



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Council budget 2014/15

The Parish Council has carefully considered its budget for 2014/2015 looking in detail at its income and expenditure. This year, as reported in last December's news article, the Council has also had to take into account the Government's changes to the Council tax benefit scheme. The Vale of White Horse District Council determines and administers its own council tax reduction scheme, which has an effect on the parish element of the council tax.

The Autumn ministerial statement from the Department for Communities and Local Government announced that it expected local



authorities to protect tax payers and help bear down on the cost of living. The Parish Council has supported this view and for the fifth year running the Parish Council has set its budget needs at the same figure of £46136. The Vale of White Horse District Council should provide a grant towards those costs of £2758, and the parish council tax element will therefore be £43378. This equates to approximately £45.09 per year for a property on Band D council tax or 87p per week.

Sutton Courtenay Lane - Proposed warehouse

At the time of writing a public exhibition about the revisions to the proposed warehouse in Sutton Courtenay Lane is being planned. It is understood that the building is likely to be reduced in height by about 5 metres, and set back some 125 metres from Sutton Courtenay Lane with more landscaping and screening. The formal planning application is about to be lodged, and the Parish Council will be consulted on the proposals in due course. Any resident who wishes to monitor what is happening can check on the Vale of White Horse District Council's website under planning, where there will be an opportunity to comment on the revised plans.

Landfill Site - FCC

The Parish Council has been advised by the County Council that FCC has lodged an appeal against the refusals in September for a waste transfer station and the amendment to the working hours and outside storage of waste.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered:

P13/V2603/LB Internal repairs and remedial works at 8 The Green. The Council had no objections

P13/V2352/Erection of 2 storey side extension and single storey rear extension at 1 The Croft.

The Council had no objections in principle, but wished window and door features to be in keeping.

P13/V2328/D Notification received for the demolition of existing buildings, coal handling machinery etc at the Power Station. The Council had no objections

P13/V2381/HH Demolition of garden store and erection of single storey rear extension at 12 Abingdon Rd. The Council had no objections

P13/V2321/RM Approval of reserved matters for Redrow Homes, Milton Road The Council had concerns regarding possible overlooking, the raising of ground levels and public open space close to boundaries with inadequate landscaping.

P13/V2447/FUL Variation of condition on Redrow Homes approval to change the wording on the consent from lodging and approval of reserved matters within 6 months, to only the submission of reserved matters within that timeframe. The council had no comment to make.

MW.048/05 Progressive extraction of sand and gravel at Sutton Wick. The council requested that the land be restored to agriculture.

MW.150/13 Retrospective application to continue the development without complying with the completion date Allens Land, Sutton Wick. Council had no objection to the extension of time, but considered that flooding was a ground for objection.



DOGS & SHEEP

The Earth Trust, which manages Wittenham Clumps, has drawn the Editors' attention to an incident last month when a dog attacked and killed a sheep on the Wittenham Clumps. The Trust also advised that over the past few weeks, there have been several incidents where sheep have been seriously injured after being mauled by dogs. The Earth Trust is requesting that all dog owners keep their dogs on a lead whilst walking in areas where the sheep are grazing. This applies not just to Earth Trust land but all land where sheep are grazing and is particularly important as we are now in the lambing season. It is worth remembering that in certain circumstances a dog can be shot if caught attacking

livestock. There are situations where a dog owner could be prosecuted for having an out of control dog. The National Farmers Union advice for dog walkers is:-

- ♦ Avoid getting between cows and their calves
- ♦ Keep any dogs close and under effective control on a lead around cows and sheep.
- ◆ Do not hang onto your dog if you are threatened by cattle let it go, as the cattle will chase the dog.

The Role of School Governors

Have you ever wondered what School Governors do in schools, or thought about becoming one yourself?

School Governors are a team of people who work closely with the Head Teacher to make key decisions vital to the successful running of the school. Governors make decisions that directly affect the education and well-being of the children and even appoint the Head Teacher! They play an important role in improving standards throughout the school and agree the schools budget. In other words, it is a very meaningful role!



Love life; love learning; love one another

Being a School Governor can be a rewarding experience. You play an important part in improving the children's education and supporting the schools staff, and giving a lot to the school and the community usually means you'll get a lot back. Being a Governor is also an opportunity to develop new skills or practice existing ones that can help you in your day job, like chairing meetings, putting forward suggestions and asking the right questions, speaking in public, appointing staff, and helping other members who are new to the job or have less experience of committee work.

Anyone over 18 can be a School Governor provided there are spaces on the Governing Body – you **do not** have to be a parent with a child at the school. However, every Governing Body includes **Parent Governors**, and it can be a rewarding way to be involved in your child's school.

The most important qualities for being a Governor are **enthusiasm**, **commitment** and an **interest** in **education**. You do not need teaching experience, but it's useful to bring skills from other areas of your life.

At most schools you'll need to attend a Governors' meeting termly. You would also be expected to join a Sub-Committee, Performance and Standards (Curriculum and Academic Achievement) or Resources (Staffing, Finance and Buildings). You'll need to be able to work well in a team, as you'll be making joint decisions on policy.

At Sutton Courtenay, our Governing Body is made up of Parent Governors, Foundation Governors (who are responsible for ensuring that our distinctiveness as a church school is maintained and strengthened), Staff Governors (made up of teaching and non-teaching roles) and those that have been appointed by the Local Authority.

There is currently a vacancy within our Schools Governing Body for a 'Local Authority Governor'. From the Ministry Team...

Are you prepared to meet the challenge of change?

'As the Spirit of the Lord works within us, we become more and more like him....' 2 Corinthians 3.18

Most of us are attracted by the idea of self-improvement, of perfecting our characters, but what we find hard to deal with is the process of change we have to go through in order to achieve this. It is all too easy for us to form habits which then begin to form us and it becomes even harder to break those habits, do something new and change. Yet it is undeniable that without change, there is no growth – either in individuals or in organisations. The good news is that if we have the right attitude, every change (whether positive or negative), will be a fruitful and growing experience. It is up to us!

In nature trees have to live through several seasons of growth and change before they produce any fruit. And is after the rainy season that the growth occurs and then the fruit can be harvested. You don't have to like the rain, you just have to understand its purpose. The Bible says that Christians are being changed into Christ's likeness. (2 Corinthians 3.18) But to be like Jesus, you have to follow wherever he leads. That means following him through the wilderness of temptation, the complete surrender of your will to God and, finally, to the place of crucifixion. There is no other way. To walk with him means you'll be in a different place tomorrow than you are today. The challenge is: are you willing to follow him all the way? Why not take a moment and consider your answer – it might just change you forever?

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently:

ADA ELIZABETH COYLE who died aged 85 on 25th November 2013 was born in the East End of London on 28th May 1928. She was the second oldest child of John and Maud Pru, and grew up there with her two sisters and brother until being evacuated to Steventon during the 2nd World War. When the war was over she moved with the family to Radley and started work at RAF Milton in the canteen where she met Des, her future husband. It wasn't quite love at first sight but, as Des said, Ada was feeding him and good food was definitely the way to his heart! They began married life living with Ada's parents in Radley until moving to a flat on Tyrrells Way and then a few years later to the house in which the family still lives. Ada and Des went on to have two daughters — Lynne and Tracy - to whom Ada was devoted and she was immensely proud when her grandson, James, was born and she loved being his Nanna – kitting him out in homemade jumpers as he was growing up. She loved to spoil him whenever she got the chance. According to Des she was a first class wife, second to none and was always very caring and hard working. They were married for 56 very contented years. As a Mum she was easy going and very loving. She liked to laugh and had a very good sense of humour and was always ready to share a joke. The family will always remember Ada in the kitchen, singing her heart out to her favourite tunes on the radio. She was a good cook of hearty home-made food and the smell of mince pies, sausage rolls and apple pie will always bring back memories of Ada as a caring, loving provider for all her family. Whilst the girls were growing up she worked as a cleaner at Culham before becoming a tea lady - a job which she loved - and she stayed there until she retired. She would often bake cakes or mince pies at home to take in to work. One of her favourite leisure occupations was going to the Bingo and she celebrated a good few wins. She also liked the one arm bandits and watching old fashioned romantic films - anything with Richard Gere in it was always very acceptable! Over the years many happy times were spent visiting family in Northern Ireland and on holidays at Pontins and also, more adventurously, travelling to Canada. The last few years of Ada's life were not easy, for either Ada or the family as dementia took hold but she was cared for lovingly at home by Des and Tracy. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends. (This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral in All Saints' Church on 2nd December 2013 by the Reverend Helen Kendrick)



WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP



FROM ED VAIZEY M.P.

Firstly, a very happy New Year to all readers: I hope it is not too late to say so by the time you see this.

Like many others, I am working on improving my fitness at the moment, so I was very pleased to learn that the Government is making changes to make life easier for our local sports clubs. The taxman had received lots of complaints that the rules for these clubs were unclear and caused confusion, so there will be a new set of simple rules. I very much hope that the changes - which include tax benefits and allowing clubs to generate more income - will make life easier for all our local sports clubs and so help them to encourage all of us not just to take sport up as a new year resolution, but to stick with it all year.



In between visits to the gym, my mailbag for the past month has included issues such as care in the NHS, the forthcoming Scottish independence referendum, and Save the Children's No Child Born to Die campaign, which focuses on reducing newborn mortalities in developing countries. As this shows, my Constituents continue to be concerned about a very wide range of issues, but the largest number of messages I've had by far has been about the planned electrification of the main railway line through the constituency. Although the idea of electrification has been welcomed, there are some very serious concerns about the consequences of doing the work which may occur, because it involves work to a lot of bridges, many of which date back to the time of Brunel. The biggest outcry came with the proposed closure of the A338 at Grove, as well as the continuing impact on the community around Fulscot Bridge. I'll continue to do all that I can to ensure that the needs of Constituents are protected as far as they possibly can be as this process goes on.

I also received a number of emails and letters from members of the farming community about the issue of changes to farm subsidies. Basically, it was about the balance between funding for measures that enhance the environment compared with those which directly support farming — some things do both of course. Having written to the Environment Secretary expressing my constituents' concerns, I was pleased that following an extensive consultation with farmers, environmental groups and others, Ministers listened to these concerns and decided on a less drastic change, with the intention of reviewing this in 2016. This will benefit farmers who take great care of our environment.




Photo: A Bald Eagle soaring in the Nashville skies

SUTTON COURTENAY IN THE PAST

1. My mother and father came to live in Sutton Courtenay about 96 years ago. In the High Street was Rant and Tombs, a thriving village shop, now a house. People used to take their Sunday joint to be cooked in the baker's oven. The shop was also the first Post Office, and sold everyday bits and pieces. Arthur Lacey had a horse and cart and would take orders and return with shopping for customers. Reg Morris on the High St also did trips to town, as well as some day trips with his 'Charabanc'.

The first Oxford Bus Company drove through the village, turning at the end of Church St where there was a small island to turn round on which was later removed. That service was both to and from Oxford. In the 40s and 50s we had a bus to go to Reading and to Newbury.

Two gentlemen in Appleford Rd, Mr Deadman and Mr Woodham, grew produce. Churchmere Rd was a cricket ground with a clubhouse, now a home.

Up the High St there was a Butcher and a Grocery combined with a Bakery shop, now Burgreys. There was a ladies dress shop next door and an egg shop in the old chapel. In the 30s on Milton Rd there were wool, grocery, bicycle and paint shops, as well elsewhere Mathews Vegetable shop, a hairdresser, two public houses, the New Inn and the Plough, and the Southport Chapel, now a home.

We were served very well, but sadly, so much has died in recent years. Kay Slater

On December 11 2013 Vale Council passed unanimously this motion

Councillor Gervase Duffield moved 'In the light of Thames Water's continuing interest in a major local reservoir this Council welcomes Ofwat's rejection of the recent Thames Water price increase application, and hopes that Ofwat will be specially vigilant on large applications costing vast sums where these can be undercut by reliable cheaper methods. This Council requests the Chief Executive to convey this motion to Ofwat, Thames Water, and the Vale area MPs, and the Water minister.'

I doubt if any reader will need reminding of the problems we all face with rising utility bills. Of late most of the attention has been on power, electricity and gas; but we all need water, and we cannot just switch water suppliers. So what are we to do to contain the rise in water prices? First, we need to understand the nature of our problem. When water was first privatised, some years back now, everyone knew that considerable capital expenditure was needed to get the water industry up to scratch. It was the same with most newly privatised industries. And to meet this need the Government gave generous tax breaks; the problem now is that this is still the situation when most of us think the original need has long passed. The effect of this is that if a water company can persuade the authorities a huge and expensive project is needed, they can make a lot of money out of it. No UK water company ever had any problem with borrowing from a bank as no Government could ever let a water company collapse. The water users pay the bill for any huge project approved, and the Water company retains the assets (unlike France where the water company only uses the assets but they are owned by the public) and the profits.

Water Company Gains

All this means that a water company can get huge benefits for its shareholders, acquire new assets which we the users pay for, and on new capital projects currently get the money tax free. So if a company builds a major new project, it gains and flourishes financially with all the tax breaks whereas if it mends the leaks, it get nothing extra. That is just part of their routine business. This situation has to change so that water companies concentrate on value for money for the community not huge tax free projects.

How do we prevent this? We put pressure on Ofwat the Government water watchdog to stop very large and unnecessary projects like the projected reservoir (which is currently shelved but which will doubtless come back again soon] when much cheaper alternatives are available (water transfer and reverse osmosis). Since the Reservoir was turned down at a public enquiry, Thames Water have requested a huge sewage system west of London which a Government committee rejected as far too large and only allowed a small part of it. Since then there is talk of another huge sewage project in London, a mammoth tunnel under the Thames.

Action

So first we ask Ofwat to reject these excessive projects and to go on doing so, when they are not necessary, are not good value for money, and often there are cheaper alternatives as we demonstrated with the proposed local reservoir. Then there is the tax question. I have no objection to a water company paying good wages, making a decent profit, and paying dividends, but not when such achievements are based on huge and unnecessary expenditure. Is it really right that a company paying handsome dividends should pay little or no tax? The Chancellor and the Treasury need to look into this. It grieves me to see headlines in a newspaper like this one: 'Thames Water will not pay tax for a DECADE'. I hope my motion to Vale Council points the way. We all need to increase the pressure on Ofwat, MPs, and the Treasury.

Local Issues

There are three important local water issues. First, with the closure of Didcot A which was a vast water guzzler with all those cooling towers, the water consumption in the western sector (known as SWOX) of Thames's area will consume a lot less water, especially if RWE give up that part of their water extraction license which they no longer need. There may well be a Didcot C station one day, but it should be air cooled like the B station, and under no circumstances be allowed to be a water guzzler.

Second, Thames Water has not given up on a local reservoir but it is currently somewhat on the back burner, but it is an open question how long a company should be allowed to hold a planning stranglehold on the projected reservoir area. I am not sure when reservoir plans first started but they have been going for well over twenty years and so far always been rejected.

Third, The Oxford East MP has raised the question of whether it is fair for rural areas like ours to pay the costs of expensive projects exclusively for London. That wants looking into.

Better News

The latest suggestions (December this year) from Thames Water contain some good news. They mention three lines of approach for water supply. Water transfer (from the Severn Trent area in our case), reverse osmosis (reusing the water as it travels down the Thames; this happens already and could be significantly increased for London), the third line is still a reservoir which needs great vigilance on water users' part.

- 2. The Alms houses are mainly dependent on busss. There is no shop at that end.

- 4. There are three great public houses, the Fish, the George and Dragon, and the Swan. With drinking and driving as well as the fuel cost, people have used the bus.
- 5. Many school children have used the bus.
- 6. The Abbey has constant visitors.
- 7. Anyone walking along the path towards the Village Green has to contend with slush after heavy rain, and, at times, the path runs down towards the ditch. Most hazardous for push chairs and four wheel disabled chairs. Be aware!
- 8. Drayton Rd already has the X2 service.

Transport to School

As I write, we are about to hear the result of the consultation on the Transport to School proposals. We all hope that reason will prevail, and that a sensible, consistent policy is arrived at that allows Drayton parents to chose their children's secondary school in Abingdon without penalty. Recent figures suggest that the amount the County will save if it takes a more draconian approach is very small.

Some good news:

After many months of concern that our excellent youth provision, in the form of the Damascus Youth Project, might be without a home, we have now had a very generous offer from MEPC of the use, without charge, of a new premises. Many thanks to MEPC for their continued support for the outstanding work of the DYP.

Area Stewardship Fund

In March, work will begin on weed clearance of the kerbs throughout the village. This is being paid for by the Area Stewardship Fund. Regrettably, budgetary pressures at OCC mean that this will be the last year of this fund

Community Grants

There is a small pot, available for this year only, with a closing date for applications of Mid February, for any voluntary community organisation needing a grant of £100-£500. Please contact me directly if you are interested. I am advertising this for the last time. I am hoping that any residue from the pot will go to the Damascus Youth Project.

Cumulative impact

Sutton Courtenay, Shrivenham, Watchfield, Kingston Bagpuize, Wantage, Grove, Botley and Marcham have all had to accept a large number of houses being built in the next few years. Enough houses to put a great strain on present infrastructure — roads, schools, leisure facilities and community cohesiveness. In all these places, there is an issue of cumulative impact of multiple permissions being granted in one area.

There is a strong case for arguing that the added impact of Didcot Power Station, FCC recycling, MEPC, and now potentially, an enormous warehouse, on Sutton Courtenay is putting the village under threat unlike any other. There are signs that the District Council is taking this message on board. I fear that the County still have some way to go. The scale of the problem is becoming so large, and people are becoming so angry, that it is difficult to know where to start. Being angry about the state of things does not seem to be getting us anywhere. Treating each application one by one — be it for housing or for some major piece of commercial or national infrastructure, can leave us feeling like Canute as the tide comes in. So where, as a humble County Councillor can I begin? Would I do better just to keep my head down, or are there things I can do which might make a difference?

I am very open to constructive, and if possible, polite suggestions, but in the meantime, I am set on these paths.

- To try to help get OCC and VWHDC to the same stage of realisation that that what has gone before must be taken into account when judging planning applications and
- To get it firmly established with all those concerned that the FCC recycling contract at Sutton Courtenay/ Appleford comes to an end in 2030 and, from 1/1/31 all the land is returned to countryside for the benefit of all those around.
- To help to focus the minds of all planners on the aim of stimulating this part of Oxfordshire into becoming the home of High Tech business rather than a muddled mish-mash of reservoirs, airports, distribution centres and heaven knows what else, with a hopelessly cramped and inadequate road system to cope with it all. There are parts of the country desperate for the sort of employment which all these other things could offer.
