Appleford Road planning appeal

We mentioned last month that we awaited the outcome of this appeal on the application for 93 houses on Appleford Road. We have now

been informed that this appeal was rejected on various grounds, and the application will not be progressed. The Parish Council employed a professional consultant to make a statement on its behalf regarding the impact of the development on the village and a number of residents also participated.

Being part of something bigger

November is a busy month for reaching out beyond the school. This year we have had to rethink the way we approach this due to the national lockdown. However, somehow it seems more important than

ever to help children be aware of common stories that link people outside of the beyond environment. Last week, we reflected on the stories behind Bonfire Night and Diwali, and shared how people across the world enjoy festivals related to light and darkness. This week, we have shared the stories behind Remembrance Sunday, and on a more contemporary note, the stories around the work that the Children In Need charity does and how it all started. All these things help to remind us that the things that make us human link us together, and never has it been more important to remember this than during a global pandemic!

Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day felt very The week special this year. before we had recorded some of the older children reading prayers which were included in the virtual service broadcast via YouTube. Early in the morning



of Wednesday 11th, I took a group of children down to the memorial. We were met by Reverend Helen who led us in prayers while we placed our wreath. I filmed this, and then all classes were able to show this just before eleven o'clock. After watching the video, all classes held a two minutes silence followed by a recording of The Last Post. I had the huge privilege of being able to 'walk the school' during the silence. It was deeply impressive to see such young children showing so much discipline and respect. There was not a sound and then as the trumpet echoed through the corridors it was extremely moving.

Children In Need Day!

Children were invited to come to school with spots! Some chose face paint and others went for a whole outfit. We also held a bucket collection at the beginning and end of school. At half past nine in the morning a group of three brave Falcons were interviewed on BBC

so proud of the way they confidently spoke about what we have been doing and why they felt it was important to remember the stories behind Children In Need and the good work it does as a charity.

We need a new fence!

We have heard this week that our application to the national Condition Improvement Fund (CIF) to upgrade our perimeter fence has been turned down again at the appeal stage. To improve our perimeter fence to a suitable standard (it's a long way round and it needs to be very robust) will cost around £70-80,000. Obviously we cannot do this out of the normal school budget so we have to apply for the grant. It has come as a surprise to everyone involved that we were turned down as this is so obviously a safety and safeguarding issue. The children and I have therefore decided to take this further. They will be writing letters and we have invited the BBC to come and report on the matter. Watch this space!

Scam warnings

Action Fraud has warned about fake PayPal accounts, where criminals trick online sellers into believing that payment for their items has been received and they're safe to send the items to the (criminal) purchaser. There are a myriad of scams purporting to be from GOV.UK and other government agencies. Be very cautious, as these emails look completely genuine. Check the sender's email address, that the grammar and spelling are correct, as these can be give-aways. If you receive a suspicious email forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk

Could you, or someone you know, be eligible for a free gas connection and central heating?

Heating a home with electricity is three times more expensive than with a gas central heating system, forcing many people to make the difficult choice between heating or eating to survive. SGN's Help to Heat scheme can support people struggling to make ends meet, by providing funding to connect some households to the gas network for free. In some cases they can also fully, or partially, fund a gas central heating system. You, or someone you know, would qualify if you/they receive certain income-related benefits.

- If your household income, after rent or mortgage costs, is considered low, and the expected cost to adequately heat your home is high.
- If you are eligible under your local authority's unique criteria, known as its 'statement of intent'. This will include income and may also include health conditions and/or your home's energy efficiency rating.

COVID, Lockdown, and Vaccines.

With the news that a vaccine or vaccines may be closer than we thought, it is very tempting for us all to take our foot off the caution pedal, but there remain many immediate threats which have to be addressed before we can indulge in mass celebrations. Our own Oxfordshire data suggests that the problem has moved away from the behaviour of the young to the behaviour of older people. It is the tendency of them (or perhaps I should say "us") to want to get together with friends and family in our houses and gardens that seems to be the source of local spread of COVID-19. The second national lockdown gives us a window to get the figures under control. There are signs that the rate of increase is slowing, but we need it to flatten (or get the "r" number below 1). All of us our feeling anxious to see friends and family but if we are to get together at Christmas and/or as soon as possible in the new year, the health message is clear. We owe it to friends, family and each other to accept it.

Information overload?

In the meantime, the local community COVID groups continue to perform a vital function in looking after people of all ages, ensuring everyone is fed, has access to medicines and advice on where to go for specialist help. Given the hundreds of contact names and numbers and the detailed pages of instructions and guidelines from government and Councils, it would be easy to get lost in the plethora of well-meaning advice.

The simple message is that the local Community Group are the ones who can point us at any advice or help that may be needed.

Roadworks and congestion

One of the predictable outcomes of the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan was that the ambitions to improve road safety in the village would wind up with a period of traffic bedlam and hold-ups while improvements are carried out. Anyone driving through the village recently will have been held up outside the development in the village centre. It was unfortunate that it has taken three attempts for the developer to get it to the correct design in the right place. However, the work is now done and the result is a "table" that should act as a traffic calming device. Given the ambition to have at least two similar tables elsewhere on Drayton's roads in the next two years, we probably need a year to recover from the frustration that roadworks cause, before the next table is constructed!

One consequence of all the development in and around Drayton, Marcham, Milton and Sutton Courtenay is that services have to be upgraded – particularly water and sewage services – and this also involves temporary roadworks which can wreak havoc with local congestion and threaten local businesses already hardpressed by COVID.

Appleford Road Appeal – battle won but the war rages on.

Most of us involved with this Appeal were delighted with the decision of the planning inspector to dismiss the appeal. As a result, the immediate threat of another 90 houses on the edge of Sutton Courtenay has gone. Interestingly, the reasons for the decision centred much more on the siting of the proposed development and that the site was not in the VWHDC Local Plan than on the traffic argument. The decision comes as an enormous relief to the residents of Appleford Road. No one is certain of the implications for other applications or how the Vale planners and the County Highways officers will approach them. The Appleford Road battle is won, but the War of Cumulative Impact continues. Richard Webber Cllr OCC/VWHDC

I was pleased to hold my first adjournment debate, where a backbench MP can raise any issue and require a minister to respond, in the House of Commons recently. My subject was safety and littering on the A420 and the A34 and I laid out in detail the safety problems we know exist on both roads. In

the last 6 years there have been 1057 accidents on the total stretch of the A420 and 2593 on the A34; these are just the ones that involved injury to people – it doesn't include the accidents involving vehicle damage alone. I also wanted to raise litter issues as I regularly receive complaints about that, too. I will now sit down with the relevant minister to discuss how to improve both matters on both roads.

I took the opportunity to get in yet another plug for my bid for Grove Station, which the ministers at the Department are very used to be raising! I was pleased to hear there should be a decision soon about whether we will get money to explore how it could reopen. You can watch the debate on my Facebook page. In other transport news, the Government has just given the County another £3 million for cycle paths and footpaths.

Like I'm sure most of you, I did not want to be in another lockdown now. As some of you will know, the Oxfordshire Conservative MPs had not supported the request of Council Leaders for us to go into Tier 2 in October as we felt it was premature and would have a detrimental effect on mental health, other health conditions and on our local businesses. The cases in Oxfordshire remain much lower than in other parts of the country and I hoping this will be the final lockdown and we can re-emerge into Tier 1, rather than Tier 2, but as always it will be the analysis of the Chief Medical Officer and Joint Biosecurity Centre that is crucial here.

The thoughts of all of us are of course on whether we will get to see our families in the way we like to at Christmas. I know the Prime Minister and the rest of the Government are keen that we will get to and I am hopeful this will be the case. The Government has set a window for university students to return home in time and is currently exploring what can safely be allowed. I think this may be my last message before it, so Merry Christmas when it arrives.

From the Ministry Team...

Despite what you might have heard, Christmas has not been cancelled this year! Whether or not we are able to gather for worship, Christians in the DAMASCUS Parish and all over the world will celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, God with us. As I write we are in lockdown once again, although hopefully it will end as intended early in December. But the restrictions do make planning for Christmas quite difficult, for churches as much as for everyone else, and somethings (such as the Torchlight Procession in Sutton Courtenay) will not be possible this year. As I think about the next few weeks, the great Advent themes of darkness and light seem especially relevant. 2020 has felt particularly dark. Most of us have had moments of anxiety and uncertainty about the future. For some there has been fear and sorrow. Others have experienced illness and loss. All of us have endured unprecedented restrictions, limiting our physical contact with those we love and forcing us to keep our distance from each other. But despite all this, there have also been moments of light in the darkness. Many of us have been spending more time with our families. We have become more aware of what is really important to us. There has been great humour and forbearance. We have risen to the challenges that have confronted us. As a community, we have been looking out for those in particular need. We have been wearing masks, not for our own benefit, but to keep other people safe. The great Christmas Gospel tells us that 'the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1.5). We don't know the actual date on which Jesus was born. It is just possible that early Christians took over the pagan festival of Sol Invictus. But it is very appropriate that we celebrate Christmas in the middle of winter, when the weather is coldest and the nights are longest. By a cosmic coincidence, on the longest night of this year, 21 December, there will be a rare 'great conjunction' between Jupiter and Saturn. Viewed from Earth, the two planets will appear very close together: just a tenth of a degree apart. It will be their closest conjunction since 1623. The two heavenly lights will almost converge, becoming a single light shining with exceptional brightness. Many people think that the 'star' the Magi followed to Bethlehem might have been a planetary conjunction, or perhaps a comet. Abraham, the ancestor of God's chosen people, was promised descendants as numerous as the stars of heaven (Genesis 15.1-6). The familiar lights in the heavens became for him a sign of hope and trust in God. When you look up at the night sky on 21 December, the light from Jupiter will have taken about 50 minutes to reach you, and the light from Saturn about 85 minutes. The three stars of Orion's belt are over 1200 light years away. The Andromeda galaxy, the furthest object visible with the naked eye, is 2.5 million light years distant. Celestial distances are mind-boggling. Space is very dark. But the light of the stars still reaches us, bringing hope and joy to those who look up and see it. The light shines in the darkness. We may be socially distanced, but God, 'through whom all things came into being' (John 1.3) is with us. The American theologian and civil rights leader, Howard Thurman, wrote this poem about lights in the darkness: I will light Candles this Christmas, Candles of joy despite all the sadness, Candles of hope where despair keeps watch, Candles of courage for fears

ever present, Candles of peace for tempest-tossed days, Candles of grace to ease heavy burdens, Candles of love to inspire all my living, Candles that will burn all year long. When the song of the angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and princes are home, When the shepherds are back with their flock, The work of Christmas begins: To find the lost, To heal the broken, To feed the hungry, To release the prisoner, To rebuild the nations, To bring peace among others, To make music in the heart." Though the Christmas Trail this year in Sutton Courtenay we are hoping as many people as possible will display part or all of the Christmas Story in their garden or in their window. It might be something as simple as a Christmas Card with a Nativity Scene or it might be a full host of angels in the garden! The idea is to witness to God with us even in this difficult time - the light shining in the darkness. With love and prayers, Helen.

REST IN PEACE

Russell Graham Montague who died on 25th October 2020, aged 89, was born on 19th July 1931 in Croydon to Phyllis Anne and William Edward Ernest Montague. He was the first of three children. The family moved to Cambridge for a few months for greater safety during the war and then to Edinburgh to avoid the Doodlebugs. It was his stay in this beautiful city that ignited his lifelong love of Scotland. On leaving school he gained a place at the first Technical College in England and this was the launchpad to his scientific career. In 1949 he joined the RAF. After leaving he concentrated on educational improvement, studying at night school for a myriad of scientific qualifications. The lure of flying manifested itself in Russell joining a flying club and qualifying for his private pilot's licence. Flying all over the UK and Europe, many times in an open cockpit, brought thrills and spills which would have terrified his parents had they known of his escapades. Furthering his career as an experimental physicist Russell moved first to Harwell Laboratory and then to Culham and it was there, in 1966, that Wendy and Russell were introduced by her brother John. Three years later they married and moved into their home in Tullis Close where they have lived ever since. They went onto have two daughters, Sarah and Fiona, and four grandchildren - Laruen, Rachel, Olivia and Bobby – of whom he was greatly fond and proud. Russell was renowned for his impeccable appearance - always in a jacket and a tie. He would even work on his Jag dressed like that and rarely

damaged his pristine appearance. Russell continued to work on lightning protection and pulse power until he took early retirement in 1992. He then established his own company in high voltage electrical engineering and he loved the freedom that running his own business gave him. In 2005 Russell suffered a life-threatening heart infection but despite his severely weakened heart he exercised back to reasonable health. Being married to a gym teacher kept him on his toes! Until very recently he enjoyed the stimulus of a small amount of consultancy work at Cobham Lightning Systems. He continued to enjoy reading in depth around his subject and his bedtime reading was on quantum physics and mechanics. For many years he was active at both the local and constituency level in politics and was treasurer and Standard Bearer for the British Legion. History was another of his great interests and he had a droll sense of humour, a passion for silly songs and was a great story teller too. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends. The funeral was held in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay on 12th November 2020, conducted by the Reverend Helen Kendrick and attended by family and friends and a Scottish Piper who piped Russell in and out of the church. This is an edited extract of the tributes given at his funeral.

BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL AND REPORT

Alan Calver was the single highest collector in our area, having raised an amazing £806.79 from his drive! The Liberty poppy print masks raised £355 and the raffle raised £262, which alongside the Remembrance Sunday collection at All Saints church, brings the village to £1,657.29. Well done Sutton Courtenay! On behalf of the RBL, thank you so much.

Here's the article I sent to the Oxford Mail:

Alan Calver, 83, a long-time resident of Sutton Courtenay and

ex-para has raised £806.79 for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal from his drive! Alan, who has been a Poppy Appeal collector for 3 years, was determined not to let the restrictions stop him from supporting the Poppy Appeal this year.



He requested help from the village Poppy Appeal organiser Georgia Broome to set up a stand

on his drive, in line with restrictions. And over the two weekends before lockdown, in the rain, he inspired the village to come out and get their poppies. He is the single highest collector in the Abingdon area, raising £806.79.

Clare Oldfield, Poppy Appeal organiser for Abingdon said: "As an ex-para, Alan has well and truly lived up to the motto, proving he really is "Ready for Anything". I am incredibly proud



of him. It's clear he would have collected more than $\pounds 1,000$ if there hadn't been the lockdown meaning he had to lose a crucial weekend's collecting. My heartfelt thanks to him!"

In June, Alan raised £4,049 for NHS Charities Together by walking 21km in the village.

Louise O'Sullivan has joined the Committee as our Welfare Officer in place of Jenny Collier whom we are glad will remain on the Committee. If any former member of the armed forces requires help in any way the Legion is here to help wherever possible.

We hope to be able to enjoy a more normal year in 2021. Fundraising for the work of the Legion will continue and the Legion is grateful for the tremendous support that it receives from the village.
