

VILLAGE HALL BOOKINGS



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

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

New Council is formed

13 residents keen to be on the Parish Council stood for election, and the new Council came into being on 11th May, with its first meeting being held on 12th May. Your new councillors are: Rita Atkinson, David Butler, Christopher Campbell, Teresa Field, William Hanks, David Hignell, Martin Howell, Michael Jenkins, Heather Knight, Claire Myerson, and Stephen Noys, Details about your new council members appear elsewhere in this issue, and on the Council's noticeboard.



Thanks must go, not only to the councillors who decided not to stand this time, Jason Warwick and Colin Woodward, for their efforts on the Council and on behalf of the community over the last 4 years, but also to the unsuccessful candidates in the election, Karl Gebhart and Ron Mead. The village is fortunate in having people who are prepared to devote much time working voluntarily for the community, and who were willing to serve on the Council.

Didcot A Demolition - Update

The demolition is half way through a 30 month demolition contract. The turbine hall, roof and sides have gone. Asbestos work has nearly been completed. At present, 30,000 tons of steel have been removed. The remaining main building will be cut in two and each half blown down, the first in August and the second in December of this year. The three remaining cooling towers will be taken down next year, however the method of taking these down is still being decided.

At present there are 130 people on site, but this will go down this year to 50.

Abbey Footway

Last month it was reported that the County Council was able to repair only one small section of the Abbey footway, and most of it, they considered to be in an acceptable state and condition. The Parish Council is not happy with this response, as tarmac has been placed on the old cobbled path, and come the Autumn weather, there is a very real chance of the remainder of the path becoming wet, muddy and slippery again as it has on previous occasions. The Parish Council is continuing to pursue the matter. Again, the Parish Council would encourage you, if you have had problems using this path, to contact the County Council either by emailing <code>highway.enquiries@oxfordshire.gov.uk</code> or telephoning 0845 310 11 11

Culham HydroPower

Concerns have been raised with the Parish Council that trees near the weirs have been felled.

There is a planning consent in existence for the creation of an Archimedean screw hydro power system. This provides for the felling of 17 trees, but also for an arboriculture method statement to be deposited with the District Council, for the protection of retained trees. A landscaping scheme too will be deposited with the District Council for approval.

The Parish Council is checking with the District Council that all necessary statements have been supplied to that Council, and that the trees that have been taken out are those with consent to be removed.

Rest in Peace

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of the following who has died recently:

Peter Joseph MERNAGH, who died on 26th March 2015, was born on 22nd February 1938 and grew up in Greenanne County with his parents, Jane and Morris, and his six siblings, Jem, Lil, Marge, Morris, Maura and Frances. Pete ran free, most of the time barefooted, in lovely countryside. Pete was a very kind and gentle man with the gift of the gab and the Irish charm. He left Ireland when he was seventeen and went to the north of England where he had numerous jobs before joining the RAF during which time he served in Germany and Benson. He married Renee, the mother of Michael, and they went on to have two children of their own, Jamie and Janice who between them gave Pete five grandchildren: Jamie's children Declan and Naimhe and Janice and Mark's children Laura, Claire and Hannah. His family were his life and he adored them. For many years he ran a haulage business with his son Jamie. Pete enjoyed watching horse racing and would spend hours going over form. Jackie's daughter Sharon would look over his shoulder and would point to a horse saying "that one" because she liked the name and the horse often would win which really annoyed Pete. Pete used to love going to the pub in the days when they had sing-songs at the weekend. Another love of Pete's was money. "Money, money, money." He loved having it but rarely let it leave his fingers. He would sit with his grandchildren counting out his loose change and when he was asked one day what he would do with a million pounds if he won the lottery he said he would draw it out of the bank so that he could count it every day! Pete was a disaster when it came to DIY. Jackie once asked him to hang up a kitchen tool set on the wall near the sink. He sat on the sink top counter and started to drill a hole when all of a sudden there was a blue flash and the drill blew out of his hands across the floor leaving him looking somewhat bemused with sticking up hair. Lucky for him his feet were off the ground! Pete loved watching quiz shows which tested his general knowledge. He was very clever and knowledgeable, knowing something about everything. Sadly in recent years Pete's health deteriorated with macular degeneration causing him to go nearly blind and he struggled for breath due to pulmonary fibrosis of the lungs. He will be greatly missed by his partner of over 32 years, Jackie, and all his family and friends.



NAG5 5AFETY CORNER

New PCSO

Appleford, Drayton and Sutton Courtenay residents may well have spotted our new PCSO, Sue Haynes, who has now taken over from PCSO Sandra Syphas. Please do say hello if you see her out and about. She can be contacted by calling non-emergency police number 101.

Cyclists

NAG5 and the police have been contacted again about cyclists who continue to cross Sutton (usually known as Culham) Bridge at speed on the footpath. It is an offence to cycle on a footpath. If cyclists do not wish to cycle across the bridge on the road, or are concerned about getting across before the lights change, they should dismount and walk on the footpath with their bicycle. The following extracts are taken from the Highway Code, Rules for Cyclists (59 to 82). Full details can be found in printed copies of the Highway Code or online by visiting https://www.gov.uk/rules-for-cyclists-59-to-82.

- You MUST NOT cycle on a pavement.
 Laws HA 1835 sect 72 & R(S)A 1984, sect 129
- You MUST obey all traffic signs and traffic light signals.
 Laws RTA 1988 sect 36 & TSRGD reg 10(1)
- You MUST NOT cross the stop line when the traffic lights are red. Some junctions have an advanced stop line to
 enable you to wait and position yourself ahead of other traffic (see Rule 178).
 Laws RTA 1988 sect 36 & TSRGD regs 10 & 36(1)
- At night your cycle MUST have white front and red rear lights lit. It MUST also be fitted with a red rear reflector (and amber pedal reflectors, if manufactured after 1/10/85). White front reflectors and spoke reflectors will also help you to be seen. Flashing lights are permitted but it is recommended that cyclists who are riding in areas without street lighting use a steady front lamp. Law RVLR regs 13, 18 & 24

The neighbourhood police team will be carrying out random checks on cyclists at Culham Bridge over the next few weeks.

Fraudulent car sales

Action Fraud and the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) have been made aware that online auction websites are being used by fraudsters to advertise vehicles for sale which do not exist.

The fraudster advertises on an auction website and gets their victim to agree to purchase a vehicle, making sure that all correspondence is via e-mail. The victim then receives e-mails which claim to be from



genuine payment merchants or auction websites, which state that the money they have paid for the vehicle will be held in an 'escrow account'. The e-mail indicates the money will be released to the seller once the person has confirmed that they're happy with the purchase. The e-mail says that this will provide the person with 'buyer protection'. In reality these e-mails are fraudulent. They don't come from the named companies, and the bank accounts are controlled by fraudsters.

Protect yourself:

- Always stay within the terms and conditions of the auction website.
- Remember that PayPal do not include vehicles under their buyer protection.
- Meet the seller 'face-to-face' and view the vehicle before parting with any money.
- Be wary of e-mails that purport to be from genuine companies, and check the 'domain' name of the e-mail address
 for any inconsistencies.
- Check feedback online by searching any associated phone numbers or e-mail addresses of the seller.

Hydro-electric power

I read with interest David Mackenzie's recent letters in two copies of the SC News, relating to alternative energy sources, and their likely economic benefit, and it seemed to me that he had made some very good points there. However I want to write about some probable misunderstandings about climate change and 'renewable' energy sources. At the moment the world as a whole is very reliant on fossil fuels (these are coal, oil, and natural gas) and might in the future rely on fracking gas. However if one is concerned about climate change and the emission of greenhouse gases (CO2 and methane) then all of these fossil fuels are 'non-green' including fracking gas which is just another hydro-carbon, and produces CO2 when burnt just the same as coal and oil. It is difficult to see why there is so much interest in fracking gas when there are so many serious environmental concerns with it and it is no 'greener' than ordinary natural gas. Also as a general principle, the use of all fossil fuels must be reduced for the long term benefit of the planet, it is squandering valuable natural resources (for which there is no known way of replenishing) and which are vital for chemical production as well as just for heat. Therefore the long term energy requirements must be weaned off fossil fuels and use 'renewables' which are solar power, and wind and tidal power. Hydroelectric power in effect is another natural use of solar power: the sun's heat makes clouds, which make rivers, which flow down mountains and hills to the sea and their down hill flow can be used to drive turbines for hydro-power.

The other source of energy is 'geothermal' which uses the Earth's interior heat, which is very large, and manifests itself in the form of volcanoes, hot springs etc but is only available economically in a very few areas of the world.

On the subject of hydro- electric power, considerable interest has been shown recently in the use of Archimedes screws for power generation along the Thames, normally alongside weirs. Although this is superficially attractive, there are two areas of concern about the expenditure of large amount of money on such schemes. Compared with the electricity requirements of the whole country, the amount of power that can be generated in small schemes on the Thames is practically insignificant. This is because of two main factors. A significant quantity of power generation requires a large head of water difference between the water supply source and the turbine discharge and a large reliable water flow rate throughout the whole year. Neither of these is available on the Thames. The head of water available is just a few feet at each weir, (and then only when the Thames is not in flood, at which time there is practically no head of water difference across the weirs, as I have witnessed at Sutton Courtenay weir). So when there is almost no head difference —no power! The other potential problem is in the summer during dry periods when the Thames flow rate is very slow. Will the operators of the Archimedes screws be allowed to divert so much water from the weir /lock areas that it jeopardises the use of the locks especially in the summer when there is a large cruiser use of locks?

A year or so ago I wrote to the environment agency asking questions about these very topics including how many months on the year on average the Thames is in flood, and what is the flow rate in the summer in very dry periods so that could be compared to the projected water use for the Archimedes screw, and for the locks. Result: no answer! So it seems that these questions have not been asked formally and have not been answered, and unless they can be answered satisfactorily, the Archimedes screw systems are non—starters.

Cyclists and traffic signs

The two bridges over the Thames that connect Sutton Courtenay and Culham have increasingly become more dangerous for pedestrians. This is also true of the footpath along the Sutton Courtenay Pools and their weirs. In the former case, individuals walking along the pavement have been abused, both verbally and physically, by cyclists who refuse to ride on the road or dismount their bicycles. This is not a shared path and cyclists can be subject to a fine by police if caught breaking this law. In the latter case, one resident walking her dogs who was approaching the weirs from the Culham end (where there is no signage) felt threatened by a pack of cyclists. Cyclists of all ages have been known to create these problems. This is clearly dangerous for individuals of all ages walking alone, with a child in a pushchair or with dogs being walked on leads.

Cyclists who do not wish to obey the traffic signals or who fear riding on the roads with single lane traffic should not Continued

break the law and put pedestrians at risk because of either their fear or unwillingness to walk their bicycles on the pavement. The police, our local Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG), our MP and our parish council have all been notified. Three examples include my husband getting punched in the face by a cyclist; our family dog was nearly hit by a car when it slipped its lead during an altercation with two cyclists; a neighbour was spat on by a cyclist. Given this level of abuse, I appealed to Ed Vaizey, MP, to help approach the OCC for clear signage. He did so and the reply from Mark Kemp, Deputy Director Commercial at the OCC was incredibly illogical, bureaucratic and unhelpful: "There is no sign in the Traffic Signs Regulations and Directions that reminds people not to do something they should know is illegal. Cycle signs on footpaths are "permissive" in that they positively identify where a process has been followed to make it legal to cycle on the path, rather than remind people it is illegal. This is, therefore, not something we would support."

So, to Mark Kemp's argument, I offer the following rebuttal: Many cyclists are unaware of the illegality of what they do or choose to ignore the law and so his argument is illogical and without merit. Moreover, there is a sign listed in the Highway Code that means "Riding of Pedal Cycles Prohibited" and shows a picture of a bicycle with the red ring around the edge, providing the exact solution required. I do not believe a temporary, non-Highway Code sign will be sufficient to deter those intent on breaking the law.

Care and maintenance of All Saints' Church

You published a letter last month which questioned the care which goes into the wonderful village asset which is All Saints Church. Open to all, available whenever any one wants to pop in for a moment of quiet reflection, and used for centuries past for villagers to meet. It is an architectural gem, mostly late English Gothic but with traces of earlier styles and worthily listed Grade 1. A real asset.

May I therefore reassure any doubters that it is very carefully looked after and explain how we do it?

First and foremost, it costs money, never easy. Legacies, grants from the Friends, special collections all ensure that the Fabric fund maintains a contingency against the many routine and unexpected demands - currently £30,000. Never enough but we get by. There is no State support, unlike most other European countries [and which has the greater heritage?]

Secondly, we have a team of volunteers who clean the inside, keep the churchyard as an oasis of calm and peace and do the essential maintenance jobs like painting, clearing gutters and drains.

And the major works. In the last 10 years - helped by a generous legacy [interestingly, not from a regular churchgoer] we have

- Reduced the infestation of Death Watch Beetle.
- Repaired downspouts and gutters
- Dried the building by replacing incorrect cement render and by improving ventilation.
- Updated the electrical installation
- Installed heating
- Made a flat carpeted area at the front of the nave for concerts and other events
- Redecorated
- Repaired the boundary walls.
- And this week we are engaged in improving access for wheelchair users.

Everything is done under the eagle eye of English Heritage and the Church Authorities, who also require an independent inspection by a specialist Architect every 5 years. The 2015 inspection has just reported most favourably - some routine maintenance but no major repairs are needed.

As Chair of the Fabric Committee, I feel privileged to be entrusted with the care of such a wonderful building and I am grateful to all who support our work.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

This is just a short note to thank the electors of Appleford and Sutton Courtenay for re-electing me as your District Councillor. I will of course do my best to help repay that trust. I expect you all know by now that there was somehing of a landslide in the poll against the Liberal Democrats. The Council itself has been reduced in size, but difference in numbers between LDs and Tories was very close; now it is 29-9 in Tory favour. It remains to be seen what exactly that will mean.

The main issue is likely to continue to be planning with all major political parties promising more and more houses. The present Government seems determined not to do much to look at the relative merits of a particular large building site (the older way of doing planning) but now to work backwards from very high overall numbers, not caring too much where the houses go so long as the numbers are met. I will keep you posted from time to time on housing and other matters.

* Coffee and Walnut cake:

For the cake: 100g/4oz soft butter, 100g/4oz castor sugar, 100g/4oz self-raising flour, 2 large eggs, 1 tsp baking powder,50g/2oz chopped walnuts, 1 tbsp coffee essence.

For the filling and topping:75g/3oz butter, softened,

225g/8oz icing sugar, sifted, 2 tsp milk, 2 tsp coffee essence, 8 walnut halves, to decorate.

Preheat oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Grease and line the bases of two 18cm/7in diameter sandwich tins. Beat together all the cake ingredients in a large bowl until well combined and smooth. Divide the mixture between the cake tins and bake for 20-25 minutes. Allow to stand for five minutes before turning onto a wire rack to cool. For the filling and topping, beat the butter and gradually add the icing sugar. When all is added, add the milk and coffee essence and beat until smooth. Spread half the coffee icing on one cake and sandwich together with the other half. Ice the top of the cake with the remaining coffee icing and decorate with walnut pieces.
