VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Sutton Courtenay Bridleway 24 (Cycle Route 5)

A temporary road closure was arranged to apply to part of Sutton Courtenay Bridleway 24 (Cycle Route 5) whilst electricity cabling and drainage works were carried out. This is the route that runs around the northern perimeter of the power station. Unfortunately the works have overrun. There is no possibility of re-opening the path immediately, as the path is not in a safe state for public use, and any works to recover from this would need to be undone in due course to complete the original works, thus merely extending the period of disruption into winter months. The path will therefore remain closed for a few more weeks.



School Transport

The Council has launched a new consultation on proposals to reduce the amount it spends on home-toschool transport. The County Council has to find huge savings right across its services, and is currently providing school transport to a greater level than the statutory requirement. Go to *www. oxfordshire.gov.uk/htspconsultation* and give your comments on line. Also a public meeting to discuss the matter will be held on Tuesday 10th December at Larkmead School, Abingdon at 7.00 p.m.

Council Tax Reduction Scheme

The Council tax benefit scheme has ceased to exist and has been replaced by the council tax reduction scheme. The reduction will take the form of a discount on the council tax bill for eligible persons. As central government funding is gradually reducing, the Vale of White Horse District Council continues to administer it own local scheme. The Parish Council will have to take into account the reduction scheme and the effect on local council tax bills when setting its budget.

Council budget 2014/15

The Parish Council is holding a meeting on 10th December to discuss its budget for the next financial year. Should there be any local organisation wishing to apply for a grant, then please note your application needs to be lodged immediately.

Didcot A Power Station

Noise levels have changed since Didcot A closed and therefore on still calm days, background noise is lower, therefore when Didcot B is operating the noise level is possibly more noticeable. Coleman and Cole have been appointed as the demolition company. They are currently assessing the demolition project and a report is expected in the early part of next year. Demolition is expected to take 2.5 - 3 years to complete. The Southern cooling towers and stack will be taken down first and the Northern cooling towers will be considered later. The area South of Moor Ditch will become available for development, and the area North of Moor Ditch will be retained.

Peep O Day Lane

The Parish Council has received several reports that motorcycles are using Peep O Day Lane. It would like to point out that the lane is a bridleway only and should not be used by motor vehicles. It is an offence to drive on a bridleway. Pedestrians, families and young children lawfully walking along Peep O Day Lane have come across unexpected and unauthorised motorcycles which put them in danger. Would motorcyclists using this route please find an approved alternate route.

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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered :

P13/V2137/HH Retention of barn for purposes incidental to the dwelling house Peewit Farm. The Council objected should the barn be outside the residential curtilage of the site.

P13/V2189/D Removal of 562.6m of pipework between the river and Appleford Road. The Council had no objections

M.137/13 To continue the development and retention of a leachate tank on the landfill site. The Council had a holding objection until the wording of " continuing the development and retention.." could be clarified.

MW.136/13 Waste transfer facility to handle 60,000 tonnes of non hazardous waste and 200 tonnes of clinical waste at the landfill site. The Council objected owing to a lack of proven need, being contrary to policies, and had concerns regarding drainage, and impact on the highway network.

P13/V2239 Erection of detached bungalow (amendment to approval P13/V0052) at 10-14 Milton Road. The Parish Council objected as a previous application for a similar dwelling had been refused. The proposal did not provide adequate amenity space.

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SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

A love of reading is what we are aiming for at Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School. Reading for enjoyment is so important. Reading can really take you places – from imaginary worlds to those firmly based in fact.

Children start to develop this love of reading and the skills to read right from the start – within our nursery where they focus on listening for sounds and have a rich diet of books within their story time sessions. This continues throughout the school with children being 'read to' as well as listened to.

The skill of reading is ever more essential communication skill, as technology has evolved. Reading e-mails, texts and messages has become part of working life and social life – now reading is not just about literature.



ON COURS

Love life; love learning; love one another

In order to foster this love of reading, our reading scheme is modern and wide ranging with a good blend of fiction and non-fiction books, which cover many different subjects to grasp different interests. Children have group reading opportunities, as well as individual reading sessions, to really get into the book, find out more about authorial techniques and really get to grips with inference and deduction skills. We also subscribe to First News (a newspaper written for children) and this forms part of the Year 5/6 group reading sessions whilst keeping them up to date with current affairs.

One class also runs a library at lunchtimes which is stocked with newly published books (funded by our PTA). Annually we hold a book week around a theme: exploring different books, inviting in authors, holding book awards and book quiz events – as well as the traditional dressing up!

Last year we became part of the *Oxfordshire Reading Campaign* which has been highly publicised in the Oxford Mail. This has enabled us to train two of our Teaching Assistants to deliver an intervention programme to children who are 6 or 7 who are finding reading difficult. This has already had excellent results. In addition to this we would also like to run a **Volunteer Reading Scheme** – *and would like your help to make this successful!*we would also like to run a **Volunteer Reading Scheme** – *and would like your help to make this successful!*

We are looking to recruit members of the community to come into school and read one to one with a child for two 30-minute sessions each week for 10 weeks, commencing in January 2014. This Reading Scheme is a structured programme and all volunteers will receive training and a handbook from our School's Co-ordinator – All reading books and materials will be supplied. The volunteer would be reading to the child to further foster the enjoyment of reading.

From the Ministry Team...

HAVING TROUBLE FINDING THE PERFECT GIFT?

A Special Gift - Christmas is the time for giving special gifts to those we love. This can be both a challenge and an adventure, as we seek out just the right present. Thinking about what makes that gift special, reminds us of God's gift to each one of us at Christmas in the person of Jesus Christ.

A Personal Gift - The best gifts are always those which are really appreciated by the person receiving them. The birth of Jesus tells us that God knows each one of us personally and wants us to know him too. Amazingly, the creator of the universe relates to us on our level, 'The Word became flesh and blood and moved into our neighbourhood' (John 1:14, The Message).

A Practical Gift - When buying a gift for someone, we want it to be practical. A middle-aged woman posted her Christmas wish list on the refrigerator for her husband to read. She requested 'something that will make me look sexy and beautiful.' To her surprise the husband gave her an exercise bike as a gift! Father Christmas may bring what we deserve; God delivers what we don't deserve i.e. life with him. This is God's gift to us through the death and resurrection of Jesus, which brings forgiveness, joy, peace and a new start.

A Permanent Gift -Unlike some gifts, God's gift to us has lasting value beyond Christmas Day. Jesus spoke of 'life in all its fullness' ie eternal life. This is a friendship which can start today and last forever, 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' (John 3:16).

A Purchased Gift - Gift vouchers are very popular today; we don't need to spend the money, just claim the value of the gift ourselves. This is the good news of the gospel, because Jesus has already purchased salvation with God for us. Our part is simply to receive this gift by faith for ourselves, recognising that there is nothing more we can do to attain God's forgiveness other than accepting it through Jesus Christ. 'At Christmas time, when we receive presents we don't really need, God offers us a gift we cannot do without.' (J John).

So as we celebrate again this Christmas season, with Paul we can say of this baby in the manger, 'Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift' (2 Corinthians 9:15).



Knitting for the 'fish and chip' babies

Through the efforts of the Sutton Courtenay knitters, with huge help from some of their relatives, friends and some of the workers at the Burford Garden Centre, plus one jumper made by an elderly gentleman, we have between us made over 100 of the little jumpers needed by the 'fish and chip' babies in Africa.

This all came about by Mary Hancock of Milton Methodist Church asking us who go to Milton Lunch Club to help with this Project. We obtained a copy, which was circulated to members of the Craft group, of the Appeal together with the pattern, worded as follows:

'Fish and chip' babies need you

Newborn babies, many of them suffering from Aids, are being called 'fish and chip' babies because many are sent home wrapped in newspapers for warmth

To help these tiny babies we are asking you to knit a small jumper which will be sent to Africa. Average knitters can complete a jumper in an evening—it's a quick and easy pattern. Special instructions are: use only double knitting wool; no pastels or whites please as these garments may never be washed; bright and mixed colours, or



stripes, are best. Then follow the pattern details.

What an array of colours they all make when put together. Many thanks to all who made the little jumpers.

Mary will take these, together with others made by her friends, to an address near Newbury, from where they will be taken to Africa. We hope the little babies will benefit from our efforts.

On the second day the temperature dropped to 3° C at sea level, but above 300M the rain turned to snow and was quite stunning to see, while driving around the single tracks of Mull, cautiously avoiding the deer and highland cows !

The wind and rain tried its hardest to keep the wildlife away, but even in the most harsh weather conditions we saw a pair of Golden Eagles, 3 different White Tailed Eagles along with many Common Buzzards. Although the lochs were being battered by high winds, the wetland birds were still feeding on the shoreline, including Curlew (photo below), Red Shank, Grey Heron and Oyster Catcher. There were many gulls of course, and we sat and watched an Iceland Gull catch a crab and devour the entire creature, shell and claws too !

As this edition will land on your doorstep a couple of weeks before 2013 comes to an end, I would like to remind you to keep feeding our feathered friends as it is predicted that we will have a harsh winter AND... to wish you all a safe and happy Christmas and a great 2014.

KEEP SUTTON COURTENAY RURAL

Pye application for 34 houses on green fields above Milton Road approved for development

Not good news on keeping Sutton Courtenay rural. The application for outline permission for 34 houses at the end of Milton Road has been passed by the Vale planning committee. This was despite KSCR getting an expert witness to state that the drainage of the site had not been properly examined by the developer and there was unknown flooding risk to surrounding and downstream properties as a consequence of the development. Indeed our expert, a Senior Lecturer at University College London specialising in flood hazard, stated that "the developer's assessment does not identify the wider catchment area of the Ginge Brook (which receives water from the site) and the potential impact on downstream properties. This view is required for a development of this nature". The planning committee chose to ignore this advice. Indeed our own County Councillor Richard Webber was "on the horns of a dilemma" and could not draw himself to vote against the application. The application was passed 8 votes in favour with 6 abstentions.

With the remainder of the Amey development, Pye, Redrow and Hobbyhorse Lane we now can't stop an extra 500 cars being on the roads of the village within a couple of years and at least an extra 30 pupils wanting to attend the primary school. There are other significant new developments likely to be applied for around the village as well. The government's planning guidance is heavily biased in favour of developers at the moment and greenfield sites yield larger profits than brownfield.

On other matters, the mega-warehouse scheme next to the village is now under consideration by the Vale and the Redrow development for 65 houses north of Milton Road, which was given outline planning permission in the spring, has now come back for full planning permission. Although the Redrow development can't be stopped, you can comment on the more detailed plans on the Vale website, references P13/V2321/RM, P13/V2324/DIS. Lastly, the FCC application for its Waste Transfer Facility is likely to be considered at the OCC Planning Committee on Monday 2 Dec at 2pm.

The only slight ray of hope was a concession the Vale planning committee made at the October meeting in which the combined effect on the village of all this development carnage will be considered at some stage in the future. Unfortunately great damage to the rural nature of the village has already been and continues to be done.

If you can help KSCR in any way please get in touch. Any legal expertise would be very welcome. Lastly, thanks to the continued support that is being given to KSCR. It is greatly appreciated.

So, residents of Sutton Courtenay, we have medical facilities in the village which is one of the reasons Sutton Courtenay is so sustainable for all this extra development.....well, according to the planning officer, Mark Doodes, we have! He stated this when promoting the Pye development at the council meeting on Wednesday the 30th of October and, of course, protocol prevents anyone from correcting him.....maybe he meant the Vet!!!! Dr. Harvey Rodda, an eminent hydrologist, who was commissioned to write an independent report, using donations from many of you, dear fellow residents, spoke on behalf of the village. One of the planning officers asked if this "new information" had been made public!!!!! That expensive document, produced by KSCR, paid for by you, had obviously not been read!!!

It was also stated at the meeting that the development is 2 metres below the level of the road and so any displaced water should not affect adjacent properties! A number of adjacent properties are below the road height and their gardens regularly flood now!!!!

But this is now a "done deal". We were not allowed to correct these discrepancies due to council protocol. Is this democracy when the residents and the Parish Council all object?

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP5 (NAG5)



Focus over the past few weeks has centred on Smartwater, the forensic property marking liquid, details of which were provided in the NAG5 update in November's edition of Sutton Courtenay News. This and previous editions can be viewed online at the village web site *http://www.suttoncourtenay.co.uk/*.

Houses in the high numbers of the High Street were recently visited by PCSO Sandra Syphas and a member of NAG5/Neighbourhood Watch promoting the use of Smartwater kits. Each household had the opportunity to ask questions and to see the contents of a kit - a container of Smartwater forensic marking liquid sufficient to mark fifty items, instruction leaflet, stickers and registration form. The response was extremely positive and the upper part of the High Street will shortly have signs displayed denoting it as a 'Smartwater Zone'. It is hoped to extend the use of Smartwater more widely in the village.

Residents have expressed concern about the safety of cyclists and other road users as winter approaches. We therefore repeat some of the advice given in February's issue of this magazine. The following are some of the legal requirements for cyclists for which the police, if they witness a breach, can issue an on-the-spot fine.

- 1. Obey a traffic sign/order (e.g. going through a traffic light at red or contra flow to permitted direction of traffic).
- 2. Obey a signal of a PC/traffic warden.
- 3. Riding a bicycle on a footpath is not permitted. (Very young children excepted.)
- 4. Drunk in charge of a push bike is not permitted.
- 5. A cyclist cannot carry a passenger on a pedal cycle a bike is only for one person.
- 6. Bikes must have operational lights, front and rear, if being used after sunset and before sunrise and also in poor visibility conditions.
- 7. For your own safety please also wear head protection and be visible to other road users.
- 8. Spot checks at Culham Bridges will be carried out over the next few weeks.

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UPDATE ON DIDCOT POWER STATION

With the March closure of the A station most of the disentangling of the two stations is complete, and the next stage is the actual demolition of A. The contractor has been named as Coleman well known in the West Midlands, and experts in providing engineering solutions to tricky demolition problems, as well as the usual trials of removing all asbestos from the site. The present stage is one of exploring all the difficulties, agreeing solutions, and then next year demolition itself will begin.

The next question will be what to do with the surplus land. The main outlet for that has always been warehousing and light engineering, but there could be some residential. RWE, the owners of the whole site, have now decided that the land north of Moor Ditch is to be retained but south of the Ditch will be available for development. Moor Ditch flows through Sutton Courtenay and the Power Stations site, and becomes the boundary of the Vale from South Oxfordshire, and parishwise the end of the Vale Eastwards in Appleford with Long Wittenham starting the western part of South Oxfordshire.

Meanwhile the B station continues its life. But it has been pretty quiet this summer with the recession having reduced overall electricity demand, and the high price of gas making B less competitive. In fact B has not run at all during the summer, and RWE has been cutting back in both Germany and Holland as well as UK. Some readers may have noticed that with A closed the site is much quieter, the reason being the A station is no longer running on base load all the time.

There is one further point that locals should note. Over its lifetime the A station has been generous to the local communities, especially schools. Now that A is closed it is costing RWE money rather than generating it, and inevitably that means a reduction in the amount of money now available for helping community projects. RWE management intend to keep on their charitable work in the local communities but it has to be on a reduced scale. The closure of A has meant far fewer staff on site, and Power station staff have been much to the fore in the charitable work for local communities. So RWE locally now has far fewer staff (more than half left with A's closure), it is earning considerably less money, and those two factors must mean less money and people available for charitable activities. But RWE intends to retain some charitable giving.

Hanson pit

This has been largely in mothballs of late, but may well soon burst into greatly increased activity taking on more local staff. It depends on continuing growth of housing market in our area and thus greater need for more aggregates. It also depends on Hanson who have other pits not too far away, some of which they wanted to run down and finish off. But expect renewed activity soonish.

Ladygrove and Didcot Park

Reading University are well advanced in their plans for a large housing development north of present Ladygrove which will extend up to the T junction Didcot turn. This is of course in South Oxford District Council area, not Vale, so I as a Vale councillor have no direct say in it, but I have seen the draft plans (soon to be submitted) and am pleased that they seem to leave a decent boundary of greenery the other side of Moor Ditch which is the Vale's and Appleford's boundary.

Adjacent to this Ladygrove northern extension is the proposed and euphemistically named Didcot Park which, if approved, will take extensive building north of the Didcot perimeter road into Appleford, and thereby bring industrial buildings and housing plus a small lake shun right up to the level crossing. This application too is due shortly. What are the implications of this? Villagers need to think that one out, check carefully on a local map, and ask themselves at what point does Appleford cease to be a village and become a suburb of Didcot?

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

Shortage of money is once again the headline this month. OCC's lack of money is going to mean that we all need to be very clever with how we operate and plan the County services. Everyone agrees that of all transport issues, road safety should always be near the top of the priority list. The sad statistics around the Milton Road out of Drayton (3 fatalities in the last 5 years), and the need for a 40mph limit on this stretch of road (at present it is unrestricted) has made us all think hard. I am very pleased to say that Drayton PC, Milton PC and Milton Park are all expressing an interest in contributing to the cost of this. County Councillors (for this year at least) have a small pot – some of which can be used. The result is that the fighting fund is all but in place. I hope to have good news in the early new year. In the meantime, please drive carefully, and slowly.

Social Services, particularly Youth services are very likely to be cut back in the budget round. This is particularly relevant to our own Damascus Youth service. I am hoping that the local Parish Councils and the District Council will feel like gathering round to ensure the long term survival of this outstanding organisation. I cannot remember a time when our young people seem happier and more engaged with the rest of us. (We old ones could still do more in trying to engage with young people. Smiling and saying hello is a good start.)

The model of the Damascus Youth Project is admired all across the wider area and I shall be working with OCC and VWHDC to ensure the proper funding of Damascus whilst trying to find ways of expanding its influence. I am hoping that there could be substantial economy of scale savings to the public purse.

The FCC liaison Committee set up by my predecessor, Cllr Stuart Lilly, has been doing some excellent work in bringing the issues and concerns of local residents to the attention of FCC Management. The numbers of complaints re noise, smell etc have been on steady decline over the past year. The picture would have been better still but for a couple of glitches. On one occasion, the complaints helped the authorities to narrow down the cause and quickly remedy the situation. On the other occasion, the authorities were on the case within an hour of the first complaint, but were unable to trace the source.

As a newcomer, it seemed to me that the complaints procedure was very effective and speedy, but that the ability to source the complaint and remedy it often lagged behind. This is no one's fault. The nature of odours is that they are often intense but often very short-lived. This could give rise to some frustration amongst the complainants and other residents. Whatever the reason, it is very important that people do not lose faith in the system. The information the public give the authorities allows them to react much more speedily and effectively - so please, if you have an issue, the EA and FCC are ready and able to resolve problems when you contact them.

There is still some money left in the Community grants pot. If you have a local community project run by a committee and need some help, please contact me.
