

# Footpath alongside The Abbey – Cross Trees to the village green

The Parish Council had received comments about the difficulty in walking this path. The footway is the responsibility of the County Council and it has been referred to that authority to investigate.

#### **Didcot Volunteer Centre - Funding**

The Volunteer Centre operates a dedicated transport service for those unable to use public transport and have no access to private transport, by taking people to hospital, doctors, and on shopping trips etc. It serves the



Sutton Courtenay area. The County Council is reviewing its grant funding of the centre, and the Parish Council has written in support of the continuation of this service, to ensure that local residents in need have access to the transport that they require.

#### Damascus – Litter Pick

Parish Councillors have been invited to attend a litter pick organised by Damascus on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> March starting at 11.00 a.m. at the village hall. Please would residents willing to help make a note of the date and time in your diaries.

#### **Parish Council Elections May 2015**

It may seem a little early to consider elections in May, but the term of office for the current Councillors comes to an end in May. Elections for the Parish Council, should there be more candidates than seats, will be held at the same time as the General Election and District Council Election. Now is the time to begin to think about standing to serve the community.

The Parish Council has a wide, but limited, range of powers to provide and maintain a variety of important local services such as recreation facilities, bus shelters, open spaces etc, and it acts as a consultee for many issues. It has representatives on many local committees and it is a very busy time in a changing parish with much going on.

Further information about standing as a candidate and the requirements of office can be obtained from the clerk.

#### Planning Applications

Owing to the fire at the offices of South Oxfordshire District Council no planning applications have been received for consideration.

However, lodged with the Vale of White Horse District Council, are enquiries from 3 developers as to whether an Environmental Impact Assessment would be required should they lodge planning applications for housing development at their respective sites. The enquiries relate to sites, North of the Appleford Road, East of Harwell Road, and off Hobbyhorse Lane (known as Sutton Courtenay East). The Parish Council is not a consultee in these enquiries, and it will be for the Vale of White Horse District Council to determine whether each of the circumstances meets the criteria for an impact assessment, as set down in planning legislation.


Over the years the children in the choir have performed with artists such

#### **REST IN PEACE**

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following people who have died recently:

DOREEN ROSEMARY JOHNSON (who died aged 91 on 10th January 2015) was born on 25th March 1923. Brought up by her mother and maternal grandparents she had a happy childhood with her brother Peter, and sister Wendy. Determined to do well for herself, she won a scholarship to the Godolphin and Latimer School. She was very proud of this but really enjoyed the sports more than the academic side of life. When the war came she was evacuated to Newbury, where she met her future husband David. A great partnership developed - David's adventurous, capable and dependable qualities combined with Doreen's overwhelming love of life. She trusted him to take her to Africa where they lived quite basically in the early years, with a massive lump of ice for a fridge and wooden stoves to cook on. She launched herself into her new life, and together they made Africa their home for over thirty years. They went onto have three children Sue, Chris and Wendy. Together Doreen and David led a very busy life with their growing family which involved lots of socializing and Doreen became a wonderful hostess. The family moved to America from Zambia - and found life very different; as if they had moved from the slow lane into the fast lane. David's job took him away travelling and soon after arriving in the US, Doreen had to learn to drive; she chose a massive American station wagon with snow tyres to cope with the five - six inches of snow that came in Winter. She was always very good at adapting and facing up to life's challenges. David and Doreen retired to Scotland but David died of a stroke in 1998 and after six months, Doreen decided to move to Sutton Courtenay. She soon built a new life for herself with her family and her pets around her, making friends quickly and was a very positive influence on her grandchildren. When Doreen first came to the village, she lived in Long Barn next door to Cocky the cockatoo, who belonged to Nancy and Virginia, and Doreen decided that the cockatoo needed to get some exercise out of his cage; there were many occasions when her family was called to bring a ladder to get Cocky down from the top of an apple tree. She became a loyal and faithful member of the worshipping community of All Saints and was a generous provider of refreshments - willingly baking cakes or making the most perfect sandwiches for any occasion. She was a steadfast member of the Women's Christian Fellowship – attending every meeting she could and running the raffle stall for many years. She loved being a 'welcomer' at services, greeting everyone with a warm smile, and was very frustrated when her legs stopped working and she could no longer help as she wished. She loved animals and had a series of dogs, cats, and chickens. She will be greatly missed by her family and friends who gathered for her funeral in All Saints' on 26th January 2015. This is an edited extract from the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the service.

EMILY JAMES known as Emma (died aged 77 on 10th January 2015) was the oldest child of Emma and Joby Loveridge, and was born in Staines. She spent her early years travelling around the country with her Mum and Dad following the harvest and going where the work was. Over the years the family grew with the arrival of her sisters, Joan, Sally and Dolly. Emma, as the eldest, was always in charge and would tell them what to do. In the summer months they would spend time at Evesham, picking fruit and planting vegetables, and her sisters remember Emma driving a tractor and towing them behind her planting vegetables. After travelling they came and settled down at her grandparents bungalow in Sutton Courtenay. The girls and their cousins used to run through the hedge to get to Mathews Flower and Fruit and Veg Shop and help themselves to the apples! The family moved from Sutton Courtenay to Berinsfield in the 1950s – into a former air force hut - before they were given the house on Fane Drive. From being a young child Emma was always a hard worker and as she grew up she would work with her Dad, Joby, scrapping and clearing out the Jumble Sales. She would spend hours sorting through the rags and shoes. When her sister, Sally, married in 1972, Emma would go scrapping with Andrew and they would travel all over the country - from Birmingham to Blackpool - three or four times a year. One day she turned up in Richard Mathews shop asking if he would take her to Covent Garden. He did and from then on she ran a Flower Stall in the layby on the Oxford-Reading Road near Notcutts. She became a very familiar sight to many drivers who would stop and buy, not only flowers, but pickles and logs as well. She was never idle and - if not working - spent her time keeping her house immaculate. She could turn her hand to anything. She loved dogs - and was known to have driven all the way to Wales for one. Emma was stubborn and set in her own ways. She always knew her own mind and no one could make her do anything she didn't want to do. Over the years she also proved to be tough and resilient, coping with the ups and downs of life but she also had a heart of gold. She and John were married in Wheatley in 1979 and they became a family with step-son John. She had a good sense of humour and liked to laugh - particularly at the old favourities on TV. In the last few years the great delight of Emma's life was her great-nephew - Jack. In recent years ill-health came to dominate her life - but she still remained independent and stubborn - refusing to give up smoking even when she was put onto oxygen. This stubbornness resulted in her blowing herself up - apparently she went up like a chimney and ended up with a blackened face and hair standing up on end but she wouldn't be told! She will be greatly missed by all her family and friends who filled the church for her funeral on 4th February 2015. This is an edited extract from the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at the service.

#### NAG5 SAFETY CORNER

#### **Action Fraud**

Is the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and financially motivated cybercrime. Run by the City of London Police, working alongside the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau, this specialist team uses information from all reported fraud and cyber-crime cases to create alerts about new types of crime, or those which are increasing in severity.



Action Fraud is now working with the Neighbourhood and Home Watch Network's Neighbourhood Alerts team in order to increase the distribution of fraud prevention alerts. Over the next few months these alerts will include information about the following common fraud and cyber-crimes:

- People calling to tell you there is an issue with your bank card, which they need to collect from you to fix the
  problem.
- Fraud committed by people selling event and entertainment tickets, weight-loss and teeth whitening drugs and selling vehicles online.
- Fraud committed by people who cold-call thousands of people in the UK in order to sell them an investment in shares or precious metals, or want them to invest their pensions.
- People pretending to be someone they are not in order to persuade your business to send money to a new bank account to pay for an invoice.
- Activities of cyber-criminals, who want to infect your computer or smartphone in order to steal your banking details
  or to 'lock' important files to prevent you from using or viewing them.

#### **USE OF FOOTPATHS**

Over recent months there have been a number of reports of aggressive behaviour by cyclists to walkers using the designated Footpaths in the village. It should be remembered that cycles are not permitted on designated Footpaths only on designated Bridleways. Footpaths and Bridleways are defined as:-

**Footpath:** a public right of way with recorded rights for walkers. Waymarked with yellow arrows.

**Bridleway:** a public right of way with recorded rights for walkers, horse riders and cyclists. Waymarked with blue arrows.

In particular it should be noted that the path beside the weirs behind Church Street and from Churchmere Road alongside the Millennium Common are designated Footpaths and should not be used by cyclists. G5760

# "THE HISTORY OF SALTERS STEAMERS" Illustrated talk by Simon Wenham

Many people will have enjoyed a leisurely trip on the River Thames on one of Salters steamers. The Thames boat firm, founded in 1858, and based at Folly Bridge in Oxford has an interesting history, not only for pleasure boating but for its role in wartime.

Simon Wenham's doctoral research was on the history of Salters steamers. He is now a research assistant and part-time tutor in history, gives talks about the Thames to different groups and is a regular contributor on Radio Oxford on local history.

At the Society's meeting in January Bill King gave a comprehensive account of the Roman invasion of Britain and its colonisation. Before the Roman invasion Britain was a tribal society living in isolated hamlets with frequent raids between tribes. We learnt that this area would have been part of the Catuvellauni tribe which quickly and peacefully adapted to Roman rule and lifestyles. This explains why there are the remains of Roman villas in the area but no forts which were built in other parts of Britain where the Romans met with more resistance. A villa may have had a community of up to 100 people, and it is interesting to reflect on what the villa excavated in Sutton Courtenay would have been like.

#### CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

Oxfordshire Mind's specialist Benefits for Better Mental Health team give anyone with a mental health problem expert advice and guidance to help them navigate the complex benefits system.

Now the Oxfordshire Mind Benefits team are working more closely with Didcot/Henley Citizens Advice Bureau, as part of the Tap-In Advice Service across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of the White Horse. David Bryceland, Oxfordshire Mind's Benefits Project Service Manager, explained what the team can do to help people having problems with their benefits:

"We often get people visiting our service who are very confused about the benefits system and who are worried that their current benefits could be taken away. Our team will work one-to-one with that person to give them a thorough 'benefits health check' to make sure they are claiming



everything that they're entitled to. We can explain what the letters they receive actually mean and resolve any problems they might be experiencing. We can also help them complete the right forms and make difficult phone calls.

"As we work with people with mental health problems, we have a lot of experience in helping people apply for Employment Support Allowance (ESA) and Personal Independence Payments. We also have an excellent track record of winning appeals when people have been turned down for ESA."

The Benefits team will be working out of both the Didcot CAB and Henley CAB twice every month. #### ED VAIZEY MP

A subject which I know is close to the hearts of many of my constituents is Community Pubs. Since the Localism act brought in the right to bid, people across the country have nominated around 600 pubs which have then been listed as Assets of Community Value. These are assets — land and buildings —that are important to the community and have traditionally been used by the community. Once submitted if the asset comes up for sale a special window is opened to give the community the chance to buy the asset before it goes on the open market. Pubs have proved to be the most listed type of asset! By the end of March the Government is planning to bring forward more legislation so that in future when a pub is listed as an Asset of Community Value a planning application will be needed for a change of use or demolition. Any planning application will be considered in the light of national policy as well as Neighbourhood Plans. Hopefully this will lead to 1000's more of our most valuable pubs becoming Assets of Community Value and retain them at the heart of our communities.

Screening films is also another fantastic way to get communities and people from all walks of life together. A new project has been designed by the British Film institute and funded by the National Lottery to support groups launching and running their own Community Cinema. It aims to bring the cinema experience to more people across the UK particularly those who are unable to enjoy regular screenings because of social and economic reasons or simply because they live too far from the cinema. This project includes advice on how to actually start up a cinema, funding, licencing and how and where to book films. Details can be found at <code>www.neighbourhoodcinema.org.uk</code> it is well worth looking at if this is an idea which interests you and your friends and neighbours.

My mailbag this month has been dominated by the issue of mitochondrial donation, widely reported in the press under the headline "three-parent babies". As you may know, the House of Commons voted to approve a new scientific technique that will help prevent mothers from passing on serious mitochondrial diseases to their children. Whilst I am very aware of the concerns that a number of constituents have raised with me in emails and letters, I think it is very important to note that thorough, scientific reviews have found no evidence that these techniques are at all unsafe. The scientific community has been clear in its support for the introduction of these regulations. Estimates show that 1 in 6,500 children born in the UK each year suffer from a serious mitochondrial DNA disorder. Parliament's intention in approving these regulations is to ensure that mothers who carry damaged mitochondria can have children with the confidence that they will be born without the devastating and often deadly conditions that can be caused by serious mitochondrial disease. The approval of these regulations will be life-changing for those families who are affected by mitochondrial disease.

#### COUNTY COUNCILOR'S REPORT

#### Cost savings...

Two ideas are being seriously considered in an effort to wrestle the County's finances back into the black. The first is the suggestion that an Oxfordshire Unitary Council (one Council responsible for everything) would certainly save some money. How much money is arguable. There is evidence that Oxfordshire is probably too big to deliver all services. There is also the issue that the commissioned report into just how much money might be saved, itself cost the hard-up county some £40K. The idea has gone down like a lead balloon with all the District Councils who argue that their own, relatively healthy financial positions, would be jeopardized by such a move. It would surely have been more sensible to consult the Districts first before commissioning the report.

The second idea is to remove the post of Chief Executive from the County Payroll. It seems it is more than an idea as the CEO has already announced that she will be going in May. The Council is being told that her roll will be taken over by the Leader of the Council — this has not been agreed by the Council as yet and will be the background to a very stormy Council Budget meeting. The potential savings are considerable. The issue is whether it is right, appropriate or sensible to hand over the running of a near £1billion turnover organization to a politician.

#### **Election reflection....**

We may be angry or concerned at the state of democracy in this country, but spare a thought for the newly elected.

On May 8<sup>th</sup>/9<sup>th</sup> all across the country, thousands of people will wake up to discover that they have become new Councillors or MPs. Some will see this as a just reward for weeks of canvassing and delivering. Some (in so-called "safe" seats – assuming such things still exist) will continue as normal. A few, who thought they were taking part simply to make up the numbers, will find themselves elected against all odds and now have obligations to people they hardly know.

The world of the new councillor is bewildering. There is no manual on what to do or what is expected of you. Everyone around you seems to speak a different language. Mrs X rings up to complain that next-door's parrot has just eaten her prize geraniums and what is the new Councillor going to do about it? The first unintelligible Council agenda, the size of a telephone directory, drops through the letter box. Mr Y emails to ask what is the new Councillor's position on sewage treatment and the NPPF?

Within a year you will either have gone mad, resigned or possibly, just possibly, become a truly great Councillor - fluent in council-speak, able to explain the SHMA to the man in the street, connecting the needy with those that can help them. Most probably, like the rest of us, the new councillor will have had many failures and one or two successes, and, like rabbit golfers, only remember the storming 5 iron hit on the 7<sup>th</sup> last year, conveniently forgetting the 6 strokes before and the two after.

Local politics is just like life – full of good and bad, success and failure. Please remember that whatever party he/she may represent, your new councillor is more than likely to be doing his/her best.

It may be that national politics is different, but I doubt it.

#### Vale of White Horse Local Plan

As your elected Vale district councillor, I thought villagers might like to know the two suggestions I have formally made to the Inspector.

Those of you with long memories may recollect that Halcro produced a plan for Abingdon traffic known as Abits. The most localised part of Abits is what we now have as the central Abingdon traffic scheme, but Halcro also added a further section saying that if we really wanted to solve Abingdon traffic congestion, we needed a complete ring road round the town and that would involve three bridges. Those of us who sit in rush hour queues on Culham or even Clifton Hampden bridges will not need much persuasion of the need for a new additional bridge in our locality.

Of course in the present economic climate no one expects the Government to go round building new bridges however desireable; bridges are very expensive items, but some bridge near Culham bridge will have to come one day and for that reason a proposal for it is included in the long term aspect of the local plan. The plan indicates a bridge further down stream towards Clifton Hampden, but the fields round there flood and building up a long anti-flood raised approach road would add a huge amount to the total cost. I recall discussion about this about a decade ago as part of the expansion of Didcot plans, and some argued that we needed a major new road to link up with the M40 at the 3 Pigeons.

That may or may not be good idea, but I have suggested an alternative river crossing be included in the plan so that different ideas can be considered. Remember that FCC have agreed to vacate their site by 2030, and they had earlier promised to do that long before that date. When FCC go, there will be a number of what I gather are technically bridleways which FCC, Hanson and their customers regularly use. These will become redundant and though they are currently private roads not made up to public road standards, there will be a lot of basic roads leading north out of Didcot perimeter road, and the Hanson gated road exit at the edge of Sutton Courtenay will be available. I think those roads should become full public roads, and the Hanson gate should be the starting point of a bridge a few yards down stream of the existing Culham bridge, and this option if adopted at some future date would take traffic across the Thames up to somewhere near the Waggon & Horses to join the Dorchester road.

I believe there are two main advantages of this new bridge route: much saving of money and using the existing redundant private roads. A new bridge in the Long Wittenham area would involve a long built up approach road, very costly. A second Culham bridge would be much cheaper as the Thames is narrower and the land on either side higher, so the bridge span and approach road costs would be less. I would be glad to know what readers think of the options.

My second suggestion to the local Vale of White Horse Plan

Everyone now knows that a large portion of the Didcot A station site has been sold to developers, and the developers have held an exhibition to explain their plans. Many of us have grown more and more alarmed at seeing green field after green field being devoured by developers, and I must confess that I often wonder just how many of these permitted house will actually be built, and if they are, whether people can afford them. We shall see on that, but the Didcot A site is wholly different. Since it is already an established brown field site, and brownfield sites are pretty rare in this area, so I welcome the redevelopment of this site with mixed shops, houses, offices and warehouses.

But I have two worries, which I could not put in any detail to the Local Plan as the developers ideas were not made known till after the Local Plan comment deadline. But I did express my worry to the Inspector in general terms because I fear all this rush to build vast numbers of houses could very easily mean that an expanding Didcot would swallow up and urbanise a lot of adjacent villages: Long Wittenham, Appleford, Sutton Courtenay, Milton, and Harwell, and probably also other villages on the southern side of Didcot eg Hagbournes but they are not in the Vale. This RWE site is mainly like the Power Station itself[despite its name] in Sutton Courtenay with only a very small corner in Didcot. An urbanised Didcotisation would destroy local villages, and in my book that is to be avoided. We must have, and keep, clear green spaces between Didcot and surrounding villages.

Now that they are public I have studied the new plans for this site, and on the whole I welcome them. There is some greenery and trees at the Didcot end, and I welcome that. But I have put one suggestion to the developers, namely that they replace their hotel with blocks of less expensive small one and two bedroom flats, perhaps 5 or 6 stories high. I am not against hotels, and there is a shortage of hotels in the locality, but others are building more hotels including one by the station, and another just outside Didcot the other end on Milton Park.

My concern is for those who cannot afford green field site expensive if nice village houses: young single people, small families, elderly who have downsized, and others especially those on lower incomes. Those who work in all the Didcot warehouses will never be able to afford what a high flying Harwell scientist or a Milton Park entrepreneur can. Economics are squeezing out affordable homes, and I think it behoves those of us who have nice village houses to remember those who can only afford less. My suggestion is to replace the proposed hotel with small flats to meet these needs.


# PLANNING DELUGE CONTINUES – IT WILL AFFECT US ALL PARLIAMENTARY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL ELECTIONS ARE IN MAY. IT'S TIME FOR VILLAGERS TO MAKE THEIR VIEWS CLEAR

The dash for "developer led" growth in the Vale continues in a manner that will shortly make the village unsustainable. One of the unexpected consequences of the draft Local Plan is to open up fresh opportunites for developers, in a way the the local council in powerless to oppose, due to the National Policy Planning Framework (NPPF). Thus development is becoming anything but planned, and is progressing without any regard to the impact on the local community, the provision of infrastructure or the cummulative impact of layering development on development. Whilst Sutton Courtenay is not alone in this, the degree of development in and around the village is exceptional and will impact on all its inhabitants.

It is important that villagers get a real sense of what has and is likely to be permitted in their name. On top of the approval for the Giant Warehouse on the Harwell Road, the large Waste Recovery Facility on the landfill site, the expansion of Milton Park towards the village and the extension of the life of the gravel pits on the Appleford Road, the approved and potential housing provision will double the size of the village in the next few years.

Despite the Local Plan originally stating that there was only a need for 229 extra houses in the area around the village in the period up to 2029, in addition to already permitted sites totalling 306 houses and 26 appplied for, a further 498 are shown as sites that are suitable and under the NPPF seem likely to be approved and 245 are on sites described as suitable in principle. This does not include the 400 on the Didcot Power Station site which is also in SC Parish. A total of 1475. The map below showing this is from Local Plan Part 1 and was buried in its Appedix 22 SuttonCourtenay.

#### The reality of living next to a building site

Anyone who has visited the 'Earthquake experience' at the London Science Museum will know what it's like to wake up in Milton Road. The walls shake violently because of heavy, noisy machinery and BOTH sides of the road are affected. There is also the 'skidpan' experience because of the huge amounts of mud slewed across the road which the rod sweeper struggles to clear (drains?. Heavy lorries carrying building materials trundle past throughout the day and, best of all, the site is so wet (as we warned them) that they have recently 'required' pumps to stay on 24 hours a day n order to continue building the houses, depriving many of us of much needed sleep.

While no-one would opt for a housing estate instead of a field at the rear of their garden, the houses are very close and parallel to our bungalows, looming over our gardens with rows of windows looking straight into our properties. The Vale of White Horse Planning Department could at least have insisted on them being arranged in a more sensitive way so that the houses were not placed in one long row.

Sadly, as Lesley Clements recently pointed out in the Sutton Courtenay News, there are more plans afoot for more building in the village and many more people will have to go through our experience. I would urge anyone to try as hard as they can to preserve their quality of life. However, again as Lesley mentioned, we made very reasonable objections to the Planning Department, raising all the possible issues resulting from allowing these applications to go forward.

I am extremely disappointed at the seemingly rash planning decisions being made by the Planning Department which are affecting our quality of life. Soon there will be hundreds more cars travelling through the village and it will never be the same again. Although we are in the 'front line' in Milton Road, all our issues affect the rest of the village too. I would also mention the access to the Pye development at the end of Milton Road. A huge cement lorry was parked outside the entrance recently and, observing the speed limit, but in poor light, we were suddenly confronted with it: it really is a hazard to traffic coming from the direction of Milton.

I am grateful to the Parish Council, especially Bill Hanks, who has listened to our issues and acted promptly upon them.

#### FURTHER COMMENT ON 'TO FRACK OR NOT TO FRACK' ......DECEMBER ISSUE

Arguments against using Fracked hydrocarbons to maintain Britain's energy supply make fulsome assumptions on the potential and economics of using so called Green Energy; in particular it assumes Solar Heating, Photovoltaic Electricity and Wind power can offer a realistic substitute to the present hydrocarbon based U.K. energy supply.

The short term answer is that Green Energy cannot achieve this.

Much of the investment in Green Energy in Britain over the last ten years duplicates programmess used in Australia over 50 years ago. Australia has a unique insight because it is probably the only developed country *without* a national energy grid. It has therefore been forced to adopt alternative energy programs for many years, and learned some lessons.

#### WIND FARM PROBLEMS – STORAGE AND MAINTENANCE

- \* Wind power is economically useless on a large scale without a viable storage system.....and
  - in Britain most if not all Wind Farms have no means of storage. Until this is tackled widespread investment in Wind power is a political folly...perhaps one among many.
  - In Australia most windmills used over the last 100 years have used pumped water storage to balance the demand and supply fluctuations of these systems.
- \* Wind generators are very maintenance intensive, yet maintenance costs are almost always excluded from promoter's proposals for wind farms. Anyone visiting the Spanish coast between Tarifa and Gibraltar will immediately observe that up to 25 % of the large number of windmills located there are not operating due to bearing or gearbox failure or other maintenance problems. ( Geoffrey de Havilland partly solved this problem in the 1950's by designing a hollow propeller windmill with holes in the propeller tips producing a substantial vacuum which was then fed to an air generator at ground level thereby drastically reducing bearing and gearbox maintenance loads.)

#### SOLAR HEATING PROBLEMS – WHEN YOU NEED MOST HEAT- ITS WINTER SUN, AND COLD

\* Even in Australia solar heating is a marginal investment, requiring long payback times to recover the initial investment (typically 15 to 20 years). Sure you get lots of hot water...but hot water is only a small percentage of the average U.K. household energy cost. Solar heat for the big cost — central heating - requires a very large initial investment in a heat pump and a very well built and large property, with a very long payback. It simply doesn't work for a two bedroom semi or even a four bedroom detached house in the U.K.

In Britain the economics of solar heaters even for hot water are questionable. The exception is Passive Solar Heating built into a new house. Still the best Solar House I've ever seen had a south facing wall made of beer bottles containing water....a very efficient and economic solar system for central heating, but perhaps impractical for Sutton Courtenay High St.

#### SOLAR ELECTRICITY - PHOTOVOLTAICS HAVE LOW ENERGY EFFICIENCY AND...

#### A BALANCE OF PAYMENTS PROBLEM.

Photovoltaics convert less than 20% of the solar intake. They are expensive to install, are almost all made outside the U.K., and the current inverters used are unlikely to last the payback period required ( read your contract carefully on this component).

They therefore represent a questionable capital investment risk, a significant balance of payments problem if widely adopted, and most uses are highly regressive using subsidies from conventional electricity users to subsidise those able to afford the up front PV cost.

It is also questionable whether using farmland, where crop growing is a very efficient use of solar energy, for inefficient photovoltaic 'farms' makes any sense in Britain where arable land is scarce. Place them on buildings... or on waste land.....but using farm land is daft.

#### SO WHAT TO DO?

- \*Invest in Green Energy only if all the costs including maintenance and insurance are included. It's a mature industry and should stand on its merits.
- \* Stop using regressive taxpayer funded subsidies to meet political targets .. a fool's game...there are better areas for energy investment.
- \* On a national scale substituting Fracking gas for imported or deep mined coal is probably at least as green and better for the carbon problem than shipping wind and photovoltaic systems from far off China....and certainly we could use a reduced balance of payments.
- \* For the average home saving energy using a growing range of conservation technologies, smart meters and thermostats, waste air and water exchange, air tightness testing, LED lighting and new glazing technology, floor and external wall insulation, energy monitoring....can all provide much better economies than solar energy collectors, and lower investment risk.

Above all Green Energy is never free and should stand on its own economics against the current mix of nuclear and hydrocarbons - unless there is a case for supporting U.K. jobs.
