Editorial: At the last Parish Council Meeting the opportunity was given to people to express their views on possible closure of the Power Station road. (See report on page 3). There is little to be gained at this stage by prolonging the arguments in the pages of the Sutton Courtenay News. Both the Milton Trading Estate and the C.E.G.B. were contacted after information was received that the C.E.G.B. was to lease land on either side of the road to the Trading Estate. A representative of the Trading Estate would make no comment on the matter, but a C.E.G.B. official stated that the road would remain open at present, and no action would be taken until a decision was made by the new County Council. In view of this, we would urge you, if you feel strongly either way (and the News tries to remain impartial!) to write to your County Councillor, Colonel R. Norman, Mill House, Milton, as the matter would now appear to be in the hands of the new Oxfordshire County Council.

.....On a lighter note, I would like to find out something about the history of the pubs in the village - I could do a pub crawl but would then be incapable of remembering anything! Morlands Brewery kindly supplied me with some factual details but if anyone has some good stories, information, etc. about the village's pubs they would be very welcome.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - March 5th 1974
(Including public meeting about Power Station Road)

At this meeting members of the public were invited to attend and speak during the discussion of the Power Station Road. This aroused great interest and the Village Hall was full to capacity. Mr. Farrant, representing the Oxfordshire County Council and Department of the Environment was also present. The Chairman opened with a brief summary of the situation. He said it was not the wish of the Parish Council to have the road closed, but that the C.E.G.B. are considering closure owing to difficulties with the barrier and over maintenance. Berkshire County Council had decided not to adopt it as they consider the proposed Milton-Didcot Link Road would be a more serviceable route.

The feeling of the meeting seemed strongly in favour of keeping the road open, at any rate for commuters between Sutton Courtenay and Didcot, for the facilities offered and for essential services such as Fire and Police, etc. The arguments in favour of closure included a decrease in traffic through the village and danger to school-children in Harwell Road.

Mr. Farrant said that his Department would note the views expressed, and, if they took over the road, it would probably be made up to first-class standard, which might attract considerable through traffic from surrounding areas. Finally Councillor Malein moved a proposal that the Parish Council is in favour of the road being kept open and maintained for the use of Sutton Courtenay residents but does not wish for a first-class road that would encourage traffic from outlying areas.

The Council then proceeded with further business as follows:-

Correspondence:

1. A letter from the Football Club asking permission to hold a Six-a-Side Tournament on the Recreation Ground on Sat. & Sun. May 11th and 12th, which was granted.
2. A letter from the Pre-School Playgroup asking for a donation towards equipment, possibly a book-case and books. This was regretfully refused.
3. A letter from the Friends of Sutton Courtenay concerning land in High Street. Councillor Smith has offered to demolish the skeleton of the burnt-out barn, free of charge, provided he can dispose of the material. This information has been forwarded to Mr. Caudwell. The Friends also expressed their approval of the improvement work started on the Village Green.
4. A letter from Mr. Curd, Treasurer of the Fund for providing the Old People's Christmas Dinner, following Mrs. Curran's request for a donation. He said that the total cost exceeds £200. A decision was postponed to a later date.

The Council felt that it would help them if, in future, all requests for donations could be received by November of each year, so as to allocate available funds for the following year.

5. A letter from the S.E.B. estimating cost of proposed new street lights:- Town Close £84; Hobbyhorse Lane £36; Churchmere Road £36. Also, too late to be included, another street light asked for in the lane leading to the Recreation Ground. The Council agreed that all these sites should be examined before proceeding further.

Planning Applications:

- 1) Grain Store for Mr. Caudwell. Concern expressed at the size, also lest it be used for grain drying.
- 2) Forecourt Kiosk, Owen's Garage for Mr. Basson. Objection on grounds of urbanization of the village.
- 3) Extension to form living-room and bedroom for Mr. Priestley, 18 The Green.
No comment.

The question of purchasing a hand-cart for village cleaning was postponed as Mr. Bayer, owing to ill-health, will not be able to undertake the work. It was agreed that we advertise again in the Sutton Courtenay News for a maintenance man, and, should there be no response, the Vale of White Horse District Council would undertake the work at a charge of a pound per hour.

Future Meetings: The Council agreed that future meetings should be on the first Tuesday of every month - next meeting April 2nd. The Annual Parish Meeting (at which parishioners may speak) and Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council will be on May 7th.

Going into OXFORDSHIRE

The changeover takes place on April 1st. You may like to note that the new Vale of White Horse District Offices will be located at the Abbey House, Abingdon. The former R.D.C. offices at 66 Bath Street will become the Department of the Environment.

Go-ahead for Footpaths Project

Proposals for footpaths projects totalling £18,000 have been agreed by the new Oxfordshire's Highways Committee. This includes a footpath between Sutton Courtenay and Milton at an estimated cost of £6,100.

The HEIGHT AND WEIGHT restriction on vehicles imposed by the Berkshire County Council comes into force in High Street on April 1st.

FRIENDS OF SUTTON COURTENAY

The Committee of the Friends of Sutton Courtenay held a meeting on 18th February. The first item to be discussed was the placing of a seat and planting of two trees in High Street. It was decided to go ahead with the work and place the inscription plate at a later date. The Chairman reported that he had written to the Clerk of the Parish Council regarding the skeleton of the burnt-out barn in High Street, and a member of the Committee offered to dismantle the skeleton free of charge provided he could retain the steelwork. A letter was also sent to the Parish Council protesting against the application to demolish the barns in High Street.

Among other items discussed were the use of weed killer on the verges; the weight limit of lorries passing through the village; the dumping of rubbish; the garage at the Swan and the work done in the churchyard and on the village green.
