

Mobile Library Changes

Oxfordshire County Council has introduced changes to the mobile library service with effect from 6th July. The library will now visit Sutton Courtenay on Tuesdays on a fortnightly basis. In future, commencing from Tuesday 14th July, the library will stop at Chapel Lane from 14.50 – 15.10 and then Bradstocks Way between 15.15. – 15.45. Sutton Bridge - Cycling

Letters in the last issue of Sutton Courtenay News referred to cycling on the footways across the Sutton bridge. With the Sustrans cycle route going from Peep O Day Lane through Sutton Courtenay to Didcot, there are numerous cyclists elsewhere in the village, and reports have been received that it is not only the bridge where cyclists appear on the paths. The Parish Council is contacting the County Council to see what can be done to ensure the safety of everyone.

Redrow Homes

Redrow Homes are proposing a housing development north of Hobbyhorse Lane on a site identified in the District Council's local plan as Sutton Courtenay East. The planning application has not yet been lodged. The Council is keeping a close watch on progress on the site, and will keep the parish informed when the Application is lodged. In case this is over the Summer months, anyone interested in looking at the details, will be able to find it, when lodged, on the website of the Vale of White Horse District Council www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk.

Neighbourhood Plan

A village group has been working on a community led plan which gives everyone the chance to say what they think about the issues affecting the community and how they would like it to develop. In addition to community led plans, the Localism Act introduced new rights and powers to allow local communities to contribute towards planning their areas by preparing a Neighbourhood Plan. A Neighbourhood Plan is not compulsory, and may not be the best option for addressing the issues in the area. On the other hand a new statutory document which sets out the objectives for Sutton Courtenay may have some merits.

Whilst the Parish Council does not usually meet in August, its members have decided to meet on Tuesday 4th August at 7.30 p.m. in the village hall to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of such a Plan. This is not a usual council meeting, as there is only one item on the agenda, but the public are welcome to attend and listen.

P15/V0841/FUL Renewal of temporary planning consent for 2 containers to store equipment at the recreation ground, Old Wallingford Way. The Council had no objections to the application.

I am very pleased to inform you that Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School has been judged to be an **OUTSTANDING** church school.

As a church school, Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School is subject to an inspection – known as SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools.)

SIAMS inspection focuses on the effect that the Christian ethos of the church has on the children who attend it. The principle objective is to evaluate the distinctiveness and effectiveness of the school as a church school through three questions:



Love life; love learning; love one another

- How well the school, through its distinctive Christian character, meet the needs of all learners?
- What is the impact of collective worship on the school community?
- How effective are the leadership and management of the school as a church school?

Our school was found to be **OUTSTANDING** in every area during the inspection in May.

The report states that the distinctiveness and effectiveness of Sutton Courtenay as a Church of England School are outstanding.

This is because:

- An exceptionally clear, strong and vibrant ethos firmly embedded in Christian values has been established in which the pupils thrive academically and personally.
- Very strong, Christian leadership by the Head Teacher in partnership with committed governors and a dedicated staff enables Sutton Courtenay to continuously develop and strengthen as an Anglican school.
- An extremely firm and mutually beneficial partnership has been established with the parish church, its clergy and community which enhances and strengthens the school's Anglican character.
- The strong, caring Christian ethos together with the impeccable example set by adults within the school produces well behaved, respectful and mutually supportive children who have a real desire to learn and achieve.

The school is obviously very proud of this achievement — As the outstanding grade is not given out to many schools. This outcome would not have been achieved without the work of The Reverend Helen Kendrick and other members of the church community who have worked very closely with the committed staff and governors who, along with the children of course, make Sutton Courtenay C of E Primary School a very special place to be. From the Ministry Team...

'Open the Book' reaches 2000 schools

For as long as there have been people, there have been stories. We all love stories, whether they are long or short, happy or sad, serious or silly. We are inspired by stories of hope and touched by stories of disappointment. Some people love fantastical stories of dragons and wizards, princesses and magical lands. Others prefer tales of rags-to-riches, heroes-to-zeroes, quests, rescues and thrilling adventures. And in many ways, your own life is a story! The Bible is one of the greatest collections of stories ever known but increasingly younger generations are becoming 'bible illiterate'.

In order to stem this the Bible Society launched a programme called 'Open the Book' and it has recently announced that this initiative can now be found in 2000 registered primary schools, and that there are 11,000 volunteer Bible storytellers going into schools across the UK. One of those 2000 schools and five of those 11,000 volunteers are in Sutton Courtenay where each Thursday morning we 'Open the Book' in our village school.

'Open the Book' is a three-year rolling programme of themed and dramatised Bible stories, which are presented by teams of volunteers, free of charge, to primary schools. Volunteers present Bible stories in primary schools in an accessible and enjoyable way and provide a resource that assists schools in meeting their statutory collective worship obligations.

The volunteers use drama, mime, props, costume — and even the children and staff themselves. All storytellers agree to a strict code of conduct and follow the guidelines in the Open the Book handbook. Volunteers stick to the script and outline for each session and present the story simply, without addition or improvisation.

Since January a team of us from All Saints' Church have been running 'Open the Book'. We don't teach or preach, but simply tell stories. We allow each story to speak for itself, liaise closely with the school and show respect and sensitivity to those of other faiths. It is a great opportunity to engage imaginatively with the rich source of stories in the Bible. We love telling the stories and the children love playing their part — we have no shortage of volunteers of all ages to take on the different roles — as well as listening to the stories.

A team of us have also had the privilege recently of leading the Year 6 children in three 'Experience' afternoons. For the first one we experienced the events of Holy Week; the second we experienced the post-Easter events with Jesus and his disciples and in the third we entered imaginatively into the experiences of Pentecost.

It is a privilege to be part of school life in this way and to help enrich the lives of the children with knowledge and spark their imaginations with experience of these stories.

We are also delighted at the result of the recent SIAMS Report (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools). As you will read on the school page of the News, the school achieved an 'outstanding' which is a wonderful accolade to the dedication of a tremendous team of staff, governors, parents and children led by the Head Teacher, Alison Ashcroft. It is indeed a church school to be proud of in the heart of our community.

GraveTalk - THINKING ABOUT DEATH AND DYING? - come and join the conversation

We would like to invite you to an afternoon in All Saints' Church to explore questions about death and dying, funerals and loss. This might be a strange invitation but we would like to help you think about these issues and perhaps start to plan what you would like to happen at your funeral.

The Church of England is the biggest single provider of funerals in England, with around 3,300 funerals held each week in churches, crematoria, cemeteries and green burial sites all being led by Church of England ministers — clergy and readers.

The afternoon will take the form of a relaxed café style in the church 2.30pm-4pm on Wednesday 8th July 2015.

Possible questions range from: 'What would you like your lasting legacy to be?', 'How do you feel about being asked to wear bright colours at a funeral', to 'What music would you like to have played or sung at your funeral?'

Recent research from Mintel (2014) shows the need for GraveTalk, showing that less than one in five (16%) people have made written funeral plans. The research highlighted that many people who want to make a funeral plan haven't yet done so, with three fifths (61%) of respondents feeling that it was important to make at least some plans for the kind of funeral they'd like to have.

The Revd Canon Dr Sandra Millar, head of Projects and Development for the Archbishops' Council said: "We have been helping people to think about the big questions of life and death for generations. Our local clergy and lay people are a valuable source of support and help at every stage. Whether it is thinking about what hymns and readings you might want in your funeral service, or finding someone to listen during the painful journey of grief, a local church can play a big part in getting people talking about death and dying."

Refreshments will be provided. There is no charge for this event.

REST IN PEACE

We send our condolences and the assurance of our prayers to the family and friends of Barbara Hands who has died recently:

Barbara Ann HANDS who died, aged 81, on 19th May 2015 was born in Marcham in 1933 where she was brought up by her parents, Nellie and Ernest along with her two sisters, Daphne and Eva. She went to primary school in Marcham before winning a place at Wallingford Grammar. She always said she had a happy childhood and loved growing up in the countryside with the freedom to roam. On leaving school she did a variety of secretarial work including working at MG and for Debenhams. Over the years she also worked part-time at Amey's and then fulltime as Secretary to Mr Amey. She retired from there when she was fifty. Barbara met Ken Hands at a dance. They were engaged for seven years until they had saved up enough money to put down a deposit to buy a house. They were eventually married in Marcham on 14th March 1959 and began their married life in Sutton Courtenay. Their son David was born in January 1960 and then Sally followed in 1962. She loved both of them dearly and her grandchildren who brought so much joy to her life. Barbara's instinctive and naturally caring nature meant that she loved being a wife and a mother – caring and providing for the family. As a Mum she was always there and her non-judgmental attitude and open-mindedness meant that she was easy to talk to. Anyone who has ever visited her home will know that she kept it spotlessly clean and food and drink would always be offered to make you feel even more welcome. She was a good cook - whether it was making Sunday Roasts for the family, a cake for any occasion, or providing dishes for the bring and share events at church, WI or Women's Christian Fellowship. In recent times she very much enjoyed the Hungry Saints lunches at The Swan. Over the years the family enjoyed regular holidays - caravanning in Scotland and Wales and once in Cornwall - or in David and Sally's words - wherever it rained they went! Barbara loved her garden and would spend hours tending it. It was lovely to go there for the WCF Garden Parties and enjoy the beautiful haven she had created. Sadly Ken died in 2003 but Barbara rebuilt her life, with the help of family and friends, and continued to enjoy time away on coach trips as well as keeping herself busy with all her village and church commitments. She never turned down an invitation and loved to go out! She also loved shopping – particularly for shoes and handbags. When at home she was never idle - she loved reading but would never just sit and watch TV without doing a Tapestry or knitting. In her younger days she used to cycle everywhere or walk to visit friends - she never learnt to drive — but this obviously helped to keep her fit and active until her final illness. She was a loyal and faithful member of our worshipping community at All Saints with a deep personal Christian faith. She was of course a stalwart of the Young Wives which morphed, as the wives 'matured', into the Women's Christian Fellowship and over the years had been Secretary and Chairman. She was also very involved in the WI and had been both Outings Secretary and the General Secretary. She led a very active social life with friends across the village and loved to help in any way that she could. She was always interested in people and never failed to be friendly and welcoming with a warm smile. Love shone out of her. Following her terminal diagnosis a little over a year ago she made the courageous decision not to have any treatment and the way in which she died was an inspiration to all who knew her. Her quiet acceptance of what was to come; her faith that all would be well and her decision to simply live each moment and be thankful for all the riches of her life was truly humbling to witness. It was a privilege to visit and spend time with her and every time we shared communion she never failed to give thanks for the blessings of her life or to keep her many friends in her prayers. She was always grateful for the care and support she received from her family, friends and neighbours which enabled her to remain in her home in her final illness. Barbara was a modest and assuming but immensely caring, faith filled person. She was a loyal friend who made a difference to the lives of those who knew her and who will all greatly miss her. This is an edited extract from the address given by the Reverend Helen Kendrick at Barbara's funeral, which was held in All Saints' Church on 4th June 2015.

Also this month we have a representative attending the AGM at The Royal Albert Hall, where I do believe the guest of honour is to be the Queen herself! She actually joined the WI in 1943.

On 21 July our speaker is Angela Panrucker. She is going to share with us her passion for the history and pageantry of the annual event held at Windsor Castle - the Order of the Garter.

Our Oxfordshire federation teams have organised trips to the National Memorial Arboretum and the City of Gloucester. We have an evening with John Craven and a Mendelson music taster day on the calendar too.

Whilst on a Royal note, I understand that the president of Anmer WI has recently written to the Duchess of Cambridge asking if she would like to join the WI. If you are new to the area, I confess that our President will not be writing to you to invite you individually to our meetings, but you can be sure that you will be made very welcome. NAG5 5AFETY CORNER

As the weather warms up and the summer holiday season gets into full swing here are a few reminders to keep your property secure and for trouble-free motoring and travel.

Home security

- Keep ground floor or accessible windows shut and locked in rooms you are not using, and lock up properly
 before going to bed. Insurance companies often won't pay out if a burglary is the result of an insecure
 door or window.
- Keep wallets, credit cards, house keys, car keys and other valuables out of sight.
- While in the garden don't leave accessible windows and doors open.
- If you're carrying out repairs or DIY jobs to your home don't leave tools, ladders and power tools out. Keep them locked up.
- Check the security of sheds, garages and gates and ensure it is adequate.

Holidays

- Ensure that all doors and windows are closed and locked.
- Use timer switches on lamps and radios to give the impression that the house is occupied.
- Tell your neighbours you are going away so that they can keep an eye on your property.
- Don't leave the curtains closed during the day. If you want them closed overnight ask someone you trust to do it and to open them again each morning.
- Cancel milk and newspaper deliveries.

Summer travel tips

- Avoid your car overheating by checking the coolant reservoir level regularly. Look out for wet or white staining on coolant hoses. Check the fan by running the car to normal temperature and allowing the engine to idle for 5-10 minutes. The cooling fan should cut in automatically.
- Check the oil level and top up if necessary.
- Check wiper blades for wear or splitting check the windscreen washer fluid level and ensure washer jets are angled correctly and not blocked.
- Check that all exterior lights are working, and that they comply with legal regulations particularly if you are travelling to Europe.
- Check tyres and spare tyre for pressure, adjusting for extra load if appropriate. Also check the tread depth

 the current minimum legal tread depth is 1.6mm (for vehicles up to 3500 kw gvw). Check caravan tyres
 for cracking and renew if necessary.
- The RAC recommends carrying the following items in your vehicle: first aid kit;, warning triangle; high visibility vest/jacket; fire extinguisher; empty fuel can; additional engine oil and water for topping up; light bulb kit; up to date road map or sat-nav and an in-car mobile phone charger.
- Don't leave valuables in a parked car.
- If you have a spare set of car keys take them with you. Keys are all too easily lost in the sand on a beach, or the remote control can be, mistakenly, taken for a swim.
- Remember to shut car windows and sunroofs as well as locking the doors.
- When cycling remember to lock your bike using a good quality D-lock, even if you only leave your bike for a minute or two.

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

Lesley Clements was right to indicate in June's edition that the SC News is no place for a national house builder to advertise. The ethos of the News , since its inception, is that this Parish magazine is provided through public funding — church, Parish ratepayers via the Parish Council, private donations and advertisements from small, local businesses, in line with its local community mission; but there is more.

Many villagers consider Redrow to have damaged the Parish by their development in Milton Road. This was demonstrated by packed out protest meetings in the village hall and an unprecedented number of objections to the planning authority, on the strong grounds of flood threat, traffic and the further reduction of the scant number of fields left in our "rural" village. So concerned were many, they provided funds for expert reports on the flooding, overflowing sewage and traffic problems that the development could create, throughout the village — regrettably ignored by the planning authority.

Redrow, by placing an advert with the SC News, is mocking village sentiment about its activities here, using its hefty treasure chest to do so. It is doubly annoying that the company is using the services of a ratepayer subsidised publication, dependent on local volunteers, the very local ratepayers it has so disobliged. The editors might like to reflect that while the adverts were in place, those living near the development were disturbed by building noise and vibration in their homes, many heavy lorries passing to & fro and noise from water pumps, as Canute-like attempts are made to drain the high water table at the site, into the Gingebrook. They continue to be so.

It is to be hoped that should Diageo, of warehouse infamy, come along to the SC News, with another moneybag, they will be shown the door. And here's an example. While SC campaigned against the waste incinerator planned for us a few years back, a village in Hampshire was similarly threatened. As a sweetener, the incinerator company there offered to make a large donation to a financially struggling local youth football club. The boys, to a lad, refused the offer. To them, even if they lost their club, there was more to life than money. Think on't.

EDITORS' COMMENTS

Thank you for your response; we always appreciate feedback from our readers.

First we need to clarify 'public funding' for Sutton Courtenay newsletter. The printing costs of 1150 copies of a 40 page edition are currently around £550. Quite often an edition runs to 44 pages, the cost of which is around £600. In the last financial year Sutton Courtenay News received donations of under £700 (of which £500 was from the Parish Council and £150 was from the Church). This means that less than one edition per year is funded "publicly" and the rest of that edition and the remaining nine editions (there are ten editions each year) are funded solely by advertising. All other costs are absorbed by the volunteers who produce and distribute the News. The economics are clear: we need every penny we can make from our advertising to continue to produce a high quality local newsletter. We treat all advertising requests impartially. There are set advertising rates for regular, local advertisers and all other applications to advertise are negotiated on a case by case basis. With regard to the Redrow advertisement, it was placed after the planning process had been completed and planning permission granted. Should Diageo ultimately get to build the warehouse, having followed the due planning process, and it wishes to advertise job vacancies in the News that request to place an advert would be treated on a entirely commercial basis, as are all other requests to advertise.

Second, as a community newspaper, we are very aware of our responsibilities to all residents, tradesmen, tradeswomen and the businesses of Sutton Courtenay. We have recently published letters from residents protesting about the Redrow development, including this one and the following one. But we also have to be mindful of the fact that people will shortly be moving into the new homes. They have a right to be welcomed into their new village, as so many of us have been in the past.

I agree with Lesley Clements' comments in the June edition of the Sutton Courtenay News that not all residents were informed of the Redrow meeting and it is not therefore representative of the views of the whole village. Perhaps developers now consider it unnecessary to make an effort as current planning procedures appear to negate the need for meaningful consultation with local people, and developers are aware that they need to do very little to satisfy the few planning conditions imposed on them.

To demonstrate their attitude to local residents, we were recently treated to loud music playing at the ends of our gardens with two different sound systems vying with each other with two different kinds of music. This was accompanied by loud, raucous 'singing' (lovely). To their great discredit, Redrow was made fully aware of ill, vulnerable, very young and elderly residents living nearby and people like me who simply find themselves at home all day through no fault of their own. They just didn't care, despite continuing intervention from Bill Hanks, Gervase Duffield and the Environmental Health Department. It would be reassuring to think that the Vale might consider the impact of this behaviour before rubber stamping further applications from developers who behave in this way.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

SUTTON COURTENAY

Here we are then. For maybe the next 5 years. If all goes to plan, with a recovering economy based on a philosophy of growth at all costs — more houses everywhere — in or out of Europe — with or without the Scots — we will all be wealthier and happier. However doubtful some of us may be about the over-riding philosophy, it is the role of us in local politics to try to help to make it all happen.

Facing the challenges

Oxfordshire County faces some major problems. As a smaller County, its very size is a concern. Could services be delivered more cost-effectively? Is our system of 4 small Districts and 1 city council all pulling in different directions fit for the 21st century? When it comes to the Green Belt, Areas of outstanding natural beauty, agreeing and apportioning housing numbers, would we not carry more clout with central government together rather than the present ragbag of small self-interest groups we currently seem to be? And what about the A34 whose inadequacy blights the whole county and beyond? How do we persuade government to spend the billions necessary to sort it out when we work so poorly together? There is a duty of Cooperation under the Localism Act which seems to be being ignored in all of this – many would say along with Localism itself. The County cannot sort these problems out on its own. The Districts certainly cannot. We might, just might get somewhere if ALL our councils and maybe neighbouring Councils worked better together. As we are, our chances of delivering the infrastructure we will need to cope with economic growth look slim.

Flooding

The new FCC flood alleviation strategy is now agreed (after many months), FCC have found the money to pay for implementation and with almost all red tape boxes ticked, I am promised things are about to happen. After a frank exchange of views at a meeting I had with senior FCC Management, we agreed a way forward to justify the restarting of Liaison Committee meetings. The next will meeting will happen in the next few weeks (once flood alleviation work has begun) and I am hopeful of a new era in the relationship between FCC and the local community based on confidence and trust.

Drayton Road Traffic calming

Planned, promised and apparently paid for many months ago with s106 money, the delivery of this scheme and its predicted costs has been like chasing the end of a rainbow. It seems that we now have C£28000 towards the scheme, but it is now predicted to cost C£42000. At the recent PC meeting I was charged with trying to get the following information:

- 1. A breakdown of the costs
- 2. What Sutton Courtenay could get for the £28K

I will report back to the PC and SC news next month.

Home to School Transport

In the past year, there have been a number of instances of SC parents going to appeal over the County refusing to pay for School transport. It is no secret that they have had to tighten up the regulations to save money. However, there is a concern that the regulations may not be being applied fairly or consistently. In order to get some evidence to take to the authorities, we are sending round a brief questionnaire to those who may be affected and will report back on the results. Many thanks to Parish Councillors Bill Hanks and Stephen Noys for their help with this. If anyone feels they have been affected by this and have not received a questionnaire, please let me know.

ED VAIZEY MP

The General election campaign was a chance to hear about a lot of issues that concerned you. It won't surprise you to hear that the main concern I encountered was about housing development. I was, therefore, extremely pleased to hear that the Vale of White Horse Local plan is due to go before the planning inspector in September. Once it has been adopted the Vale can take proper control of housing development again and prevent the speculative applications currently coming forward. It will mean we get more housing but it will at least be controlled.

Other problems that were reported to me, which are related to development, were the pressures on Primary School places and on GP waiting times. I intend to look into these very carefully. The issues are complex and include demographics, constraints on school sites and encouraging young medics to take up General Practice. I will campaign on behalf of my constituents to try to ensure everyone has access to the services they need, when they need them.

I have worked with my Parliamentary colleagues in the past, and will continue to do so in future on plans to improve the rail line between Oxford and Bristol which includes the reopening of the Wantage Road Station at Grove. This would remove some of the pressure on Didcot Parkway Station and would provide a much needed alternative way for local residents to get to Oxford. I will continue to lobby at the highest level for this.

The issue of IVF funding has also recently been brought to my attention by several of my constituents and I plan to campaign hard on their behalf. Many deserving couples lose out on funding in Oxfordshire because of local rules — but they would be funded if they lived elsewhere. I will also continue my work to raise concerns about the side effects of roaccutane, a drug which has had such tragic consequences for a constituent of mine.

This month my postbag has been dominated by the debate on whether the Hunting Act should be repealed or not. I fully appreciate that this matter raises strong feelings on both sides of the argument, and I have indeed received many emails from numerous constituents on each side. The Prime Minister has said that a majority Conservative Government will give Parliament the opportunity to repeal the Hunting Act on a free vote, with a government bill in government time. In the event of such a vote, I would vote to repeal it. In my judgement the Act does nothing to protect wild animals and, in many cases, is actually detrimental to animal welfare when other methods of control are deployed, several of which can be indiscriminate.

* Coffee and Walnut cake:

For the cake: 100g/4oz soft butter, 100g/4oz castor sugar, 100g/4oz self-raising flour, 2 large eggs, 1 tsp baking powder,50g/2oz chopped walnuts, 1 tbsp coffee essence.

For the filling and topping:75g/3oz butter, softened,

225g/8oz icing sugar, sifted, 2 tsp milk, 2 tsp coffee essence, 8 walnut halves, to decorate.

Preheat oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Grease and line the bases of two 18cm/7in diameter sandwich tins. Beat together all the cake ingredients in a large bowl until well combined and smooth. Divide the mixture between the cake tins and bake for 20-25 minutes. Allow to stand for five minutes before turning onto a wire rack to cool. For the filling and topping, beat the butter and gradually add the icing sugar. When all is added, add the milk and coffee essence and beat until smooth. Spread half the coffee icing on one cake and sandwich together with the other half. Ice the top of the cake with the remaining coffee icing and decorate with walnut pieces.

PENSION SCAMS

Henley CAB has issued a warning to pensioners about scammers targeting their pension savings in the wake of the new pension rules.

Five types of scams have been reported:

- 1. Pension "transfers": Scammers charge pensioners high fees for moving their pensions but nothing happens; or the money is moved without their permission; or, if the pensioner agrees to the transfer, the money vanishes or is transferred to fraudulent schemes.
- 2. Pension savings become "investments": People are told that they can get more out of their savings by investing in goods like wine, or "revolutionary" new products or projects.
- 3. Pension "advice": Scammers offer "free" pension advice or a review of the victim's savings, which can cost money and be useless, or might just be a cover for obtaining crucial personal details.
- 4. Pensioners are offered services for a fee. In some cases no service is provided at all. In others, a service is provided but it is either expensive or not in the consumer's best interest.
- 5. Contacting people by email or telephone, scammers persuade victims to hand over personal data like their National Insurance number and bank account details. Sometimes the scammers will use information they already have, such as name of the victim's employer or pension provider.

Pension scam advice

- 1. Inform someone else about a possible scam, an unsolicited phone call or text, or offer of money.
- 2. Never give out your bank details or send money unless you are certain you can trust the person who has asked you to do this.
- 3. Don't feel pressured to make a decision straight away. Take your time.
- 4. Seek advice by calling the Citizens Advice consumer service on 03454 040506
- 5. Report a potential scam to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040

People approaching retirement with a defined contribution pension pot will be able to get face-to-face help from a Pension Wise expert in their local Citizens Advice Bureau.
