

# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### **Road Closure B4016**

The section of the B4016 between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford is scheduled to close from 11th November for 5 days to allow for carriageway resurfacing. The closure area is from the junction with Abingdon Road right through to the turning to Didcot beyond the Appleford level crossing into the landfill site. Access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and residents in the closure area.



#### **Review of Parish boundaries**

The Vale of White Horse District Council is currently undertaking a community governance review and has recommended that consideration be

given to placing the whole of Milton Park in a single parish. Sutton Courtenay Parish Council however, believes that any change would not have a positive impact for community governance in this area, and it has not supported the principle of considering the parish boundaries.

#### **Parish Housing Policy**

Residents have suggested that the Parish Council give consideration to drafting a housing policy for the area, given the number of applications that have been lodged recently. At the moment a group of volunteers in the village is undertaking a community led plan. The Parish Council has therefore decided to wait until the analysis of those questionnaires is complete, and the community led plan drafted, and it can then consider producing a summary sheet containing the key issues for housing in the parish.

#### Grants

The Parish Council considers any requests for grants when setting its budget for the next financial year. Therefore, if there is any worthy and needy organisation where Sutton Courtenay residents benefit, which is considering applying to the Parish Council for a grant, then please write to the Clerk as soon as possible, stating the purpose of the grant and supplying a copy of your organisation's accounts.

#### Fireworks

A reminder to be considerate of neighbours and the many pets and animals in the village when letting off your fireworks. Please notify others when any fireworks are going to be lit so that villagers are aware and arrangements can be made to keep pets indoors.

#### **Planning Applications**

#### The following planning applications have been considered :

P13/V1893/HH Alterations to conservatory and change garage flat roof to pitched roof at 8 Harwell Road. The Council had no objections

P13/V1991/HH Oak framed extension to kitchen/breakfast and single storey extension to study at The Barn House, Old Wallingford Way. The Council had no objections

P13/V1988/LB Replacement of boiler at The Abbey, The Green. The Council had no objections

P13/V1832/O Erection of new buildings for storage and distribution on land west of the Power Station off Sutton Courtenay Lane. The Parish Council lodged strong objections to this proposal owing to the traffic implications for the village, the lack of a travel plan for employees, the cumulative impact of all developments in the area, the effect on the local residents and school, the design, size and height of the buildings. acoustic impact, drainage, effect on biodiversity, socio-economic impact and the coalescence of settlements. The Parish council has urged the District Council to refuse the application.

#### Erection of 9 dwellings - Peewit Farm

The Parish Council has been advised that an appeal against the refusal by the Vale of White Horse District Council, to erect 9 dwellings at Peewit Farm off the Drayton Road had been turned down.

I also noticed today that there appears yet another leak in the High Street next to the Garage. Are the Parish Council being kept aware of these problems with the water pipework by Thames Water?

## SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Our first term back at school has flown past and it will not be long until we are building up to Christmas.

Last term there were many different projects going on in school to engage the children and help to bring their learning to life. The whole of Key Stage 2 (ages 7-11) studied the topic entitled 'Scream Machine'. This focused on Science as the main area of the topic and in particular looked at the forces of gravity and friction. The children have had fantastic learning experiences: making paperclips 'float' whilst exploring the forces of magnetism, investigating friction whilst doing 'jelly races' and as a finale all the children visited Legoland to see forces in action.



Love life; love learning; love one another

Year 2 (ages 6 and 7) have been exploring the Orchestra and composing different pieces of music and Year 1 have also had a science focus: electricity.

This year we have started all sorts of initiatives, one of which is replacing the 'School Council' with a Pupils' Parliament. This involves all children in Years 2-6 making decisions about different aspects of school life. Their work this term has involved looking at the values that we want all members of our school community to display at all times. This is what the children decided:

We are honest.

We co-operate.

We are responsible.

We show respect.

We are kind.

We persevere.

We always do our best.





Our iPads have also added to the learning experiences with children from reception upwards using them to create eBooks using a range of features and different apps. This wonderful resource has become a very important part of the learning that we are able to offer.

Term 1 has also seen us launch our new sports initiatives. For the first time we entered a Cross Country competition and our boys team came 9<sup>th</sup> out of 21 with the girls finishing 8<sup>th</sup> out of 19. Our football team has also started playing in the small schools league. After school clubs are very popular with basketball, football and zumba all attracting over 20 children every week.

# **REST IN PEACE**

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following person who has died recently:

**Sebastian Peter Grootz** who has died aged 28 on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2013 was born 19<sup>th</sup> March 1985 in Oxford on and grew up in Sutton Courtenay, Didcot and Scotland. He went to Northborne Primary School and to St Birinus. From an early age he was interested in life – energetic and curious, a live-wire with a mischievous streak. He was the baby of the family and grew up with his big brother Kai and big sister Nina – putting up with all that a little brother must. As a young man he spent several months in New Zealand – a time which proved to be very formative for him and left him with a lifelong love of the country and a desire to return – the only thing holding him back was the thought of leaving all his family and friends who meant so much to him.

Sebastian met Emily in 2009 and, although Emily's first impression of him was not entirely favourable, his charm did eventually win her over and he, apparently liked Emily from the first moment as she actually laughed at his jokes. In due course Seb and Emily set up home together and their daughter Scarlett was born on 25<sup>th</sup> July last year and Ruben, their son, is on the way. Seb proved to be a very good father – always prepared to change nappies and very keen to get involved in all aspects of being a parent. He had a natural connection to children and he always wanted some of his own. He had a sense of adventure, a hunger for life and for all the experiences it offered. He loved motorbikes; relished the cut and thrust of rugby and enjoyed time with Kai on their mountain bikes. He was addicted to the Harry Potter films and used to like drumming – although, as his Dad observed, that wasn't so popular with the neighbours. He was an inventive cook, not afraid of experimenting. In many ways he was a free thinking, free spirit but also proved himself to be very determined, hard-working and committed to providing for his growing family. After various jobs in sales he began working for Asda and embarked on a college course to train as a plumber and with dreams of starting his own business – determined to carve out a future for himself and his family. Tragically this was not to be, as he died in a motorcycle accident on 23<sup>rd</sup> September. He will be greatly missed by his partner Emily and all his family and his many friends.

This is an edited extract of the address given at Seb's funeral on 8<sup>th</sup> October 2013 in All Saints' Church, Sutton Courtenay by the Reverend Helen Kendrick. Personal tributes were also paid by Seb's brother Kai, his sister Nia and John, one of his many friends.

Duruflé: Requiem

Choral works by Beethoven, Bruckner, Holst and Rheinberger

Albinoni: Adagio for strings

Maurice Duruflé was born in Normandy at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. His early education as a chorister at Rouen cathedral introduced him to plainsong chant and it is this style of singing which has strongly influenced his requiem. He was a fastidious composer constantly re-working his compositions and often burning discarded writing, as such only 14 opus numbers are known to exist. This work displays a subtle and expressive reading of the requiem, in contrast to the somewhat fiery settings of Verdi and Berlioz at the time and represents the idea of comfort, faith and hope.

The choir will be joined by a mezzo soprano and baritone soloist, with a full supporting orchestra.

For a number of years now, we have neglected to use the fine organ we have in our church and we shall be using this magnificent instrument throughout the concert

#### FROM ED VAIZEY M.P.

As we are now approaching the first anniversary of the Localism Act, it's worth remembering the range of powers and programmes which communities can use to shape their areas. The Government has published a guide which can be accessed at this website:

<u>www.gov.uk/government/publications/youve-got-the-power-a-</u> <u>quick-and-simple-guide-to-community-rights</u>

It's described as quick and simple, and as it runs to just 23 pages it is a model of brevity compared to many documents produced by civil servants. There's concise guidance on the options that might be available in different sets of circumstances and then advice on what each process will



involve as well as examples of how each of the powers has been used by a different community. It's well worth a look.

This has been a busy month in politics. The major parties have all had their conferences and Parliament has returned for the autumn. With all the issues that have arisen and the policies that have been discussed in recent weeks, it's no surprise that my mailbag has also been keeping me busy. I have had emails on a wide variety of issues but 2 campaigns have been particularly noticeable:

Firstly, there is a campaign to speed up the approval of a Royal Charter to regulate the press. I can assure you that the Government and I are committed to implementing a tough new system of press self-regulation, and a royal charter with cross party agreement was agreed to earlier this year. This is now being fully considered, to ensure that the process of implementing the Leveson recommendations is as robust as possible. While I understand the desire to see changes made as soon as possible, given the importance of these measures I would be reluctant to see the process rushed in any way.

Secondly, there have been a number of emails arising from the film 'I Am Breathing', which tells the story of Neil Platt, a young man with motor neurone disease. MND is a dreadful, devastating disease and I am sure that his important film will not only raise awareness of the condition, but act as an inspiration for others. The cause of MND is unknown and therefore there is no known cure. However, the treatment of MND and other long-term health conditions remains a priority in this Government's plans for the NHS, which is why there is now a  $\pounds 3.8$ bn fund to aid the joining up of different health and care services to ensure that people get the specific care that is right for them.

# BIRDWATCHER

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP 5 (NAG 5)**

At the last meeting of NAG5, the discussions centred on the June meeting of The Thames Valley Neighbourhood Watch & in particular the protection of property. A major concern expressed by the Police at that meeting was the high volume of lost & recovered stolen property held by police which could not be identified with the owners. The police stressed that there are simple means of marking property which would identify the owner to the police.

There are ultra violet (UV) marker pens with which owners mark valuable items with their post code and also there is a brand of forensic marking fluid known as Smartwater. This liquid is invisible to the eye when dabbed onto valuable items, but as with marker pens, glows under UV. Each bottle contains sufficient to mark about 50 items and the contents are unique to the purchaser much like DNA. Advantages of Smartwater over marker pens are that it is linked with the owner not the address, and does not wear off. Should an owner move house the Smartwater register needs to be updated with the new address but it is not necessary, unlike with marker pens, to re-mark the items. Information provided with the Smarwater kit includes a registration form containing the liquid's unique number which the user completes and returns to the address provided. Stickers to affix to windows and doors to show that Smartwater has been used are also provided. Any items coming into police possession are scanned on arrival and if marked are linked with the owner. Neighbourhood policing teams also carry with them ultra violet lanterns which they use on stop checks, search warrants & scrap yard checks.

There are a limited number of Smartwater kits available at the police station, priced £15, heavily discounted. They can be ordered by phoning 101 & asking for the front desk. Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators may wish to encourage participation in this scheme by their groups. Help and advice can be sought from our neighbourhood police team. Appleford is now designated a Smartwater Zone as a large number of residents are using Smartwater. This should discourage thefts.

There are few Neighbourhood Watch schemes registered on the Watch website. There is only one registered in Sutton Courtenay whereas there are several in the village. This makes it difficult for those wishing to join a scheme to find one local to their address. Coordinators are asked to register their schemes on the website, *www.ourwatch.org.uk* and go to the Home page and follow the instructions.

# SUTTON COURTENAY COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Oxfordshire County Council, in common with most County Councils is very short of money. It has capital reserves, but its Revenue Budget gets tighter and tighter every year. In the next financial year, it is going to have find tens of millions of annual savings to makes its books balance. Hard decisions are going to have to be made over which services, traditionally offered by OCC should be cut. With Social Services, Roads and Education being the major costs, and the Education budget being largely protected, the options are not attractive. By contrast, District Councils, by and large, are comparatively wealthy; Parish Councils also have more freedom to raise money (at present) than either District or County Councils.

We can either complain and demand a reverse of direction or we can embrace the change and endeavour to make it an opportunity rather than a threat. Money flowing down the chain towards Parish Councils, empowering people to take more responsibility for local decisions, raising the status of, and public interest in the work of Parish Councils, is no bad thing. Indeed, it is what Localism is about.

However, giving people more power over their own lives only works if a) local people are prepared to take up the responsibility and b) those, who have traditionally held the power, understand that they are required to give some of it up. None of this will happen quickly, indeed, it may take years to achieve. However, having watched the Parish Councils in my Council Division in action, I cannot accept the old argument that such bodies are not capable and fit to make sensible decisions for their communities. There is much to threaten us out there at present, but there is also great opportunity. So where does this leave a County Council? Maybe Social Service responsibilities are gradually being handed downwards. Academies are steadily removing County powers over Education. It seems that the only certain future responsibility of Council has is spent largely here. If the whole place is not to seize up, if people are going to be able to get to our Schools and our Social services, we are going to need some solutions to our transport problems in this rather overcrowded part of these overcrowded islands.

It is a sad fact that it takes a fatality to focus everyone's mind on a road problem. The Milton road out of Drayton has just seen its third fatality in the last five years. In each case, itwas a lone driver (in two cases, motorcyclists), who died. In no case was there a multiple collision. It seems that the drivers lost control on one of the numerous S- bends between Milton and Drayton. At present, the speed of the road is not restricted. In other words, it is legal to drive at 60mph on it. I do not know a single person, resident, Parish Councillor from Drayton, Milton or Sutton Courtenay who thinks that 60mph is a safe or sensible speed to be travelling on that stretch of road. Reason and public opinion all; argue that it should be 40mph. Arguments against are around enforceability, precedents and the cost of implementing a change. Enforceability is, of course, an issue for an overstretched Police Authority – but if the effect of a 40mph limit is only to reduce the average speed on a road by say 10%, surely this us worth it -a smaller risk of lives lost – even if it cannot be fully enforced? And if there are other stretches of road which could be affected by such a change, is that such a bad thing? No, the argument for me, is all about cost. There are legal costs to such a change, costs of consultation and costs of implementation. In the case of Milton Road, the total costs are estimated at between £3-4K. OCC has no budget for this, but until April, at least I have some money (maybe up to  $\pounds 1K$ ) from a thing called the Area Stewardship Fund which could be spent on it. The rest of the money would have to be found from a general whip round the Parish Councils and Milton Park, but I would like to pursue this. This is urgent. We do not want any more fatalities. If you agree, and live in Drayton, Milton, Sutton Courtenay, or work at Milton Park please encourage everyone to support this initiative.






