#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### <u>Large Goods Vehicles through Appleford Road and</u> <u>Church Street</u>

The Parish Council has had concerns about large vehicles going through Appleford Road and Church Street and has investigated this. It appears that the B4016 is part of the Driving Standards Agency test route. The Council has written to the Agency asking about the frequency the routes are reviewed and whether there is any possibility of vehicles avoiding Sutton Courtenay.



#### New Housing Developments

The Parish Council has had concerns about the capacity of the foul drainage system in the village to be able to accommodate all the new housing which has been granted planning consent, and any possible further housing in the future. It has pursued the matter with Thames Water, and at the time of writing, is organising a meeting with Thames Water to discuss the problems that the village faces.

#### SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

As you read this our new school year will have already started and the children will be settling into their new classes and finding out about the exciting learning opportunities that are available to them.

In order to make this a really smooth start, all of the children have already spent at least two days with their new teacher in their new classroom to ensure the transition is as seamless as possible. This is also the case in our Reception Classroom (Barn Owls) where the children were full time for both days – and had a fantastic time.

Parents in our Barn Owls class had already attended a meeting prior to the transition days to meet their teacher and to talk through their 'School Ready' pack that we provide.

Within the pack is a CD of songs that are used a lot in the classroom, various activities to do at home and a book written by the current Barn Owl children about what it is like to be in the class. We have found that this information has been really useful for both parents and children alike.

Starting school is often more daunting for parents than the children but we like to support both as much as possible. It is so exciting to be starting the learning journey, exploring and discovering all kinds of new things: ideas, creations, constructions, knowledge. It is not long before the whole class in Reception are busy reading and writing confidently.

Parents can find out how to support their child's reading by attending a phonics workshop early on in the autumn term to ensure that the correct sounds are used when reading and 'sounding out' – it is vitally important to get this right!

#### **REST IN PEACE**

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently:

Harold Hughes (known to everyone as Brad) who has died, aged 76, on 15th May 2013 was born on 23rd March 1937 in Abingdon, although he spent the last 33 years living in Sutton Courtenay. One of seven children he grew up with his three brothers and three sisters in Abingdon. He had a hard life, brought up in the war years. His Father died at an early age and his mum worked hard to provide for the family. His sister Pauline can remember Brad being a very protective brother, he would give her boyfriends the once over and make sure she was home on time (9.30pm). Brad tapered all the teddy boys trousers. He taught Pauline how to press them, and he would pay her 2 shillings for each pair she pressed. He was always the first on the dance floor where he was infamous for his rock and roll dancing at the local dance halls. He started a country western group called the Abingdon Bounty Hunters. They would perform shows and hold dances to raise money for local charities. In the early days he loved banger racing. He won cups and medals and would do the repairs himself and keep the cars on the track. His love for racing continued and he followed formula one racing. He also loved going off-roading with his son Chris and Grandson Troy. Cars were his passion – progressing from building his own bicycles made from recycled parts from the local dump, to fixing up modern day cars. He could always be found at the local scrap yard. Later in life he met Sherryl through his brother Ron. They married and had 4 children Chris, Sharon, Jayne and Paula. It changed his life forever. He had many hobbies. With his son Chris he played Aunt Sally for the Plough Inn at Long Wittenham. He had two fish ponds, where he kept Koi carp. He also enjoyed his woodwork, making wishing wells and plant tubs among other things. Sherryl never needed to call in any repair men as he could repair anything. He especially loved his holidays in Cyprus with Sherryl and went there many times. On one of his trips he went to Egypt and the Pyramids. He was brave enough to go through the small opening, and went deep inside one of the Pyramids when no one else would. Some of his proudest moments were walking his daughters down the aisle, and the arrival into the family of his many grandchildren. He was a quiet and unassuming man but was always willing to help when and where ever he could. During the last few years he also helped look after his in-laws. Marion and George, they called him their tea boy. Some days George and Brad could be seen on their electric scooters on the road to Didcot to fetch the shopping. In the last few years he had slowed down. One of the things loved to do was to sit in his own special chair with a cup of tea and do his wordsearches and of course, still enjoying a cigarette. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends. His funeral service took place in All Saints' Church on 28th May, conducted by the Rev'd Ernest Adley. This is an edited extract of notes provided by the family.

Marion Louise Tyler who has died, aged 73 was born in Oxford, to parents Bill and Lou. She has a brother Stuart and sister Jane. She attended the West Oxford School before starting her first job at the Co-Op before going on to Coopers, the Jam factory, where she made horse radish sauce. Marion met George Tyler outside Woolworths in Oxford at Easter 1957. She was only 17 and he was 18. George would cycle from Appleford to Oxford and, after a courtship spent going to the pictures and for longs walks along Binsey Lane and around Port Meadow, George proposed to Marion in the hut at Appleford Station and they were engaged on October 1st. Despite Marion telling George she 'would have to think about it' they were married in February 1958. They lived in Appleford before moving to Bradstocks Way in 1963 where they have lived ever since. George and Marion went onto have six children - Sherryl, Georgina, Paul, Leslie, Jeanette and Pauline and over the years the family continued to expand with sixteen grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. As well as bringing up her children she had a variety of jobs. She drove the Spark's Bus taking children to Benet House and worked as a cleaner at nights at Jet in Culham. She was a Home Help and she also cleaned at 'The Fish' and for the Vicar at the Old Vicarage. Alongside all of this George's grave digging business soon developed into a real family concern with everyone lending a hand. Marion was a very good cook and as a skilled seamstress used to make lots of her own clothes and with her knitting machine would make school jumpers for all her children. She also liked to crochet and loved flowers and flower arranging. She belonged to the Young Wives and for many years was Brown Owl for the village Brownies. She helped in the early days of the SC News – being part of the working party who would staple all the pages together before they were distributed. She worked many hours fundraising for the school, helping to raise money for the outdoor Swimming Pool and organising the Christmas parties. At Tupperware Parties she would often be found looking after all the children whilst the Mums shopped. Marion's door was always open for her children's friends, and, latterly, also for her beloved grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Instinctively loving and caring, she loved children and was always ready to offer them a warm welcome and a listening ear. She loved family holidays spent in Hayling Island and later Cyprus. They also visited Spain, India and Jersey but above all Marion loved her home and to sit in her chair at the centre of her family. The later years of her life were very tough with the increasing challenges of ill-health and the death of George in 2011, when she seemed to give up without her partner of so many years by her side. If George had lived, they would have celebrated their 55<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary in February this year. Life for Marion would have been a lot harder without the loving support of her family around her to help her through numerous health crises and trips to hospital. She will be greatly missed by her family and her friends. This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral on 6<sup>th</sup> July by the Reverend Helen Kendrick.

Pamela Lucy Rae Horn, who has died aged 77 years, was a familiar figure in Sutton Courtenay – often described as 'the woman who walks', as, whatever the weather, she could be seen walking up and down the length of the village. She was born in 1936 in Derbyshire being the only child of Madge and Laurie. She excelled at school and studied science but she later gave up these studies to take up secretarial work. She worked for the Derbyshire County Council and then taught Commercial Subjects at the Derby Technical College where she met her future husband Jack. As a young person she enjoyed walking with her father almost every day and also went rambling in the Peak District accompanied almost everywhere by her Scottie dog. After her marriage to Jack, Pamela won a scholarship to Leicester University, eventually gaining her MA and a PhD. She then moved with Jack to Portsmouth until they finally moved to Harwell Road, Sutton Courtenay. As an economic historian she enjoyed a distinguished career as a Lecturer, not least at Oxford Polytechnic, and as time and her detailed and diligent research allowed, an even more distinguished career as a prolific writer on a wide variety of economic history subjects. Her publications extended from short booklets about individuals and single topics to many articles in learned journals and to major texts on, for example, the Rise and Fall of the Victorian Servant; Pleasures and Pastimes in Victorian Britain; Behind the Counter; and Ladies of the Manor. Her latest publication was a colourful Pitkin Guide to Life in a Victorian School. She was nationally recognised as expert in her field and was invited to lecture at the Society of Genealogists and numerous University Societies. She still accepted invitations from small groups who sought to hear her on a particular topic. Her great support in all her work was her husband, Jack. Himself a distinguished Business Specialist at Oxford Polytechnic, in retirement he would take Pamela to libraries and record offices around the country. This Pamela acknowledged in every one of her publications indicating that Jack had helped her in every possible way. She was also an invigilator for an examination board and spoke and read German fluently. The National Trust and other Great Old Houses gave her much pleasure and of course information for her many books. She also made several TV Appearances, gave Radio Interviews and provided information to TV producers for Period Dramas. Pamela was constantly in touch with her few relatives. She was a quiet and private lady who was most interesting to converse with on many subjects. She loved literature but her great love was history and this interest and her academic work helped her through the years alone after her husband's death. Pamela was determined to live as independent life as possible but she was also very grateful for the support she received from her next-door neighbours - Judy and all the Mathews family who helped her in so many ways over the years. Without them, life alone would have been even more challenging. Her funeral took place in All Saints' Church on 24<sup>th</sup> July 2013. This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral by The Reverend Helen Kendrick.

#### FROM ED VAIZEY M.P.

The Wantage and Didcot Constituency is a fascinating place! I've recently been reviewing some of the statistics which are provided to MPs and have seen that we are one of the most prosperous areas in the UK. 83% of people locally between the ages of 16 and 64 are employed and nearly 89% are economically active, with around 7% running their own businesses. That compares with an employment rate of 74% across the South East and 71% nationally. Of those working in the constituency, 83% work full time compared with 74% nationally, meaning our workforce has more stable and often more rewarding employment, with average local incomes 10% above the national level. That's due, in some part, to the fact that 34% of local residents have a degree or higher qualification and just 3% have no qualifications at all. Businesses set up locally do better over their first five years than in other places too. We are home to some of the most exciting and innovative scientific enterprises in the world.

What that string of statistics actually means is that the Constituency is not only a very attractive area in which to live, but also a vibrant and successful one. We do have some real challenges, such as the fact that house prices are very high in relation to our incomes, and finding a decent home in the area can be a real challenge. Helping people with housing problems is one of the areas where I am kept busy, and identifying suitable places to build the new homes we need is a real challenge. On that last point, I am continuing to lobby ministers nationally to try to have planning laws and guidance made really fit for purpose so we can build the homes we need without imposing inappropriate growth on rural communities. The Minister who leads on planning, Nick Boles, will be visiting the Constituency at my invitation in September to hear directly from constituents about the problems we have here with the current system. \*



A number of constituents have also contacted me about getting people in Britain cycling, an issue which the Government has already taken significant action on.

However, an area of great concern for people considering starting to cycle is the safety for drivers on the road, so I am pleased to hear that the Government has allocated  $\pounds 107m$  to support cycling safety, loosened rules so Local Authorities can introduce 20mph speed limits in residential areas, and made it easier to install Trixi mirrors to improve the visibility of cyclists at junctions.

And one final note! I was astonished to hear about the plans being put forward by a developer for an international airport south of Marcham. There are many reasons why this is a very daft idea, most of which have been reported widely. Please rest assured that if the concept doesn't disappear of its own accord very swiftly, I will do all that I can to ensure that it never gets beyond the drawing board.

#### ORWELL SOCIETY MEETS AT ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

Around 50 people attended a commemoration of the life of George Orwell on Sunday 23rd June, timed to coincide with the Church's Midsummer Weekend and to be the nearest Sunday to Orwell's birthday (which falls on 25th June). Most of you will know that Orwell, whose real name was Eric Blair, is buried in the Church graveyard. The Orwell Society was formed two years ago and its patron is Richard Blair, Orwell's adopted son. In a short act of remembrance, Richard read one of Orwell's essay, "Some Thoughts on the Common Toad", published in 1946, the year after Animal Farm and three years before Nineteen Eighty-Four. In the essay Orwell asks, "Is it wicked to take a pleasure in spring and other seasonal changes?". Orwell is undoubtedly better known for his great novels than his love of nature, but many of his less well known writings concern nature and are always written in his entertaining and easy to read style. He concludes the essay by saying that, "The atom bombs are piling up in the factories, the police are prowling through the cities, the lies are streaming from the loudspeakers, but the earth is still going round the sun, and neither the dictators nor the bureaucrats, deeply as they disapprove of the process, are able to prevent it."

On behalf of the Orwell Society I would like to thank all the villagers who made us feel very welcome, and in particular The Reverend Helen Kendrick for allowing us use of the Church. We would like to make the event an annual one and have already pencilled in Sunday 22nd June 2014.

#### CHILDREN'S READ-A-THON AT MILTON MANOR

#### "Reading is one of the most important gifts we can give our children. One in six people do not have the literacy skills they need. We have the ability to change that statistic."

A fun day to inspire and fire the literary imagination of children of all ages....from toddlers to octogenarians will take place in the beautiful grounds of Milton Manor, Milton, near Abingdon on Saturday 14th September from 11 am to 4 pm.



Every part of the delightful grounds will play host to a children's story or character, with Peter Pan hiding out in

his amazing Tree House, Beatrix Potter characters by the lily pond, and a beautiful resident Shire horse, Rocket, taking the role of the equine hero of Michael Morpurgo's War Horse in the Georgian stables. Well-known children's authors David Melling (Hugless Douglas), Alan Gibbons (Shadow of the Minotaur) and up-and-coming illustrator and author Charlie Sutcliffe will be giving readings from their books and offering book signings. They will also be joined by poet John Foster who will be passing on his enthusiasm for poetry with readings and talks.

The free event is the brainchild of Oxfordshire teacher and Milton resident Anne Wattam. "We are really keen to attract children who wouldn't normally come to such an event. By bringing the characters to life, making story-telling an adventure and meeting inspirational authors and poets, we hope to fire their imagination and develop a life-long passion for reading."

It promises to be a magical affair. A woodland walk becomes the Gruffalo Walk, a lily pond will be the mermaids' lagoon from Peter Pan and the stable courtyard becomes an activity zone where children can be transformed into their favourite characters with face paint, illustrate their own story characters and join in other fun activities linked to their favourite stories. Visitors are encouraged to dress as their favourite character and bring their own books to trade in at the book swap stand (one book for 2). The Manor's walled garden will host Code X Microworld and feature the 12 themed reading zones already familiar to many primary school children, including Dragon's Quest, Forbidden Valley and Bugtastic. There will be an interactive zone featuring ipads and e-books hosted by RM Education, a Mad Hatter's Tea Party in front of the Manor, tractor and pony rides, house tours and a chance to seek out 32 story characters wandering around the grounds, including, rather appropriately, Where's Wally!

Says Anne, "Publishing houses and authors have offered some fabulous prizes such as signed books including Angelina Ballerina, Winnie the Witch, Shadow of the Minotaur, Hugless Douglas sets and John Foster poetry books. We were thrilled to also receive a huge plush Hugless Douglas toy as a prize - a real coup as these toys can't be bought in the shops. There's also a raffle and the chance to win books, book vouchers and even an Icer Aconia tablet."

Milton Manor is the ancestral home of the Mockler-Barrett family with present incumbent Anthony Mockler-Barrett opening the event alongside Culture, Communications and Creative Industries Minister Ed Vaizey, MP for Didcot and Wantage. Mr Mockler is himself a published author.






