PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

New Parish Councillor

At the September meeting of the Parish Council, the Council was pleased to welcome Mr. Ron Mead of Chapel Lane as a new member to fill the seat that remained vacant following the elections last May. The contact details of all members can be found on the noticeboard outside the Burgrey shop in the High Street.

Waste Recycling Group – Sutton Courtenay Landfill Site

The planning application for the Mechanical Biological Treatment Plant was refused by the County Council on 12th September. WRG has 6 months from the date of the decision notice in which to appeal. It is unknown at this stage whether an appeal will be lodged.

At the time of writing WRG is planning an exhibition in the village halls both at Sutton Courtenay and Appleford on 26th and 27th September, regarding its plans for an anaerobic digestion facility. Your parish councillors will be attending these, to find out as much information as possible, in order to best represent the electorate as the issues relating to the latest proposal unfold.

Oxfordshire County Council – Draft Minerals and Waste Consultation

The Council is currently consulting on its draft minerals and waste policy. Comments are invited up until 31st October, 2011. The documents can be found on the County Council's website. www.oxfordshire.gov.uk on the home page on the left hand side under "respond to a consultation."

Cemetery Clearance

The Parish Council is planning for the next area of burials in the Cemetery. This is to clear some of the trees, level the ground and grass seed it. The ground will then settle before it is required in a few years for interments. It is expected that the works will start during the Winter.

Community Pay Back

The community pay back scheme is where offenders do work in the community as part of their sentence. It has been suggested that there might be projects in the village which could receive assistance from the scheme. The scope of the projects on which they can work is wide, such as environmental or landscaping, litter picking or decorating as well as many others. Projects must:

be of benefit to the local community not take paid work away from others not be making a profit from the work be challenging and demanding be worthwhile and constructive

If there is anyone with ideas of what could be undertaken in the parish, or anyone who needs further information then please contact the clerk.

Peafowl

Again the Parish Council is receiving complaints about peafowl in the village and the chicks that have hatched this year. It has had numerous requests to consider the management of them. The birds each year are inbreeding which can increase the chances of the chicks having problems. The Parish Council is again considering the matter and what action it could take.

SUTTON COURTENAY ANGLING CLUB

It seems that Sutton Courtenay news has information about practically everything going on in and around the village except for one gaping omission - the active and popular fishing club that operates on the local stretches of the Thames.

Sutton Courtenay Angling Club (SCAC) was formed as the Southport Arms Angling Club in 1932 to retain local fishing for local anglers. There are more than 400 members and a small but dynamic committee. The very scenic parts of the river Thames surrounding the village forms the bulk of the club waters but there is also a lake adjacent to the Abingdon Marina for still water enthusiasts. Many members compete in fishing matches throughout the season but others simply take pleasure in the fishing the natural surroundings and the quiet river fishing offered in the area.

It is our intention to write a series of articles in the Sutton Courtenay news about the club and about fishing and fish in general; but particularly river fishing. We intend to highlight environmental issues and also angling's contribution to the maintenance of the river environment. We will also highlight any special catches that you would like to send to us and focus on some of the history of the sport.

The club would also like to welcome anyone who wants to fish in the Thames but also to remind everyone that an environment agency permit and a Sutton Courtenay club ticket are necessary before you fish. Day tickets and season tickets (£28) are available at **Didcot Angling Centre** on Wantage Road and environment agency rod licences are available online and at the Post Office.

IAN GRAHAM WILLIAMS, who died aged 71 on 17th August 2011 was born in 1940 and brought up in Hull. On leaving school Ian trained as a Test Engineer. When his parents, Cyril and Gladys, moved to Appleford in 1966 Ian moved with them to begin work at ARC (Ameys) and from then on worked as a Concrete Test Engineer. In due course Ian moved with his parents to Katchside in Sutton Courtenay and then took early retirement in order to care full time for his mother who was suffering from arthritis. Sadly 20 years ago he too was diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis and eventually moved to Abingdon to a more manageable flat. Ian was a quiet man, someone who was understated, with a dry sense of humour. A caring and compassionate son, a loyal and indulgent older brother to Peter and a devoted and proud uncle to Anthony with whom he loved playing cricket and sharing his enthusiasm for stamp collecting. He was also a keen reader and loved history and natural history. With care from Peter and the family, and the support of Abingdon Day Centre in later years, Ian lived a quiet and uncomplaining life despite the physical challenges and frustrations. His funeral took place at Oxford Crematorium on 31st August 2011 and he will be greatly missed by his family and friends. (This is an edited extract from the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the funeral).

GEORGE RICHARD WOODWARD, who died aged 88 on 8th September 2011 was born in Appleton on 17th August 1923 to Maud and Frank. Throughout his life he had a very close bond with his siblings: Marjorie, Freda and Nancy and Frank. When George was 12 the family moved to Sutton Courtenay. Aged 17 George joined the Navy and worked on motor torpedo boats and earned the title of first class gunner. George met his wife, Jean at a

dance in the old village hall in Wallingford Way. They corresponded throughout the war and were married in All Saints' Church on 1st March 1947. The majority of their married life was spent in Frilsham Street before retiring to live in Katchside. George learnt carpentry whilst working for a local company, Chambers and then went on to work for Ameys as a Maintenance Manager where he made many life long friends. He retired when he was 65 to enjoy time on their boat on the Thames. This was their life for many years, until they became unable to jump on and off at the locks and the moorings! George never failed to be a loving, caring and understanding husband to Jean; a devoted Father to Jane, Sarah and Georgia and a proud grandfather and great-grandfather. Sadly in the last year or so George's own health deteriorated and, although he rarely complained, it was a very challenging time. The roles were reversed and his beloved daughters, with help from the team of carers at Care Tree, cared lovingly for him and Jean. His funeral was held in All Saints' Church on 19th September, followed by burial in Sutton Courtenay Cemetery.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Pumpkin and apple soup



500g (11b) pumpkin flesh 1 large onion 1 large carrot 1 litre (1.5 pts) stock 75g (3 oz) butter 1 large apple 1tbs tomato puree 0.5 tsp curry powder Mint or chives

Slice onions thinly and add to melted butter. Cook gently until soft. Chop carrot, peel, core and chop apple and add to pan with the chopped pumpkin. Mix in curry powder and tomato puree. Add stock (chicken or vegetable). Simmer until all vegetables are soft. Cool enough to liquidise. If liked, more stock maybe added. Check seasoning. Finely chop mint or chives and sprinkle over hot soup in bowls.

BIRD DIARY

The wetlands just outside the village on the road to Drayton have become a very good site for unusual birds. Recently two adult Spoonbills and one juvenile were seen there. These are very rare visitors coming from the continent, most likely Holland. They are waders feeding on molluscs, crustaceans and small fish and need access to shallow open water. They are unusual birds with a long bill with a spatula like tip, which gives them their name. Their typical foraging

behaviour is to hold their bill under the water and swing the head from side to side feeling for food. In July twelve Green Sandpipers were seen on the above site. These are summer visitor waders who appear singly or in small groups. They can be identified by their white rumps and their distinctive call as they fly away when disturbed. Three Snipe and two Water Rails, quite rare and similar in size to Moorhens, were seen on the same site in July.

Towards the end of May there was a lot of bird activity on the pond just past the playing fields. One day at the end on the month there were Ducks, House Martins, and Lapwings. The pair of swans which have nested twice recently were not here this year.

By the beginning of July there were good numbers of Swifts, House Martins, and Swallows flying around the village.

MECHANICAL WASTE PLANT DETEATED AT PLANNING

WRG's latest proposal for the greenfield landfill site was defeated at the Oxfordshire County Council planning committee meeting on Monday 12th September by 9 votes to 4.

Lead by Robin Draper, representatives of the villages of Sutton Courtenay and Appleford, and the Parish Councils and also Didcot Council and the Vale of The White Horse, put forward spirited and comprehensive objections to the proposal for a large building to mechanically sort an additional 220,000 tonnes per year of waste from London and elsewhere. This would have brought the total of landfill and mechanical waste processing close to 900,000 tonnes per year with additional noise, traffic, odour, flood risk, and flies as a result.

We were fortunate to have a highly professional summation of the balance of arguments against the proposal by our Councy Councillor Stewart Lilley and also a history of the greenfield site permits presented by Vale Councillor Gervase Duffield, which helped persuade planning councillors to refuse the application (by an increased vote over the previous incinerator application last year.)

The main argument was WRG's failure to show that there was an overriding need for the MBT plant -a necessary planning requirement to allow permanent industrial use of a greenfield site. WRG have now put forward twelve planningapplications to change this site -all of them recommended for acceptance at committee by O.C.C. planning staff. Fortunately councillors have been persuaded by our arguments in the case of the applications for both a very large Incinerator and a huge Mechanical Waste plant.

However the value of the site to WRG will continue to result in pressure to turn the greenfield site into a huge Waste Plant, and WRG may appeal the decision; they already have put forward yet another proposal for an Anaerobic Digester- a large 'cooking pot' to produce gas and compost from maize. Of course AD has been around for centuries and can equally use green waste from both farms and domestic sources to produce gas. It is, properly operated, a rather lower pollution source than the previous proposals and would provide business for farmers within a 10 mile radius of the site.

We will have to wait and see the size of the plant WRG are proposing – at this point four spherical digesters each 30 to 50m diameter, suggests an overall site

size of perhaps 180 metres by 90 metres, which is a considerable 'industrialisation' of this site and may set a precedent for a return of the other

processes at a later stage. Look at the proposal as it develops on WRG and O.C.C. websites and of course-WATCH THIS SPACE !!!!

Our new county councillor, Stewart Lilly, also backed us strongly. Members of the public who attended the meeting loudly applauded the excellent speeches by our representatives and this too may have contributed by showing the strength of feeling in the area. Well done to all concerned!

Despite what we learned from the movie Amadeus, the composer Antonio Salieri had nothing to do with the Requiem nor did a good number of people who wanted us to think they did. Most of the unfinished work was given in outline to Mozart's pupil, Franz Sussmayr who completed the Requiem with help from his friend Joseph Eybler. Mozart's early death has provided much fuel for speculative myth makers with an abundance of conspiracy theories, from strangers in grey cloaks, jealous competitors intent on his death and his own conviction that he was being poisoned by a slow-acting mixture of arsenic, antimony and lead; all probably rubbish. Scholars generally accept a diagnosis of acute rheumatic fever. He died at 12.55am on December 5th and was buried late the following day.

In tackling this sombre and brilliant composition, The All Saints Singers have given themselves an imposing task. No matter that not all the writing is Mozart's own, the fact is that the Requiem represented a major shift in church choral music and would have been quite revolutionary at the time; it continues to fill churches and concert halls today simply because it is beautiful music. The choir will sing with the benefit of a full orchestra, with strings and a major wind section added to organ and timpani. The result we believe will be an awe inspiring and worthwhile evening of wonderful music.

We will be joined by our local soprano Anna Shackleton (who delighted all who came to the Summer Serenade).We are pleased to confirm that the orchestra will be led by Sue Lynn who will also be the soloist in the Vivaldi concerto.

THE SEASONAL GARDENER

After a short but well needed break, I'm back! Many apologies for anyone who actually missed the Seasonal Gardener in September! I'd had great intentions of writing while in Cornwall in August. However the lack of web access or even phone signal prevented me from sending anything in. And I have to confess it was very nice. I'd forgotten what it was like to not have any access to all this modern technology! However, normal service has resumed and so has October!

I always think Autumn in the garden is a bit like spring cleaning in the home. Out with the old and tatty and in with some new fresh stuff to fill the gaps! I've spent a couple of very therapeutic days composting all the summer bedding from my pots and hanging baskets and refilling with colour for the winter. My preference is for delicate little violas mixed with silver leafed senecio. But there's a fair few choices out there even at this late stage. Pansies, wallflowers, sweet williams, ornamental cabbages, forget-me-nots, bellis and heathers are all available at garden centres at the moment and as we're towards the end of planting season, you may get some really good bargains. Don't forget to bury some spring bulbs underneath for that extra layer of colour. If you're like me, by spring you'll have forgotten you put them in there and they'll give you a lovely surprise!

Clearing away all the herbaceous growth on the perennials can leave you with space in the garden to plant extra bulbs and maybe some grasses, hebes or box to provide some extra winter/spring interest. Leave some pretty seedheads for the winter frosts and the birds though. Also, don't be tempted to do any drastic pruning yet. Pruning encourages growth and any new leaves will suffer from the cold and frosts to come and may weaken the plants. I'd shorten any stems on tall plants such as roses, buddleja and lavatera to stop them rocking in the winds and leave the rest until late winter. And move into shelter any tender plants, like fuchsias and even bays in pots, in case we get another hard winter like last year.

Another good thing to do at this time of year is to sow seeds for an early start in spring. If you have a spare windowsill or greenhouse, get started on some sweetpeas for earlier flowering next year. Broadbeans can be started in pots or under cover on your vegetable plot. It's also the last chance to plant garlic, onion sets and spring cabbages straight into the ground although it's advisable to cover them with net to stop pigeons pecking the fresh green shoots!

And finally, I like to have some growing things in the house over winter to remind me that spring will come. Having some bulbs potted up or a fresh new orchid to look at or seed trays with little shoots popping up is always nice when it's too miserable to venture outside!
