


VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Vale of White Horse – Local Plan 2031 – Housing Delivery Update

The Parish Council has commented to the Vale of White Horse District Council on the Local Plan 2031 proposals. It is most concerned to note the extremely high housing target figures being put forward by the District Council and it is not sure that the numbers are at all realistic or whether there is adequate infrastructure. Historically, planning authorities have made provision for 10% of housing need to be met by sites which have not been specifically identified in the plan, and there was no recognition of this in the plan. Also there was no attention paid to the fact that there are



already commitments to build around 275 additional houses in the village, without the new increase which has been identified in the plan. The proposal is to site a further 220 dwellings off Hobbyhorse Lane. The Parish Council believes that this has not been adequately thought through. Land close to the landfill site is prone to surface water flooding, and the site too can be a source of complaints of odours and other issues. Frilsham Street itself is often reduced to a single width with parked cars, so the Parish Council cannot believe that the District Council seriously considers that a site off Hobbyhorse Lane is suitable for 220 houses.

Thames Travel – X1 bus service

The Parish Council has made representations to Thames Travel again regarding the changes to the bus service. There are some amendments to the timetable, which if approved, will come into effect later in the year, probably from early June. However there are no changes to the route. It is extremely disappointed that part of the village, Church Street and Appleford Road, is going to be left without a bus service and residents will have to walk to Cross Trees to catch a bus. We have been told that the changes are to improve reliability, as traffic conditions have meant that buses have found it difficult to keep to the timetable. The changes will allow extra time for journeys, particularly at peak time. Whilst there is no intention at this stage to alter any route, Thames Travel is still mindful of the Parish Council's aspirations in this regard.

Oxfordshire County Council – Minerals and Waste Local Plan

The Parish Council has expressed concerns to the County Council on the draft core strategy. These concerns are based on previous experience of :

o The implementation of previous Minerals and Waste Structure Plan policies;

o The inconsistent approach to the grant of successive planning permissions that exceeded or went beyond the various Structure Plan provisions;

o The extremely inconsistent approach adopted by the regulatory authorities in respect of the enforcement of compliance with either policies or conditions on planning permissions.

The Parish Council was sceptical about the County Council's ability to protect the amenities of Sutton Courtenay, and about its interest in safeguarding the landscape and preventing the coalescence of the settlements of Sutton Courtenay, Appleford and Didcot.

To the Parish Council the strategy appeared to be worded in an ambiguous form. In places Hanson have obtained consent to extend the timeframe of their works on the site, yet in other parts of the documentation there is reference to limited reserves left.

Policies needed strengthening in order to protect Sutton Courtenay from the constant round of noise, light, odour and vermin pollution that it currently suffers and which has been the case for some years.

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PARISH COUNCIL CONTINUED

Drayton Road - traffic speed

Concerns have been raised with the Parish Council regarding the speed at which buses and Biffa dust carts are travelling along the Drayton Road. The Council has drawn this to the attention of the relevant companies .

War Memorial Appeal

The war memorial has stood for well over 90 years on the village green. As the anniversary of the first world war is approaching, a decision has been made to try and restore the war memorial by cleaning, repointing and relettering. A substantial amount of money needs to be raised to undertake the work. See Reverend Helen Kendrick's appeal elsewhere in this issue. Public Footpath to the weirs off junction of Church Street and Appleford Road

Oxfordshire County Council is undertaking replacement footbridge works on the path that goes to the weirs. From 19th May there will be a closure order in place and access will not be maintained over the bridge. Unfortunately users from the Sutton Courtenay end will not be able to access the path at all, and there is no alternative route. The estimated duration of the works is 2 - 3 weeks.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered :

P14/V054/HH Single storey side extension at 2A Abingdon Road. The Council expressed some concern regarding the proximity to the boundary.

P14/V0456.HH Single storey timber outbuilding to be used as garage and separate store area replacing an existing large shed at 66 Milton Road. The Council had no objections.

P14/V0464/HH Alteration and extension at 4 The Nursery. The Council had no objections.

With an ever increasing amount that has to be fitted into the primary school curriculum, the performing arts can sometimes be overlooked. However, at Sutton Courtenay we strive to ensure that all children have the opportunity to learn an instrument, be part of our active choir and also to have plenty of opportunity to perform on stage!

Whilst not all of our children will become actors or musicians, there are many other skills that children develop whilst doing and practising these activities that will help them in all areas in their lives.

Watching children grow in confidence as they take on a role, and

then seeing this transfer to other aspects of school life is one of the joys of teaching. There are many children now within our school who are confident to sing solo in front of a large audience, which does take a lot of control to do so successfully.

Resilience and determination are also needed when rehearsing for a play or practising an instrument – it will not be perfect first time. After all if it does not go wrong how can we further improve or perfect that scene or that tune? This resilience and 'fail safe' attitude is important in lessons too. There has to be challenge and children have to see school as a place to have a go, and learn from mistakes.

Team work also plays a huge part in a successful performance, and successful collaboration later on in life will certainly be a great talent to have. There is a huge sense of achievement when children have worked together to put on a play. The

enthusiasm and excitement is tangible and infectious and the whole school gets involved. There is always disappointment when the performance is over but the memories will be long lasting.



Years 3 and 4 have had drumming lessons this year each week. The 'Djembe Drums' echo around the school building every Monday morning which certainly wakes us all up! The children have learnt so much about rhythm, notation, listening and performing.

So now there are opportunities every year for all children to perform on the stage: Christmas Production from Foundation Stage and Year 1, a musical from Years 2 - 4 and there will be a further production in the summer by Years 5 and 6. From the ministry Team.....

During Holy week I read a story from early 20th century Russia when civil war ravaged the country. As war swept through the land the wife of an officer in the white army knew that she and her children were in great danger because the city where she lived had fallen into the hands of the rebel Army. Towards evening she heard a knock on the door. On the doorstep stood a young woman her own age who urged the mother to leave that night with her children. "You have been discovered," she said. "Tonight they will come. - Don't worry she added, I'll stay here, they won't even look for you".

So Natalie stayed as the mother and her children escaped to the woods. Natalie faced the certainty of death alone. With the cold of morning the soldiers came. They battered down the door and, without checking her identity, they shot her where she was and returned to their base. Next day she was found by her friends dead.

Almost 2000 years before, a man of Natalie's age called Jesus rode into Jerusalem to do something similar for us. In going to his death he took upon himself the guilt and horror of our sin. He sacrificed his life so that ours might be saved.

Christians believe that on Easter Day God honoured that sacrifice and raised Jesus from the dead. It is an awesome claim. Yet something happened that first Easter Day which changed the disciples. Before the resurrection they were frightened and broken men. Afterwards they travelled north and south, east and west, and preached the good news of a God who loved us enough to send his son.

Today the message of Easter is just as strong. We too can know a saviour who has shared every hurt and despair that we have. We too can meet a risen Lord who can change us, and fill us afresh with hope and life.

So as we met to worship on Easter Morning we proclaimed with Christians down the ages; Alleluia, Christ is Risen; He is risen indeed Alleluia.

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REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently:

Patricia Anne King who died on 19th March 2014 was born in Bolton, Lancashire on 19th July 1933. Her parents Ellen and Frank ran a series of shops, newsagents and hotels across Lancashire. She had a slightly wandering childhood with her three younger sisters, Kathleen, Adrianne and Sheila, and to whom she remained in close contact all her life. She went to school in Lancashire and studied Hotel Catering and Management at Southport college.

It was whilst working at the family Hotel, the White Lion in Clitheroe that she met the man who was to become her future husband – Trevor King. Trevor had gone to the hotel for a pint with his brother in law, Jack and it was Pat's mother, Ellen, who took a shine to him and his sense of humour, thinking he would be a very suitable match for Pat and so invited Trevor home to tea in the drawing room with the best china (so all the sisters knew that this must be 'serious').

Pat and Trevor's first official date was in an old Austin A40 called Florence, a car which he was immensely proud of. But unfortunately one which had holes in the floor, and one that on the first date brokedown! Nevertheless Pat and Trevor went on to marry on the 30th March 1957. They set up home in Bolton-le-Sands, Morecambe where their first child, Andrew, was born. Their second child, Sarah, some three years later whilst they were living in Devon.

In 1971 the family moved to Whitley Bay in the North East of England for what Pat often described as some of the happiest years of her life. She loved Northumberland living in the welcoming community where she made many friends.

Some eight years later Trevor's work moved and brought the family to live in Sutton Courtenay. Pat immediately joined in with the life of the community and over the next forty years was involved with many organisations and charities - from being Clerk to the Parish Council, a volunteer with meals-on-wheels and an officer of the Citizen's Advice Bureau. In later years she was involved with the Local History Society and, of course, was very much a part of All Saints' church congregation, and the Women's Christian Fellowship. Pat was always ready to bake a cake or serve refreshments. She liked to be busy, was a great planner and always well-organised. Her beautiful garden is a testament to the many hours she spent nurturing and caring for the wide variety of plants and flowers. She loved listening to the radio – being an avid fan of the Archers – and going to classical music concerts and attending the NADFAS lectures in Abingdon with friends or visiting National Trust Properties. She enjoyed travelling – particularly with Trevor – venturing to a variety of places including Malta, Portugal, Russia and Kenya and river cruises with Adrianne.

But her main focus was always her family – whom she loved very much. As a Nan or Nanny she was very hands on and showed infinite patience in playing alongside her grandchildren. She was a good cook and made a mean Apple Pie and was well known for her 'Jimmy Young Cake' – using a recipe she heard on the radio show of the same name. She was always up-to-date with and had a view on world events.

Sadly Trevor died in 1996 bringing to an end a partnership formed in true love. Pat continued to love and care for her family and give as much of herself as she could to those she loved and in helping out in the local community. She was a quiet, private and gentle person who greatly valued the friendships she had – one of life's gentle folk – always happy for a natter and a laugh. She was a good confidante and a great supporter and encourager to those in need. Her funeral was held in All Saints' Church on Monday 31^{**} March 2014 and the service was conducted by the Reverend Helen Kendrick. The tribute was given by her son of which this is an edited extract.

Elle May Kelsey who died on 26th March 2014 was born on 25th May 1992 in the JR to her parents Gary and Carol. She spent her early years in Abingdon and then moved to Sutton Courtenay where she grew up with her older siblings – Lizzie and Peter and attended the primary school.

She was always a free spirit with an adventurous streak and from an early age she was accident prone – breaking her arm when she was two. Her first push bike was a three wheel Harley which her Mum and Dad bought her as

an incentive to get her to go to school! Over the years she went onto enjoy going to motorbike rallies and the Bulldog Bash. She was always daring and would lead her big sister, Lizzie, astray. She didn't seem to have any fear and sometimes the daredevil in made her behaviour challenging for those around her.

Gary and Carol remember that her first school report stated that Elle was always away with the fairies but the family also remember her as being bright as a button and able to work out how to assemble flat pack furniture without reading the instructions. Gary recalls her figuring out how to open a suitcase with a complicated lock, which had completely defeated him, when she was just a toddler. Also whilst at school Elle sang in a girl band called 'Breeze' and they would do shows in their back gardens and practice for hours.

Other precious family memories include times spent cray fishing and going on holiday to Jamaica and they will never forget how much Elle loved cucumber sandwiches with the crusts cut off and eating gherkins, olives and beetroot and above all sucking ice cubes – a love which she has passed onto her daughter Isla.

On leaving school she trained to be a hairdresser and even though she didn't really enjoy it she became very skilled at it and when she was at college in Oxford she won the trophy for the Student Hairdresser of the Year.

She loved spending time with friends and enjoyed a good party – drinking cider and listening to music. She also loved to dance.

But above all Elle was an amazing Mum and when Isla was born on 11th June 2012 Elle showed a very caring and protective side of her nature. Anyone seeing the two of them together would never doubt that Elle loved Isla with all her heart and Isla brought huge joy and delight into her life. They both enjoyed spending time with Lizzie and her daughter Jessie going to play at the Treehouse in Didcot and to McDonalds. They were looking forward to watching the two cousins grew up alongside each other.

Elle was always determined and stubborn and she was certainly someone who knew her own mind. Life was not always easy for Elle and there were some very troubled and difficult times when she found herself unable to make the best decisions and take care of herself or Isla despite the loving support of her family who so wanted the best for her.





Many thanks to Drayton PC, to Milton PC, to Milton Park and to OCC for their financial contributions which have made the installation of a 40mph zone between Milton Village and Drayton a reality. This must, at last, reduce the risk of any more fatalities on that stretch of road.

It is no secret that OCC is short of money. Indeed as the District Council gets richer on the back of New Homes Bonus, it seems the County gets poorer. With the arrival of Academies and Fee Schools, many of the County's Education responsibilities have gone. The Roads and transport budget is under huge pressure and the incredibly wet winter has not helped. The Social Service budget too is squeezed. There are outstanding OCC officers trying to take on ever more work.

Given the pressures, it is great to see OCC standing up for itself as it has over the proposed extra pedestrian crossing in Ock Street, Abingdon. This proposal was the result of the Planning Inspectors decision to allow 160 homes to be built on the Dayton Road - provided that the pedestrian crossing was completed. His decision effectively meant that "The need for housing" had trumped "the severity of the traffic". The question would now be would "the reduced safety of pedestrians including schoolchildren" be similarly trumped. To his great credit, the Cabinet member for the Environment said "No, the need for housing should not trump the safety of people". As a result, the house building cannot begin. A great result, but I fear the saga will not end there.

Bus Services, as never before have to be financially viable, there is no more money to subsidise unprofitable routes. Hence with that "Use it or lose it" health warning, I would like everyone affected by the lack of a service in Appleford and the Eastern end of Sutton Courtenay to assist by writing in to me, or the Parish Council, or Thames Travel to express their concerns. It may be a long haul, but to have any chance of persuading Thames Travel to rethink, we must demonstrate a need for such a service.

I have just returned from a Liaison meeting at Didcot B Power station where they explained, in some detail, their plans for the demolition of Didcot A. They are fully aware of how much public interest there is in this issue and are very keen to keep everyone informed. The 3 cooling towers which can safely be demolished with explosives are due to come down this summer – for those keen to get the best seats, we are all going to be given plenty of warning. The whole meeting was very helpful and frank and I warmed to the way n power were engaging with us all.

In the next few weeks, I am hoping to set up a series of surgeries, or more properly "opportunities to meet to discuss current issues". Perhaps one every two months. Rather than in a formal setting, perhaps in a quiet corner of one of the pubs? Suggestions from any residents of Appleford or Sutton Courtenay would be welcome.

ED VAIZEY MP

The subject of new housing has been top of my list of correspondence in recent weeks. People are understandably concerned about the large numbers of houses that the authorities say need to be built in our area over the next fifteen years or so – something like 100,000. This is an increase of almost 40 per cent in the numbers of houses in Oxfordshire – twice the rate of increase there has been in the last fifteen years.

So it is clear to me that the housing predictions may be too high. I am therefore going to lobby at a national level for a change in the way housing need is predicted so that it reflects actual, current housing need and a wellgrounded view of new jobs. The number of homes planned should also be based on what can, realistically, be delivered by developers in the local area, bearing in mind what can be planned and constructed within available resources. I will also ask that the constraints imposed by the Oxford Green Belt, floodplains and the Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty locally are taken into account, as there are large areas that can only be developed exceptionally if at all, which increases the burden of housing imposed elsewhere.

I have no doubt that this debate will continue for many months: I will continue to do all that I can to represent the views of my constituents to ensure that we get genuinely sustainable new housing to meet real need, but that we don't damage our local area in the process.

In the midst of the debate about housing, I have continued to lobby Network Rail to try to ensure that the impact of the electrification of the railway line will cause the minimum possible disruption. There are clear signs that Network Rail are taking much more account of the comments they have received, particularly about the needs of local residents as closures are planned.

I have also received a number of emails and letters from constituents regarding the Care Bill. Many of those who have been in touch are campaigners for Macmillan Cancer Support, and I think it is important to pay tribute to the work done by this fantastic charity in their efforts to raise awareness of the most pressing issues facing cancer carers. Cancer carers play a crucial role in the lives of cancer patients here in the constituency and across the UK, and it is vitally important they receive the support they need to help them to continue this invaluable work. A particular concern has been on the identification of carers by the NHS. I am therefore pleased that the Care Services Minister has confirmed that accompanying guidance to the Care Bill will reinforce the importance of cooperation between the NHS and local authorities on local authorities' duty to identify carers.

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CONSTITUENTS MEET ED VAIZEY MP

About 100 people attended the public meeting with Ed Vaizey to discuss the development in and around the village. For the most part, the conversation was constructive and the follow up asked him to action these items:

1. Transmit queries over the basis for house build estimates for Vale District and ask for explanation from Nick Boles department as to how these figures for housing/population growth were derived, especially given the amount of growth provided for these houses versus the actual historic population growth, as well as the outlook for employment in the area for the increased population. Also to enquire about plans for all infrastructure--schools, roads, sewage/waste, drains to deal with flooding and water, health services. We will welcome hearing the response.

2. Suggest Abingdon Road/Culham bridge to be returned to 2 way – with pedestrian footbridge as a cheap way of improving road gridlock. Write to OCC.

3. Joint examination of Culham no 1 site by both Vale DC and SODC--encourage the 2 councils to communicate.

4. Suggest to Vale a use of higher density apartment housing on power station site for affordability and better use of existing infrastructure.

5. Additionally, not mentioned yesterday but for consideration for Ed and the VWHDC to discuss would be to build an Ebbsfleet/garden city sort of development with purpose built infrastructure over the old reservoir site at Drayton.

I have asked and am hoping that he will provide his updates in this Newsletter for all to read and respond accordingly. I hope that all residents, whether or not you attended that meeting, will feel free to contact Ed at his email, *ed.vaizey.mp@parliament.uk*. The more voices he hears, with constructive ideas, the better it will be for us all. Our meeting was featured on BBC Radio Oxford as well as BBC Oxford News. Many thanks to all of you who came to the meeting and I very much hope it will help save at least a part of Sutton Courtenay.

VOLUNTEER LOCK KEEPERS NEEDED

For the last three years volunteers have been assisting our Lock Staff on the Thames at the 45 locks along its length between Lechlade and Teddington. Now, ahead of our fourth season, we invite you to apply to become a Volunteer Assistant Lock Keeper at a lock near you.

The Environment Agency, which is navigation authority for the Thames, is now recruiting for the 2014 season and are looking for volunteers who can commit to assisting at least one day a week between May and the end of September. Volunteers can agree their hours with lock keepers but need to be available at least from 11 to 5. Volunteers are particularly needed along the river between Reading and Lechlade. Volunteering is a great way to meet people and to find out more about the Thames, its history, wildlife and management. At the same time volunteers know that they are doing something worthwhile that is really appreciated.

Our Volunteer Assistant Lock Keepers work alongside paid lock keepers. They help boats pass through the lock safely: taking ropes, directing traffic, and operating sluices and lock gates. They help maintain the site: painting, tidying and gardening. They provide information to visitors, be they on foot or afloat, so that they can make the best of their time on the river. Visitors really appreciate the local knowledge that volunteers can provide.

All applicants are invited to an assessment at a local lock. Here they will have the role explained to them and be shown what it involves in practical terms. They will also be assessed to decide which site may be most appropriate for them and to ensure that they have the physical capabilities required. After successful completion of the assessment, they attend an induction course which focuses on safety and preparing them for the lock side. On the lock side the volunteers follow a documented training programme before being signed off to take charge of the lock on their own. This will only be for short periods, while the paid keeper is at lunch for example. The volunteers are there to augment the service provided by paid staff rather than to replace them.

Volunteers are provided with some uniform and can claim mileage for travel to and from a lock local to them. They also receive a monthly newsletter which keeps them in touch with what is going on along the river and other activities of the Environment Agency.

THE HIGH STREET PARKING ODYSSEY CONTINUES...

I have worked diligently to find proof that "Parking on the pavement is an absolute offence", as stated in a letter to last month's edition. Certainly, pavement parking in Greater London is an offence and has been since the days of Ken Livingston and the GLA, but the boundaries of the capital are where that legislation begins and ends. The Department of Transport says, "There is currently no national legislation banning the parking of all vehicles

on the pavement, due to the wide range of circumstances and locations where pavement parking occurs".

Confused.com says, "According to the 1835 Highways Act, there's no law saying motorists can't park on pavements outside of London."

The House of Commons Library (Note SN/BT/1170) says, "There is no national prohibition against on-street or 'pavement' parking except in relation to heavy commercial vehicles. Local authorities may act to tackle pavement parking in various ways, such as under legislation governing obstruction and dangerous parking; designating limited areas of 'no pavement parking' through a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO); or establishing a special parking area. A vehicle can only be illegally parked if there are parking restrictions operating in the area." Blocking the highway, on the other hand, is an absolute offence. TfL says, "The right to pass and re-pass along a highway is from a judgment in common law, and this refers to the whole highway being blocked and not just the footway."

So, it seems that there's no law against pavement parking outside London unless specifically designated (and signposted) by the relevant Council, but there is a nationally applicable law against blocking the road. This is something I'm trying to avoid - which is why I park with two wheels on the pavement.

The 1835 Highways Act does impose certain conditions that apply to those living in the disputed section of the High Street. These include offences of:

* "Throwing or laying any dirt, litter, or ashes, or nightsoil, or any carrion, fish, offal, or rubbish, on any street."

* "Knowingly suffering common prostitutes or reputed thieves to assemble at and continue in his premises."

* "Wanton and furious driving."

I am fastidious and resolute in my compliance with these laws and will not transgress, regardless of temptation or coercion.

On a final point, I note that a previous letter stated that..."Mr. Connor knew there was no available parking at his house when he moved there". This suggests that houses on my stretch of the High Street are suitable only for carless pedestrians, which seems a little harsh, and also denies the apparent truth that, according to the statutes as they currently stand, there is available parking and I'm legally entitled to use it.....provided, of course, that I don't block the road and deny other vehicles the right to pass and re-pass freely.

Victoria Sandwich: 175gms(6 oz) butter, 175gms(6 oz) castor sugar, 175gms(6 oz) SR flour (sifted), 3 standard eggs, lightly beaten. Pre-heat oven to 180° C, 350° F, Gas 4.
