert . The Bennett household moved frequently before making their home in Sutton Courtenay 1977. Allen filled his life with activities and interests. As a younger man playing rugby and cricket in the army later, he thoroughly enjoyed watching matches on TV, completely immersed in the action! For 50 years he's grown runner beans and dahlias, and every year on holiday in Provence he made wonderful apricot jam with apricots 'scrumped' from the hedgerows. Allen loved the Provençal wines and food, he and Barbara visited France four times a year - but he vehemently denied being a Francophile! He was always busy with DIY projects, he had made wonderful wooden toys for his children and grandchildren and lately made extraordinarily detailed and beautiful model boats. He loved Jazz and Opera and going to concerts and simple pleasures like doing the Daily Telegraph crossword, reading spy novels, and walking 4 miles a day with his much loved golden retriever Alfie (and his predecessors Figgy and Teddy). It won't surprise any of you to learn that Allen left all his affairs neatly filed with lots of notes. One set of notes concerned his funeral. He wanted you all to know he was the happiest of men, with a full life, wonderful wife, children to be proud of, and his three Grandchildren, Ruby, Laurel and Cassian, the icing on the cake. Small in stature, but never lacking in self-belief, Allen was very much his own man.

This is an edited extract of the tribute given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick, on behalf of the family, at his funeral on  $22^{nd}$  October 2018 in All Saints' Church.

### MILLENNIUM COMMON

For those of you who are new to the Village and who are not aware of the existence of the Millennium Common I would like to draw your attention to this wonderful, natural community facility. It is an area of land in the northeast quarter of the Village, immediately to the south of the old Amey site in Appleford Road – the site now being developed by Persimmon Homes. It was formally handed over to Sutton Courtenay and Appleford villages by WRG (now FCC Environment Ltd) in December 2001, having been set up originally in December 1996 for an 80-year period under the provisions of a Section 106 Undertaking involving both WRG and Hansons and with a grant from the latter.

The site is controlled by a Management Committee that meets twice a year (February and July) but which is administered through Oxfordshire County Council. The overall management objectives for The Common are:-

 To manage it as a nature reserve with a diverse range of habitat types to support a wide range of plant and animal species; and

### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR**

#### Neigbbouhood Planning

Neighbourhood Plans (NP) are the province of District Councils. However, County Councils become heavily involved over roads, schools and other infrastructure. I have been asked to write an article on NP to clarify the pros and cons, so the Expressway will have to wait until next month. I was heavily involved as a District Councillor in Drayton's NP from the outset and watched its progress, its achievements and its mistakes (as the first such plan in the Vale there were plenty of those).

More than 5 years ago, Drayton residents attended a public meeting and saw maps of Drayton between 1720 and 2010 as evidence of inexorable growth. "Can we/should we stop such growth?" they were asked. Most thought we could not and should not and, after some persuasion, accepted that Neigbourhood Plans were not about stopping growth. So what is the point of them? For many years, where houses were built was wholly the concern of distant planning "experts" with an overarching strategic view, who had little understanding or knowledge of any one village or town. Local people were not trusted to be part of the decision making process as "they never want more houses". NPs were an attempt to build local knowledge of how a community functions into the decisionmaking process. This, it was hoped would take some of the acrimony out of the planning process. The Drayton NP strapline was "Our chance to plan our future". So what has it achieved?

By sitting down with VWHDC and OCC Planners, with landowners, developers and residents, everyone began to see that there were some potential gains for all. The planning system would run more smoothly – less anger and frustration and, if done properly, it could result in better connected communities with decent infrastructure, and decent housing.

Drayton would get decent sports facilities, an improved village hall, a purpose built pre-school, and road improvements. Drayton would change from a village that everyone drove through (and no-one noticed) into a place that people wanted to live and feel part of one community.  $\pounds 2m+$  of infrastructure was negotiated with landowners and developers. The appearance of the new houses would complement the old. And looking forward, the Drayton NP would run until 2031 with opportunities for new speculative development being drastically reduced because local people would have already decided where development should take place.

Of course, it has not all run smoothly. It took some time to convince Drayton residents that for the first time they had some power. Even now, there is some resistance from the authorities to being asked to give up some of *their* power and make room for local knowledge. In the current nationwide building frenzy, there is no doubt that some developer/ builders have ignored planning conditions and been remarkably disinterested in the feelings of new residents. Some houses have been poorly built. A few last-minute, very cheeky but small additional housing developments have been allowed. (mistakenly in my view). However, the overwhelming aims and aspirations of the Drayton NP have been, or are being achieved.

And what does the Drayton experience have to do with Sutton Courtenay and Marcham?

Sutton Courtenay: The OCC decision to object to any development, at least or until a new bridge over the Thames has been constructed, gives us a breathing space of at least six years (a luxury not given to Drayton)— plenty of time to produce a well worked out NP — work which is well under way. The village faces many additional issues to those faced by Drayton -an expanding MEPC, Didcot B. the Didcot Garden Town project, the landfill site, potential quarrying and so on. It is going to take much work from many local people, but the prize will be a better-connected village planned with the help of Sutton Courtenay rather than in defiance of them.

And the alternative? No NP and back to the speculative development that the village has had to cope with over recent years with all its frustration, anger and unhappiness. I would urge all residents of Sutton Courtenay to get behind its developing Neighbourhood Plan, criticize and modify it if necessary, but help it to achieve as much and more than the Drayton NP has achieved and make maximum use of the breathing space that the OCC decision has created.

Marcham has naturally been pre-occupied in recent years with the Anson Field project, the new Village Hall and Sports facilities, but meanwhile it has been subject to endless speculative development over recent years. I have no doubt the village itself could have planned things better had it had a say via a Neighbourhood Plan. Marcham's problem is that it is surrounded by developable land in all directions. For the life of the emerging Local Plan (up to 2031), the likely development has now been determined. However, I have no doubt that after 2031, Marcham will once again be under great pressure to grow. A Neighbourhood Pan will not stop the growth, but it will give residents the opportunity to have a say in how it develops at the same time as capturing a maximum amount of infrastructure money in the process.

# ED VAIZEY MP



Some good news over the summer for the broadband roll out in our area. The government have announced an extra £45 million investment in rural broadband. The new funding for the government's Rural Broadband Infrastructure Scheme adds to the £30

million investment announced last year, increasing the total pot of funding available to £75 million. In other broadband news, East Hagbourne have clubbed together to obtain ultrafast broadband for the village. More information in doing this in your area can be found at communityfibre.openreach.co.uk.

Oxfordshire hospitals are being given a major funding boost to to improve care ahead of winter. The Oxfordshire NHS Trust has been allocated an extra  $\pounds 3.21$  million to improve diagnostics and patient flow. This is part of  $\pounds 145$  million of capital investment in the NHS from the Department of Health.

Two projects in Didcot have just been awarded a combined  $\pounds 19,331$  from the National Lottery. Didcot TRAIN, where I am a patron, has been awarded  $\pounds 9,531$ . TRAIN works with young people in the area to fulfil their potential and overcome barriers that may limit their social integration. The second, SOFEA, has been awarded  $\pounds 9,800$ . It works with young people and their families to overcome a variety of issues and build confidence and skills.

Kellogg's are running the Schools Breakfast Club Awards to celebrate best practice in breakfast club provision and recognise the role played by the schools, teachers, parents and children in helping them run. If your school runs a breakfast club, they can enter at *kelloggsbreakfastclubawards.co.uk*.

I was very pleased this month to visit a number of excellent organisations in the constituency. Skoob Books in Didcot have an enormous second hand book collection, and supply film sets with books for background shots. Milton House Hotel has come under new ownership and are planning a range of improvements. I was also pleased to meet with the Changing Places team, who are campaigning for fully accessible disabled toilets, and Bpas in Oxford who provide specialised reproductive health services to the area.

#### MAGNOX REMOVAL OF HARWELL PIPELINE

Following the presentation by Magnox Ltd at the Parish Council meeting on the 2nd October, it was requested that an article should be submitted to this newsletter regarding the work being performed by Magnox, so people unable to attend the meeting know what work is planned in the village.

The two pipelines from the Atomic Energy Research Establishment, (AERE), at Harwell to the River Thames were constructed through the village in the late 1940's. These pipelines carried fresh water to a waterworks on All Saints Lane before pumping it to the Harwell site, and also discharged treated water effluent from Harwell into the Thames via a weir at the rear of Mill House. The discharges were under a licence from the Environment Agency.

The water discharges from the Harwell site finished in March 2013 and to date 4.75km of the pipeline has been excavated and removed, (from the Harwell site to a point south of Sutton Courtenay village, including Milton Park and the railway which has allowed the re-opening of the Backhill Lane Underpass).

The next and final phase of work is to remove the pipelines from the village. The intention is to start this work in early December for completion around June 2019. The pipelines follow a number of footpath, road and bridleway routes from Frilsham Street and Footpath 27 via Old Wallingford Road and Footpath 7, and All Saints Lane, to Appleford Road. The work will require the temporary closure of these routes, to allow the work to be undertaken safely, as it proceeds through the village. A number of properties fronting onto these routes will be directly affected by our works and we have written to those households separately to explain the effects on them for access and possible alternative routes.

Starting in December 2018; the current plan is to remove the pipes from these areas during these dates:

Frilsham Street to Old Wallingford Way, December 2018 to February 2019 Old Wallingford Way to Churchmere Road, March 2019 to April 2019 All Saints Lane, May 2019 to June 2019

A small team of 6 workers and two excavators will expose two lengths of pipe at a time, approximately 6 to 12 metres. This rolling process will slowly work its way through the village over a period of a few months. All excavations will be backfilled and the work area made safe at the end of each day; there should be no more than 1 or 2 lorry movements per day.

# UPDATE ON SUTTON COURTENAY NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN



#### **Community Consultation**

Community Consultation is not only a statutory requirement but also, and we believe, the keystone to an inclusive Neighbourhood Plan. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped to deliver and collect the questionnaires for the village survey. Following the completion of the data collation and feedback, the Steering Group is proposing to hold two community consultation events in mid to late February 2019.

- A workshop facilitated by an independent group Oxfordshire Community First. It is an open event for everyone in the community. Date will be published widely and in the February Village News. It is an opportunity to contribute further as well as for those who, for whatever reason, were not able to complete a questionnaire.
- A Pizza Night for young people to contribute in focussed group sessions.

#### **Evidence Base**

*What is this?* Evidence is extremely important as it ensures that the choices made in our neighbourhood plan are backed by facts. The Independent examiners may recommend that a

policy is deleted or modified if it is not underpinned with appropriate evidence.

For example, if affordable housing is identified as a priority for the community, this will require policies on type and tenure, design / layout. These policies will need to be underpinned with data on current population, trends and projections, current housing stock (type and tenure), housing need (objectively assessed) in the area, housing prices (purchase and rent) and affordability, existing housing and development policies and strategies.

Policies to fulfil the aspirations expressed in a Neighbourhood Plan on heritage, green spaces, footpaths and other amenities will similarly require gathering of data and facts on the status and justification provided for the changed need.

Some data sources are available, and the District Council has a duty to support us in gathering data. Please do get in touch if you can spare some time to gather data and carry out local studies where data is not available. To minimise the risk of providing a weak evidence base and to ensure timely making of the Neighbourhood Plan, the Steering Group is proposing to use expert input to produce the following assessments:

- Green Space Assessment
- Landscape Character Assessment
- Village Character/Heritage Assessment
- Housing Needs Assessment

#### Funding

The Parish Council has been awarded a grant of  $\pounds 10,000$  to offset some of the costs. Once the technical specification for the assessments are better defined, further grant applications will be made.

#### **Extortion scams**

Cyber criminals are attempting to blackmail unsuspecting victims by claiming to have used the victim's password to install spying malware on the victim's computer. The criminals claim that they've recorded videos of the victim watching adult material by activating their webcam when they visit these websites. What makes this scam so convincing is that the email usually includes a genuine password that the victim has used for one of their online accounts. It is believed criminals obtain the passwords from data breaches.

If you receive one of these emails:

- Don't reply to it or feel pressured into paying.
- Trying flagging the email as spam or junk if you receive it multiple times.
- Perform a password reset as soon as possible for any accounts where you've used the password given in the email.
- Always use a strong, separate password for important accounts, such as your email account.
- Where available enable two-factor authentication (2FA).
- Install or enable anti-virus software on laptops and computers and keep it updated.
- Always install the latest software and update apps.
- Report the email to Action Fraud as a phishing attempt at *https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/reportphishing* or call 0300 123 2040.
- If you've paid the ransom in response to one of these emails please contact the police (see contact details below).

#### Data breaches

If you have been, or think you may have been, affected by any of the recent data breaches please consider the following.

- If your password was compromised you should change it. If you've used the same password for other accounts ensure that you change those passwords too.
- There's a possibility that you may receive very convincing e-mails, texts and calls as the result of a data breach. Be suspicious about unsolicited requests for your financial or personal details.
- If your financial data was compromised be on the lookout for any suspicious activity in your bank accounts. If you notice any unauthorised transactions contact your bank or card company.
- If you think you've been the victim of fraud report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or use their online reporting tool at https:// www.actionfraud.police.uk/reporting-fraud-andcyber-crime.

#### Advice for dog owners

Following an increase in reports about dog attacks Thames Valley Police would like to remind dog owners that it is their responsibility to ensure that their dog is under control at all times, and to consider the following.

- Consider keeping your dog on a lead in public places.
- Ensure your dog is comfortable off a lead and will return when you call.

- Use a muzzle if you're concerned about your dog's behaviour in public places.
- Keep your dog on a lead when near livestock.
- Seek advice from your local veterinary surgery if you have any concerns.

Your dog must be wearing a collar with an identity tag bearing the owner's name and address. A telephone number alone is not enough.

#### Reporting non-urgent crime and incidents

A reminder that you can now report non-urgent crime and incidents online, using the Thames Valley Police website. This system allows the report to be logged immediately and you will be contacted by a police officer within 24 hours.

- Visit the Thames Valley Police website at https:// www.thamesvalley.police.uk/ then click on the 'Report' button, select the type of crime or incident and the site will guide you through the process.
- If you don't have online access you should call 101 for non-emergencies.
- Always call 999 for emergencies.
