PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



FCC – "Radcot Green" development

A presentation will be being given to the Parish Council in respect of this proposed development. The Parish Council will be holding a

further Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 13th October at 7pm to facilitate the same. Due to current restrictions this will be a virtual meeting. Should you wish to attend the same, please do contact the clerk on the below details and the login information will be provided closer to the time.

Land at Appleford Road Planning Appeal

The planning appeal in relation to the proposed building of 93 houses at Appleford Road is due to take place on 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th October 2020. The inquiry will take place virtually given the current restrictions in place. The Parish Council has engaged a Planning Consultant to prepare and present a statement on their behalf.

Anybody is able to observe the inquiry either via Microsoft Teams or by dialling in by telephone (this will incur a charge). Should you wish to do so, written confirmation of your intention should be given to the Inspector prior to the inquiry proceeding so that sign in details can be provided — please do contact the Clerk on the below details and she will provide you with the relevant contact information for the Inspector's office.

Thames Water works - High Street

With the completion of the works on Drayton Road, Thames Water will be looking to commencing the works on the High Street. However, their initial investigations earlier in the year discovered high water levels. This means that the work will need to take place in the summer months and work therefore will not be commenced until May 2021 at the earliest and this will be dependent on weather conditions over the summer. Their investigations also confirmed that due to the positioning and size of the pipe, this may need to result in a road closure. They have confirmed that given the time before works can proceed they have time to investigate whether there is a way for the works to be completed with traffic light control but they can make no assurances that this will be the case. We will keep you updated onto any further information on the same both in this newsletter and on the Parish Council website.

Covid-19 update

The Parish Council would like to express its thanks to the Sutton Courtenay Covid-19 support group for its continuing work in helping the residents of Sutton Courtenay. Although a lot of their support has now diminished due to the lifting of restrictions, they are ready and willing to assist going forward should the need arise. Please are you able to keep an eye on neighbours to ensure well being going forward.

There is a real concern relating to people's mental health following lockdown and should you have any suggestions on ways in which reduce any feelings of isolation please do contact the clerk on the details below.

Given the new rules brought in on 14th September, please do endeavour to follow social distancing guidelines and restrictions on gatherings to help prevent the spread of the virus.

Comments: Council has no objection.

P20/V1903/FUL - S73 - Variation of wording of condition 6 (removal of current bund and replace it with a new one) on application ref. P18/V0069/O Residential development of 91 dwellings and associated access.

Land at Appleford Road

Comments: Council objects and disapproves of any variation to the wording.

Welcome back everyone!

A huge congratulation this week to everyone involved in getting the children back to school so smoothly for this new school year. The atmosphere in school has been amazing, with everyone clearly so glad to be back. I cannot believe how

quickly the children have settled down into school. As I walk around, I see them engaged in their lessons, enthusiastic and

respectful. I feel so thankful to have such a supportive school community. Parents have worked hard to prepare their children for the new ways of working and given their children the confidence to return without a hitch.



Hopefully, we can now

have a period of continuity for the children. In the national plan this autumn and winter, primary schools will be the very last thing in communities to close, after secondary schools, pubs and non-essential shops and businesses. The government has recognised how important it is for young children to have stability and routine. So for now, we are enjoying the fact that we are all back together again as a school community.

Reading books this term

It is really important that children have the right books at the right level for learning to read. This was one of our biggest challenges in lockdown and we are keen to catch up with reading

as quickly as we can.

To keep everyone safe, we have a strict system to avoid sharing. Books stay in our scheme boxes and are not touched by other children before they are given



to another child. When they come back to school, they are kept in separate boxes so we can remember when they came back, and kept apart for 72 hours. They are then considered safe as the coronavirus cannot survive on surfaces longer than that, and can be returned to our stock. It's a bit more complicated than it used to be, but we are all getting used to the 'new normal'!

Remote teaching

Our Year 5 and 6 teacher, Ms Parks, was in Croatia when the government announced the quarantine measures. This was

particularly upsetting as she had already cancelled her trip to France and swapped to Croatia to avoid the quarantine from there! She missed the first two days of term but she was determined to teach her



class. Like something from a science fiction film, Ms Parks taught her class remotely like a giant HAL! The children were incredibly well behaved and attentive. Well done Falcons! As the headteacher, I hovered in the background feeling quite redundant.

FROM THE EDITORS

Last month as editors we gave notice that we plan to retire from Sutton Courtenay News (SCN) at the end of this year. This month we thought that you might like to know what we do and how SCN works, especially for all the newer residents, some of whom may wish to volunteer to replace us!

SCN started in 1972 to keep village residents up to date with everything that was happening in the village and all the events being organised by the various village organisations. We are told that it was copied at home on a Gestetner machine (for those of you who don't remember them try Googling it)! The aim was that it would be printed monthly (except January & August) with a copy being delivered to each house free of charge. We still do this. Currently 1350 copies are printed per month. An online version is also now available.

To enable this to happen, we have a team: two editors and administrators (Clare and Diane), Bernie (the advertising, IT, and website guru), and a whole set of distributors. In addition, there is the treasurer (Clare) and the Chairman (this role is currently vacant following the retirement of Mary Thompson, one of the founders of SCN). Very importantly, and the point of the whole thing, there are the contributors, many regular, and some occasional.

We cover our printing costs largely from the fees we charge our advertisers, very many of whom are also regulars. However, we also rely on a generous annual grant from the Parish Council. Some of our contributors also make donations, for which we are very grateful.

The third Wednesday of each month is our copy date by which time we hope that we will have received all the copy by email. We then aim to do the layout using the Publisher program and get the proof to the printers over the following weekend. We are entirely self-taught, which may explain some of the errors along the way, especially at the beginning, 11 years ago! (We are aware that there are other programs which can also be used and might be preferable). The printed copies are then ready for distribution the following weekend.

For anyone thinking of volunteering, as we have two editors, we need only do one edition in two but the workload could be split in any number of ways. This does help when planning holidays! Also, there is no need to be physically present in Sutton Courtenay each month as long as you have access to WiFi and a computer. A number of SCN issues have already originated outside the UK!

We do this because we enjoy it. We feel that a village newsletter is still an important part of village life, even though now social media can convey news much faster. We believe there is still a need for a continuing, hopefully balanced record of how we are living our lives, and a platform for villagers to contribute as they wish. We hope that this is a chance for new people to take over the reins of SCN and shape it for what looks like a very eventful future for the village We hope some of you will volunteer and ensure that SCN will still be here to celebrate its 50th birthday in 2022.

Scams

Amazon Prime scams, in various guises, are still circulating locally. As outlined in last month's Safety Corner, courier scams are also prevalent in the area, with criminals posing as police officers. If you receive an uninvited or

unexpected phone call which asks you for personal, banking or credit card details, or for cash, you should **never** provide them and you should immediately end the call. **Remember that criminals are experts at sounding genuine and completely plausible. They want to make you panic, so that you don't stop and think about what they're asking you to do. If you've been a victim of a scam or fraud please report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or by using their online reporting tools at https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/**

Reporting suspicious texts (phishing) and emails (smishing)

Suspicious emails should be forwarded to the National Cyber Security Centre's suspicious email reporting service at report@phishing.gov.uk

Suspicious texts should be forwarded to 7726, which will enable your provider to investigate the origin of the message and, if it's malicious, to take action.

Cybercrime - how to stay secure online

Fraud and cybercrime are the most common criminal offences in the UK, with analysis showing that 86% of frauds have a cyber element. Here's how you can make it harder for cyber criminals to access your online accounts and devices.

- Install the latest software and app updates. Cyber criminals exploit weaknesses in software and apps to attack your devices and steal your identity. Software and app updates are designed to fix these weaknesses and installing them as soon as possible will help to keep your devices secure. For more information visit the National Cyber Security Centre website at https://www.ncsc.gov.uk/collection/top-tips-for-staying-secure-online/install-the-latest-software-and-app-updates
- Protect your email account by using a strong and separate password. Cyber criminals can use your email account to access many of your personal accounts and find sensitive information, such as your bank details, date of birth and address. Having a strong, separate password for your email account means that if cyber criminals steal the password for one your accounts they can't use it to access your other accounts.
- Enable two-factor authentication (2FA) on your email account. 2FA is the single best thing you can do to improve the security of important online accounts, such as your email account. 2FA enabled accounts require you to verify your identity by using your password (first factor) as well as a randomised 6-digit code (second factor) that's delivered to your mobile phone. If your password's stolen the criminals will still need your phone. If your phone's stolen, they still need your password. - **Use a password manager** You should use a different password for each of your online accounts. A password

- manager's an app on your phone, tablet or computer, which stores your passwords securely so that you don't have to remember them all. For more information visit https://www.ncsc.gov.uk/collection/top-tips-for-staying-secure-online/password-managers
- Secure smartphones and tablets with a screen lock. Each time you want to unlock your device, or switch it on, you'll be asked to enter a PIN, password or fingerprint. If someone gets hold of your device they'll be unable to access any data on it.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Urgent need for consultation.

Covid has inevitably slowed up Council's ability to consult. There is no doubt that, under normal circumstances, all Parish Councils in the area would have had direct face to face presentations and briefings from OCC Highway officers to explain their thinking on the proposed new link road and Thames bridge and how they are planning to manage traffic over the coming years. The apparent silence from the Council has allowed an atmosphere of anxiety and suspicion to develop. That atmosphere is stimulated by the signing of the HIF fund, the now certain funding of the new infrastructure, the SODC Local Plan inspection with the likely passing of plans for many more houses at Culham, and talk of a Radcot Green development on the FCC site near the Power Station. It is understood that traffic modelling has been done and the proposed new road layout around Didcot, Sutton Courtenay, Appleford and Culham will not only cope with the extra traffic the new homes will generate, but will improve current traffic flow.

However, anxieties remain and indeed are growing, of a South Abingdon rat run developing, and increasing damage to ancient village properties with more HGV traffic. But perhaps most damaging, there is a growing suspicion that the wool is being pulled over the resident's eyes and that COVID and its impact on consultation is being used as an excuse to foist yet more housing on an area that is already struggling to cope. Whilst the silence persists, these anxieties will continue to grow.

This article is an appeal to Council's to address the problem of consultation as a matter of urgency and is being copied to OCC Highways for a response.

COVID-19 Community Group

In case there are people in a Sutton Courtenay and Appleford who are not aware (and there cannot be many), since the outbreak of the pandemic, a group of volunteers has been meeting regularly to try to minimise the impact on the community life. The volunteers include representatives from the PC, the Damascus Youth Project, the Church, the NAG and others. Not only has it been heart warming to see them in action, but it has underlined the fact that, in an atmosphere of conflicting messages and often depressing news from above, it has demonstrated how the COVID impact is best handled by local communities from the "bottom up". I believe Government - national and local is learning this.

Whilst preparing for a second spike (should there be one), the Group is now moving its focus on to Mental Health and how to keep people cheerful and positive with a collection of safe activities for all ages.

When this is all over, there will be a time for a round of thanks and appreciation for all the COV19 Group, but in the meantime, if you have useful ideas that can be added to the collection, please let us know.

Bear and Milton Hill House, hotels being one of the sectors of the economy that has been particularly badly hit by lockdown, with some people being more reluctant to return to their previous way of life. At gyms like tfd Health and Fitness and Fitness Space people *are* keen to get back their previous way of life — and as a gym-goer myself I understand them! — they just have to book in advance and adhere to a higher standard of hygiene than perhaps they did previously. No bad thing, in my book.

At Farmer Gow's I saw not just what a great family day out the farm is for young and old, but also met the proprietors of successful businesses that Anne Gow has as tenants on the site, from LissieLou, the cake decoration business, to Bark and Berry Dog Grooming and the Oxford Yurt, a pretty impressive glamping site — I've never been glamping myself, but if you like doing so I'd check them out. I was pleased to make my first visit to the Westmill Wind and Solar Farm and delighted they were successful in their bid for Government funding for a new visitors' centre that will increase the number of visitors 6-fold.

Along the way there were lots of other independent businesses, like Didcot Glass and Glazing, Emma's Vintage Style, 30 Something and Bob's Butchers. Charities too, like Children Heard and Seen, which supports the children of prisoners — more on that in a future column. On my Facebook page (davidjohnston4wantage) you'll see I've started 'three questions' with the owners of different organisations to spread the word about organisations people might not have heard of.

On my week off, we went to the Lake District, but unfortunately I crocked my knee on a crag and am currently on crutches! It's my first real experience of having restricted mobility and it does bring home quite how many places are inaccessible for those who need to use crutches or a wheelchair to get around, something I've understood only theoretically before. Parliament is probably one of the worst examples, although I'm grateful I've temporarily been given an office nearer to the House of Commons to reduce the walking I have to do. DAMASCUS Parish Letter for October

"Wild flowers full of beautiful colours"

"Bird song raising spirits to the sky"

"Thank God for our gardens and the comfort of nature"

"Loving kindness is the shield".

These are some of the comments given to me by people who were, and perhaps continue, shielding. During those strange weeks, despite the anxiety and frustration of lockdown, many were thankful of the abundance of nature, and of the green spaces in our villages. You may have explored or discovered new parts of our villages. You may also have seen the kindness of sharing produce, plants, books, toys. You may have tried or seen neighbours growing vegetables and enjoying home grown produce. However, there were shortages too, loo rolls and pasta spring to mind. Home baking was dependant on the supply of flour and eggs. These shortages perhaps serves as a little reminder of how fortunate we are, ordinarily; not to have to worry about food shortages or being hungry.

September and October are months when the harvest is gathered and celebrated. The harvest festival as we know it today, was the invention of a great eccentric clergyman, Robert Stephen Hawker (1803-75) vicar of Morwenstow , N. Cornwall. He was fond of early church history and probably got the idea from reading about Lammas, which was an Anglo Saxon church festival to celebrate the "first fruits" of the grain harvest. Harvest festivals rapidly became widespread in the late Nineteenth century, and have become quite the norm.

This year there is a new normal; social distancing, sanitizing hands, wearing face coverings, are just a few. In this new normal there is time to celebrate harvest, to be thankful for the rural nature that surrounds us. There is also space to share and be reminded of those who are going hungry, and counties where the harvest will not be shared or so bountiful. Yet there are ways to help support those in need, locally and further away. These are ways to show gratitude and thankfulness for the blessing that we have. Donations to local food banks can be placed in boxes found in the DAMASCUS parishes churches throughout the year. The demand on food banks has sadly increased greatly in 2020, and harvest time makes this more poignant. Fair Trade produce can be bought throughout the year too, and is a direct way to support farmers and craft workers. Many of these will be living in countries less able to overcome the effects of the pandemic we are living through.

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who died recently:

Vera Mary Jones (formerly of Tullis Close, Sutton Courtenay, who died aged 92 on 24th August 2020, was born in Cardiff on 17th November 1927, an only child to her parents Doris and Arthur Jones. She was extremely close to her Cousin Doris throughout her childhood and they grew up as sisters - remaining good and supportive friends to one another throughout their lives. attended Penarth County School which is where she met Malcolm. Malcolm borrowed her hockey stick, they became childhood sweethearts and marriage followed in due course in 1952 - a marriage which endured for 56 years until Malcolm's death in May 2008. On leaving school Vera trained as a pharmacist and worked in a chemists in Whitchurch. When Malcolm's work took the family to London she worked at East Grinstead Pharmacy and eventually Malcolm's job brought them to Oxford and they moved to Tullis Close, Sutton Courtenay in 1962 - as one of the original residents of the Close. Vera continued to work for Boots in Abingdon and then for the pharmacy at the Clifton Hampden Surgery. All this alongside bringing up her boys. Gareth born in 1958 in East Grinstead and Wynford in 1962 in the Warren in Abingdon. Wynford described Vera as a fantastic Mum - a loving and supportive parent who ensured they had a balanced and secure childhood. She was always willing to take them to all their sporting commitments - driving here, there and everywhere. She loved having an open house for all their friends and she was always encouraging of their involvement in sports and other interests. She was a good home cook - although this didn't stop her on one occasion from allowing a steam pudding to boil dry and explode all over the kitchen ceiling! She did attend a Cordon Bleu Cookery Course but she didn't last as she thought the portions too small. Her idea of a good meal was a generous Lamb Roast. She always had a very sweet tooth - was almost addicted to chocolate bars and she loved a sherry. In her younger years she had been a keen hockey player and also enjoyed tennis. In later years in

the village she enjoyed being part of the Evergreens Club in Sutton Courtenay and was a loyal supporter of the bingo sessions at the Village Hall - enjoying the fun and the tea and biscuits. She was a great knitter - making many jumpers for Malcolm and the boys but she was also skilled at shrinking everything in the wash. She enjoyed traveling and went with Malcolm all over the world, supporting his stamp collecting, on trips to Canada and North America. It was his interest in stamps from this part of the world that led to he and Vera doing a year's house exchange in British Columbia, Canada in the late 80s. They also enjoyed trips to Portugal and several cruises in the Mediterranean. She loved being Nana Vera to her grandchildren and doted on them all - there were always sweet treats in the cupboard for them whenever they came to visit. She was a big part of their upbringing and enjoyed many outings with them over the years - and was kind and generous with her time. Sadly Malcolm was diagnosed with cancer in 2003 and his health gradually declined until his death in 2008. He was looked after by Vera - who truly honoured her marriage vows by caring for him so devotedly. Vera was a straighttalking individual who could often be outspoken. She was never afraid to express her very definite point of view - and this could sometimes be challenging for friends, neighbours and family alike but she also had a sense of humour and could tell a funny story. She had a fantastic memory for facts and excelled at spelling - practically a walking dictionary! As a family they always kept either cats or dogs, until their last dog, Pepper died. As Vera's health failed, she needed more care and as the boys had promised their Dad they would always look after their Mum - Wynford and Heidi adapted their home in Cholsey so they could care for her and she spent her final years surrounded by her family and, in her turn, was cared for so devotedly by them. NORTH APPLEFORD ROAD APPEAL APP/V3120/ W/20/3247391 STARTING 6 OCTOBER

The appeal on the decision to reject the application to build 93 houses North of Appleford Road is to be held virtually on MS Teams starting at 9.30 am on Tuesday 6 October and is expected to last for several days.

Villagers who would like to participate or observe the proceedings should register asap with the Planning Inspectorate having read the Inquiry Attendance Information in the attached letter. The Inspectorate stress that all written submissions from application and appeal stage will be taken into account by the Inspector and re-stating the same points won't add any additional weight to them. Registered participants in whatever capacity will receive individual joining instructions, providing details of any requirements, guidance and support, whether joining by MSTeams or telephone.

The Parish Council has retained a planning consultant to represent it and Sutton Courtenay Action will also be participating.

At the time of writing, this is not providing access to these documents but this should be rectified shortly. It is becoming clear however that OCC has decided to adjust its traffic objection due to the successful HIF Infrastructure bid for the new bridge across the Thames and associated road improvements. That is due to be completed in 2024, so meanwhile, OCC appears content to agree to the development of 40 houses on the site under Grampian conditions.

This does not, however, negate the other reasons for refusal that; it is speculative development which is not allocated in the Local Plan; the Vale has sufficient housing to meet the required 3 years supply and that the site is beyond the built area of SC and part of the open countryside.

Some 60 villagers objected to the application when it first arose in 2015. Their objections are also on the above website should anyone wish to review theirs. It will be possible to dip in and out of the event.so villagers are asked to at least register to observe the proceedings, to reinforce the degree of concern felt about this speculative application, despite the proposed infrastructure improvements, which it is far from certain will reduce the traffic flow through the village.

LETTER TO THE EDITORS

Dispirited villagers - a call to arms!

We'd like to think we live in a democracy, but residents of Oxfordshire might disagree.

A case in point - over objections from the newly-elected South Oxford district council, Culham Parish council and many villagers within Culham itself — the construction of more than 3,000 houses has been approved **through direct Government intervention** on greenbelt land between the EUROPEAN school and JET site/Culham Laboratories. How is this democracy?

What does this mean? At least 3000 more cars on the road queuing to get into Abingdon, or through Clifton Hampden and on to Oxford or to Didcot is what it means. And, as you are all aware, with the possibility of more housing estates springing up in the local area, this will inevitably result in more cars. We are facing gridlock. We're becoming Milton Keynes!

How much, if any, thought has been given to infrastructure? Unlike Milton Keynes, very little it would seem.

While Culham still put up a fight to stop over-development in their village, Drayton, Appleford and Sutton Courtenay now face problems of our own. We are surrounded by builders hoping to turn our villages into one huge conurbation. FCC, the company than manages the landfill sites between Sutton Courtenay, Appleford and Didcot, wants to build many hundreds of new homes on their site — land that was meant to be returned to agricultural use.

And then there is "the bridge" with its slip-road at Appleford. Suggesting this new bridge will enhance the speedy flow of traffic through Sutton Courtenay is laughable.

Roads through the village will become "rat runs". Road parking will be stopped. Noise levels will increase and air quality will drop. How will the increased volume of traffic, from both directions, navigate the difficult turn by The Fish? Once past this pinch point, cars frequently accelerate along Appleford Road breaking the speed limit towards Appleford.

The proposed bridge is supposed to facilitate the movement of traffic to the JET site over the river. The idea appears to be a "box ticking" exercise with little intelligent thought given to outcomes from this outrageous plan. Yes, more traffic will move to the JET site — but not just from the new road. Inevitably, more traffic will also move to JET through our villages!

We must make our voices and concerns known! We need to pester, if needs be, our local MPs. They are our representatives in the Houses of Parliament. Let them prove themselves as such.




