PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

<u>Local Government Boundary Commission – Electoral Review of Oxfordshire</u>

The review of Oxfordshire is now complete. The changes proposed must be implemented by Parliament. A draft Order is being prepared. This brings into force the boundary commission's recommendations, and the new electoral arrangements for Oxfordshire will be implemented at the local elections in 2013. There will be a pattern of 59 single-member and two two-member divisions for Oxfordshire. There will be a new Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Division. Dog Mess in the village

There seems to be an increasing amount of dog fouling around the village in recent weeks.

It is an offence under the Dogs Fouling of Land Act 1996 as amended by the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 not to pick up after your dog in certain designated places. Dog faeces can be linked to health risks including toxocara canis. Roundworm eggs can be found in dog mess. These can infect young children, causing potentially severe illness. Eggs can remain active in the soil for many years.

It is recognised that most dog owners are responsible and do clean up after their pets, but there are some that do not. It is the responsibility of the dog owner or person in charge of the dog to clear up any mess left by their dog. Failure to clear up can result in a fixed penalty notice or if prosecuted a fine of £1000. The Vale of White Horse District Council does have envirocrime wardens who can take action on reports received. The Parish Council has asked them to visit the village and monitor the current problem with dog fouling. There are several dog waste bins around the village. Would dog walkers please use them and help keep the village a cleaner and tidier place for us all.

All Saints Lane - Lake

The Parish Council would thank the new owner of the lake for opening it up to the public again, and would draw residents' attention to the note he placed in the last edition of SC News.

Namely, that the lake would be closed unless the public took responsibility for dog fouling. The Parish Council has had reports of litter being dropped and larger cans left behind as well.

Would everyone who uses this area please take their litter home and clean up after their dogs. Not to do so could mean that the lake is closed to all owing to the thoughtless actions of just a few people.

Planning Application – landfill site – Anaerobic Digestion facilities

The Parish Council carefully considered this application at its recent meeting. It expressed concerns regarding the permanent presence of this process should consent be granted, the linking of settlements, the industrial nature of the process, transport issues, the likelihood of odours and the negligible benefit that the process seemed to generate for the community. A letter of objection is being written to the Vale of White Horse District Council.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP 5 (NAG5)

Incorporating Appleford, Drayton & Sutton Courtenay

Over the last few months NAG5 has been working on ways in which to raise drivers' awareness about the importance of observing speed limits throughout the three villages. NAG5's previous report, in September 2011, gave information about Oxfordshire County Council's SpeedWatch scheme, and SpeedWatch posters have been displayed in the three villages. They have been temporarily removed, but will be displayed again shortly (this is suggested by the Council so that the message does not lose its impact).

Preliminary discussions have also been held with the Head Teacher of the primary school in Sutton Courtenay, with a view to involving the pupils in the community anti-speeding and road safety campaign, and it is hoped that work with the school will start shortly.

NAG5 together with Thames Valley Police would like to remind all drivers to:

- Ensure number plates are clean
- Check all lights are working before setting off
- Always carry a blanket, warm drink and snacks in colder weather
- Be aware that almost half the motorists found to be speeding in the villages were residents
- Ensure parked cars are always locked and that no valuables are left in the car.


SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Developing ourselves as learners at Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School

This term we have been talking a lot about what makes a good learner to ensure that our children make the most of the excellent teaching from our team. When we carried out our annual pupil questionnaire earlier in the school year, it was clear that children saw learning as highly important. The 'wordle' below was generated from pupil responses when asked: 'what aspect of school is the best?" (The larger the word, the greater the responses).



Love life; love learning; love one another



We have explored the aspect of learning to see what makes a good learner and the children came up with various qualities: concentration, perseverance, effort, listening, positive attitude and sense of pride. The children acknowledged that sometimes even when you do apply all of these qualities the work that is produced may not be completely correct and then you have to have strength to pick yourself up and keep trying.

Each term the teachers are asked to identify up to two children from their class that have displayed these qualities and a special letter of recognition is posted home to be opened in the holidays. The children identified will help to form a 'learning council' at school to help other children become better learners.

It's possible to make a few fairly specific forecasts about Sunday March 18th 2012. The most certain is that all over Britain mothers will receive cards, the best ones being home-made with crayons or felt-tip pens and featuring hearts and smiley faces. There may well be presents, too, carefully if clumsily packaged and containing one or more of the following: chocolate (in various forms), cosmetics, handkerchiefs or funny aprons. From a more senior source (if the recipient is lucky) might come some flowers, a book, some perfume, or a subscription to a fashion magazine. If, however, he's got it wrong (as he usually does) she might find herself with a toaster, a new iron or even a season ticket for the local football club. It's Mothers' Day!

Of course, as far as the Church is concerned it's 'Mothering Sunday', which sounds quite menacing, really - too near 'smother' for comfort. Yet it did all start in church long ago, with a Lesson for the fourth Sunday of Lent which included the phrase 'Jerusalem which is above, the mother of us all' and a tradition of welcoming apprentices, and those in service, home halfway through the Lenten fast, bearing Simnel Cakes for their mothers.

But then the greeting card industry got interested, the occasion spread to America and bingo - it was suddenly big business. Of course it's more than that. It's also a very welcome opportunity to recognise that mothers tend to play a rather big role in everyone's life and to say 'thanks' to them. On the whole, Mothering Sunday/Mothers' Day is definitely a 'good thing'.

It's also quite a good thing for the church, because families like to come together on this particular day, and by tradition posies of flowers are provided for the children to give to their mums - and sometimes grandmas, too. Because the following weekend is the feast of the Annunciation (the angel Gabriel telling Mary that she was going to have a baby), preachers may justifiably point out how crucial the role of motherhood is in the whole Christian story. All those paintings and stained glass windows of the Madonna and Child remind us that, just like all the rest of us, Jesus had a mother who fed and nurtured him, guided him through the years of childhood and stood by him later on when things were dark and dreadful.

Some chocolate, some flowers, a phone call, a nice lunch out are all ways of saying 'thank you, mum'. And of course it's not just our Mums but Grandmother's as well. Something like 48 per cent of all grannies now child-mind their grandchildren for at least 20 hours per week. A quarter of grannies child-mind for more than 25 hours a week. And one in ten grannies are childminding a staggering 40 hours a week! In all, our grannies save us £2 billion a year in childminding costs. But grannies don't stop there. Six out of ten grandparents often go without things for themselves, in order to finance their children and grandchildren. A third of grandparents can struggle to pay heating bills and council tax, never mind afford a holiday — because overwhelmingly they are putting their family's needs before their own. The average granny babysits 42 times a year, and a quarter of grannies babysit every week. What does all this child-minding do for granny? Keeps her young! Grannies who care for grandchildren feel a whopping 14 years younger than their actual age.

And so this Mothering Sunday I would like to invite everyone to write a 'Twitter' of 140 characters of what they love about their Mum or their Grandmother. Bring them along to All Saints' Church at 10.30am on Sunday 18th March 2012 and they will be read out during the service in celebration of 'mothering love'.

The Holy Land Institute for the Deaf in Salt, Jordan, was established in 1964 as a small school for Deaf children. It has been expanding almost ever since, and is an important resource not only for Jordan but also the Middle East. The Salt Training and Resource Institute for Disability (Stride), based at the school, provides teacher training not only in Jordan but arranges courses in Iraq, Syria, Yemen and more recently in South Sudan

The HLID offers Rehabilitation, Education, Vocational Training, and other services for Deaf, Deafblind and physically disabled people. It wishes to enable and equip them for inclusion and participation in family life and society.

Nearly twelve years ago a UK branch of the Institute was started to provide much needed funding and support. There are also branches in Switzerland, Holland, Germany and America. Over the weekend of March 23-25th – HLID will be having a conference at the Abbey and will be coming to All Saints' Church for the morning service on March 25th at 10.30am. Oxford Deaf Church will also be joining us for the service, and the service will be interpreted into sign language.

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently.

Sylvia Bishop (Sylv) who died on 28th December 2011 was born on 18th December 1936 in Oxford where she spent her childhood with her parents Aidan and Saphora Lewis and her brother and sister Alyn and Wendy. She attended East Oxford School where she met her great friend Eileen when she was just five years old. They were such good friends that Sylvia and Eileen went onto marry brothers – Vic and Mike. Sylvia left school at 15 to become a bookbinder at Mowbray's in Oxford. She met Vic at Easter 1951 on the 100 Step Bridge at South Hinksey. It was love at first sight and Syliva waited whilst Vic did his two year's National Service in Germany (always carrying her photograph with him) and they were eventually married on 4th May 1957 in Iffley Church. They moved to Bradstocks Way in Sutton Courtenay in 1959 into a brand new house, which they didn't leave until 1999 when they retired to Radley. Over the years Sylvia did a variety of jobs - at Culham Collage and for Colonel Windsor on the Milton Trading Estate and finally helped Vic run his Milk Round in Wantage. She was a real asset to the milk round as she loved looked after older people and they both worked as a team - not only delivering milk but also helping to care for many of their customers. Sylv wouldn't hesitate to make them a cup of tea or help them to get up in the morning if that was what they needed. Such was the affection in which Sylv and Vic were held they still got Christmas cards from many of their former customers- years after they retired. Sylv and Vic had four children - Susan, Trevor, Wendy and Tina-Marie, nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren who will all greatly miss her. This is an edited extract of the address given at the funeral service which was held in All Saints' Church on 12th January 2012 by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

Cornelius (Jim) Happe who died aged 76 on 15th January 2012 was born in Bow, 3rd February 1935. Big Jim, as he came to be known, was the 2nd eldest of four children. His childhood was dominated by the war and he had vivid memories of being evacuated and of experiencing the Blitz. He wrote about his wartime experiences in 'Diamonds in the Dark' – available as an e-book for £1. Big Jim left school at 15 and went to work with his Dad in the building trade learning practical skills which he retained all his life. He did his National Service in the RAF and met his future wife Maureen when he was introduced to her by his sister Millie and her boyfriend Henry (who just happened to be Maureen's brother). At first Maureen didn't want anything to do with Jim but Jim's charm eventually won Maureen around and they were married in a double wedding with Henry and Millie in Bow – an event which made the newspapers! They had two sons, Jim (or Little Jimmy) and Andrew. Through visiting family in Sutton Courtenay they decided to move to Harwell Road in 1963. Big Jim worked as a welder at Ameys and whilst there was sent to the Falkland Islands to rebuild the runway after the war. In 1979 Jim and Maureen moved to Stanton Harcourt. Sadly Jim was made redundant in 1990 aged 55. For a practical, hardworking man who always liked to be busy it was a real blow, but the compensation was that he got to spend quality time with his grandchildren- Tom, Lucy and Josh. In 2003 Jim became ill and he was lovingly cared for by Maureen. It was then that they started to make plans to move back to Sutton Courtenay but this was not to be as, sadly, Maureen too became ill and died, just five months short of their Golden Wedding Anniversary. After Maureen's death Jim moved to Abingdon in 2006 where he was well-cared for by his family who will all greatly miss him. This is an edited extract of the address given at the funeral service which was held in All Saints' Church on 26th January 2012 by the Reverend Helen Kendrick

Maurice William Scraggs who died aged 71 on 13th January 2012 was born on 6th August 1940 in Kidlington to Lydia and Charlie Scraggs. He grew up there with his brother Rodney and sister Linda, going to Gosford School, where he was captain of the rugby team as well as being involved in football and athletics. He left school aged 14 to go and work as a painter and decorator for Phipps and Wynn where he proceeded to work his way up through the firm to the position of Company Director. Always hardworking he put in long hours until he was forced to take semi-retirement on the grounds of ill-health. He married Anne in 1963 and they went onto bring up their two daughters, Marie and Alison, in Kennington. Sadly, after 34 years, Maurice and Anne's marriage broke down but it is a tribute to their mutual love for Marie and Alison that they remained friends and still loved and cared for one another. He was a proud and doting Grandad to his grandchildren – Chris and Alex and Ben and Toby. Life in the last few years of his life was not easy for Maurice after he suffered a series of strokes eight years ago and then developed cancer, but he was very grateful for the love and care that his family gave him. He will be greatly missed.

OXFORDSHIRE CARE SUMMARY





The way we manage your health records is changing

The NHS in England is introducing the NHS Care Records Service to improve the safety and quality of patient care. These secure electronic records will give healthcare professionals faster, easier access to reliable information about you to help with your care - particularly in an emergency, or if you see a doctor out-of-hours when your GP practice is closed.

Your care records will be made up of two parts;

The national Summary Care Record – this record is held nationally and will be available across England to support emergency care and will contain three things: your allergies; your medications; and any adverse reactions to medicines that you have.

The local Oxfordshire Care Summary – this is 'view only' and will contain more detailed information than the national Summary Care Record. It will only be available to local healthcare professionals involved in your treatment in Oxfordshire.

Every individual in Oxfordshire aged 16 years old and over* will receive a patient letter at the beginning of April 2012, asking them to choose whether they want these care records. If you are a parent or guardian, you will need to make this choice on behalf of your child, or support them in making their own decision if you feel they are mature enough to do so.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Seville oranges are now available so try using them in other ways than marmalade.

Orange and pork casserole

500gm pork

100gm butter

0.5 tsp all spice

1 tsp dried rosemary

Half garlic clove, optional

4 oranges

1tbs cornflower

1 cup sherry or vermouth

Seasoning

Rub garlic over pork and cut into cubes. Sprinkle with all spice, rosemary and grated rind of 1 orange. Heat butter and cook pork for 5-10 minutes. Slice oranges thinly and add. Pour in sherry or vermouth. If necessary add enough water to just cover the meat. Season. Simmer very slowly or cook in oven 150 degrees, Reg 2, until pork is tender. Remove meat to serving dish and place orange slices on top. Keep warm. Mix cornflour with 2tbs strained liquid and return to pan. Cook, stirring constantly until thickened and smooth, adding extra liquid if necessary. Pour over meat or serve separately. Make use of the oven by cooking potatoes in their jackets.

Unlike any other composer, Rossini might easily have devoted his life to high cuisine, his gastronomic prowess was legendary and almost all of the composer's biographies emphasise a life devoted not just to music but to culinary expertise. Numerous arias were written whilst waiting for a restaurant dish to be served, and many have been named in honour of the great composer, most famously Tournedos Rossini; even as a young altar boy Rossini developed a liking for mass wine. Towards the end of his life he composed some little known piano pieces entitled Radishes, Anchovy, Pickles, Butter, Dry Figs, Almonds Raisins and Hazelnuts; clearly then a lifetime passion. There are so many really tasty dishes dedicated to and named after Rossini that the true concert goer will of course prepare and serve one of these dishes after attending The All Saints' Singers offering of Petite Messe Solennelle, thus completing a magical evening that will be remembered long after the final notes have died away.

This rarely performed Mass written almost at the end of his life at the age of 72 years (with piano pieces entitled "The sins of my old age") is a delight. Sensitive phrasing, gorgeous harmonies and brilliantly crafted solos will give pleasure to all. Not bad for an apprentice blacksmith.

The choir will be directed by Caroline Hobbs- Smith and accompanied by Gulliver Ralston and Peter McMullin.

BIRD WATCHER

In December songbirds begin to sing, especially on a sunny day. Early in the month I heard a Songthrush singing behind Lady Place and a flock of Goldfinches twittering high in the bushes, and later in the month Mistle Thrushes were seen eating berries from a mountain ash tree by the football field.

In early December a Blackbird was heard singing softly, probably practicing for the spring. The Blackbird is one of the world's best songsters. The species evolved in woodlands where a strong song was needed to penetrate the canopy. The complexity of the male's song impresses the females and the song develops throughout the bird's life. The males could be seen in December on garden lawns claiming their territories.

Robins sing most of the year in an attempt to retain their territory, which however may shrink later in the year because the young need to find a territory, as do birds migrating from the continent. The winter song is gentler and rather sad, becoming louder and more aggressive in the spring to attract a mate and protect territory.

In January the Great Tits begin to sing, and they have many different songs, one of which is a loud 'teacher teacher' like call, similar to that of the Chiffchaff.
