

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Council Tax 2012

The Parish Council has carefully considered its budget for 2012/2013 looking in detail at its income and expenditure. The Council has taken a positive decision not to increase the precept in view of the economic climate and the financial difficulties that people are generally facing. This is the 3rd year that the precept remains the same. This equates to less than £1 per week for a Band D property.

Appleford Road - Extension of 30 mph limit

The new housing development at the Eastern end of the Appleford Road is well on the way to completion. In the interests of road safety and to reduce danger to all road users the County Council intends to introduce lower speed limits to safely accommodate the associated junction. The proposal is to extend the 30 mph 155 metres east of its current position.

WRG / Hanson Site

A planning application for the importation of reject building blocks from Berkshire and Warwickshire, to be crushed and mixed with other locally available materials, and then made into new building blocks at the Milton Blockworks, was considered by the County Council on 16th January. The Parish Council had lodged strong objections to this, having concerns for the transportation requirements to bring in 1100 tonnes from outside of the area each week, the impact on residents that the process would have, and the lack of an environmental impact assessment with the application. The Parish Council attended the meeting, and spoke against the proposal. This, however, was approved 13 votes to 1.

Expansion of village

It was reported in the November issues that the Parish Council had written to the District Council regarding the rapid increase in the number of dwellings in the village in recent years. The Vale of White Horse District Council has a draft Interim Housing Supply Policy which could lead to more dwellings in the area. The District Council has confirmed, that whilst the housing policy has not been finalised, it acknowledged that the final policy would need to take into account the existing planning consent for development at the Amey site.

Catholic Church site – Hobbyhorse Lane

Last month it was stated that the Church site was sold by the Church of England. Further queries have been raised with the Parish Council regarding whether it was actually sold or gifted. The Parish Council has checked with the Church of England who state this it was sold. However the Parish Council has no confirmed information as to the value of the transaction. It is understood that the transfer of the land took place in 1967 and anyone interested in finding out more information can contact the Land Registry. FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

FROM: Councillor Stewart Lilly

Christmas is over & I hope you all had a happy time with friends and family.

2012 will bring further challenges which will bring fresh chapters to old topics. One topic that remains constant in your Parish is WRG / Hansen and their associated problems. The County Council has in fact been recently credited with the way in which it is ahead of the game nationally in processing all our waste. However, it does have to go somewhere. For the moment the proposed MBT facility within Sutton Courtenay appears not to be proceeding. The Company are allowed the right of appeal and at the time of writing this note the outcome of that remains unknown. They have until March.

I am pleased to report that within my Division, the Trading Standards Department and the Police have had great success in dealing with doorstep crime. Elderly and vulnerable people should always alert the Trading Standards Dept and / or the Police for advice. This is an increasing problem in these tough economic times so do seek proper identity from anyone purporting to sell services or products at the door. (Action Line for these incidences: 0845-051-0845)

Public transport in the area remains positive, but regrettably the Service No: 97 through Appleford has not proved the success I would have wished and is currently under review as the financial subsidy is quite expensive for the usage it receives. However, within Sutton Courtenay the new timetables for routes 32/32A seem to be well received.

You may also like to know that the Counties Fire & rescue service received last November the accolade of being the best & most efficient fire service in the Country. This service is run entirely independently by the County Council.

Most Parish Councils in my Division willingly accepted the 1 ton of free salt to be locally stored and thus available if difficulties occur with that white stuff! The County Council has also invested heavily in new road clearing equipment and new vehicles are located locally at the Drayton Works.

During 2012 further dialogue will be held with Network Rail as the promotion of more freight going by rail between the Midlands and South Coast ports is pursued. This will have local implications and I will keep abreast of events. However, it will also take a large number of trucks off the A34.

A Christmas disco was very popular with the children and there are future plans for a Quiz Night – so please watch this space. Every single parent is eligible to be a member of FOSCS and as it is a Friends Association, if anyone else would like to be involved in this very active group – or could lend a hand or some expertise from time to time, please do contact the school. With the money raised from these events, FOSCS are helping the school to develop their own mini Forest School within the grounds, so if you are particularly interested in this project, we would love to hear from you.

Our school is continuing to grow rapidly. We currently have 112 children within the main school and, at Easter, will be at full capacity of 30 within the nursery. In September we are expecting to have over 120 children within the main school and will be able to sustain our five-class structure, which is fantastic for the school. From the Ministry Team...

The Church's season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday (22nd February). But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament where the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their actions as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. This was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of wrongdoing. In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

Receiving ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday is a symbolic action which encourages us to remember the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us. Have you done something which haunts you? Which makes you feel restless and defensive, every time you think of it? Why not deal with it this Lent, and put it behind you? Whatever your mistake has been, consider what the Bible has to say: 'I have not come to call the virtuous but sinners to repentance' (said Jesus) (Luke 5.32). 'Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.' (Joel 2:12-13) God is inviting you to come to him this Ash Wednesday. What a wonderful offer! Make the most of it, and remember how the prodigal son was welcomed back by his compassionate father. Above all remember how you can always start again as this story reminds us. A man out walking in the early Spring saw a bird's nest lying on the ground. It had been destroyed by a storm. He thought sadly of the time and work it must have taken to build it, but suddenly his thoughts were interrupted by a bird singing. When he looked up into the tree, he saw a wonderful sight: the little bird was busy building another nest! You can't go back. You can't rewrite the past. But you don't have to wallow in regret or remorse. Your experiences have made you the person you are today and, if you're still breathing, then you can start your life over again, beginning right now. In the Bible we hear how King David blew it - his mistakes were bigger than most people's, but he decided not to be a prisoner of his past. And in the Psalms he prayed: 'You will give me added years of life as rich and as full of those of many generations, all packed into one.' (Psalm 61.6). All of us have things we wish we had done differently - or hadn't done at all. But there is no use in looking backwards. What is past is past. This Lent put the past under the forgiveness of a merciful God and move on. Your best days are ahead if you can accept this promise and move forward.

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently

Alfred Ludwig Henker (known as Bob or Ludy) who died on 20th November 2011 and whose funeral took place on 1st December 2011 in All Saints' Church was born in Dresden in 1922. Bob left school to serve his apprenticeship as an electrician. On being called up he served as a Navigator in the German Air Force. He was shot down three times before been taken prisoner at Arnhem and brought to England where he at first worked in the coalmines, and was given his nickname, Bob – which stuck with him for the rest of his life. He was then moved to the POW Camp at Milton Depot. He was later transferred to agricultural work on a farm in Cornwall, which was where he met Margaret at the YMCA. They were married on 1st August 1949 and came straight to Sutton Courtenay as there was a job at Courtenay Nurseries, part of Lady Place, as a gardener/handyman which included a tied cottage. They lived initially above the fruit and vegetable shop at 58 High Street and then at 10 The Green where Peter and Marian were born to complete their family. In 1950 Bob took British Citizenship. After he suffered a back injury, whilst helping Dr Sinclair of Lady Place collect a heavy garden statue, he had to give up this type of work and was rehoused on the new housing estate on 28th May 1958. He then worked as an electrician at the MG Car Works in Abingdon for 23 years. When the factory closed down he took a job at the Home Office in Steventon until he retired. Both he and Margaret were interested in photography and joined both Sutton Courtenay and Abingdon Camera Clubs. Over the years they took a lot of slides, made them into shows and took them around the old people's clubs in Abingdon. In the 1950s the Queen visited Abingdon after the Town Hall had been refurbished and Bob was asked to make a scale model of it for a shop window display to celebrate the occasion and it can still be viewed in Abingdon Museum. He always enjoyed gardening. He also loved dancing and he and Margaret joined the country and western club in the village. In later years they were also key members of the Evergreens Club. Bob was devoted to Margaret - they celebrated their 62nd Wedding Anniversary in August - and to his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren who will greatly miss him. This is an edited version of the tribute given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick

John Cecil Pitson (Big John) who died on 21st November 2011 and whose funeral took place on 1st December in All Saints' Church was born in Milton on 2nd May 1938. Apparently John was tall from an early age as the bottom of the bed had to be sawn off to let his feet hang over the edge! He left school at 15 to work on a farm in Steventon and did his National Service in Cypress in the late '50s. Ellen and John moved to Barretts Way in 1962 where they brought up their boys and have lived ever since. John worked at Ameys, for Pembertons the Coal Merchant and then for 18 years at Morris Motors. He then spent 18 years working for the Power Station before retraining as a Fork Lift Truck Driver. After five years he retired to take up gardening for a large number of people locally. The family joke was that John had three mowers in the shed but not a single blade of grass in his own garden, although the mowers helped out with other people's gardens. He loved playing bowls and has played for the Marlborough Club, at Milton Hill and in Harwell. He had only just stepped down from being Captain of the Kennet League. Both John and Ellen enjoyed the Turkey and Tinsel weekends organised by the Evergreens, going to Bingo regularly and the Vicar's Tea Parties as well as travelling all over the world. Wherever he went John was often regarded as a tourist attraction in his own right, as the locals would be fascinated by his great height and size. He will be greatly missed by Ellen and all his family and friends. This is an edited extract from the tribute given at the funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

Anthony David Pratley (Tony) who died, aged 81, on 2nd December 2011 was born on 9th March 1930 at Clifton Hampden to a large family. He worked at Trotman's Bakery, Ameys and the Gas Board and he did National Service. Tony was a lovely person, a bachelor and home lover. When all the siblings left home Tony remained, and after Dad died he looked after Mum. Tony was a keen gardener, even though he was disabled with peripheral neuropathy and severe arthritis in his knees and back but he never let it get him down. Tony could do his own chores with the help of his mobility scooter, putting out the bins, cleaning his beloved car and shopping, with the help of Jackie his sister. His love of traction engines also took us to several rallies every year. He collected corgies and dinkies and his house was full of them. In Tony's younger days he loved bicycles. He belonged to a cycle group and they would meet up on a summer evening outside the Abingdon Town Hall and ride up the downs to little pubs, then back again, or go for full days to London or the coast. Tony loved painting pastels and water colours and most of the family have one of his pastel paintings. The Milton Art Club really cared for and looked after him. He loved going to the pub until the smoking ban began. He and Pete and his friends would sit with a pint and a ciggy and he loved a singsong at the pub. He also liked to dance and despite his disabilities he would do a two step at the Country and Westerns in the village hall hanging on to his friend Marina. Tony may have lived on his own, but he was never lonely as he was visited by family and friends who will all miss him greatly. This is an edited version of the tribute given at the funeral by Tony's niece Sharon, on behalf of his sister Jackie and all the family.

Phyllis May Powell (formerly known as Loveridge) died, age 99, on 8th December 2011 was born in Kingsclere in 1912. Her father worked in the racing community as a stable lad, so the family moved around the stables, from Blewbury to Letcombe Regis to Salisbury Plain. Phyllis had many happy memories of time spent with her brothers and sisters. When she was 18 she met Jack Tolley - a National Hunt Jockey - and had her first son, Ken. Sadly Jack was killed in a riding accident and Phyllis was left to bring up Ken on her own with the loving support of her own family. Always a good cook, she was working in a café when the 2^{nd} World War started and she then joined the ATS. She Met Edwin James Willey – better known as Ted – when she was out walking with friends and his ammunition lorry had broken down. They struggled to find somewhere to live but they eventually set up home as a family in a converted railway carriage in Brightwell-cum-Sotwell before moving into a cottage where their other two children were born. Ted was an entrepreneur and Phyllis worked alongside him in his many business ventures. Phyllis always loved travelling. From the early camping holidays with the children in Cornwall and the New Forest to t rips to Italy and Yugoslavia, she enjoyed many holidays in both the UK and abroad. She and Ted retired to Cornwall there but sadly Ted died aged only 65 and Phyllis returned to Brightwell to live with her sister and husband. In the early 1970s Phyllis met and married Rueben Loveridge and they lived in West Hanney for a short while before moving to Abingdon. Rueben died in the early '90s and after time on her own Phyllis met Len Powell and they became companions. Later she went to live in the Bluebell Unit in the Meadows. Such was her desire to not be a burden on the family, she always went away for Christmas - the timing of her death once again meant that she has gone away for Christmas so as not to cause any difficulties to her family who will all miss her greatly. This is an edited extract from the address given at the funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

REST IN PEACE CONTINUED

Anthony Brian Deadman (Tony) who died, aged 76, on 11th December 2011 was born on 8th March 1935 in Sutton Courtenay to a large family. At 14 he went to work as a Cobbler because his Mum wanted him to have a trade. He then became a Painter and Decorator until he joined the Army in 1952. Family legend has it that he wanted a motorbike but his Mum wouldn't let him have one so he joined up! He served for seven years, two of them in Egypt. On his return he took up lorry driving for Ameys and became a car mechanic. It was whilst working underneath a lorry in 1962 that it dropped on his head – seriously injuring him. Whilst lying in hospital he heard the doctors telling his parents that he would be in bed for 18 months – but such was Tony's determination he was out within a week and made a complete recovery. In 1963 he came to the Forge Garage in Appleford where he managed the petrol pumps for Margaret Cross and slowly began to develop the car repair business. In 1968 he met Doris and in 1969 they bought Forge Garage to run it as their own business. Work was always his focus, and Tony and Doris worked hard together to build up the business and to provide for their family of Jill, Brian and Alan. He was a very skilled mechanic, specialising in automatic gear boxes, and never liked to let anyone down. And in 1977 when he broke his hip in an accident at work he was back at work working balancing on two crutches as soon as he was out of hospital. Tony was a hard worker but he was also generous with his time in helping others. During one very bad winter when the Milkman couldn't get through he drove a Land Rover to collect the milk and then delivered it around the villages - in return for this kindness he was given a week's worth of free He enjoyed meeting customers and could chat for England. He always had a soft-heart for children and was devoted and very proud of his grandchildren and their achievements. In later life he joined the local group of The Canal Zoners – and liked reminiscing with fellow soldiers about their time in Egypt. In October 2008 he became ill and never really recovered his health. Above all he never lost his sense of humour and never took life for granted. Having come close to losing his life at such a young age he was always very grateful for the life he had. He will be greatly missed by his wife Doris and all his family and friends.

This is an edited extract from the address given at Tony's funeral by the Reverend Helen Kendrick held at All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay on Monday 19th December 2011.

CHURCHYARD TRANSCRIPTIONS

Sutton Courtenay Churchyard

We have at last completed the transcription of Sutton Courtenay Churchyard, Church, Cemetery and War Memorial – this has meant copying every word that can be read on over 921 monuments and checking and rechecking names and dates with the help of burial records, then collecting them, together with a photograph of each monument, onto a CD-Rom. Alan Simpson, the MI Co-ordinator for OFHS (Oxfordshire Family History Society), has overseen this task, checking many records himself, and was the computer expert who put it all together and produced the CD.

You may wonder what the point of all this work was. Well, there is a national programme to record for family historians names and dates on headstones before it is too late to read them. (Many stones in the Churchyard have worn badly as we can tell you!) OFHS is encouraging every parish in the County to produce a Transcription.

Copies of the CD will be given to the Vicar, the PCC, the Parish Council and all helpers. If anyone wants to buy a copy, they can be ordered online or by post, cost £6, from OFHS: http://www.ofhs.org.uk/CDsales.html The code will be OXF-MI-SUT.

NOTICE FROM COUNTY TRADING STANDARDS

Fake Vodka on sale in Oxfordshire shop

Oxfordshire County Council's Trading Standards Service is warning people to be vigilant after counterfeit Vodka, containing dangerously high levels of an industrial solvent found in screen wash and nail varnish remover, was found on sale in a shop in Oxfordshire.

The product 'Arctic Ice', which is branded to look like Vodka, was analysed and found to contain Isopropyl Alcohol, which can cause symptoms including drowsiness, stomach pain and cramps, vomiting and diarrhoea. If enough is consumed it could cause unconsciousness and death.

The label on the 'Arctic Ice' bottles give no indication of where the alcohol has been produced, or who the manufacturer or importer is, and carries a fake HMRC duty stamp.

This discovery of unsafe alcohol follows seizures of counterfeit wine and Vodka in the county during a Trading Standards campaign to identify counterfeit and illegal alcohol and remove it from sale.

Richard Webb, Acting Head of Oxfordshire County Council's Trading Standards Service, said: "Shop owners should be very wary if they are offered cheap alcohol. It may be smuggled, counterfeit or, like Arctic Ice, be unsafe for human consumption.

"Elsewhere in the country, shops have had their alcohol licenses reviewed or revoked because they have been found in possession of illegal alcohol. If any members of the public have this alcohol in their homes they should not drink it and should destroy it. If you have consumed this product, our advice is to contact your doctor immediately."

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Smoked haddock chowder

This recipe can be served on Ash Wednesday which is in this month. It's a warming and filling soup in the cold weather. Serves 6.

700g smoked haddock

1.5 litres milk and water, mixed

3tbs sunflower oil

1 onion

5-6 potatoes

1 leek

0.5 tsp nutmeg



Remove skin and check for bones in fish. Put in pan with milk and water and simmer for 5 mins. Heat oil and add chopped onion, sliced leek and chopped potato. Cook 5 -10 mins, stirring frequently. Add seasoning and nutmeg. Pour in strained fish liquid. Simmer until vegetables are very soft. Cool, and then liquidise half contents. Return to pan and carefully stir in flaked fish. Check seasoning and reheat. Just before serving stir in chopped parsley. Serve with crusty bread or rolls.

The All Saints' Singers Forthcoming Concert Sunday March 25th Petite Messe Solennelle. Gioacchino Rossini

For our regular concert goers; another chance to hear this exciting work first performed by The All Saints' Singers in 1992.

The Petite Messe Solennelle has been described as neither little, solemn or particularly liturgical in spirit but there is no doubting that after many years of composing opera, and at the age of 77, the Rossini magic could still work its spell. One simply cannot describe a mass as "fun" and yet this is exactly the expression and feeling the work creates. This work has everything. The light hearted and brilliant rhythmic excitement of the Kyrie, the hushed intensity of the Sanctus, and some of the most remarkable operatic solos ever sung in a liturgical setting.

Rossini specified the work to be performed by a small group of singers with 2 pianos and a harmonium in accompaniment. The inscription in the introduction to the first version of his score reads: "Twelve singers of 3 sexes - men, women, and castrati - will be enough for its performance: rest assured Lord that my cherubim will sing properly and con amore your praises and this little composition which is, alas, the last mortal sin of my old age"

Our pianists for the concert will be Peter McMullin and Gulliver Ralston, both highly acclaimed Oxford musicians and previous performers for the society.

SUTTON COURTENAY CAMERA CLUB

When I was asked to write a potted history of the Camera Club I realised that the club has already existed for 25 years before I joined it, so I asked Joan Clifford, my predecessor as secretary, to fill in the details. She wrote: 'the LODU CLUB (LIGHT – Over, DARK - Under exposed), later to be known as the Sutton Courtenay Camera Club, was formed in 1960.

It started in the sitting room of Ida and Stan Wills, who had the hardware shop in Milton Road for many years. Just seven of us, Stan and Ida, Win Fookes (Treasurer), Florrie Roe, as she was then, Jackie Matthews, Edith Mackay and myself. We were just interested in taking photos and wishing to learn more. A committee was formed with Ida as Chairwoman, and I was 'temporary' Secretary (a job I held for 35 years). If I remember correctly, we paid 1/- a meeting. We gradually gathered more members and grew too big for Ida's sitting room, so we held jumble sales, raffles, etc. to get funds to hire a room at the back of The Fish. At several of these meetings we were joined by a very humorous and pleasant man known only to us as 'Bunny'; it wasn't until sometime later we discovered he was James Robertson Justice, a popular character in British films at the time. However, they were not happy with us at The Fish as we didn't buy many drinks from the bar, so we moved to a room at the old Village Hall. We still ran jumble sales and raffles, etc. — and had to put up the subscriptions to pay for this larger room. We also had outings, rallies and treasure hunts, all with photography included, which everyone enjoyed. We then had cups and trophies for winning competitions, and began having Annual Dinners with the awards presented by a Guest of Honour, together with a certificate designed and drawn by Edith.

By now we were having judges, as until then we had judged the slides ourselves, giving points for Focus, Exposure, Composition, etc. At one time we had nearly 50 members and were now in the Club Room in the new Village Hall. It was a bit crowded at times, but we had fun as well as showing slides. We bought projectors and a large screen from the Wallingford Club, so that we could do an Annual Show in the Village Hall. At this show people in the village were encouraged to enter slides in an Open Competition and the winning slides were put up on the screen and presented with a prize. The hall was so full one year that although we had 100 tickets printed I had to write out more.

By this time we were making Audio Visual shows dissolving the pictures between two projectors. We felt we were getting quite professional! As time went by photography was getting more technical and may of our members had either died, moved away or just left. It was a pity but not everyone could afford the equipment to carry on. Eventually my husband Arthur and I were proud to be made Honorary Members.

I will now pass this on to June for more up to date records of the, by now, 'Sutton Courtenay & District Camera Club'.'

Just after I joined the club in 1985 we had a bit of a boost when Didcot Camera Club closed and we acquired a few new members from Didcot. All our work then involved slides and I was overwhelmed by their magical quality. The Annual Audio Visual Show Joan mentioned had been the attraction and our best advertisement, but gradually over the years fewer club members entered the Slide Show Competition and finding a good evening's entertainment became more of a challenge. Audiences got smaller and new members were a rarity. Then digital cameras began to take over and judges were becoming more used to dealing with prints. Most photographers now spend a lot of time sitting at their computers and many prizewinning pictures have been manipulated. It was a whole new ball game and our older members did not adjust easily. Steadily membership dropped until it was no longer a feasible proposition to continue the club.

We truly made every effort to keep the ball rolling. Calling the club 'Sutton Courtenay & District Camera Club' was one ploy which we hoped might encourage members from other villages or towns. We did a massive amount of advertising. But we needed new blood and some youthful enthusiasm and technical knowledge.

Our final real effort was our 50th year celebration when we had a full year of activity including an exhibition of our work, but the drop in number of members was relentless as year followed year. In spite of this we had very pleasant evenings and were always known as a very friendly club; also we were very competitive in competitions with other local clubs. We are very sad and sorry to see the end of the club but feel it was inevitable.
