

VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

War Memorial

Parishioners are still generously donating to the war memorial renovation project, and the Council would thank everyone for their help. Children at the Primary School undertook a sponsored cycle ride to raise funds. They put in a great deal of effort, and the Council is extremely grateful to them and the staff that organised, and the families that supported, the sponsored event. A cheque in the sum of £1140.59 was given to the Council.

The war memorial is made of Bath stone which is quite soft and advice has been sought from the War Memorial Trust as to cleaning and restoration. The Trust has advised that



there is a limited number of times that lettering can be recut into the stone, and that if inappropriately cleaned at the wrong time of the year can store up problems for the future by causing irreversible damage. The War Memorial Trust is the expert in conservation of war memorials and its guidance and comments come from many years of experience and knowledge. The Council accepts that they are the experts and following advice of not to start the project at this time of the year, has agreed that it would be better to wait until the weather improves next Spring. It is unfortunate that the war memorial will not be at its best for Remembrance Sunday this year, but the Council is keen to ensure the correct preservation of the war memorial

Vale of White Horse District Council - Local Plan

The District Council will soon be publishing the latest "submission" version of the local Plan for its final round of consultation before it submits its plan to the government for an independent examination. The Council has confirmed that the site it proposed for allocation at East of Sutton Courtenay is included the submission version of the plan. This is the field next to the village hall running northwards up to the recreation ground. The proposed allocation is unchanged at 220 homes. The publication of the local plan is expected at the beginning of November.

Street Naming

Houses currently under construction and those that are about to start will require new street names to be allocated in the future. The Vale of White Horse District Council is the street naming authority and invites the Parish Council to make suggestions as to possible names. It also asks the developer for suggestions. Once it has gathered in several ideas, the Vale of White Horse District Council will chose a new street name, or devise one its own. If anyone has any suggestions of names that they would like to put forward, please contact the clerk.

Footpaths

The checking of the state and condition of the footpaths is continuing. There are numerous instances where paths are impassable or extremely narrow, owing to the growth that is overhanging from neighbouring trees and shrubs. The Council has agreed to contact landowners to request that these be cut back. If you have rights of way going over your property, could you please check that there is a reasonable width of path available for pedestrians, and that there are no overhanging branches which impede passage.

PARISH COUNCIL CONTINUED

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered:

P14/V1902/HH Renewal of P098/V1363 Erection of extensions at 3 Hillyard Barns. The Council commented that the 2 storey extension may cause some loss of light to the adjacent property.

P14/V1877/HH Single storey timber outbuilding at 18 High Street. The council had no objections provided the separate building was not converted to living accommodation.

P14/V1447/FUL Change of use to private health club/gym at 2B Trident Park, Basil Hill Road. The Council had no objections

P14/S2430 Archimedean Screw hydropower installation and associated works

Land north of River Thames Weir. The Council did not object in principle to this, but wished to see a design in keeping with the open countryside and a more sympathetic building in place. There was the opportunity for bill boards and educational displays. The footpath should remain open and the open views remain rather than the footpath going behind a brick building.

SUTTON COURTENAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

During the five years that I have been Head Teacher at Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School, the school has grown in numbers from 85 children to currently 135. Fortunately, the school building is currently big enough to accommodate this growth in numbers and at present, we do have limited spaces available for new children in all our year groups.

With the planned growth for the village there are already plans in place to increase the school by at least two classrooms within the

next few years in order to accommodate any extra children. I am expecting an Architect in order to begin drawing up plans very soon.

We are fortunate to occupy a very large site. We have: two playgrounds, an enormous field, our own Forest School area, garden area, outdoor learning spaces and a pond area. Extra classrooms will not impact upon these facilities.

Once the classrooms are built we will then be able to offer 30 places per year group instead of the current 20 places and be able to teach our children in single year group classes.

It is very exciting to see our school growing in so many ways. The children are relishing the challenges and ever increasing expectations that we have on them. The new curriculum that has come into force is more demanding than previous requirements so in order to ensure that our children are fully prepared (especially within maths and English), the new curriculum was implemented within our school last January instead of September.

We are still committed to providing a creative curriculum that brings all subjects to life. Trips and experiences bring this to life and despite only being a few weeks into term, Year 2 have had an exciting canal boat trip, Year 3 have had visitors in from The Co-operative in Steventon to talk about where the food all comes from and they brought some interesting food to try! Year 5 and 6 are busy making preparations for their fast approaching residential where they will be trying all sorts of new challenges such as: climbing, abseiling and zip wire, before visiting the Imperial War Museum in November as part of their 'Fallen Fields' topic to learn more about World War 1.

From the Ministry Team...

The story behind ... Come Ye Thankful People Come

Come, ye thankful people, come, Raise the song of harvest home! All be safely gathered in, Ere the winter storms begin; God, our maker, doth provide For our wants to be supplied; Come to God's own temple, come; Raise the song of harvest home!

We ourselves are God's own field,
Fruit unto his praise to yield;
Wheat and tares together sown,
Unto joy or sorrow grown;
First the blade and then the ear,
Then the full corn shall appear:
Grant, O harvest Lord, that we
Wholesome grain and pure may be....

If you come to our Harvest Celebration at 10.30am on 5th October in All Saints' Church we will be singing this Harvest hymn. It was written by the Rev Henry Aldford, DD, a Victorian clergyman who had been a student at Trinity College, Cambridge with Alfred Tennyson, and whose transparent goodness and friendliness seem to have made him liked and appreciated wherever he went.

His ministry began as vicar of Wymeswold, a tiny village in Leicestershire with a badly neglected church. Over 18 years, Henry rebuilt the faltering Christian community, faithfully visiting every person in his parish, and preaching his way through the Bible in sermons that were so clear that everyone could understand him. He then moved on to the incumbency of Quebec Chapel in London for four years, before moving to the Deanery of Canterbury, in 1857, where he lived until his death in early 1871.

Henry was one of life's good people; gentle, kindly, grateful for everything he had (he used to say 'grace' before AND after each meal), and eager to encourage all those whom he served. He was prodigiously productive: writing something like 50 books. The best known of these was a four volume exposition of the New Testament, which took him nearly 20 years.

His famous hymn draws upon two of Jesus' parables: the story of the wheat and tares (Mt 13:24-30) and also the story of the seed that grows unbeknown to the sower (Mark 4:26-29). Both are parables draw from agriculture; both are about the ultimate harvest of our souls before God. During this lifetime we properly give thanks to God for our harvest of the gifts of this world, but we should also reflect on what seed we are sowing in our lives, and what harvest we may expect; as one day God will gather us together for the eternal heavenly harvest.

Archimedes comes to Abingdon!

After four years of research and planning, Abingdon Hydro is near the end of the bureaucracy required for generating hydroelectricity from the Thames. The £1 million scheme will harness the sustainable, green power of the river without diverting it or enclosing it. Some of the water currently flowing over Abingdon weir will instead go through two reverse Archimedes screws, 3.3m in diameter. Up to 5 tons of water per second can pass through each screw, generating a total of up to 100kW of electrical



power. Environment Agency records for the Thames go back up to 70 years, giving confidence in the expected long term output. This project was set up as a community enterprise to make the profit available to support environmental community projects in the town. As far as we know this is Abingdon's first green, ethical, community investment, and the opportunity is coming up later this year to buy shares. This is a long term investment, with a target return of about 4%. The minimum investment is £500 and it will qualify for a tax rebate under the Enterprise Investment Scheme.

H.H.Asquith and World War 1

The centenary of the start of World War 1 has drawn attention to former Prime Minister Asquith and events at the time of the declaration of war with relevance to Sutton Courtenay.

In 1912 the Wharf was purchased by Asquith's second wife, Margot, with the help of a benefactor, partly as a country retreat and also because their son was at a prep school in Oxford. The Asquiths frequently came to Sutton Courtenay, particularly at weekends. It is known that members of Asquith's government sometimes came here for meetings and it is likely that discussions took place about the situation leading up to the war which may have given rise to various versions of events that have circulated over the years. However it is incorrect, as has been claimed, that Asquith was in Sutton Courtenay when war was declared.

Recently a number of historians and a biographer were contacted to investigate this and all are in agreement that Asquith and his wife were in London throughout the days leading to the outbreak of war. Records show that each day Asquith was engaged in cabinet meetings and discussions with colleagues. On Tuesday,

4th August the cabinet met in the morning to formulate and despatch the ultimatum to Germany. In the afternoon Asquith addressed the House of Commons after which he and Margot sat in the cabinet room waiting for the ultimatum to expire at 11 pm. Margot Asquith's War Diary, which has recently been published, also confirms their whereabouts and activities at this critical time.

It seemed important to clarify some of the statements that have appeared recently both in print and on the local radio.

Some historians and authors have criticised Asquith for his leadership during the first two years of the war until his resignation in 1916, whilst others consider his reputation as an unsuitable war leader is unfair. Asquith's peacetime premiership from 1908 to 1914 has been favourably regarded as his government introduced significant domestic reforms, including welfare legislation and a reduction in the power of the House of Lords.

NAG5 SAFETY CORNER



DOORSTEP CRIME is the name used to describe a range of crimes which all involve attempting to obtain money from people in their own homes. Criminals usually target older people living alone, knowing that they can use scare tactics, bullying or intimidation to get money from their victim. Doorstep crime includes rogue traders and distraction burglary.



ROGUE TRADERS

Aim to persuade the home owner to have work carried out on their property. This work is often unnecessary, may be charged at grossly inflated prices and is normally very poorly done. The trader will also often charge for uncompleted work. Typically it will involve roofing, guttering gardening or driveway repairs.

Typically rogue traders may:

be insistent, reluctant to leave once the door has been answered and will not agree to let the victim have a few days to consider before agreeing to have the work done.

use fear and intimidation to get the victim to agree to the work.

claim that something needs urgent attention so that the victim agrees on the spot.

provide a quote that is much lower than the final amount charged for the work.

not provide any paperwork, or have paperwork with only a vague address and details.

often say they have materials left over from another job.

<u>Traders claiming to be a member of a Trade Association</u>

If a trader claims to belong to a professional organisation, e.g. the Federation of Master Builders, check this with the organisation, either by calling them or looking on their web site. It is an offence under the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008 if they lie about this.

DISTRACTION BURGLARY

An unexpected caller arrives on the doorstep, often with a claim to be from the council, be a police officer, needing to read the gas or electricity meter and suchlike. They may often have someone else with them and, once they are inside, one will distract the householder while the other steals money and/or possessions.

How to deal with an unexpected caller:

Ask to see the caller's ID and if they do not have ID do not let them into the house.

If they have ID which you suspect is not genuine do not let them inside until you have called the organisation they claim to represent. Use the internet or the telephone book for the number. Do not use the number from their ID card. Genuine officials will be happy to wait while you check.

If you are still concerned ask the trader to make an appointment to call back later, and ensure a friend or member of the family is with you when they return.

If you are caught out

If you have fallen for scams like these, had money stolen or been threatened with physical violence you should report it to the police.

<u>Useful</u> information to report

Key dates - when the trader first contacted you and the date when work started.

Whether the trader is still at your home and, if not, whether they will be returning at a later date.

If you know the trader is still working in the area, or mentioned that they had worked on another property in the area.

Whether you have paid for the work you agreed to have done and, if so, how you paid.

If you paid by cheque, the name the cheque was made out to.

The name of the trader or business.

The registration number and description of any cars or vans, including any business names or telephone numbers on them.

A description of the trader's appearance - clothes worn, accents or other noticeable features.

Details of any paperwork such as receipts or invoices.

CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

Abingdon Citizens Advice Bureau is warning that innocent secondhand car buyers could have their vehicle taken away from them because of an outstanding loan on the car dating back to the previous owner.

"Logbook loans", officially called bills of sale, are often taken out against the purchase of a car. The bill of sale gives the lender ownership of the car and the lender gives the car buyer the right to drive the car as long as loan repayments are up to date. If a borrower fails to repay the loan, the car can be seized by the lender. But most people do not realise that if the car is sold on while the loan is still outstanding, and payments are not being made, the logbook lender is legally entitled to take the car away from the new owner.

In one case made known to Citizens Advice, a man said he had spent £1,100 on a secondhand car. A few weeks later he received a letter from a logbook loans company saying he owed them £637. The man contacted the loan company to explain that the car had been sold to him, providing the loan firm with the seller's address, but somebody still turned up to take the car away. Worried that he would be left without any way to get to work, the man had to borrow money in order to pay off the previous owner's loan.

Drivers can carry out checks before buying a car, to see whether a loan is attached to it. However, there is a charge for these searches, and not all loans will show up.

Evidence collected by Citizens Advice suggests that people are signing up for logbook loans, tempted by the promise of fast cash and no credit checks, without realising the full implications. Interest rates charged are much higher than those for a conventional loan, and borrowers can end up much deeper in debt as they struggle to repay amounts which exceed the original cost of the car by almost three times.

ED VAIZEY MP

Over the summer there were many events both across my Constituency, in the UK and across Europe which marked the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War. Each was quite different – from the names on the war memorial being read out in Wallingford to the unveiling of the Memorial Arch in Folkestone where I was deeply moved to see a parade, which was a stark reminder of the men who marched off to serve their country a century ago. For me, perhaps the most moving event of all was when people all over the country put their lights out and we all paused to remember the courage and dignity of the millions who fought for freedom and democracy, so many of whom never came home.

It's so important that we don't just remember for a day or a week, but that we really do try to learn the lessons of what became known as the Great War, which so sadly was not, as so many hoped, the war to end all wars. In particular, getting young people today to engage with the real impact of the First World War is a challenge. I was therefore delighted to come across a truly imaginative and effective way to do just that set up by one of my constituents - a Facebook page of a soldier-to-be had the platform have been available 100 years ago. I know that young people are already checking out the Facebook page to see the latest information, and I'm sure that the numbers will continue to grow over the summer. You can see the page at <code>www.facebook.com/WW1SoldiersTale</code>. Not only does the page recount the events in one life, but it sets it all in the context of a family and friends, and all the other events — local and national — happening at the time. Not least among those events is the campaign for votes for women: it is still less than a century since any women at all were allowed to vote and it was only in 1924 — within living memory - that women were finally able to vote on the same basis as men.

Reading about the fight for the right to vote is a timely reminder that our we can, perhaps, take our democracy and our right to participate for granted. Over the next few months, the electoral roll which will be in place for the 2015 General Election will be compiled. Please do make sure that you encourage anyone just coming up to 18 both to look at the facebook page above and to get on the electoral roll – and do both yourself too!

This month my mailbag was dominated with concerns over the breeding and sale of puppies and kittens, where there is believed to be a lack of thought for the health or welfare of the animals. I was pleased that MPs had the opportunity to debate this issue, which is clearly of great importance to many of my constituents. The debate helped clarify the belief that dog breeders only need a licence if they have a bitch producing five or more litters per year. DEFRA discovered that when the relevant Act came into force under the last Government, the Home Office sent a circular indicating this; it is now writing to councils to stress that anyone in the business of breeding dogs must be licenced. Recent Government action shows that much can be achieved without new legislation. That said, I do share concerns about unregulated sales over the internet, so am pleased that the Government has acted to create a voluntary code which has resulted in 100,000 adverts being removed since the start of 2014.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Bullfinch and beyond..

When I first joined the County Council, Operation Bullfinch was well underway. This was a combined, coordinated project to understand, to learn from and to ensure that the chances of Child Sex exploitation ever
raising its head again in this county would be very small. It took honesty, courage and determination to admit
past mistakes and put new, more thorough procedures in place. Last May it seemed that Oxfordshire might be
seen as the "home" of child sex exploitation. As a result of Operation Bullfinch, I am happy to say that
Oxfordshire is now seen as leading the way. CSE is a national problem, needing national solutions - but we can
all take heart in our county having come to terms with the problem first.

A policy of no hope..

About 3 months ago, I heard a County Highways Officer talking about the Council's policy on how to manage road maintenance and improvement in an atmosphere of ever tightened budgets. He talk of a policy of "managed decline". I assumed that this was a personal view rather than a council policy. Yet last week, I heard on the evening news, the County Cabinet Member for Highways use the same expression. "Managed Decline" could be argued to be a reasonable short term policy in tough times, but as a long term plan, it seems a policy of total gloom and doom. Very gradually we will manage our road conditions downwards until potholes fuse and all traffic is at a standstill. Surely, we should have a long term strategy to improve things. OCC has the temporary (2 days a week) use of 2 large machines that operate like roadside combine harvesters. They clear out, fill and resurface in one operation, leaving a permanent repair ready to drive over in minutes. The same machines spend 2 days a week on the roads in Essex, where I am told the potholes are like tank traps.

Doubtless the machines are fiendishly expensive to hire or buy. But could a number of counties not get together to get more of them? What about prudential borrowing? At least its the sort of idea which might fix the problem and offer us a more hopeful policy than one of "Managed Decline!"

Planning: houses in the Didcot area

It seems to me that villagers and other locals would be well advised to take a good look at what is happening in housing locally. We all know that the Government via the Vale Council which is made up almost entirely of the two party components of the present government is seeking to force very large numbers of houses into Oxfordshire, and particularly our part of that county. We also know that this worries a very large number of locals. What exactly is likely to happen? The honest answer is that no one really knows for sure, but the history of housebuilding shows that it is economics that call the tune, not Governments or planners. It is one thing for planners to push everything through in the teeth of determined though largely powerless local opposition, it is quite another for all the houses actually to get built. Banks will not lend if they think a builder cannot sell his houses, and buyers will not appear if they cannot afford the houses. And there are many economic warnings around, and it is at least arguable that our Government is unwisely propping up the housing market and parts of the economy. Consider briefly a) Help to buy schemes heavily criticised by the International Monetary Fund and by the Government's own Office for Budget Responsibility. What will happen to those who can just about afford a house with mortgage help and then interest rates go up as they surely must? And is the Help to buy scheme inflating house prices in itself? b) the Bank of England has held bank rate down since 2009 against all market forces, and meanwhile the Bank is printing money fast, something I used to be told only 'banana republics' did! The economic situation for future housing is far from certain, and I am getting a steady stream of advice from City financiers warning against the housing market collapsing; c) what will happen to those large builders who have borrowed heavily to buy up land, if the housing slows down? So beware of assuming too easily that all sites getting planning permission will produce all those houses.

Our Immediate Area

Now whether all the houses get built or not, consider planning in our immediate area, in and around Didcot; not just Sutton Courtenay or Appleford but all planning in the vicinity. Starting at the eastern end in South Oxfordshire, up to 2000 approx houses to the north along side the Appleford & Vale boundary; then Didcot Park stretching from Didcot perimeter up to Appleford level crossing, then in Sutton Courtenay the Ameys site, the Roman Catholic Church site, either side of Milton Road, and a new large development on the Didcot A station site; and then across into Milton the new Linden development about to come to planners, and Milton Heights. Where does all that leave us? I cannot speak for south of Didcot as that is SODC territory not Vale, but I should be surprised if the Hagbournes are not experiencing the same pressures. Get out a local map and look at what all this involves. It seems to me inescapable not to conclude that in a few years time all our villages will be subsumed as suburbs of Didcot and be urbanised. Do we want that? If not, we need to fight hard, understanding the overall position, marshalling our arguments and suggesting alternative ideas for housing development.

The Next Step

The Vale cabinet and the planners are intending to make public the next stage of the Local Plan about mid-September, and they will come to the October council meeting for their subsequent stage, and if passed, then go out to consultation again. We must be active at this point, and we have to be ready with our criticism, and if we want to win through, with constructive alternatives. Here I hope to suggest one or two such ideas for you to consider. (The Harwell Rd. Diageo warehouse appeal is important, very important, but I am not considering it here as it is commercial not housing).

Some different planning ideas

First, I believe our area must plan on the basis that Didcot, a valuable rail centre to most of us, and also an expanding town, needs to be told firmly to stay in Didcot, so that we can keep the green field buffers in position and not allow Didcot to absorb all the **nearby** villages. If you agree with me on this, it is crucial that we get this curbing of Didcot over to our planners, convince them of its merits, and hold them to it.

Second, working from that, Didcot needs more housing, but where and what type? To date expansion in the area has just been commercial developers doing deals with landowners for yet more estates in villages, older planning laws more or less suspended, local objections ignored, and developers getting pretty well anything they want. That might result in a lot more estates being built in villages, but my problem is that I do not believe there are enough people who can afford such housing, so we need something else. Now the Didcot A site is of course a brownfield site, and so as long as houses are kept away from the immediate vicinity of the B station, that site could well take a much greater density of housing, so that we meet the Government imposed Vale target housing figures but use much less land in the process. It is true that this site is in Sutton Courtenay not Didcot, but it is brownfield and it is in the industrialised end of Sutton.

Third, my suggestion is that we invite the developers to build blocks of one and two bedroom flats, for folk who need a roof over their heads but are never likely to be able to afford a nice new village house. How about blocks going up to 4 or 5 or even 6 floors to cater for poorer folk, for single folk, or perhaps the ground floor flats for the elderly? Locals have to understand that whether we like it or not, our planners have to meet Government imposed housing figures, and just about the only way we can save our village green spaces, is to use **greater housing density** and hence blocks of flats. I do not say this is a perfect solution, so if anyone has better ideas, please let me know. But at least it cuts down the pressure on our remaining green spaces in villages.






