area of the field and will include the addition of a grass pump track. The website will contain further information and plans in due course.

Road closures

The Parish Council has had notification of the following road closures over the coming months, in, or in the vicinity of, the village:-

- 27th June to 30th June between 8am and 6pm in Barrett's Way whilst installation of new telecoms pole and cab works are carried out. Diversion signs will be in place. Access for emergency vehicles and properties within the closure will be maintained subject to the progress of the works and upon liaison with the site manager. Pedestrian access will be maintained, and all pedestrians will be accompanied by a member of the workforce.
- 1st July to 6th July between 9am and 3.30pm Abingdon Road Appleford. Road closure and 'No Waiting' restriction to facilitate carriageway patching works. Access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and for those frontages within the closure area, subject to the progress of the works and liaison with the works supervisor.
- Overnight closure 8pm on 1st August until 6am on 2nd August, B4017 Abingdon Road, Drayton, to facilitate carriageway patching works. Limited access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and for frontages within the closed section of road, subject to the progress of the works. The "No Waiting" restriction means that wherever there are in place yellow "No Waiting" cones, you will not be able to park vehicles on the road.

SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL



A warm welcome

^CA₁MAB</sub>^A ^C Our school is an increasingly diverse and vibrant place to be. This month, we welcomed new children who are refugees from Ukraine. They are now staying with a family in the village. It has been good to step back and reflect on how much we have learned since we welcomed our Afghan refugees in October. We have been able to ask those children to advise us on what made a difference and how we can best help our new arrivals to settle in.

When children arrive in school with almost no English, it is a real opportunity to see the universal language of childhood. Children quickly find ways to play and to communicate without words. Smiles and gestures go such a long way. When they feel safe and secure, their language skills develop rapidly. The whole school community can learn from this. have been busy planting seeds. take part All children in gardening in school on а rotational basis. This is a lovely opportunity to connect aspects of the curriculum. Of course, there are the obvious elements of science - understanding growth and life cycles. In addition Mr Greenough covers changing seasons with the children and the



reasons for shorter and longer days, with the impact of this on plant growth and animal habitats. The school grounds are a fantastic eco-system. It is also a chance to develop elements of the personal development curriculum, such as inclusive participation (everyone working together) and self-care (developing interests and hobbies, and understanding the origins of healthy food).

The FOSCS Science Garden project

The Friends of Sutton School Courtenay are creating a science garden. As far as possible, materials are being sourced sustainably. Recycled railway sleepers are being used to construct the planting beds. On Sunday 15th May, children, parents, grandparents and friends all came to school for a working day to move top soil into the beds. We had a wonderful



morning —it was hard work but it was also great to work together on a project that will benefit the whole community. The beds will be planted with sensory plants. An arch will house climbing plants but will also be a useful structure for linking parts of the garden with pulleys and other forces equipment. There will also be a solar fountain, a weather station and a clock with gears.

What's growing Mr Greenough?

Spring is fully underway now and there is a lot to do in the garden. Mr Greenough has been working as with usual а group of children each week, and they

This has been the subject of much discussion for many years now. Indeed, my first piece of casework when elected in May 2013, was to try to get proposals for a buildout to happen. After months of arguing over first, the costing, then the type of buildout and its positioning and finally changes to Highway policy and Covid, the scheme was put on hold. Happily, a change in administration last year breathed new life and money into the proposal such that it will now happen this year. What this scheme, and others, have taught me is that it is impossible to get unanimous agreement on Highway schemes. Concerns about speeding and safety along the whole stretch of this road between Sutton Courtenay and Drayton have been around as long as the buildout. Indeed, I remember walking the road with our MP and OCC Highway officers some years ago to discuss what could be done to prevent any further fatalities.

The two new mobile speeding signs have now been commissioned but there have been further disagreements over the siting of the poles to support the signs. In an effort to get things moving, I have agreed with Highway Officers on the initial sites of the poles, but there is no reason why other poles could not be put up in the future. There is an increasing case for speed signs around Marcham – particularly Sheepstead Rd.

Drayton and Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Parish Councils are considering applying for 20mph zones within their villages.

Finally, if the HIF1 road scheme goes ahead (and there remains some uncertainty), the traffic modelling suggests that the new road would take away a proportion of the traffic currently using the road. It may be little more than a mile of road, but at last things are happening. Hopefully, many of the proposals will make the B4016 a safer road to live beside.

Noise

Electric vehicles may well reduce traffic noise, but the amount of commercial activity in our area is giving rise to increasing numbers of noise complaints over lost sleep and impact on mental health. The trouble with noise is that it comes and goes so unless the measurements are taken at the worst time, the evidence is difficult to pin down. However, it is becoming apparent that the impact of heavy traffic is not just its effect on air quality and physical human health, but increasingly on mental health. It is not clear what can be done about this but it is something Councils need to be taking more seriously.

Elections

For many years, Oxfordshire has been a hotbed of political dispute. At first glance, last week's elections might seem to have heated the atmosphere even further. There is one positive in that politicians across the County are realising the need for compromise and the need to take account of all opinions if they wish to get things done. This has to be a good thing.

Holiday season

It seems we may be in for a long, hot summer. For those able to afford them, holidays postponed or curtailed thanks to Covid are, at last, possible. With the world in its current state, some time in the sunshine, time to reflect and reorganise, may be just what we all need.

I recently exceeded 25,000 constituent cases dealt with since I was elected in December 2019 (to those who don't like it when they don't get a

fast reply, I hope this helps you understand why!). One of the first things to strike me when I became an MP was how the correspondence you get is so different from that in almost any other job, in a good way. Many MPs are councillors before they enter parliament, but even then, my ex-councillor colleagues might have represented 10,000 people at county or equivalent level and typically had a narrow range of topics they were contacted about. MPs represent tens of thousands – Wantage and Didcot is one of the largest constituencies at near 100,000 – and are written to about every issue under the sun; during the pandemic, veteran MPs said the rate of correspondence we received was 3 times the level they'd ever seen. But the more people who contact me with problems the better, as being able to help them is the most rewarding part of the job.

Alongside individual cases I've been supporting four campaigns recently. One is continuing to help the local AEAT Pensioners obtain redress and I am pursuing something that I hope will give them an avenue for this. Another is to help Didcot resident, Sharon Gaffka, with her campaign on spiking. The Government recently moved the GHB drug – used in the majority of spiking cases – up a category so that the prison penalties for carrying it or producing it are increased. I took Sharon to meet the Safeguarding Minister so that she could explain what else she wants to see happen, including better education of young people.

I'm then supporting the Epilepsy Society's Zach's Law campaign to punish people who – believe it or not – send those with photosensitive epilepsy flashing images online in the hope that they will induce a seizure in the recipient. We're hopeful the Online Harms Bill will clamp down on this. I was also pleased to join 70 colleagues in calling on companies not to digitally alter body proportions in pictures, which give people – particularly young people – an unrealistic body image to aspire to, with negative consequences for their mental health.

Visit highlights since I last wrote include Faringdon Junior School, where I took tough questions and learnt about dragons; the new Kingsgrove Café; Mission Motorsport in East Challow, a fabulous charity which supports those affected by military operations; and being in Wallingford for the first day of Wallingford Radio's FM license (tune in at 107.3FM!).

RIVER ROOM 200 CLUB

ADVICE ABOUT LONG COVID

In March, the Office for National Statistics reported that approximately 1.7 million people in the UK were experiencing self-reported long Covid. Over half of these had symptoms such as fatigue, loss of sense of smell and inability to breathe, for at least a year. This can have a far-reaching impact.

In the short term, if you are employed and ill, sick pay may be available and there is information about this on our website www.citizensadvice.org.uk if you think you are not receiving the correct amount. If your income has dropped,

an online benefit calculator will show whether you may be entitled to additional financial help, such as Universal Credit, Council Tax Reduction and Personal Independence Payment (PIP) etc. Details of how to claim benefits, including contact numbers, are on our website. An unexpected drop in income means that debts can quickly mount up and it is better to take action to manage the situation sooner rather than later. You can talk to an adviser on our Debt Helpline: 0800 240 4420. There is also a link to webchat in the debt section of our website.

If you are being dismissed from work due to long-term illness, there is also advice about this on our website, or you can speak to an adviser by phoning Adviceline: 0808 278 7907.

There is ongoing research into long Covid as so much is still unknown, and new groups are forming to provide information and mutual support.

NORDIC WALKING

I asked our walkers last week, 'Do you feel better physically and mentally, following your Nordic walk this morning, than you did before your walk?'.

NEWS FROM THE ABBEY



Some residents in the village have been participating in recent discussions about the future of The Abbey; others however have only limited

information and rumour to rely on. I feel that now is a good time to share developments around The Abbey more widely as it has an important place in the history and life of the village.

Many will know that The Abbey was established about 40 years ago as a centre for spiritual and psychological enquiry with the aim of enabling individuals to seek personal growth so that they could make a deeper contribution to the problems of modern society. Many people have encountered the very special atmosphere of peace that is present at the Abbey. Unfortunately, the lockdown and its social and financial effects, together with the tragic death of a resident, mean that significant changes to life at the Abbey have had to be made.

At present the Abbey is open by appointment with the Administrator, and there is a team of volunteers looking after the place on a 24-hour basis. A number of trustees, company members and friends are urgently reviewing options for the future. One line of enquiry is to look for potential partners to keep the Abbey open as a place of spiritual refreshment and enquiry, and we are contacting other organisations and charities with similar objectives to see if we can work together to find inspiration and the money to make this happen.

What happens if this initiative does not bear fruit? A serious option is that the Abbey is sold, and the charity closed. The other piece of work being done is therefore investigation of the legal and practical work needed if we were indeed to sell. (The charity could continue and become a grant-giving charity to support work by others, which would need further legal work.)

We cannot disguise the fact that the financial demands of maintaining and restoring a Grade I listed building are severe, and tend to increase with time and with stricter heritage requirements. The ongoing costs of maintaining the buildings and grounds must still be met so all this work is urgent, and we are looking to determine our way forward over the next few months. Please keep The Abbey and its future in your thoughts and prayers.

News from the Sutton Courtenay Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council has now resolved that the **Draft Neighbourhood Plan** is ready to move to the consultation stage. Consultation on the draft is a requirement that has to be undertaken before the Plan can be formally submitted to the Vale of White Horse District Council for independent examination. The Parish Council is required to publicise the consultation in a manner that is likely to bring it to the attention of people who live, work or carry on business in the neighbourhood area.

The Council has to:

- give details of where and when the Plan can be inspected and details of how to make representations.
- state the date by which those representations must be received, being not less than 6 weeks from the date on which the draft proposal is first formally publicised.
- consult any consultation body whose interests the Parish Council considers may be affected by the proposals for a neighbourhood development plan.

The documents and all details will be made available on the Parish Council website. Please look out for any notices on the Parish Council Notice Board (outside Hari & Esha's Newsagent on the High Street) and check the Parish Council website. A separate email address will be set up to enable you to respond with your comments.

This is just an early mention of the process; we hope very much that we will be in a position to formally start the consultation on Monday 6 June which will be after this June issue of the Sutton Courtenay News is delivered. Hence this is an early 'heads up'. We are keen to ensure that the six-week consultation does not run in to the summer holiday season.

Cyberhood Watch

NHW have teamed up with Avast, an IT security company, to create **Cyberhood Watch**, an initiative to help people learn more about the cybersecurity risks every time you go online.

Cyberhood Watch has reported that research by Avast has found that 85% of people have accepted cookies on a website without reading any of the policies, while more than a third (37%) said they have done so, only to later discover they had agreed to something they wish they hadn't.

They offer these tips:

- 1. Understand cookies: they are small bits of information that help computers interact with websites. They allow websites to remember information, such as logins or items stored in an online shopping cart. They also record your browsing activity so advertisers can use it for targeted advertising.
- 2. If you want to limit the information websites can access, choose a browser that blocks third-party cookies (those created by websites other than the one you're visiting) by default.
- It's good digital hygiene to clear cookies regularly. You can do so in the setting or preferences of your browser of choice. Deleting cookies helps to keep your browser running smoothly.
- 4. Some websites allow you to control what cookies to accept or reject via a pop-up window that appears before you access them. It is good practice to only accept the cookies required for websites to function, such as language and region, and reject those related to advertising and tracking.
- 5. For more privacy-conscious people, consider rejecting all cookies but expect website performance issues. Alternatively, choose a secure browser with antitracking technology to block web trackers, including cookies, to minimise companies' amount of online surveillance.

Fake Emails

Action Fraud has received 752 reports in four days relating to fake emails purporting to be from **Ofgem**. The emails state that the recipient is eligible for a rebate as a result of a newly announced government scheme. The links in the emails lead to genuine-looking websites that are designed to steal your personal and financial information.

• Remember, your bank, or any other official organisation, won't ask you to share personal information over email or text. If you need to check that it's a genuine message, contact the company using details from their official website or app.

Courier Fraud

In 2021 alone, 181 Thames Valley residents reported a courier fraud with total losses of $\pounds1,506,131$.

Typically, courier fraudsters target their victims by claiming to be a police officer or a member of staff from a victim's bank and they often pressure people into making quick financial decisions to assist with fictitious investigations.

This crime is often specifically targeted at older people, by exploiting their trust in the police and their bank, in order to steal from them. Courier fraudsters are nearly always part of broader, sophisticated criminal gangs.

Police and banks will never ask for full passwords and pin numbers or ask for money or goods to be handed or transferred to them.

Anybody being cold called and asked for personal details, to withdraw money or purchase high value items, is urged to end the call, and seek advice from trusted friends or family members, or to call their banks directly using the number on their bankcards.

Water safety advice is being issued by Oxfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service over concerns about the number of people getting into difficulty in the county's waterways and lakes.

Across the UK, in 2020, over 250 people drowned needlessly and thousands more suffered injury, some life changing, through near-drowning experiences.

Oxfordshire is criss-crossed by rivers, streams, canals. Activities that are known to lead to the highest number of fatalities are **walking** or **running beside a waterway** and **swimming, jumping or diving in**. **Cyclists** are also at risk. For further information: oxfordshire.gov.uk/water-safetyadvice

Smart motorways are up and running in many places across the country, including parts of the Thames Valley. What used to be the hard shoulder is now a fourth lane and there are overhead signs above the lanes. These will display important information such as variable speed limits and lane closures.

It's important that you obey these signs for your safety and that of other road users. You'll see a red 'X' if a lane is closed. This can often be set far in advance of an incident to help those who are dealing with it. Make sure to leave gaps in the traffic to allow people to filter into an open lane.

Driving in a closed lane could result in a fixed penalty of up to £100 and three points.

Launching the '20 is Plenty' Campaign for Sutton Courtenay

You may be aware that now Parish and Town Councils can pass resolutions supporting 20mph speed restrictions where people live, work and play. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) is changing the pace of our roads to make streets safer, encourage residents to walk and cycle more and to reduce noise and pollution.

OCC has been proactive and set aside some funding for implementing a 20mph speed limit if applicable. It has invited parish councils to consider implementing a '**20** is **plenty**' campaign and make an evidence-based application to restrict speeds to 20mph through their communities.

Measures supported will be from a simple change of speed signs to more complex solutions in areas that can range from a whole village or a single street. Speed cameras and road humps will not be used.

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council has asked NAG5, the Neighbourhood Area Group that covers Appleford, Drayton and Sutton Courtenay, to progress the work needed for the parish council to make an application to OCC. OCC wants evidence that the community is engaging with the 20mph campaign and working to gain compliance. This requires raising the profile of the campaign.

Some suggestions are –

- Display bin stickers, car boot stickers and bike stickers
- Village School Sign Project
- Use of Street Tag
- Ask residents to drive at 20 and identify 'pace makers'
- Find ambassadors who will spread the word
- Carry out local 20mph surveys
- Spread the word
- Posters in local shops/notice boards etc
- Collect company names of commercial vehicles driving through the village & contact them to see if they would be 'pace makers' and drive at 20mph.
- Contact local businesses to join the campaign
