VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Highway Verges – Gas Works

Following the completion of the installation of the new gas piping in the village, Southern Gas Networks are inspecting all the highway verges in the village to check for areas where restoration is needed. They will be levelling and reseeding any areas where trenches have been dug. Please do not park your cars on the verges as this will prevent the appropriate restoration from being carried out.

Rural Footpaths

At this time of year as the growing season gets underway weeds and overhanging tree growth begin to take over some of the rural rights of way. Whilst the County Council has some responsibility to protect the public rights of way so that the public can use and enjoy them, it can also require owners to cut back overhanging growth from the side of a path and can deal with obstructions on any of the routes. If you are the occupier of land adjacent to a path, then please help to it clear to allow pedestrians to use it without hindrance. Also in the past there have been grass cuttings dumped on the rural paths. Please help to keep the village tidy by placing garden waste in the brown bins available from the Vale of White Horse District Council or take it to the local recycling centre at Drayton.

English Heritage – Didcot Power Station

Confirmation has been received that English Heritage had submitted a recommendation to the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, that Didcot A power station should not be added to the list of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historical Interest and that a certificate of immunity should be issued. The cooling towers at the Power Station will therefore not become listed.

Local Government Boundary Commission – Vale of White Horse

The Local Government Boundary Commission has completed its electoral review of the area and confirmed that the Vale of White Horse District Council will have 38 councillors from the next elections in May 2015. The aim of the review was to recommend ward boundaries that ensured that each councillor represented approximately the same number of residents. The recommendation is to leave Sutton Courtenay Parish with Appleford Parish in a one member ward.

Planning Applications

The following applications were received by the Parish Council:

P13/V0463/CA and P13/V0462/FUL Demolition of 2 existing dwellings, and erection of 2 detached family dwellings with associated landscaping at 2 and 3 Abbey Cottages, High Street. These applications were amendments to a previously approved application, and the Parish Council had no objections.

From the Ministry Team.....

I have just returned from a four day conference, run by the Diocese of Oxford, on 'Leading Your Church into Growth'. Over 100 clergy and laity from across the diocese were there to hear that church growth, whilst extremely challenging in the present climate, is not impossible! And the story of Pentecost is just part of the encouragement we can find in the Bible.

2000 years ago Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits. A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit - the day the Church was born.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else left for them to do: Jesus had died, he had risen, and he had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. Jesus had told his apostles that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for his apostles – but he knew they could not do the work themselves – they would need his help. And so the apostles and disciples waited in Jerusalem, praying together for several days.

And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them.

The Holy Spirit came to dwell in the apostles and disciples of Jesus: and the Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent and the church grew.

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian church that morning: proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded to Peter's words, were converted, and were baptised – now how's that for fast church growth?

FROM ED VAIZEY M.P.

One of the issues that concerns many constituents is the local postal service, and the wish to preserve the service that we have. Getting the post out to all the residents in our very rural constituency is no mean feat, as I see for myself every Christmas when I visit sorting offices to thank the post teams who do all the work. At the moment, one particular small but important issue is being considered - protecting rural post boxes. Ofcom have set out proposals that would protect post boxes in our villages by tightening the criteria which oblige the Royal Mail to ensure that there is a post box within reasonable reach of people in all but the most isolated places. This won't mean more post boxes being installed, but it should prevent any more being removed. I think that is much to be encouraged!

As an MP I am often alerted to opportunities that I think may benefit constituents, and two have recently come my way. Firstly, if you are working on a community project, do have a look at the People's Millions website. There's an application form there which allows local community-based projects to bid for up to £50,000. Past successes have included a training service for blind people and a cyber café run by disadvantaged young people, as well as a project that built a new toilet and washbasin area for young people in a memorial hall. There's clearly all sorts of ways such funding could be used, and with the wealth of community projects and activities across the constituency, I am sure that we have some great ideas that could be put forward. The deadline is 13th May, so please don't delay.

Small businesses are vital to our economy, and they too need some help from time to time. One particular problem can be late payments – when larger organisations take far too long to pay smaller suppliers. The Federation of Private Business has let me know about their website -<u>www.fpb.org/page/531/</u> <u>Late payment Hall of Shame .htm</u> which shows details of companies that really ought to behave better than the do in this respect. It is not a website where anyone can post unproven allegations, but does allow small businesses to report late payers. If the behavior is shown to be bad then details will be posted on the website by the Federation. I'd very much hope that no businesses in the constituency either need to be reported or have to report others, but if the reasons are there, then the website will be a very useful tool.

This month I've received a great many emails about the protection of bees in the UK. The decline of bees around the world is a real problem and one that I looked into and raised myself during the last Parliament. In response to recent concerns about pesticides my colleague in the Department for the Environment and Rural Affairs, Lord de Mauley, has written a detailed letter about the work being done in the UK to safeguard bees and the scientific evidence that has been investigated with regards to the harm caused by neonicotinoids and other pesticides. Other campaigns that I have seen in my mailbox include support for the British Red Cross' campaign "Pupil, citizen, lifesaver", which seeks humanitarian and first aid education in the classroom, and also support for this Government's commitment to spend 0.7 per cent of our gross national income on development and aid spending abroad.

UPDATE FOR KEEP SUTTON COURTENAY RURAL

Thanks again go out to everyone who has objected to the Pye and Redrow applications that threaten to substantially alter the nature of the village. Over 100 objections were posted on the council website for each of the applications. It is still not too late to get your concerns heard by contacting the Vale of White Horse Planning department with your objection. The latest new on the applications is as follows:

Pye Homes: The target decision date for the Pye Homes' application for 34 houses on a green field site behind 92a-110 Milton Road was 24th April. However, the planning officer has confirmed this is not possible because he has yet to receive, from the developers, outstanding information on a number of issues. He has also indicated that the earliest the application could go before the Vale of White Horse Planning Committee would be 22nd May.

KSCR is planning to collect further traffic information, as that provided by the developers was unreliable and incomplete. Traffic survey work, already delayed by the road works in the village, will now need to be held back because of the impact on SC of road works in Milton High Street.

Because of the unreliable nature of the data Pye provided, Oxford County Council Highways Liaison Office (HLO), the statutory consultees on traffic, have used their own data, collected in 2008, upon which to base their response. The HLO conclusion is that, for the Pye site alone, there is not sufficient severe harm from increased traffic to justify refusal, although they do seek the fulfilment of several other highways related conditions.

However, it has been noticed that the 2008 data appears to show traffic volume lower that that identified in Milton Road, in a village survey conducted in 1995. KSCR will seek clarification from OCC concerning their data. Clearly data collected by KSCR, once the work in Milton High Street is completed, will provide a more accurate appraisal of the current situation. Furthermore, the HLO have given no consideration to the cumulative effect of additional traffic from the Pye and Redrow proposals taken together.

Redrow: The Redrow target decision date, for 70 dwellings behind 28-74 Milton Road currently remains 12th June.

Harwell Road Warehouse: At the time of writing there are no further developments on the, as yet, non-submitted application for a mega warehouse in Harwell Road.

DIDCOT POWER STATION

The demise of an old friend

The Didcot A coal fired power station is no more. At least it is still standing there, but it will never be used again, though it now has to go through a period of decommissioning, and then finally demolition, so it could easily be five years before it finally disappears, and of course meanwhile there is a gradual run down of staffing levels. (The B station continues to flourish and will be expanding).

I must be one of the few locals who was resident here before the A station was conceived and then built. So readers might be interested in a few facts and salient features. The station was designed in the 1960s and built to open in 1970, and has run pretty well without a serious hold up ever since



until this Spring. It took nearly 30,000 tons of steel in its construction, and the main foundations took almost 500,000 tons of concrete. Getting on a four miles of roads were constructed.

By the 1990s the A station was joined by its B sister, a gas fired station and very much smaller which started generating in 1997, and is still going strong. Didcot A survived the miners' strike but had to get special permission to bring in coal by road, since the station had been planned for exclusive rail deliveries. There were some disagreements and misunderstandings about the despatch of spent fuel to Radley lakes, but now happily resolved. There was unauthorised entry and tower climbing by Greenpeace and others, but the police and the station staff dealt with that promptly though these invasions did cost the owners a lot of money which no doubt ended up on all our electricity bills.

I doubt if I am the only one who feels a certain nostalgia about the end of Didcot A which incidentally is overwhelmingly in Sutton Courtenay despite its name. We had all got so used to it there, and you could see it for miles around, but now it is going if not gone, and we have to move on. In conclusion I would like to pay tribute to the staff who were well known in the community, especially local schools, and unlike some other major companies Didcot A was an admirable corporate citizen in the community.

BIRDWATCHER

New visitors to the garden since the March issue have been a beautiful Grey Wagtail with its bright yellow underside, and a pair of tiny, busy Chiffchaff's. Most of our village birds have built or are just finishing their nests by the time this issue is printed, so please try and avoid disturbing trees and hedges for the next 4-6 weeks.

I have been fascinated by raptors & owls (birds of prey) since my childhood. Their very survival means they have to kill almost every day. The Red Kites over our village often prompt a discussion on "How dangerous are they?" Well, unless you are smaller than 5-6 inches, you are very safe. Red kites eat mainly carrion (dead animals) that they are able to find, as they are too weak-footed to kill any prey much bigger than a baby rabbit. Their diet consists primarily of small rodents, beetles and earthworms. The Red kite hunts by flying low over open country, using the forked tail to steer like a rudder. Kites prefer hilly country, where woodland and open grassland occur close together. Sutton Courtenay with its woodlands and varied farmland provides a good location for the birds to nest and feed.

From my perspective, they help clean up our neighbourhood, and look magnificent as they float on the thermals above our houses. The image below was taken of a Red Kite above our village church.



Additional Red Kite Info: Length: 2' - 2' 6" Wingspan: 4' 8" - 5' 6" - They can live for more than 20 years. By mid-April, the female Red Kite has usually laid her eggs, although it might be a little later this year, due to the very cold weather. The eggs hatch after 30 days or so.

My daughter and I took a short cycle ride through the village and down Mill Lane this past weekend, and we disturbed a Common Buzzard from the roadside hedge where it was preying on wood pigeons in the open

field. Somewhat startled, it flew away, no more than 6 feet from where we had stopped. Hopefully, the next time we see this impressive bird, I will have my camera.
