Hobbyhorse Lane North Site

Savills, who is acting as the Planning Consultant on behalf of HarperCrewe Ltd. to develop the Hobbyhorse Lane North site, requested a meeting with the Parish

Council. Savills have agreed to attend the Council's 4th November meeting to give a presentation and answer questions. The meeting will start at the earlier time of 7pm and members of the public are welcome to attend.

Final call for grant applications for 2026-27

In the October edition we summarised our grant application process, the final deadline for this year is 9th November 2025. If you are a member of a local group which would benefit from a grant, please complete the form available on the Parish Council website and/or contact the Parish Clerk (details below).

Councillor Vacancy

Sutton Courtenay Parish Council can have a maximum of 11 Councillors. At present there are two vacancies and the Council is looking to fill the positions by co-option. Individuals who are on the electoral register and who live or work in the parish or within 3 miles of the parish can be considered for co-option. If you are interested in working in a small team to contribute to local life, taking forward projects which benefit people across the parish, then please contact the Clerk.

Please note the role is unpaid, as a minimum you would be expected to attend monthly meetings and check your Council email account at least once a week. You would be asked to take an active role in a couple of areas of the Council's work across recreational amenities, the cemetery, planning policy, community infrastructure (defibs, benches, bins), community events and representing the Parish Council at meetings with local charitable and commercial organisations.

Council meetings and contact details

Members of the public are welcome to attend Council meetings. The dates of the next meetings are Tuesday 4^{th} November *7pm start*, (18^{th} November Finance), and 2^{nd} December at 7.15pm. Meetings are normally held in the Committee Room at Sutton Courtenay Village Hall.

OLLY GLOVER MP



The past month has been a particularly busy and productive period, marked by the Liberal Democrat Conference, ongoing parliamentary work, and a range of constituency engagements.

Most notably, I'm honoured to have been appointed as the Liberal Democrats' Transport Spokesperson, and my team and I are currently coordinating the transition to this new role.

At the Liberal Democrat Conference in Bournemouth, it was a pleasure to meet so many people and discuss the needs of residents and communities in Didcot and Wantage with national charities and organisations. I was especially pleased to contribute to policy discussions and outline key local issues. Particular highlights included interviews with ITV and LBC, taking part in a Q&A on men and boys' mental health and wellbeing, and proposing a new policy to protect the UK's space sector - citing the vital role of Culham and Harwell in supporting our national economy.

In Parliament, I attended an event focused on the future of the UK Space Strategy, spoke at the High Speed Rail Group's Political Engagement Network meeting, and met with Wave Optics, a manufacturing site based in the constituency. I also attended the launch of the new PlaceShapers report exploring the potential of housing associations, and continued my ongoing work as a member of the Transport Committee.


Back in the constituency, I met with the new parking regulators and the Orchard Centre in Didcot along with the Centre's manager, where I pressed them on the new parking payment method, antisocial behaviour, Christmas lights this year, and traffic issues — I will be meeting with them again and reporting back on progress. Additionally, I enjoyed meeting young people from Youth Challenge, and attended a climate event in Oxford with constituents. I have also recently released a health survey, which hundreds have already responded to. The link can be found here: oxonlibdems.typeform.com/25healthsurvey.

Outside work, I managed to take a short cycling trip across Europe - a great reminder of the potential for improving cycling infrastructure here at home. There is so much we can learn from our European partners about safe, accessible, and sustainable travel.

DISTRICT & COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Following last month's revelation about the sky-rocketing tripling of costs for the new locally funded reservoir which will be passed on to our bills for many years to come, I am taking a motion to council to request the Secretary of State to direct Thames Water to re-evaluate, against a range of measures, the options for their Water Resource Management Plan compared with other options, such as the Severn-Thames Transfer Pipe, which probably now make better sense, in order to save us from another national infrastructure white elephant like HS2. Public consultation by Thames Water opens on 28th October and runs to 13th January, and I encourage everyone to take an interest. I will provide more details next month.

The new HIF1 road from the A34 Didcot/Milton Interchange past Appleford, across the Thames to Culham and on past Clifton Hampden is moving along swiftly through detailed design; 8 new detail planning applications have been submitted this month, which I am working through carefully with local parish councils — particularly Appleford whose residents are most concerned by its impact both during construction and once built.

For Appleford, we have been pushing for improvements for the train station and services. We have submitted requests to the OxRail Strategy consultation for more trains to stop there as well as the introduction of a Sunday service. I am pushing for more services to start in line with the HIF1 construction as the best alternative to getting around the road works. However, to make the station usable, it needs to be much more accessible, and we are developing plans in line with HIF1 to open a safe path over the bridge next to the platform exits and onto the adjoining safe cycling and walking network enabled by HIF1. The latest piece in the puzzle is that FCC have agreed to provide land for a new car park for the station which will enable users from Sutton Courtenay and elsewhere to benefit from the station and help drive demand, thus reinforcing the need for a more comprehensive train service. Fingers crossed!

Next meeting 21st October

Linked to this, I am now chair of the Abingdon Localities group, which looks at council developments and plans across the area. HIF1 presents an excellent opportunity for improvements beyond Appleford too. Work continues to improve the Hobbyhorse Lane byway across to Sutton Courtenay, and the route to the Europa School is being considered, with improvements at the Tollgate Road A415 crossing already in design stage and funded for completion. The new cycle and footpath linking Abingdon from Peep'O'Day Lane through to Milton Park and onto Steventon is also resourced, and its feasibility study starts this autumn. The main sticking point will probably be agreeing with local landowners to give up a strip of land to enable it to be built. I hope this is straightforward.

At the same time, there will be a feasibility study for what to do with the Steventon bridge. This will include local consultation. Remedial repair work finished in the summer, but it remains restricted to one way traffic because of concerns that re-opening it fully will cause further damage. There are lots of options, and I favour a solution like going under a narrow rail bridge — two way car traffic is possible but big vehicles have to use the centre of the road forcing others to give way. Let's see what's best.

The last thing to report is that the Planning Committee threw out the application to extend the Waste Transfer Facility at Sutton Courtenay from 2030 to 2050. This is good as it reinforces the overall plan for restoring the whole landfill site from 2030, rather than letting things go on indefinitely. Although restoration is likely to include clean energy developments, this is considerably better than a dirty waste site. I will work with the landowners and the council to ensure plans meet our needs as well as theirs and strategic energy infrastructure needs.



Our Year 6 pupils set the tone early. Thanks to our new handwriting approach and raised expectations, nearly half the class earned their pens within weeks. 
Meditation at the Abbey

From the Ministry Team

November marks the end of the Church calendar year; it is a month with many occasions to look back and

remember. First in the month, is All Saints' Day, previously known as All-Hallows, meaning holy. (Halloween is the old English for holy eve). The festival of All Saints is when Christians celebrate those who have been an inspiration in their life of faith and an example of encouragement for others to follow Jesus.

All Saints is followed by All Souls. This is a special service to many who share in the loss of loved ones. It is a time to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life and love, encouragement or who nurtured us in faith.

The noise and spectacle of fireworks on Guy Fawkes night reminds us to:

> Remember, remember, the fifth of November Gunpowder, treason, and plot; I see no reason why gunpowder treason Should ever be forgot.

"Lest we forget" (Rudyard Kipling) is often to be found inscribed on our War Memorials. It is also recited, along with "their name liveth forever more" (Ecclesiasticus) in Remembrance Day services. Their traditional use dates back to 1919 and was meant to encapsulate a national obligation to remember the sacrifices made rather than to glorify victory. The fourth verse of the poem "For the Fallen" by Lawrence Binyon, (written 1914) has influenced the way in which the nation has responded in times of crises and tragedies:

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:
Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun and in the morning
We will remember them.

Silences have increasingly become the standard response to terror attacks and disasters, whether of nature or of human making. Some observers say that we are having more of them, because we want to be seen to care; it demonstrates to the people involved that they are not alone. Not only do I care, WE care. The impact of a football stadium crowd or busy shopping centre suddenly falling silent is an impressive message, and an impactful gesture.

The lighting of candles and the laying of flowers and wreaths are more lasting, visual signs of remembering. Rituals such as these are important for the well-being of both individuals and communities. Our churches are here in good times and in bad, offering space to find peace throughout the year, and places for remembering. *Rev Rosie Bruce*

IMPROVEMENTS TO SUTTON COURTENAY'S COUNTRYSIDE PATHS

I have an update on the work FCC have in-hand, or completed recently, to improve our public rights of way to the east of the village.

Actions Completed:

BOAT 9 – Hobbyhorse Lane (between the Village Hall and Haul Road):

- FCC used a flail mower to trim back the verge vegetation where possible.
- FCC removed any metal objects sticking out of the surface.
- FCC have cleared the plastic pipe and other waste materials from the verges. The works were completed before the end of September 2025.

Footpath 7 – North from Hobbyhorse Lane (diagonally across the corner of the landfill):

- FCC removed the fence across the right of way at the southern end.
- o FCC cut a 2-metre-wide path through the crop to reinstate the legal route of the right of way but have stated they don't currently intend to stop people walking along the edge of the field which is FCC land and not a right of way.

BOAT 10 – Old Wallingford Way (between the Tarmac Haul Road and the Village):

 FCC will use a flail mower to trim back the verge vegetation.

Footpath 7 – South from Old Wallingford Way towards Hobbyhorse Lane:

- O To help us move the path back to the DMS (legally designated) route and discourage illegal use of the path by motorbikes etc., FCC has cut back the overgrowth and undergrowth between the PRoW gate at the Wallingford Way (BOAT 10) end and the stile at the Southeast corner of the Recreation Ground.
- FCC also cut back the vegetation around the pedestrians' gate and closed the large gates.

FCC report they have done their best to cut back the vegetation as much as they can at the moment. During October, they will use a side arm mower to cut back their hedges. They will try to clear this area a bit more, but there are some larger trees on the footpath line that may need some attention from Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) as anything growing on the path is OCCs responsibility to remove.

This and any other issues on public rights of way should be reported using the OCC footpath reporting site publicrightsofway.oxfordshire.gov.uk/standardmap.aspx

Actions Outstanding:

Footpath 7 – South from Hobbyhorse Lane towards the Power Station:

- FCC will do further hedge cutting and brush cutting between the two fence lines.
- o FCC will have removed all the barbed wire on the fences by the end of September 2025.

BOAT 9 – Hobbyhorse Lane (between the Village Hall and Haul Road):

• FCC will to bury the exposed pipes and cables crossing the route.

A follow up meeting is being arranged with OCC, FCC and Thames Water for November. The time, date and venue will be confirmed by OCC soon. This will be a public meeting and anyone interested will be welcome.

If anyone has any questions I don't mind if they contact me via Sutton Courtenay News, and I will answer if I can or follow up with FCC, Thames Water or OCC!

Our next meeting with Thames Water and others, to discuss the works required to repair Hobbyhorse Lane has been confirmed for 2pm, 11 November 2025 in Sutton Courtenay Village Hall.

Importantly this meeting is open to the public and will be also be attended by the key people from Oxfordshire County Council, responsible for the oversight and surface management of our Public Rights of Way. We have also invited FCC, the waste management company responsible for the landfill site between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford and the PRoW that cross this land.


This meeting is important because, after years of campaigning, the key parties responsible for the upkeep and condition of the PRoW to the east of our village have accepted that more needs to be done and have agreed to meet with us to discuss who should be doing what and when. The focus of the meeting will be on Hobbyhorse Lane, this is an important path connecting Appleford and Sutton Courtenay without having to use the B4016, Appleford Road, which can be dangerous for cyclists, walkers and equestrians.

This initiative is also supported by our County and District Councillor, Peter Stevens and our Member of Parliament Olly Glover.

Rest in Peace

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who died recently:

Margaret Mary Hamilton (Maggie) who died on 6th September 2025 was born on 24th February 1945 to Fred and Alice Poole in Barton-under-Needwood in Staffordshire. Her mother was the Nanny and Housekeeper to the local village doctor and the family lived in a part of the doctor's house. Margaret grew up alongside her younger brother, Gordon, and she always said she had a very happy childhood with lots of animals — cats, dogs, chickens, pigs, a pony and a donkey! Her love of animals was something which never left her and for many years, right up until her death, she was actively involved in volunteering and raising money for the Donkey Sanctuary.

Margaret disliked school but she loved belonging to the Red Cross of which she was a member for many years. She also enjoyed singing in the local church choir. She left school at Christmas 1959, when she was just 14 years old and went to work as a housemother in a local residential school for deaf children, a job she stayed in until she was 18. Even at such a young age she was building lifelong friendships and she remained in contact for the rest of her life with some of the children she had looked after. She then went to work at a local factory — cycling 10 miles there and 10 miles back each day. From there she moved to a local chicken farm which was where she met her future husband, Roderick. It wasn't exactly love at first sight, according to Roderick, but something clicked and they were married in 1965 and moved to Hayley Green near Ascot.

A year later they moved to Sutton Courtenay, when Roderick started working for Frank Cauldwell. It was then that they had their daughter, Geraldine. Margaret continued to work; at night as a cleaner at the Culham Laboratories, and during the day as a child-minder. Nathan came along in 1969 and Margaret then went to work the evening shift at the plastic factory on Milton Park. Whilst there she met a gentleman who offered her a job at a new chemical factory and she later became a part-owner of the business, until she sold her shares. Margaret then went to Securicor as a nightcleaner until she became Assistant Manager and had to work days. She left there and went to work for Mars as a vending machine operator because the hours fitted in with the children going to school. Her next job was with the Oxford Intensive School of English collecting the students from Paris and Germany until she met another gentleman who worked for a holiday company who got her a job as a travel guide. She went onto work for them for over 25 years. She loved the job – making many friends, visiting many places all over Europe and seeing lots of concerts performed by stars including Phil Collins, Cliff Richard and Pavarotti. She also worked in Disneyland, Paris twice a year and the Edinburgh Tattoo every summer.

Always sociable and outgoing, the family hosted a lot of house parties over the years – although Margaret could not be described as the best of cooks. As Roderick said, she was a functioning cook. One memorable meal, served to Christine and Nathan, involved a 'potato crumble'. It should have been apple but Margaret failed to notice that she had defrosted potatoes rather than apple from the freezer! Geraldine and Nathan both remember 'Russian Roulette Tea', where Margaret would open unlabelled tins and it was just luck if it was peaches rather than beans! She was, however, very green-fingered, although Roderick claims he did all the work in the garden! She was a keen competitor in the Sutton Courtenay Village Show - winning many prizes over the years. She was notorious for pinching cuttings from plants whenever she visited a stately home and liked what she saw. She was a bit of a hoarder. She never said no to anything when people gave her stuff to sell at car boot sales - which she seemed to attend almost every weekend. Again, it was more about meeting people than selling stuff.

Over the years they had many happy family holidays – always camping in a tent – apart from one year when they purchased what they described as a chicken coop on wheels or, in other words, the smallest touring caravan in the world. Despite her busy working life and looking after the family Margaret managed to be actively involved in many aspects of village life. She was a member of the Young Wives and eventually the WI which had only recently morphed into the Tuesday Club under Margaret's care. She supported the Community Brunch and the Community Café held in the River Room. She always came to the Knit and Natter - but spent more time nattering than she ever did knitting. She was a volunteer driver and spent a lot of her time taking people to medical appointments or to the airport. So many people have reason to be grateful for Margaret and her willingness to help in any way she could.

Several years ago, she became the guardian to Edgar, a young Russian school boy at Kingham School. He and his friends would come and stay with Margaret and Roderick every holiday. Tragically he was killed in a car accident in Oxford but, because he had loved England so much, his parents decided he should be buried in Sutton Courtenay and Margaret kept in touch with his family and lovingly tended his grave in the cemetery on their behalf. However, Margaret was no plaster saint. She had her own strengths and weaknesses. She was a great storyteller – and was not afraid to tell a joke against herself. She was self-deprecating and she secretly enjoyed being teased by her family especially the grandchildren! She could also be stubborn – once she had made her mind up it was hard to change her opinion. Her timekeeping was dreadful and, although she always had a colourful tale to tell giving the reason she was late - over the years the family learnt to always tell her where she had to be an hour ahead of time and she did improve in later years.

After 35 years working on the farm Roderick was made redundant and they bought a house in Bradstocks Way. They became grandparents to Fraser, Edgar and Erin who Margaret always said she was lucky enough to see growing up. She loved looking after them - although they always went home tired because they had too much fun with Grandma to go to bed! She did her best to go to every sports event or play that they took part in and I know that she was immensely proud of all three of them. Margaret's and Roderick's marriage was an enduring partnership as they celebrated their 60th Wedding Anniversary at The Swan with friends and family - just days before Margaret died. Although she was in acute pain she was determined to be there celebrating with those closest to her and about whom she cared so much. Margaret, although 80, seemed to have the energy and enthusiasm of someone so much younger.

I first encountered Margaret when she was working in the shop over 22 years ago and I had just arrived in the village as the new Vicar. It soon became clear that she knew more about me than I did! I discovered that she was the fount of all knowledge about this village and its people – or as Nathan described her – the Town Crier. This wasn't just curiosity – she genuinely cared about people. She was always friendly, sociable and outgoing, looking out for the needs of others. She loved to meet people and keep up to date with all the news. She was always generous with her time and her money in helping others and serving her community.

This is an edited extract from the address and tribute given to Margaret at her funeral held in All Saints' Church on Tuesday 30th September 2025 by the Reverend Canon Helen Kendrick, when the church was filled to over-flowing with family, friends and neighbours from across the village and the country.

Gena Pedge (nee Buckle), who died on 31st August 2025, was born on 9th September 1956 in The Warren, Abingdon and grew up on the Drayton Road, Sutton Courtenay. She first met her husband Steve at the Sutton Courtenay weirs in 1972 when he impressed her as he was canoeing down the open weirs. They met again at the local village dance the following weekend and continued to meet for a few months before going steady and eventually marrying in All Saints' Church on 13th May 1978. Gena trained to be a hairdresser at Richards hair salon in Abingdon, and subjected Steve to many new hair styles through those training years. Their first child Cathie was born on 20th July 1982 and their second, Hannah on 31st July 1985. Tom arrived on 16th May 1991 a Thursday, the day Gena's aunties would come over to have their weekly shampoo and sets done. Midway through doing their hair, Gena telephoned Steve at work to say she had gone into labour, the baby was on its way. He made a mad dash home only to find that she was still hairdressing! A true professional she had to finish what she had started!

In 1993 Gena lost her father to cancer and it was a tough time for the whole family. As a farmer, Reg was always busy, other than the odd weekend he had a little time to spend with the grandchildren. Having just retired he had so many plans for them. Grandma was to be the saving grace, teaching the grand children how to cook, sew and even knit. She often had them overnight, but only one at a time! Grandma became a central figure in the family. Alongside Gena, the two very caring figures were to be great influencers on the children. As the children got older and less dependent on her, Gena decided to go back to work, not as a hairdresser, but as a nursing assistant. She worked as a bank nurse for the NHS, and took shifts in many of the Oxfordshire hospitals, but it was working in maternity that she enjoyed the most. Gena worked at Wantage maternity unit for a number of years, helping to bring new life into the world. With her caring nature and her own experiences of childbirth she was in her element, sadly this came to end when the unit closed. The next chapter of her working life would prove to be a bit more challenging. Still working for the NHS Gena would take on a role looking after adults with learning difficulties. This entailed taking them out into the community and doing day to day things such as going to the shops, cinema or just going for a walk. Some days would be a challenge for her, but offloading to Steve seemed to help ease the burden. That is what you call teamwork and what marriage is all about. Helping each other through life's troubles.

In 2020 face to face work stopped and Gena was now in the office phoning clients to make sure they were OK. This spelt the end of this particular job, Gena could not cope with office work and decided to move on. Another support worker suggested she contact Pennyhooks Farm, a trust that supports young people and adults on the Autistic Spectrum. This turned out to be the dream job for Gena, working with animals and people who needed her support, she was in her element. The other love in Gena's life were the grandchildren, Rory, Bella, Noah and Koby. Gena loved to spoil them, whether it was buying them clothes, sweets or other treats, they were always treated equally. If they wanted a breakfast cereal they were not allowed at home she would buy it. Thursdays would become grandchildren day. Family commitment was not just limited to immediate family. Gena's commitment to her aunts and uncles was just as important, arranging doctors' appointments, hospital visits, getting them their shopping, the list goes on. Gena's ability to care about people knew no bounds, it even extended to animals and birds. She kept ducks and chickens, if one of them fell ill it had to go to the vets. It would have to be given a chance of further life, if possible, and Steve's wallet bears the scars!

Over the last six years Steve and Gena decided that it was their time to travel while they had good health and their adventures with friends took them to Kenya on a seven day safari followed by six days in Zanzibar; then a trip to Sri Lanka where the highlight of the holiday for Gena was to witness a turtle laying her eggs on the beach, she was in awe of this event. Once the turtle had finished laying her eggs the

beach warden came and removed them and took them to a safe area where they would be hatched. Gena asked the warden if she could go and see the hatching area. Once at the hatching centre she had the chance to release some new hatchlings. If you could picture this in your mind - Gena placing newly hatched little turtles gently on the sand and watching them scuttle off to the sea – making sure they made it, to see the broad smile on her face was a picture worth seeing. Trips to India and then to Sorrento in Italy followed. The villa was beautiful. There were chickens and cats at the villa, Gena's caring nature kicked in, she was concerned the cats and kittens looked thin and needed fattening up. By the end of the holiday the cats would be lined up in the morning waiting to be fed, she made sure the chickens were also looked after giving them extra food. Every holiday was filled with laughter.

Gena was a modest, unassuming person who nevertheless let her light shine brightly before others. She seemed to have an infinite capacity for caring and touched the lives of people in so many different ways. She would have been surprised and delighted by the love shown by all those who attended her funeral in All Saints' Church.
