PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Proposed Housing rear of 28 to 72 Milton Road

At the last Parish Council meeting, Bidwells, agents on behalf of Redrow Homes Ltd gave a presentation about proposals to erect 85 dwellings on land north of Milton Road. Many local residents attended the meeting to hear the presentation, and the Council thanks you for your interest and participation. A new vehicular access and path would be on the site of the current property no. 68 Milton Road with another pedestrian access between 42 and 44 Milton Road. In accordance with planning requirement approximately 40% of the new homes would be affordable homes with tenure to be agreed. The developer expects to lodge a planning application by the end of the year. The Parish Council will advise residents when this is received by the Vale of White Horse District Council and therefore available for comment and also when it is to be discussed by the Parish Council. Schools Admission Dates

Is your child 3 or 4 years old? If your child was born on or between 1st September 2008 and 31st August 2009, you need to apply for a primary school place now. You must still apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to the school. The closing date for applications is 15th January 2013. Apply online at *www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/admissions*, Access to the internet is available at libraries and children's centres.

Local Government Boundary Commission

The Commission is carrying out a review of the Vale of White Horse. The aim of the review is to recommend that the ward boundaries are such that each councilor represents approximately the same number of electors. The Commission has proposed that Appleford, Sutton Courtenay, Drayton and part of Milton parish be in the same ward. There would be two district councilors representing this area.

<u> Milton Park – Local Development Order</u>

A draft Local Development Order has been made for Milton Park. This ties in with the new Science and Enterprise Zone and aims to extend the permitted development rights for certain forms of development at Milton Park for a period of 15 years. This would mean that some development could take place without the specific need for applying for separate planning consent. The Parish Council has objected to the inclusion in the Order of part of the field between the existing Milton Park and the estate, as this open area represents a buffer zone. It had concerns about possible light pollution should development be closer to the village. It also suggested that there be regular meetings between interested parties such as the parish council **and MEPC so that there could be an exchange of information and the parish council kept up to date about likely changes and new developments on Milton Park.**

Damage to planting in fields

It was reported at the last Council meeting that walkers were straying from the public rights of way network and trespassing across fields. Such action can cause damage to planted areas leaving valuable crops trampled and destroyed. Similarly motorbikes have been seen going through fields. Again these are causing damage to crops. The local fields are not off road areas for bike riding, unless you have permission from the land owner. Would anyone seeing misuse of the rights of way network report the matter to your local parish councillor or clerk.

Council budget 2013/14

The Parish Council is holding a meeting on 10th December to discuss its budget for the next financial year. Should there be any local organisation wishing to apply for a grant, then please note your application needs to be lodged immediately.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered :

P12/V1972/HH Demolition of outbuildings and construction of new Orangery

13 High Street. Council requested that a heritage assessment be provided, as the building was grade II* and asked that all materials used should be in keeping with the building.

P12/V2043/HH Erection of a two storey extension at 6 Abingdon Road. Council objected to the extension as it was very similar to a previously refused application and it would in an area liable to flood. Council asked for the Environment Agency to be consulted.

P12/V2028/HH Erection of an oak open sided boat shelter at 43 Church Street. Council had no objections.

MW.0174/12 Variation of conditions 1,3,22 of approval MW.0027/12 (for the establishment of recycling facilities at the landfill site to extend the end date of operations from 2019 to 2030, and to increase the annual MRF throughput from 70 000 tpa to 200 000 tpa. Council objected owing to the increased life of the site and the increase in processing by some additional 200%. This would create a permanent feature in the area once the cooling towers at Didcot A had been demolished. Council also objected to increased traffic movements, and the potential for noise and dust nuisances.

What Does God Want for Christmas?

Question: What do you buy someone who has everything? Answer: 'A burglar alarm!'

Presents can be a real problem, when we want to give those we love something they really want. But what about God? What would he want from us this Christmas? What's a suitable gift to celebrate the birthday of Jesus? What do you give someone who not only has everything, but is actually the source of everything? The answer can be found in the words of Micah, a prophet who lived about 700 years before the birth of Christ: 'He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.' (Micah 6:8).

This Christmas, God is looking for the gift of our lives – lives characterised by **justice**, **mercy** and **humility**:

Justice - God is just - he is absolutely fair and righteous in all his dealings and justice means 'treating people right because you know God.' In the Bible it means caring for the poor, speaking the truth and refusing to take advantage of the less fortunate. For us at Christmas, justice means doing right for those less fortunate than ourselves – perhaps by giving to one of the charities we are supporting (PACT during December and The Children's Society in January at our Christingle Service).

Mercy - This speaks of sharing God's heart by loving the unlovely even when they don't love us back. How has God dealt with you this year? If He has forgiven you, then forgive others. Has God lifted you up when you were down? Then why not seek to lift others? Where God has overlooked our faults, let's overlook the faults of others. If God has been merciful to us this year, Christmas is a time to show mercy to others.

Humility - Humility is the opposite of pride. It reminds us that everything we have in life is a gift from God. Although some may have more or less than us, we can still thank God for what we have and do the best with what God has given us. This is the attitude we can reflect at Christmas, when we invest so much time in the presents we give.

God is looking to all these actions arising genuinely from our heart. As we sing in the carol 'In the Bleak Midwinter':

'What can I give him, poor as I am?

If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb.

If I were a wise man, I would do my part.

Yet what I can I give him - give my heart.'

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following:

Beatrice (Beat) Kate Pitson who has died aged 97was born in 1914 into the extensive Lyford family and was brought up in Sutton Courtenay. She always had a strong connection to this place and had many happy memories of time spent with family and friends. In her childhood days she knew the then Prime Minister Asquith and his wife. Beat, and her sister Mary regularly travelled to the tennis courts in the heart of the village in the Asquith's Rolls Royce to act as ball-girls. They were normally rewarded for their efforts with threepence each! On one occasion Mrs Asquith gave each of them a Shantung dress which they cherished for many years. One day Beat was climbing an apple tree when she fell and badly cut her hand. She went to the doctor to have it cleaned and bandaged and instead of giving her a sweet or a lollipop he gave a clay pipe which she gave to her father who then treasured it for many years saying it was the best present he had ever received. She met her husband Jack at the age of sixteen on the swings at the old recreation ground. They married at All Saints' Church, when she was seventeen, and were blissfully happily wed for 66 years until Jack's death in January 1998. After their marriage Beat and Jack lived at 5 The Green, the thatched cottage between the church and the Swan. Originally it was two cottages but, after a bequest from her great Aunt Mary, Jack converted it into one. The wooden garage to the side still stands today since being built by Jack in the 1950s. With great reluctance they moved to Abingdon in 1960 as the thatch needed replacing and the cost in those days was astronomical. There they brought up their two children – Joy and Roger – and Beat indulged in her favourite passions: cake making, in which she excelled; and embroidery. Beat loved to travel, especially to see her niece in West Virginia, USA and frequent trips to the coast with her immediate family, with whom she loved to spend time. Even in her twilight years at the Winterbrook Care Home in Wallingford there was nothing more that she enjoyed than a ride out in the car to Sutton Courtenay, which she always referred to as her old stamping ground. Beat was a gentle, friendly and amicable person who worked hard all her life (including many years spent house cleaning and over 10 years working for Production Tools on the Radley Road Industrial Estate). A woman who always loved dogs – although she was not so keen on cats – and used to keep poodles. A woman very typical of her generation in experiencing some hard and challenging times - particularly during the war years (when her husband was away from home serving as a motorbike despatch rider). But throughout her long life she loved her family and always put them first. They will miss her. (This is an edited extract of the family tribute given by Dennis Lyford and the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at Beat's funeral which took place in All Saints' Church on 7th November 2012).

FROM ED VAIZEY MP

Over recent weeks I've also received a massive number of emails about the proposals to cull badgers in rural areas to prevent the spread of bovine tuberculosis. I understand the feelings on both sides - many people feel powerless in the face of a disease that has cost the taxpayer £500m this decade and many others feel great concern about taking such a drastic step. The Government has therefore decided to pilot the scheme in areas of very high concern and I will be carefully watching the results of these pilots and the local reaction to it.

Another major campaign which has hit my mailbag this month supports the proposals to force energy companies to move customers onto the cheapest tariff suited to their circumstances. I absolutely support these proposals as I believe they will lower every family's cost of living - and help make sure everyone can afford to keep warm during the winter. In a previous newsletter, I mentioned the CAB as a source of advice. I've been reminded that the Independent Advice Centre in Wantage is also a very good place to go for reliable, impartial information on a wide range of issues. Do you know of somewhere else in the constituency where good advice is available that I can mention to readers?

Recently, the European Space Agency announced it would put its telecommunications satellite monitoring work at its base in Harwell. Now, telecoms satellite monitoring might sound pretty technical, and not something that impacts on our daily lives, but the decision is part of a wider good news story. The decision will lead to a 100 jobs, but that's not all. It also confirms that Harwell is now one of the leading space research places in the UK, and therefore the world.

If you asked most people what a Government's policy for space should be, they might assume it was putting men on the moon or sending them to Mars. As we haven't done either in the UK, then you might also assume we are nowhere in the 21st century space race. In fact, we have one of the largest space economies in the world, worth $\pounds 9$ billion, and a lot of it is based in Oxfordshire.

Because space does affect our daily lives - whether it's TV reception, satellite navigation in our cars, or mobile phone signals and a host of other applications, all depend on space technology. That is why I was delighted when George Osborne, the Chancellor, announced recently that he hopes to triple the size of our space economy from £9 billion today to £30 billion by 2020: that means more jobs and more investment in Harwell and other parts of Oxfordshire.

I am also delighted to be able to tell constituents that the Post Office is offering people on pension credit, Employment and Support Allowance or Incapacity Benefit 36 first and second class stamps at last year's prices. The offer will continue until Christmas Eve, so some constituents who are most in need will be able to send season's greetings for 14p less each time. Do enquire at your local post office.

FCC (WRG) WON'T GO AWAY

AND WE ARE STILL AT RISK FROM THEIR POLLUTION

Assiduous readers of the Daily Mail or the Times on Saturday 17th November may have picked up an article referring to research by the U.S. Institute on Ageing concluding that air pollution by tiny particulates may be an important environmental risk factor for reduced brain power. U.S. research has already established the link between this particulate pollution and cardiovascular and respiratory diseases.

Two things are important when considering these stories in relation to WRG activities.

The first is that almost all the research on air pollution impacts on health comes from overseas. Britain simply doesn't do this sort of research despite having some of the worst air pollution in Western Europe. Secondly there is very little scope in U.K. planning procedures for these kind of health risks to be considered. The process applicant – WRG – has no real obligation to consider public health, while the Environment Agency and the Public Health authorities almost never consider overseas research when involved in planning applications..... although one would think that is a critical factor in something like an incinerator. During the WRG incinerator application some years ago neither the EA nor the public health authorities appeared even aware of most of the pollution issues such as burning fire retardants, fine particulate pollution etc. They certainly didn't research the issues!

We already know that the cancer rates – particularly for women – in the local area are some 20% worse than the national average and yet there seems no means of bringing the kind of long term cumulative health risks posed by waste disposal into the planning process. Moreover the planning process itself is already corrupted by the planning creep practised by large companies overwhelming the planners with planning applications, whilst maintaining the threat of costly appeals against council decisions impacting on council budgets should an application be refused. Since that incinerator application WRG have made at least six more applications to expand and extend the disposal of rubbish at the landfill site by a variety of means......almost all being successful. It is only a matter of time before the incinerator returns.

If the planners are powerless and the Public Health authorities are flaccid and feeble, who ensures that applications for more and more varied waste disposal will not endanger ourselves and our children. The short answer is no one but ourselves. **But how?**

There seem to be only three possibilities.

The first - as in the incinerator application - is to pressurise the planning committees by publicity, by correspondence, by public meetings, by community awareness and action.

The second – which we have not practised – is to pressurise company directors through their shareholders. Consumer action!

The third - again unused locally - is to pursue legal action against the companies so that

they become aware that they risk their financial viability if they transgress.

Recently I received a letter from a solicitor's firm offering a joint class action against WRG along the usual lines (we all know the John Grisham novels), of no win no fee basis.

Since I can see how hard it is to maintain a planning pressure campaign over many applications, and also to pressurise WRG shareholders who all live in Spain, the third way seems to offer the only realistic prospect.

MILTON PARK DEVELOPMENT

On 11 November over 50 local residents voiced their concerns, at a meeting at Milton Manor, about the lack of consultation by the Vale of White Horse District Council (VoWH) on its work with MEPC and made clear their objections to the future development of Milton Park.

It is proposed that Milton Park is given the status of a Local Development Order. This will streamline the planning process for the next 15 years. As a result, certain developments will be able to take place within and <u>beyond</u> the current boundaries of the Milton Park site without the need for planning permission. Much of this will be within the present foot-print of the park but MEPC also wish to enlarge their footprint to develop land they own near the railway and Milton interchange at the western end of the park and up to half of Kelaarts Field (MP9) between the present northern boundary at the Moor Ditch and Sutton Courtenay Primary School.

If approved, Milton Park will be extended to accommodate a further 8,500 employees and for the <u>first time</u> encroach on green field sites <u>beyond its current borders taken into the new LDO footprint</u>. This directly threatens our village and Sutton Courtenay and has significant worrying consequences for local amenities and access.

Adrian Duffield, Head of Planning Services VoWH, Reg Waite, District Councillor, and a representative of MEPC - invited to attend the meeting as observers - said that there had been appropriate publicity ahead of a 20 November objection deadline to the proposed development. But many residents had clearly heard little or nothing from MEPC, the Vale or via their Parish Council about plans for the expansion of Milton Park beyond its current boundaries. Residents thought the consultation process had been a sham. They wanted to know more and objected to the proposals which would see "Domesday" villages destroyed by an ever expanding enterprise zone.

After a passionate, historical overview by Anthony Mockler-Barrett and an update from Martin Woodgett of information about the proposal gleaned from VoWH and MEPC, residents voiced their frustration about being left in the dark. They wanted more consultation and agreed to form an Action Group to try and change the proposal. They opposed the plans which would lead to the urbanisation of an area of natural beauty, a big increase in traffic and further risk of flooding.

They had particular objection to the development of Kelaart's Field which is of archaeological importance, home to significant wild life, including skylarks, and provides an important "green lung" between Milton and Sutton Courtenay - enjoyed by all especially local families, school children, park employees exercising in their breaks, ramblers and dog-walkers. Moor Ditch is a natural northern boundary to the Park and should remain so. Flooding in the area is already a major concern and nothing should be done to increase further flooding. They seriously questioned the need to develop "Green Field" sites when "brown field" sites are available and under used – in and outside the Park's parameters. More would become available when the decommissioning of Didcot power station begins in 2013.

They made sure their concerns were known. Make sure you do too! It is really important that you exercise your right to be heard if we are not to find that within a few years Milton and Sutton Courtenay's unique identities are lost forever to a sprawling business park and "Greater Didcot".

The deadline for objections to be made to the Vale was 20 November. But, we understand that written objections made to the Council by <u>5 December</u> will be considered. So it's not too late for you to set pen to paper, finger to keyboard, or sign the petition available at Millbrook House Farm Shop (The Old Stables) in Milton High St.

S C RESIDENTS AGAINST MILTON ROAD DEVELOPMENT

As advertised by the Parish Council last month, Bidwell Properties/Redrow Homes gave a presentation to Sutton Courtenay Parish Council on 6th November, in which they indicated their proposal to submit a planning application for 85 homes on a site to the north of Milton Road. This meeting was attended by c.70 local residents and the mood of the meeting was a clear and strong objection to this proposal.

We have therefore formed a local campaign group in which we will formulate suitable arguments for objection and we have a number of key action points relating to traffic, education, flooding and drainage, archaeology and wildlife as well as the general impact on the village, that are currently being addressed.

Once the planning application has been submitted and we are able to view the final submission, we will arrange a wider meeting with residents to convey our information, discuss our pooled approach and if required, provide assistance to individuals in submitting a suitable response to the Consultation. In view of the fact that the Consultation period is likely to be only approximately three weeks, but that we need to see the actual planning application to form the most effective response, this meeting will be at short notice and we will endeavour to publicise details as widely as possible.

LATE NEWS ON FCC PLANNING APPLICATION (PAGE 13)

This application is scheduled to be considered by Oxfordshire County Council Planning and Regulation Committee on 3rd December 2012. The planning Department has also received a number of letters from concerned local residents detailing their opposition to the proposals. The points raised will be taken into account in reaching a recommendation on whether permission should be granted.

BIRD DIARY

Earlier in the year it was reported that a flock of six White Storks flew over the village heading to Farmoor reservoir where they stayed for several days before heading north. In late October I was told that four White Storks landed on the playing fields here, staying for about half an hour before one flew off, followed by the other three. They must have been a striking sight because the footballers stopped their training session to watch them.

Several thousand Starlings gave a wonderful display over the village in early November. Our resident Starlings have declined seriously in recent years but towards the end of the year we are visited by large numbers from such places as Russia. I have been told that a flock of about five thousand were roosting each night in reed beds between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford. No doubt these were the same birds who were displaying over the village. I also heard that they landed in conifers here, chattering very loudly.

In late October I saw a large flock of Fieldfares flying high over the

village. They come from Scandinavia each winter and feed on berries, first in the wild and then in gardens. They look very like our Mistle Thrush but stay together in fairly large groups, often accompanied by Redwings.

CHRISTMAS RECIPES BY CHRIS GATES

TURKEY, CRANBERRY & CIDER CASSEROLE

Full of festive flavours this is a delicious sweet and creamy casserole – perfect for using up leftover turkey.

Serves 6

2tbsp olive oil 900g turkey thigh, diced (cooked or uncooked). 3tbsp flour 1tsp dried parsley 8 shallots, peeled and halved 200g button mushrooms 300ml English Apple Cider 200g cranberry sauce 200g Crème Fraiche 2tbsp fresh parsley, chopped



Heat the oil in a large casserole dish. Place the flour and parsley on a large plate and roll the turkey in the flour to coat. Add to the pan and brown for 5-8 minutes. You may need to do this in batches. Stir in the shallots and mushrooms and brown lightly. Add the cider and cranberry sauce, bring to the boil then simmer, covered for 40 minutes.

Remove the lid, add the crème fraiche and simmer uncovered for a further 20 minutes. If you fancy a thicker sauce mix 2tsp cornflour with 1tbsp water to make a smooth paste then add to the pan and simmer until thickened.

Season with a little black pepper. Sprinkle over the fresh parsley and serve.

Variations: If you don't want to use cider, simply substitute apple juice instead. For additional flavour and colour add a few handfuls of spinach with the crème fraiche and allow it to wilt in the sauce.

PORT, ONION & FENNEL SOUP

This is a great soup for winter and full of Christmassy flavours. Great for a light lunch on Boxing Day or as a starter if your entertaining.

25g butter
3tbsp olive oil
1kg onions, sliced
3 cloves
1 bay leaf
1 fennel bulb, cored and chopped
750ml chicken or vegetable stock
Freshly ground black pepper
6tbsp port
200g Crème Fraiche
1tbsp freshly chopped parsley

Serves 6

Melt the butter and olive oil in a large saucepan. Stir in the onions, cloves and bay leaf and cook gently until golden brown, about 20-30 minutes. Add the fennel and stock then cover and simmer for 20 minutes until tender. Remove the cloves and bay leaf from the pan.


Cool the soup slightly then blend with a hand held blender or in a food processor until smooth. Return the soup to the pan and add the port and all but 2tbsp of crème fraiche. Warm through and season to taste.

Pour the soup into bowls then swirl a little crème fraiche over the top with a scattering of parsley. Serve with warm crusty bread.

PREPARE AHEAD

You can freeze this soup for up to 1 month without the port or crème fraiche. Defrost overnight in the fridge then add the port and crème fraiche and heat through to serve.
