

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EDITORIAL: On October 17th the Sutton Courtenay News held its A.G.M. Details of the Committee, etc. will be published later. More important are the problems we discussed such as the rising cost of production. During the past year the cost of paper and other materials has risen from approximately £60 to £140. In addition, mechanical troubles have forced us to consider the purchase of another Duplicator, probably a re-conditioned one, cost as yet unknown. Our only regular income is from advertisements, and we have recently appealed to organisations for a donation for the year 1975. Individuals may also like to contribute and we plan to put a box in the Post Office (what would we do without the Post Office?) for any gifts, large or small. JOHN MASON SCHOOL BUSES

The 8.15 a.m. bus is a public service bus intended to cope with the increased numbers of children going to John Mason School. From the numbers being left behind it is clear that the service provided is inadequate, whilst on some occasions the bus has not run at all. The Headmaster has asked for co-operation at this difficult time as he is doing everything possible to ensure the service improves. It would be helpful if all incidents could be reported to the school so that they can be passed on to the Bus Company and the Education Authority.

The bus drivers themselves have complained about the mis-behaviour of pupils whilst travelling on the buses. So if YOU have children using the buses, please make them realise they are letting down the school, and their families and seriously endangering the lives of many people by their behaviour.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING. October 8th 1974

The following were among matters discussed:-

The County Forestry Officer, the Chairman and the Clerk met to examine sites where trees might be planted and these were on the grass verges outside 57 and 61 High Street, also on the verges at both entrances to Bradstocks Way, and a replacement for a tree outside the shops. All these sites are subject to approval by the County Council and nearby residents.

F.P.13 Barrier - The Clerk was asked to write to the County Surveyor explaining that the new barrier prevents access by prams and asking whether it can be altered.

Correspondence

1. A letter from the County Archivist re copy of Enclosure Map - it could be reproduced 2/3 size at cost of £1, or full size for £9. It was agreed to order a copy at £1 so that it might be examined.

2. The Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils asked that names should be sent in as proposed Governors of Secondary Schools, and Mrs. Thompson's name was put forward by the Parish Council for consideration.

3. The Parish Council has already applied for a £2,500 loan sanction in 1975 for the Village Hall extension. In connection with this matter a letter was received from Mr. Bird, Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, enclosing a plan for the proposed extension to form a Bar & Lounge with space for storage at a later date, along part of the east wall of the Hall. Councillors were of the opinion that it was false economy to add these extensions piecemeal and that extra storage space should be included. It was agreed that the Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council should attend the next meeting of the Village Hall Committee to put forward these views.

5. Mrs. Fletcher wrote to complain about the noise made by the Pop Group in Mr. Astor's barn. Councillor Mrs. MacKenzie is to contact Mr. Astor's secretary about the repair of the sound-proofing, but some of the noise came from a private party.

Among matters raised by Councillors

The Vice-Chairman suggested permission be sought by the owners of the hedge in front of Tullis Close to root out the elm saplings which have contracted Dutch Elm Disease.

Councillors Ward and Mrs. Thompson drew the Council's attention to the chaos existing over the picking up of schoolchildren for John Mason School. Children are frequently left behind which in some cases encourages truancy, and the problem is aggravated by undisciplined behaviour of children on the buses. The Clerk was asked to write to the Education Authority's Transport Officer, and the Headmaster of the school.

NEW LIFE AT THE ABBEY - THE NAMIBIA PEACE CENTRE

After a long spell of occupancy by the Ockenden Venture, whose history in Sutton Courtenay ought to be reported in some future issue of S.C.News, the Abbey has new tenants. Bishop Colin Winter, who was living with his family in the Abbey some two years ago, and has since been living at St. Margaret's Vicarage in Oxford, has now been granted a lease. The Abbey will become the English centre for the work of the Diocese, which covers the whole of what used to be called German South West Africa, and is now (outside the Republic of South Africa) known as Namibia.

Bishop Winter and his family and helpers will be the focus of a multi-racial Community which will welcome short and long term visitors from Southern Africa, and will also wish to have active contact with Sutton Courtenay people and other local friends. The heating plant at the Abbey has broken down, and there is much other preliminary work to be done; but the Bishop expects to be in residence well before Christmas. He is still recovering from a serious illness, and when well, will again be in great demand elsewhere; but we have made one firm booking for him in All Saints' Church, where he is to preach at our United Service on Sunday, January 19th in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. We welcome this new Community, and in particular the Winter family, and pray for God's blessing on this important new venture. (An article on the Peace Centre, by Bishop Winter's American secretary, Miss Anne Lowell, should have appeared in the Abingdon Herald on October 10th, and may yet be in print before this note).
