

VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS





PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

X1 Bus Service

Complaints have been received by the Parish Council about the new X1 bus service and the route it takes, as well as the timings of it. The bus after travelling the High Street turns left and through Drayton to Abingdon, and does not follow the route of the former 32 service which turned right and served the Appleford Road and Culham. The Council has invited the Operations Manager from Thames Travel to attend a meeting to explain the company's thinking and to answer questions.



High Street - HGVs

HGVs have been spotted again in the High Street. There is

a 7.5 tonne weight limit and they should not be using this road. Trading Standards at Oxfordshire County Council can take action against offenders where there is evidence. They have recently successfully prosecuted a driver elsewhere who breached a weight limit. Can residents who are aware of HGVs in the weight restriction area e.g. High Street, Milton Road and Harwell Road, please gather information about the vehicles, such as the registration numbers, who they belong (often they have company details on the sides), and make a note of the day, date, time and direction of travel. A photograph too would help provide the evidence needed to report these drivers onto the authorities that can take action.

Footpaths

The Parish Council is planning to check all rural footpaths once the weather is a bit drier, and has earmarked some money from its budget to have the rights of way strimmed and made more easily accessible for the Summer.

Overhanging Hedging

The Council had received reports that there are hedges and shrubbery overhanging footways making it difficult for pedestrians and those with pushchairs to get through without leaving the path and going onto the muddy verge. As Spring approaches and new growth appears, the problem will only get worse. Would residents please check their front boundaries, and be mindful of those who walk the paths, and trim back the parts of hedges which are overhanging the highway.

Vale of White Horse – Local Plan 2031 – Housing Delivery Update

The Local Plan will shape the future of the Vale. The updated proposals are at a draft stage, and the District Council is inviting comments on the proposals, as there are changes to the Plan published last year. The Plan is available for viewing at www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/localplanpartone or is available at Abingdon library or the District Council's offices at Abbey House, Abingdon. Local exhibitions and meetings are being held. An exhibition will be held in premises at the precinct, Abingdon on Saturday 22nd March between 10.00 a.m.- 3.00 p.m. See also the District Council's website for further information.

P14/V0011/LB Repairs to boundary wall at the Mill House, Appleford Road. Council had no objections.

P14/V0023/HH Demolition of garage, rear extension and extension to west elevation to provide accommodation at first floor level at 83 Milton Road. Council had no objections .

P14/V2331/RM - Amendments to reserved matters for 65 dwellings for Redrow Homes in Milton Road. Council had concerns over the drainage of the site, and to ensure adequate protection for trees on the southern boundary, with screening on the western boundary.

P14/V0069/HH Demolition of existing rear extension, conservatory and outhouses. Erection of new first floor extension, garage conversion and single storey rear and side extension at 30 Chapel Lane. Council had no objections

P14/V2491/FUL Proposed redevelopment to provide new buildings for storage and distribution and ancillary facilities on land west of Didcot Power Station. Although this warehouse proposal had been reduced in size, there had been no significant changes, and the Council continued to maintain its objections.

Sat 06.00 - 17.30,



SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

At the end of January, 52 children from Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School joined a mass choir of over 7,000 children to take part in the Young Voices concert series at the London O2 Arena.

This is the fourth year that the school has taken part in the concert and we took our largest choir yet. The children start rehearsing in September when we receive the music packs and we certainly need plenty of time to learn all the words and dance moves off by heart for the concert in January — especially when the children have to also learn more songs for our very popular Christmas carol service too.

This experience is certainly one that is very memorable. Every child is made to feel very special, and being part of something so large — especially for a small school such as ours, starts enabling children to have a different perspective. Every voice, every movement is important and they are part of something amazing.

David Lawrence, the Principle Conductor, rehearses the children for around two hours before the concert in the afternoon and ensures that the choir has a good sound. David Lawrence is one of the UK's most versatile conductors, working with orchestras, symphony choruses and national youth choirs. He has worked with the London Philharmonic Choir, the Hallé Choir, and the CBSO Chorus for whom he is the Associate Conductor, as well as the national youth choirs of Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales. David has adjudicated at international choral festivals, as well as for the BBC Choir of the Year and Young Musician of the Year competitions. He conducts for BBC Television's 'Songs of Praise' and directed 'The People's Chorus' for BBC Four.

The music is arranged by Craig McLeish – who also arranges music for Les Miserable and Miss Saigon and with a live band, Young Voices Singers and guest artists, the evening is certainly very special.

Being part of Young Voices has exposed the children to a wide range of music from different countries and a huge range of styles and whilst the Pop Medley is always popular, it is not always the children's favourite song to sing!

The children have already told me that they would like to go again next year and I can't wait!

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently:

COLIN BOLTON who died aged 58 on Christmas Day 2013, was born in Abingdon on 3rd March 1955. He was the third child of Donald and Doris Bolton's seven children and he grew up with Reg, Gerald, Ronnie, Kath, Mandy and Doug in Bradstocks Way, Sutton Courtenay. He attended the old village school, making many friends over the years. His love of football developed from a very early age and he soon showed some very promising skills. Sadly, a knee injury stopped him from pursuing football to higher levels but his passion for Chelsea seemed to grow stronger with the years. He was always keen to pass on his enthusiasm for the sport to friends and family. And he was on the touchline as often as he could be shouting encouragement at Carl when he played. After primary school he went to Fitzharries in Abingdon before starting work as a porter, moving office furniture for £12 a week, and then to Lambourn Asphalt as a road builder where he earned the princely sum of £100 per week. This was a job he greatly enjoyed and, over the years he also worked for Thames Water and as a Construction worker for Clancy Docra. His eldest son Kris was born in 1979 and in 1988 Colin married Stephanie and the family continue to grow with the birth of Jade in 1989, Carl in 1990 and Chelsea in 1991. Tragically Stephanie died in 1998 and this was a devastating loss for everyone who knew her but Colin, with strength and determination worked hard to be the best father he could be and provide for his children. It was a really tough time but Colin was determined to keep the family together and he successfully brought up a family of which he was immensely proud. He became an even prouder grandfather on the birth of his first grandchild - George - last November and was looking forward to the arrival of the next one. Always a child at heart he had a great affinity with children. He had always loved animals - particularly dogs - but at one point he and Steph had also tried to adopt a lamb called Ruffles unfortunately it didn't seemed to want to stay around and jumped the fence into next door's garden! In his leisure time he enjoyed playing Darts - he and Steph used to play and they taught the children - and he often competed with Jade in doubles matches. He also liked playing Aunt Sally at the Pack Horse. He was competitive but seemed to enjoy the teasing banter just as much as the winning. A new chapter in his life began when he met Barbara at Milton Football Club and it was love at first sight for both of them. They were married in September 2012 in a castle in Bude surrounded by their family and friends. They both regarded themselves as very blessed to have had a second chance at love in their lives and were greatly enjoying their life in Blewbury with their dog, and ducks and chickens and simply spending as much time as they could with each other. Colin did have one weakness and that was for white chocolate -which he would hoard in a drawer even when he wasn't meant to be eating sugar! Colin coped stoically with the loss of his leg in 2007 and, with the loving support of those around him still led an active and fulfilling life. All his life Colin strove to do what he could for those he loved. He was very friendly and approachable and had the gift of being able to talk to anyone – even complete strangers – and put them at their ease. His puns were legendary and he was naturally able to lift people's spirits. His friends filled All Saints' Church for his funeral which took place on Tuesday 21st January 2014. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends. This is an edited extract from the address given at his funeral by The Reverend Helen Kendrick.

ELEANOR RUTH DAVIES, who died on 2nd January 2014 aged 87, was born in 1926 in Cheltenham, the youngest child of an extended family, to her parents Mabel and George Hawkins. She attended school in Cheltenham before going to the University of Bristol to study Chemistry. On graduating she worked for Esso Research and she was based at Esso House where she met her future husband Roy. They were married in Cheltenham in August 1953 going on to form an enduring partnership in which their personalities and skills complemented and balanced one another. In May 1954 they bought West Wilden – then an extremely run down and neglected property with an extensive garden. It cost them less than £3,000 and they moved in with two pieces of furniture! Over the years they worked on attempting to renovate the house but it was the garden that soon became their focus and where they expended their time and their energy, transforming it over the years into a beautifully cared for slice of paradise. It became their pride and joy. Like everything she did in life she took gardening very seriously and over the years Eleanor attended gardening courses at Waterperry to improve her skills. Kate their eldest child was born in 1956 followed by Joanna, Harriet, Oliver and Anthony. She enjoyed cooking - mainly in order to cook her home grown vegetables. She belonged to a book group, before they became the fashionable things they are today, and she was a voracious reader all her life. When not visiting their much loved holiday home in Pembrokeshire both she and Roy loved travelling and they explored Europe and England extensively - holidays were not to sit on beaches but to study ecclesiastical architecture. She had a constant thirst for knowledge. For many years Eleanor played a significant role as the matriarch of her large family supporting them throughout all the challenges of life. She was very proud of all her grandchildren and great-grandchildren - who knew her as Garra - and took a keen interest in their lives

and all their activities. She was a woman with a deep personal Christian faith who took life seriously; someone with a strong will who was very forceful, direct and determined. She was a straight forward, straight talking individual, not afraid to say what she thought and she enjoyed having the last word in any discussion! She was fiercely intellectual but also with a great deal of common sense, and although she was not one to suffer fools gladly, she was also a good friend to many offering kind and sympathetic support whenever and wherever needed. Above all she gave generously of her time and her talents in the community. From serving on the Parish Council for many years to working as a Guide Leader for several years - Many girls have reason to be grateful for the hours of voluntary service Eleanor gave to them. She was active in the church community on various rotas and helping out in any way she could. She was one of the distributors of the SC News and served Meals on wheels around the local area. Roy died in 2010 and soon afterwards Eleanor identified the house in Chapel Lane she wished to move into as she accepted that West Wilden and its garden were simply too big for her. On moving she soon transformed the garden and made it the way she wanted. Eleanor coped stoically with the last few years of increasing old age and growing infirmity, determined to maintain as much independence as she could, but she was also immensely grateful for the support of her family, friends and neighbours who will greatly miss her. (*This is an edited extract from the address given at a thanksgiving service in All Saints' Church on 20th January 2014 by the Reverend Helen Kendrick*)

JANET ROGERS who died, aged 72, on 7th January 2014, was born in Oxfordshire, spending her early years in Yarnton with her parents, Olive and Leonard Mead-Harris. She had a sister who died young and sadly her father was killed in the War whilst serving with the Fleet Air Arm. Her Mother went onto marry John Gurl, a policeman, who brought Janet up as his own daughter. The growing family, which included John's son, Mike and the new arrival, Peter, lived in Headington Quarry where Janet attended St Margaret's School before being apprenticed at Elliston and Cavell the leading department store in Oxford at that time where she trained as a furrier. From there she went to work at the Nuffield Orthopedic Hospital as a splint maker and here she met Alan when she began work in his department. They were married in 1964 in Headington Quarry Church and began married life living above the premises of the general store in Sutton Courtenay which Alan had bought and converted into a sweet shop in 1963, called A C Rogers. Janet went onto run this for many years with the help of Vera Eustace and two or three other ladies from the village. They had over 50 jars of sweets - and it is an establishment very fondly remembered by many people in Sutton Courtenay. In 1968 Felicity was born and they had to move from the sweet shop across the road to 15 Milton Road as the pram wouldn't fit through the door. Growing up, Felicity has fond memories of her mother cycling her to primary school until she was old enough to walk or cycle herself and remembers her serving in the shop with a checked blue overall, busy with many customers, and, after school, helping to reload the Corona drinks machine, the chocolate counter or helping people in the back room choose cards. She was talented at many handicrafts – sewing, embroidery, tapestry and patchwork – and made Felicity's wedding dress, sewing on hundreds of pearls. Felicity said they were meant to be doing it together but suspects that her mother re-sewed many of the pearls she had done to make sure that it was perfect on the day! Over the years she was a keen participant in the Horticultural Show, entering many different classes and encouraging Felicity to do the same. They won prizes for everything from needlework to baking. Janet was a good cook and the family remembers her Lemon Drizzle and Fruit cakes and marmalade. She would do large scale baking for the WI and the Farmer's Markets. She belonged to the Thames Craft Club in Abingdon and the WI in Sutton Courtenay. She was also a volunteer driver for Meals on Wheels and she was often seen cycling around the village helping to deliver the SC. News and waving cheerily to neighbours. She loved playing croquet - either at home or at the Thames Croquet Club in Abingdon. She was very competitive but anyone who played with her had to play according to 'Janet's rules'! She delighted in wildflowers, birds and trees - although Alan would only let her plant them around the edge of the lawn! She loved to dance at any opportunity and the family have fond memories of her washing up and dancing around the kitchen with sheer joy of being alive. Janet always had a great spirit of adventure and loved to travel on holidays and at weekends to new places. Every Easter Alan and Janet would go to Scotland and in later years found great pleasure in cruising. Janet also enjoyed many truly happy times at their holiday cottage, called Rosemary, near Barnstaple in Devon and later at their house in Poole which Janet thought was ideal because it was close to both the sea and the shops. In everything she did Janet was a perfectionist. She was gentle, kind and loving and always keeping herself active and busy. She was always willing to help and organize and get involved. She was often full of giggles and laughter. She was a woman who had a natural ability to enjoy life. She loved parties – going to them and hosting them. She enjoyed nothing better than spending time with family and friends and she loved her granddaughters - Alexandra and Isabelle and doted on her son in law Guy. Having bought 'Lakeside' in All Saints' Lane Alan and Janet sold the sweet shop in 1980 and moved into what has been their home ever since. Sadly 10 years ago she developed the first signs of Dementia and, cared for initially by Alan and Felicity, eventually needed the more specialist care Vale House could offer. Even in her illness the strong core of determination which kept her going did not diminish and it meant that, with Felicity's help, she recovered amazingly well from a broken hip and learnt to walk again. She never liked to sit still and right to the end was always wanting to be up and about. This is an edited extract from the address given at her funeral on 23rd January in All Saints' Church.

FRANCES BUCKLE was born in Sutton Courtenay on 17th February 1933, the youngest of a family of eight and always regarded this village as home. Her parents were Leah and Jim Belcher but Frances was mainly brought up, as was often the case in large families, by her sister Brenda. Her father, Jim, was a Batman in the Army. He had been awarded the Victoria Cross in the First World War and continued to serve on the Didcot Depot. Frances was very close to her Dad and she had many fond memories of what she regarded as a good and happy childhood during which she was known as 'the little fairy'. As a child she loved dogs and always said that she wanted dogs and not children when she grew up! Bright, intelligent and hard-working she attended school in Didcot before going to the Marcham Road Hospital where she trained for four years as a nurse. This really developed the compassionate and caring side of her nature and she loved her work - particularly with children. It was whilst caring for children on the Scarlet Fever Ward that she caught it herself. Frances made the decision to give up her nursing career to care for her children and over the years she brought up Michael, Beverly, Therese, Val, Jesse and Ricky. After living briefly in Abingdon the family moved into Tyrrells Way in 1958 and Frances lived there from then on. Her family was always her first priority and her philosophy was that children should be encouraged to grow like flowers. Although they might not have had much money or many material possessions they all knew themselves to be well loved and were always well-fed. Frances brought them up firmly but fairly, teaching them manners and respect and encouraging them to treat other people as they themselves wished to be treated. She sent them to Sunday School, here at this church, and she instilled in them the ethos of hard work. Alongside bringing up the children, she would work through the seasons on the village farms - from potato picking for Allens to Turkey plucking for Cauldwells and helping with the fruit harvest at Harwell. Although it was hard she enjoyed the outdoor work and it kept her fit and healthy and she would encourage the children to join in too. As they said to me, she gave them the tools for life. Over the years Frances enjoyed travelling in England having fun at the seaside or going on train rides or magical mystery tours by bus. She also had a bit of a reputation as a boy racer in her Metro! Frances was very musical and could play the piano by ear and would often sing just to keep the children happy. She loved to dance - and in her younger years particularly enjoyed the Jive but also enjoyed the Country and Western Dances in the Village Hall when Jess was playing with his band. In later years she loved watching and singing along to Songs of Praise. The family share many memories of musical evenings and parties in their home with friends and family. Frances was a generous friend, very sociable and enjoyed throwing parties. She loved a glass of ginger wine and had an entertaining sense of humour - enjoying the banter! She would always help someone in need and was willing to share whatever she had. The last few years, since Bernie died, had been hard and, despite the fulltime care of Therese and the rest of the family, she became increasingly frustrated at not being able to get out and about. Last year she celebrated her 80th birthday with her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren - or her blessings as she called them. She had a strong faith which kept her going through some tough times but she was always thankful for what she had. Her mission in life had been to care for her children and she finally felt she had accomplished this. This is an edited extract of the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the funeral held in All Saints' Church on 30th January 2014.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP

PCSO Sandra Syphas has contacted us about the following current scam:

A fraudster 'cold calls' the victim on their landline and claims to be from a bank or the police where they claim they have identified a discrepancy on one of the victim's accounts.

- To gain the victim's trust they will ask the victim to call them back straight away, but unknown to the victim they have not disconnected the call and when the victim dials the real number they are still connected to the fraudster. The fraudster will then ask for the victim's bank account details, PIN numbers and / or sometimes cash.
- Finally, the fraudster sends an innocent taxi driver or courier to the victim's house to collect the items. The fraudster will then use the card to withdraw cash, make purchases in stores or online.

Most of the victims have been elderly people.

Sandra also writes:

'I'm currently in the process of going door to door with my NHW coordinators, and offering a "Smartwater" forensic marking kit for household belongings, as part of a neighbourhood action group project to deter would be burglars. If you were not at home when we called, and would like to obtain a kit, or find out a little bit more about the project, please contact me on 101 or email me at <code>Sandra.syphas@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk</code>. The kits are £15 each and contain enough fluid for approximately 50 items.

My aim is to get as much of the village as possible protected, and we are currently in the process of getting permission for the erection of permanent street signs to endorse this.'

SUTTON COURTENAY COMMUNITY-LED PLAN - UPDATE

Thank you very much to all who worked tirelessly to distribute and collect questionnaires in the autumn last year. The questionnaires were duly sent to the Vale of White Horse District Council for collation of the data.

We have received the collated data back from the District Council and are now in the process of grouping all the 'free script' comments into themes so that action points can be formulated. There are 151 pages of feedback comments.

A total of 1854 questionnaires were distributed of which 707 were completed and returned. This gives a return rate of 38%. Some households chose to complete one questionnaire on behalf of all the adults in the household rather than each adult complete a questionnaire. However, we are not able to reflect this in the return rate.

We will also be including feedback and comments elicited by the Community-led Plan group from residents at various village events. We also have feedback from young people and children.

Once the themes are established the Community-led group will be preparing the plan. We will give monthly updates through the Village News but hope to have the completed report in April/May.

Last but not least – you may recall that each completed questionnaire is to be entered in to a prize draw and the lucky winner takes home £100. This will be done at the time the report is published.

As regular readers of my newsletter will know, as an MP I receive many interesting snippets of news about the Didcot and Wantage Constituency. I recently heard from the National Lottery that they have given grants totalling more than £500,000 in the last year to good causes across the constituency. The recipients were hugely varied, with two rewards of just under £1,000 to individuals under the 'Heroes Return' programme that helps veterans of World War II to take part in commemorative visits at one end of the scale and £365,000 going to Circles South East, whose aim is to reduce the harm caused by sexual abuse in our communities. In all there were 18 projects across the Constituency supported by the National Lottery: you can see more about lottery-funded projects here: www.lotterygoodcauses.org.uk/

Quite apart from the good news about funding, each of those 18 projects represents a huge amount of effort from volunteers and campaigners across the Constituency. Applying for a lottery grant is never easy, and each application in itself is the result of many hours of work gathering the right information and presenting it in the right way. Behind that effort, is the work each group or organization does day to day, providing services, facilities, activities or support for many other individuals and groups in our communities — a network of effort and help for others. As your MP I am able to meet many of these fantastic people, and see and hear about the work they do and I am constantly amazed by the dedication of the people I meet.

So much of this voluntary work is unsung, and can pass unnoticed, so I'd like to take a small opportunity to say 'thank you' to all those who work for others, in any way at all. We are all grateful!

This month's postbag has been a real mix of domestic and international affairs, with issues such as autism, blasphemy laws in Pakistan, transparency in politics, wildlife crime and animal rights in South Korea featuring frequently.

As the conflict in Syria continues to force millions from their homes, it is vital that we do our utmost to assist those suffering at this time of great need. Following the announcement, I received an email from a local family who wish to offer their home to a refugee, which provides just one example of why the UK has such a proud tradition of supporting those most in need.

40mph Limit

The consultation period for the proposed new 40mph stretch of road between Drayton and Milton is about to begin. The funding is in place, the will is there indeed, the only thing which could derail the process is if a large number of the public and authorities object. I urge all those interested (and in particular those in favour!) to respond.

Warehouse Proposal.

I am unclear as to how the developers expected the residents of Sutton Courtenay and surrounding villages to react to their new proposal to reduce the area from 1 million square foot to 950,000 square foot. Or indeed, if they expected local residents to be reassured by plans to institute, monitor and police HGV restrictions when current HGV restrictions go unmonitored and far too often abused.

I find it hard to see how a plan to offer an employment site to 2000 people on close to minimum wage in an area short of affordable housing and already suffering severe transport congestion is even remotely compatible with ambitions to make this area a focus for Hi-Tech / Bio-Tech industry.

Are there not parts of the country (even in the South East) crying out for employment?

I will continue to argue this wherever and whenever possible.

Budget

Later his month the county's budget will be set and we will be able to see where cuts are to be made. Home to school transport is going to be a major area of contention. So are large parts of the Social Service budget. We are incredibly lucky that much of our Youth support service does not depend on OCC funding. In the villages of Appleford, Sutton Courtenay, Milton, Drayton and Steventon the Damascus Youth Project has been doing its excellent work for many years now. Based in its new premises in Milton Park (once again many thanks to MEPC for their generosity), I was delighyted to steer the last of the Big Society Fund their way. I hope this will allow them to purchase their much needed vehicle. Other smaller grants were made to Evergreens towards transport costs, Sutton Courtenay Primary School for computing equipment, a Defibrillator for Drayton, and equipment for the Wootton and Dry Sandford Youth Club.

X1 Bus Service

There have been a number (a large number) of complaints about the new X1 Bus service through Sutton Courtenay and Drayton. Buses late, buses not appearing, poor customer care compared with the now defunct 32 service through Sutton Courtenay. Thames Travel has been made aware of all these concerns and will be producing a new (and hopefully more meaningful) timetable within the next month. In the meantime, Sutton Courtenay residents should be aware that the bus arrives at the triangle and turns to Drayton. Residents of Drayton should be aware that unlike Sutton Courtenay, they also enjoy the benefit of the X2 service. I am aware that people living at the Appleford end of Sutton Courtenay have a long way to walk to catch the bus and that many of them are elderly. I am asking Thames Travel if they could look at this issue in the meantime a regular and reliable service of any kind for Sutton Courtenay would be nice....



HYDROPOWER IN SUTTON COURTENAY?



Thank you for turning out at the Public Meetings to discuss water power in a time of flooding! There are several possible sites from which energy could be captured, but we should only expect the Environment Agency to agree to one. The show of hands in both villages was clear — overwhelming support for taking it further. I think we all recognise that it won't be easy.

Starting with the concerns that were expressed

Canoeists – they value the pools because they suit a range of skills, and would like to work with us to get the best outcome

Fishing – there was one vociferous opponent, but there was support from other anglers for improving the fishing environment; they remain open to consultation

Flooding risk – clearly any scheme has to comply with EA guidance, which means at worst being flood-neutral, and at best means improving the flow and ground conditions. There is no record of hydropower contributing to flooding

Noise – mustn't be an issue, we could run noise simulations for reassurance

Visual - the generator houses will be smaller and lower than the existing pump house on the NDA weir, and can be built to look traditional

We thought that one gentleman in SC summarised the concerns perfectly — 'if we want to stop piling carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, whether we do that with nukes or renewables, everyone has to be prepared to give a little'.

To these concerns, we should add **the challenges** posed by **land ownership**, the **EA**, the **Planners**, and last but not least raising **finance**, including somehow covering the upfront studies and applications before we know whether we've secured a site or not.

Now, the benefits and the opportunity

Domestic electricity prices have been rising by 5-8%, and investing in renewable energy is one of the only ways to directly offset this. It is not possible for hydro schemes to be linked directly to villages, although something may come of this in future; nor can we simply sell cheap electricity to local users. However, generators can produce steady dividends which shareholders can use to offset their electricity bills.

HYDROPOWER IN SUTTON COURTENAY?

Other developers have already applied for licenses in Sutton Pools as well as us, so we need to keep the pressure on. Henry and I would like to take up some of the offers of support and assemble a small group from the local communities; we'll be approaching some of those volunteers, who should be encouraged by the forest of raised hands! Or was that just a vote to end the meetings on a happy note, and get back to doing what pubs were built for...

The Editors have received the following letter about the project:

Last week [11th February] we attended a very useful meeting in Sutton Courtenay where village resident, James Walton, and Culham resident and hydraulic engineer, Henry Reily-Collins, outlined the possible benefits and opportunities of having our own Archimedes Screw Hydroelectric system, sited on one of the weirs in Sutton Courtenay pools. This is a good starting point, but it is very important that if it is to be successful as a community project, a number of issues are clarified as soon as possible.

1. The issue of ownership

How is the money to be raised and who "owns" the project? This includes how the electricity generated is sold to the National Grid and what is to be done with any profits that may accrue over the first 20 years.

From reading the accounts of other similar projects: e.g. Osney, Abingdon and Settle (see website links below), it is significant that they have all been seen as community owned projects. The rivers are a community asset and any benefits raised from this project need to be shared by the whole village.

2. Where do we start?

Obviously there will be money required for the initial professional surveys. Although Henry Reily-Collins kindly offered his professional help and advice, it was unclear who we would get to do the engineering and land surveys — and how these would be paid for. Also, who are the relevant land-owners and how willing they would be to be involved in this project? This will depend on which weir we are discussing. We need advice on the choice of weir as well, as the height of the water fall is critical for the production of electricity.

3. When do we start?

There are obviously a number of interested parties within the village, including the water sport and angling communities that need to be involved. It is important that, within the very near future, we get a working committee together that represents the whole village in order to discuss the project and then pass the information on to the rest of our community. Clearly, transparency about the aims and financing of this project are essential for it to be supported by the good-will of this community.

Parking on the High Street

A few days ago residents at the 'Triangle' end of the High Street awoke to find their cars bearing "Polite Notices" on laminated cards.

These cards expressed a desire on the part of the author that the owners of these cars should desist from parking their vehicles with two wheels on the pavement.

The principal reason cited was that obstruction to the pavement caused inconvenience for wheelchair users, parents with children in buggies, anyone using mobility scooters, etc.

I would invite people to consider some alternative points of view.

- 1) The only unbroken footpath running the length of the High Street is on the OTHER side of the road.
- 2) Having the wing mirror smashed off your car is a not infrequent occurrence for residents at that end of the High Street, even when they choose to park partly on the pavement.
- 3) There is nowhere else to park.
- 4) Although one or two people per week might be inconvenienced by having a narrower usable pavement, or by having to cross to the wide pavement on the other side of the road, hundreds of daily road users will be held up as a consequence of the reduced road width.
- 5) Cars parked wholly in the road will make it impossible for a car and, say, a lorry or bus to pass each other in what remains of the road.

As an aside, I can't help observing that merely printing "Polite Notice" on an unsolicited communication doesn't automatically validate either its politeness or its authenticity as a "notice". Particularly when it is anonymous, has no contact details or other mechanism for continued dialogue, and seems calculated to leave the author's identity - and therefore responsibility and culpability - beyond the reach or reproach of those whom he or she has accused of, effectively, irresponsibility.
